150 Member Venire Called For Trial

A special 150-member special venire is being called as prospective jurors for the trial of John Lincoln Grissiam on a charge of murder with malice.

The trial will begin here in 84th District Court before Judge Max Boyer Monday, May 17.

Grissiam, 34, a farm laborer, has been indicted on a charge of murder with malice, in the shooting death of P.H. (Mickey) Westerfield, 62, a Gruver merchant.

Grissiam is alleged to have shot Westerfield when the merchant entered his store and caught Grissiam burglarizing

caught Grissiam burglarizing the dry-goods firm.

After Westerfield was shot with a small caliber pistol, he managed to get to a phone and dial the operator and tell her he had been shot. But he was not able to identify himself or tell where he was.

Sheriff J.B. Cooke, his deputies and Texas Ranger Bill Baten of Pampa, had Grissiam under arrest in less than 24 hours. Grissiam was arraigned on a charge of murder with malice within 29 hours after Westerfield reported being shot.



LAWN INSECTS-WHITE GRUBS

Several people have asked me what to do for grub worms in their lawn. First, you want to make sure you have grubs. Take a shovel and take a piece of your lawn out to see if you can find the white grubs. If you have them you will need to use an insecticide to kill them. You can use these wettable powders: 6 oz. 25% Aldrin-10 oz. 40% Chlordane-4 oz. 25% Dieldrin-5 oz. 25% Heptachlor. Use the above rates on 1000 sq. ft. of lawn. Apply dust on lawn and sprinkle with water to soak into soil.

Sprays to use include: Chlorobenzilate, Diazinon, Dimethoate (Cygon) Kelthane, Malathion, Tedion, Ethion. Usually a second application 7 days later is necessary to obtain control. Follow directions on the label. NITROGEN RECOMMENDATION EXPLAINED

Below is a report from James Valentine, Area Extension Soil Chemist.

Soil testing procedures used in the A&M University Laboratories measure soil organic matter but do not detect the presence of anhydrous ammonia or other inorganic nitrogen fertilizers. For this reason it is essential that the Laboratory be informed of previous recent applications of nitrogen fertilizers on the Information Sheet.

The predicted nitrogen lev-

The predicted nitrogen levelshown on your report is based on several factors, one of them being the organic matter content. Organic matter, excluding the undecomposed residue removed from the sample by screening before analysis, contains about 5 per cent total nitrogen. The amount of the nitrogen that will be available to a crop in a growing season will depend on conditions of aeration, soil texture, temperature, moisture, and residue from the preceeding crop. A clay soil containing 1.5 per cent organic matter can normally not supply as much nitrogen to a growing crop as can a sandy soil containing 1.5 per cent organic matter.

While there is definitely a relationship between organic matter content and the nitrogen for fertilizer, needed the

relationship between organic matter content and the nitrogen fertilizer needed, the above factors are all considered along with expected yield goals in the nitrogen use suggestions shown on your report. 


