

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FHA Now Accepting Loan Applications

Farmers Home Administration is now accepting loan ap-plications from rural families plications from rural families who need to improve their housing, Robert J. Holloway, the agency's supervisor for Hansford, Hutchinson, Lipscomb and Ochiltree Counties said today.

Funds may be used to finance homes, building sites, and essential farm service buildings.

Under the new program pri-

Under the new program private capital will provide the bulk of the funds with the Farmers Home Administration making the loans and guaran-teeing the repayments of prin-cipal and interest to the investors.

Legislation implementing the new insured loan program was contained in the Housing and Urban Development Act of

Act authorizes the Farmers Home Administration insure loans totaling \$300 million each year for families in low or moderate income le-vels. These loans will bear in-

Additionally, loans bearing 5-3/4 percent interest can be insured for families with incomes above the moderate lev-

Holloway said that loans are available to families living on farms and in rural areas including towns of 5,500 population to construct, improve, repair rural homes and re-ed facilities, or farm service buildings, or to provide water for farmstead and housevice

hold use.
Families needing credit to improve their present housing may use loan funds to add may use loan funds to add bathrooms, central heating, modern kitchens, and other home improvements, as well as to enlarge or remodel farm service buildings and put in related facilities such as yard fences, driveways and side-

walks.

A farmer may borrow funds
to provide buildings for his use
or for the use of his tenants and

laborers.

A rural resident may use loan funds to buy a previously occupied house, or to buy a site on which to build his home or to build or repair a home on

land he owns.

Insured rural housing loans are made to applicants who are unable to obtain the required credit from other sour-
