



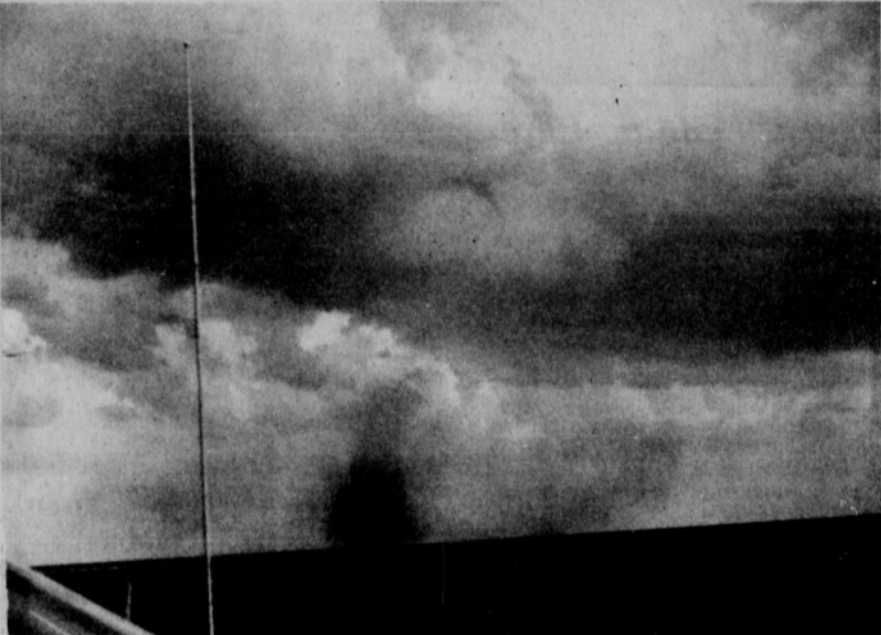

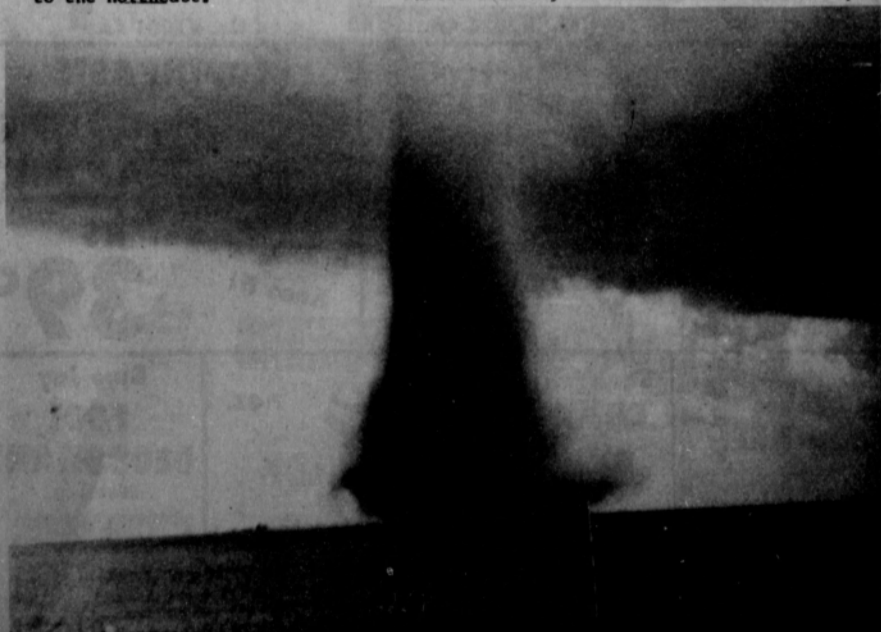

## Crop-Plant Clinic Tuesday

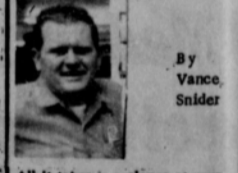
There will be a Crop-Plant Clinic Tuesday, July 8 in Hansford County. Three Extension Service Specialists will be present for the informal come and go clinic.

Tuesday morning the clinic will be held in the Home Demonstration Club-room in Spearman from 9:30 to 11:30 and Tuesday afternoon it will be in Gruver at the County Agricultural Building from 1:30 to 3:30.

Dr. Roland Roberts, Area Vegetable Specialist will be present to assist with vegetable problems and questions. Dr. Robert Berry, Area Plant Pathologist will assist in answering plant disease problems and James Valentine, Area Soil Chemist, will assist with fertility problems.

When honey is substituted for sugar in puddings, custards and pie fillings, breads and rolls, use cup for cup. In cakes and cookies, use seven-eighths cup honey for one cup sugar and reduce liquid three table-spoons for each cup of honey substituted. Unless sour milk or cream is used in the recipe, add one-fourth to one-half teaspoon baking soda per cup of honey. Frances Reasonover, foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A & M University System, advises.

All it takes is a glance at your own checkbook to know that in the long run you have to have more coming in than going out. The same principal works with nations as well. That's why an international trade surplus is more desirable than a trade deficit. American farmers last year did far more than any other segment of U-S industry to reduce a trade deficit topped off by the high prices of mid-eastern oil. Agricultural exports last year were worth 22 billion dollars, producing an agricultural trade surplus of nearly 12 billion. This contribution by food and fiber producers brought our total deficit to 3 billion dollars. Still high, but much less than some economists thought it would be. Those figures from last year are considered by many to be the harbinger of agriculture's future importance to the U-S position in world affairs. Farmers and ranchers are moving more directly into the limelight as they produce enough to keep us number one.

## State Fire Marshal Appointed

AUSTIN --- State Insurance Board Chairman Joe Christie said the state has launched a new fire awareness and prevention program with the appointment of a full-time State Fire Marshal.

Christie said Charles Meadows, 60, has been named State Fire Marshal under authority given the State Insurance Board in Senate Bill 925, enacted by the recently ended 64th Legislature. Meadows, a former Fire Chief of the Odessa Fire Department, has served nearly 30 years as Coordinator of Fire Prevention under a previous state law which designated the Insurance Commissioner certain State Fire Marshal responsibilities.

"Nearly 700,000 fires occur in America annually with losses of nearly \$1 billion and a problem of such magnitude deserves the full time efforts of an administrator who can pay more than lip service to fire prevention," Christie said.

Christie said the revitalized State Fire Marshal's office will give new emphasis to arson investigation and the licensing of fire prevention and detection alarm equipment.

According to the new state law, Meadows will become the chief arson investigator in Texas.

"In Arson," Christie said, "the ultimate victim in Texas is the general public whose fire insurance rates may increase as a result."

He said there were more than 2,000 suspected cases of arson in Texas last year.

The Fire Marshal will be especially active in assisting local prosecutors obtain evidence to take arson cases to court.

Following the adoption of rules and regulations, the State Fire Marshal will supervise the fire detection and alarm system industry in Texas.

Christie said evidence of bogus fire alarms were uncovered some 10 months ago in a nursing home in East Texas by department investigators.

"These alarms would have provided about as much protection in a fire as a can of gasoline,"

Meadows has also served as an instructor at the Texas A&M University Firemen's Training School since 1957. He served on the Board of Directors of the International Association of Fire Chiefs for three years and was President of the Southwestern Division of the International Association of Fire Chiefs in 1958 and 1959.

## AC Offers Law Enforcement Course

An 18-week course in basic law enforcement will be offered by the Amarillo College School of Continuing Education and dept. of law enforcement beginning Aug. 12.

The 240-hour class will meet from 6 to 10 Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings, with the Saturday firing session to be arranged to suit the schedules of the students.

Completion of the program satisfies requirements of the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education, said Clifford Sless, supervisor of Adult Vocational Education.

Students enrolling in the class must have first passed a physical examination, had a driver's license check for DWI and DUI offenses within 10 years and had an FBI fingerprint check.

Tuition for the course is \$77 and books and ammunition will be available through the AC bookstore for approximately \$53.

Students wishing to register or obtain further information may telephone Walter Eubanks, chairman of public safety education, at AC.

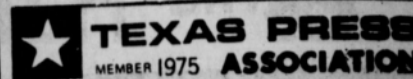

### Bicentennial Communities Reach 4,780

Washington, D.C. -- Connecticut has become the first state in the union to have all of its eligible communities nationally recognized under the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration's (ARBA) Bicentennial Communities Program.

John W. Warner, Administrator of the ARBA, announced the recognition of 642 additional Bicentennial communities in June, bringing the total to 4,780 in the nation.

Connecticut's achievement, among other things, means that every citizen in the state's 169 towns and cities can now fly the national Bicentennial flag.

Lois Springs, Wyoming, population eight, was among the newly recognized communities. This rural community may be the smallest incorporated town in the United States. Despite its diminutive size, the area's Bicentennial committee has come up with an active Bicentennial program.

Lois Springs is building its July, 1976, celebration on plans taken from a 1926 issue of the "Lois Springs Times." That same year, Catherine Snyder Nussli began teaching school in Lois Springs. She is still teaching school there today, and the town will show its appreciation with a special day in her honor.

Other Bicentennial projects in Lois Springs include renovating two cemeteries and the town hall, a family history and genealogy program and a compilation of school children's art depicting local history.

With the recognition of Lois Springs, the national Bicentennial Communities program now includes the nation's smallest community and its largest city--New York.

In numbers of communities recognized, New Jersey leads with 256, followed by New York, and Texas with 252 each.

### Small Schools Project Workshop Set

AUSTIN -- The 16th annual Texas Small Schools Project workshop, a week-long effort keyed to the needs of rural and other schools with relatively few students, will bring more than 500 teachers and administrators to Austin July 14-18.

Sponsored by the Texas Education Agency in cooperation with the Texas Small Schools Association and the University of Texas at Austin, the workshop will be held at Jester Center on the University campus.

Dr. Harold A. Haswell, assistant commissioner for the U. S. Office of Education Region VI in Dallas, will keynote the 7:30 p. m. Monday (July 14) opening session. Dr. Haswell, who will speak in the Jester Center auditorium, will discuss "The Three R's in Rural Education."

The closing general session set for 8:30 a. m. Friday (July 18) will feature a discussion of "The Small School Revisited" by Dr. Jerry Dawson, Southwest Texas State University graduate dean.

High interest topics ranging from kindergarten to remedial reading will be featured during 22 different small group sessions designed for teachers, aides, librarians, and other small school staff members.

School administrators will focus their attention on new school finance legislation, Title IX, a regulation prohibiting discrimination on the basis of sex in programs

of educational institutions which receive Federal funds, and open records legislation.

Six special sessions scheduled for Wednesday (July 16) will feature a close look at details of the quarter system, behavior problems in the classroom, practical ways of helping special education students, and methods for helping students develop learning skills.

Most Texas "small schools" currently enroll fewer than 500 students in all grades, kindergarten through high school. They range from single campus units located in suburban areas to isolated rural schools sometimes 50 to 60 miles apart.

### Cattle Cover Miles in '74

Cattle traveled further in 1974 than in 1973 according to a report from the Livestock Laws Reform Commission in Kansas City. Figures reveal that 2.4% of all cattle moved 400 miles or further from the seller to market in 1974 as compared to 1.4% in 1973.

The average cattle changed ownership 1.83 times in 1974 slipping from 2.02 in 1973. Such are the "travel" figures on the bovines indicating that the market has put limits on the far-flung cattle industry

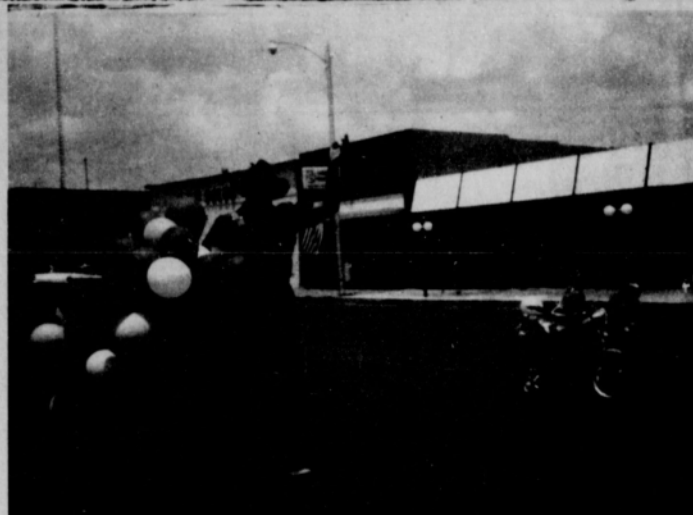
