Cold weather may be sign of "changing times" PDRA Improvements

The experts think this new type of weather may be with us from now on! Ten miles south of Spearman, Texas at the Albert Clark farm, they have had approximately 27 inches of snow this winter while here in town we have had about half same. Dumas also has 27 inches of snow. North of Spearman, the snow is heavier than in Spearman proper. The snow and slush has been with us off and on for 4 or 5 weeks and it has almost stopped "commerce" in the city of Spearman. The last burst of snow came Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday of this week with the temperature dipping to 4 above zero at 7:30 Friday morning. The streets are snow-packed, as a result of the 4 inches of snow Thursday, and the city is busy digging out from under the blast of snow.

Although many of the people are suffering from "cabin fever" they all agree that this is much better than a dust storm! One year ago, the wind had almost destroyed all of the windows in Spearman. Glass people could not start to put the windows in as fast as they blew out! Here at the Reporter Office, Tiny Gressett loaned us his truck tarp, we stretched it

over the window frame in front of the Reporter Office until the Glass people could replace the blown-out windows! Most everyone agrees that this is much better than dust! And many of the farmers are rejoicing over the snow. It definitely will work a hardship on the cattlemen, however, as they have been feeding for several weeks.

Oil field personnel are suffering from the cold! Many pumpers are having to walk into their units in the northern part of the county. Bulldozers are put into use to enable the pumpers to service their wells.

But people are learning to drive in the snow better; nothing like experience and the radial tires are working wonders on the ice and snow! Actually not many accidents have occurred in the city of Spearman.

Snow men are springing up all over Spearman and almost every street has a beautiful snow man peering at you as you drive by. Actually, the total moisture for the past week has amounted to .80, which is about 8 inches of snow, and this figures pretty close to what everyone figured on the inches.

Irrigation Gas Still Flowing

An official of Peoples Natural Gas Co. in Spearman, the largest supplier of natural gas for farm irrigation purposes in Hansford County, reported Friday, Feb. 17, that his company is not aware of any plans for curtailment at this time of natural gas to farmers for irrigation use.

His statement was released after reports had been heard in Spearman and vicinity of the possible imminent danger facing farmers in the Texas Panhandle and South Plains through curtailment of natural gas for irrigation farming if large industrial users requested additional natural gas supplies resulting in curtailment of farm irrigation supplies.

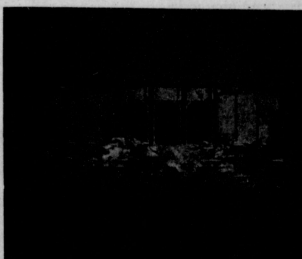
In other action during the meeting, the board heard the

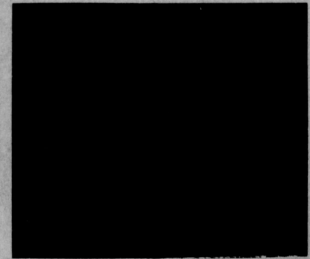

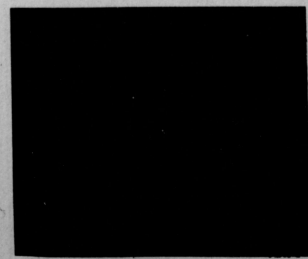

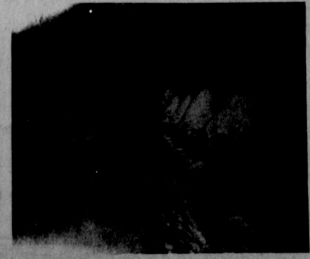

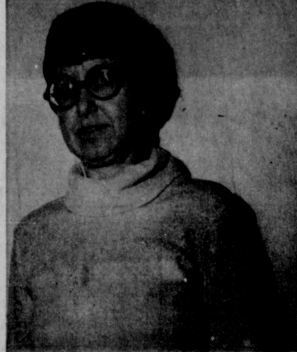
Piles of building materials, or an uncovered hole in the lawn, also might be attractive to an imaginative youngster. It's really your obligation as a homeowner to see that such dangers are

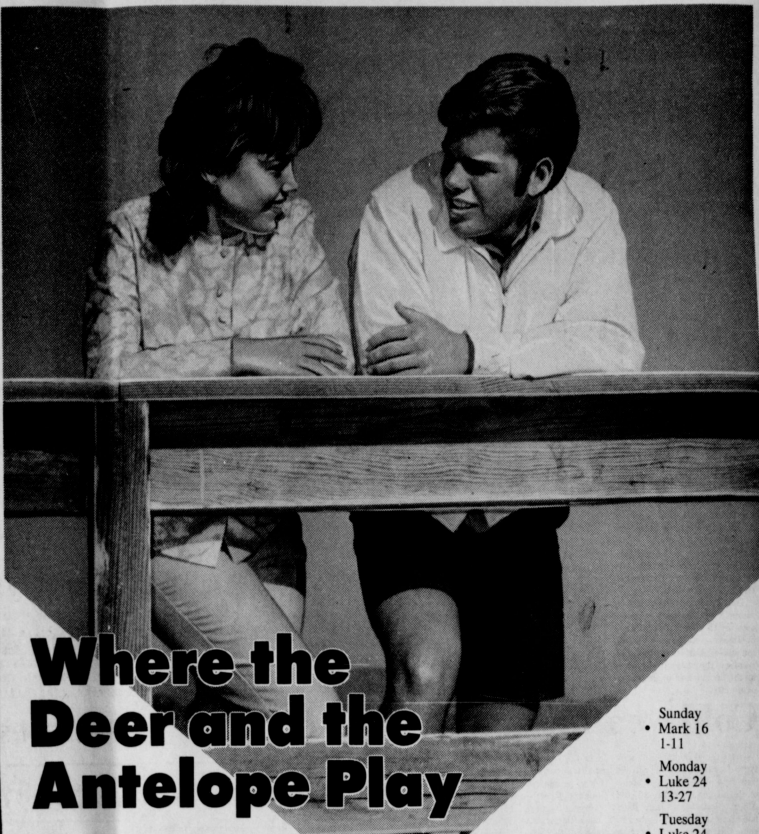

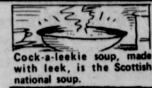

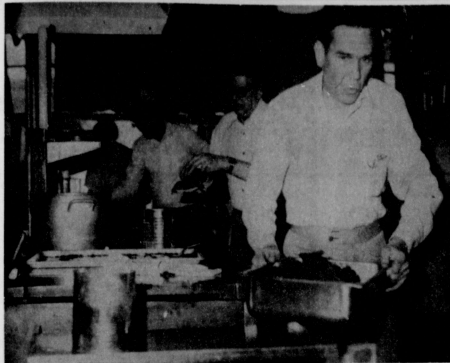

Tax Rebate Checks Mailed

According to information in the announcement from the office of State Comptroller Bob Bullock that his office has mailed checks totaling \$13.7 million to Texas cities and towns as their February rebate of the one-cent city sales tax. The check for Spearman was for more than for last year by \$1,781 more than the \$6,019.77 check sent in February of 1977.

Gruber received a check for \$1,491.76, some \$625 less than the check for this time period in 1977.

In his announcement, Bullock said 1978 city sales tax rebates as of Feb. 15 total \$32.2 million, compared to \$30.4 million during the first two months of last year.

The Comptroller said the 1978 increase in rebates is nothing to crow about so far, but predicted that March city rebate checks will go a long way toward replenishing city coffers.

"The 1977 Christmas quarter was most likely an all-time record quarter for sales tax collections by retailers," Bullock said.

He explained that sales tax returns for that quarter and monthly returns for December were due Jan. 31 and the city sales tax is now being processed for the March 15 rebates.

The biggest February check--for \$2.8 million--went to Houston, Dallas followed with \$1.4 million, San Antonio with \$795,972, Fort Worth with \$542,741 and El Paso with \$368,029.

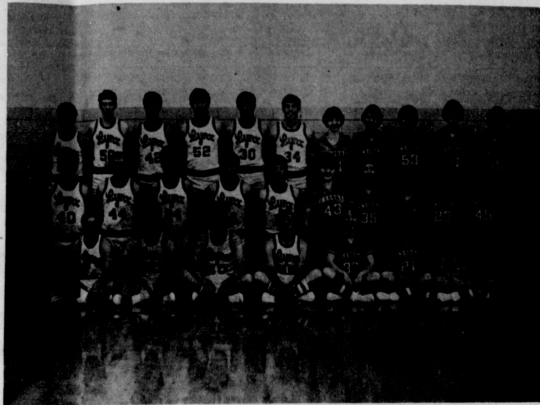

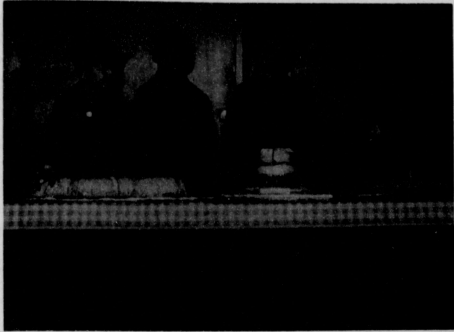

A one-day "how-to-do-it" seminar to outline the best approach to take in the future growth and development of Spearman and Hansford County was conducted Wednesday, Feb. 15, at Martin's Steak Garden in Spearman with Jerry Heare, Director of Community Development of the Texas Industrial Commission, and Homer Tucker, Senior Industrial Development Consultant of the TIC, in charge of the program sponsored by the Spearman Chamber of Commerce and attended by at least 40 Spearman residents during the morning and afternoon portions.

Another public meeting for local participation strictly has been scheduled Feb. 28 with the community gathering set for 4 p.m. on that date at B and B Industries, Inc., it has been announced by the Chamber of Commerce which is sponsoring this meeting. It also was announced that additional details of the Feb. 15 meeting as well as of the one scheduled later this month will be released by the Chamber of Commerce between now and then.

The program presented Feb. 15 by the two men from Austin has been developed by the Industrial Commission and implemented in three cities in Texas.

In announcements prior to the Feb. 15 one, Jim McLain,

President of the Spearman Chamber of Commerce, had pointed out the meeting "will prove a test of Spearman's leadership and interest in setting a course for the future."

At the morning session, Heare grouped those in attendance and asked each group of four to designate their number one and number two priority for the future development of the community and then, through a spokesman for each group, these priorities were reported to Heare who listed them on a wall chart.

A lengthy list of priorities emerged with the number one being that of working together to unify, improve and sustain community pride and development in all economic and non-

economic areas.

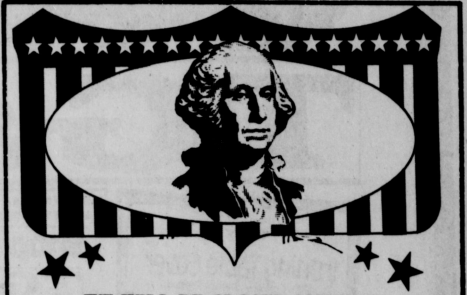
Second priority was to bring about the development of community awareness of things that need to be done and the approach to be used in getting them done.

Solutions to such situations as housing, airport expansion, industrial development, the need to diversify and stabilize the community's economy and, a prime requisite for sustaining any and all future development, the maintenance of a first rate hospital and medical personnel.

The initial step to getting the future growth and development program for Spearman and Hansford County in forward gear is the establishment of a planning and steering group utilizing the Chamber of Com-

mence and personnel from the business and agricultural sectors of the community to provide as well as receive input from throughout the countywide community in establishing community priorities and then getting to work on them.
