MINUTES OF THE REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING

The City Council of the City of Spearman, Texas met in regular session in council chamber of city hall, 30 S. W. Court, on January 14, 1986, Mayor C. Ralph Blodgett presiding. Aldermen present: Wilson McClellan, Jim Nicholson, Ed Garner, Burl Buchanan, Mike Cudd. Staff present: Jim Murray - City Manager, Cheryl Gibon - City Secretary, Joe Raper - Interim Police Chief, Ron Antalek - Fire Chief. Visitors present: Kenith Loftin.

PLEDGE AND INVOCATION. A 7:30 p.m. Mayor Blodgett declared a quorum present and called the meeting to order. The pledge of allegiance to our flag was led by Garner followed by the invocation given by Mayor Blodgett.

CONSIDERATION OF THE MINUTES OF REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON DECEMBER 10, 1985. Motion was made by Garner to approve the minutes of regular city council meeting held on December 10, 1985, as corrected. Second by Cudd. Motion unanimously carried.

CONSIDERATION OF THE APPOINTMENT OF CHERYL GIBSON AS CITY SECRETARY. Motion was made by Cudd to appoint Cheryl Gibon as City Secretary. Second by Garner. Motion unanimously carried.

PUBLIC HEARING CONCERNING AN AMENDMENT TO SPECIFIC ZONED DISTRICTS AND AMENDING THE ZONING ORDINANCE.

to adopt ordinance #533, an ordinance amending chapter 14, planning and zoning, or the Spearman Municipal code; amending the zoning code by amending certain district boundaries on the zoning map of the City of Spearman, Texas, and providing for an effective date. Second by Buchanan. Motion unanimously carried.

CONSIDERATION OF AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO ORDER THE CITY ELECTION FOR THE FOLLOWING OFFICIALS: MAYOR AND TWO POSITIONS FOR ALDERMAN FOR A TWO-YEAR TERM, WHICH WILL BE HELD APRIL 6, 1986. Motion was made by Cudd to authorize the Mayor to order the city election for the following officials: Mayor and two positions for alderman for a two-year term, which will be held April 6, 1986. Second by Buchanan. Motion unanimously carried.

CONSIDERATION OF AWARDED A CONTRACT TO PURCHASE A SMALL SIZED ONE-HALF TON PICKUP TO HERGERT PONTIAC, BUICK AND GMC, INC. IN THE AMOUNT OF \$7,086.18 FOR THE UTILITIES DEPARTMENT. Motion was made by Buchanan to award a contract to purchase a small sized one-half ton pickup to Hergert Pontiac, Buick and GMC, Inc., in the amount of \$7,086.18, which was low bid, for the utilities department. Second by Garner. Motion unanimously carried.

CONSIDERATION OF AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO TAKE SEALED PROPOSALS FOR A LEAK SURVEY ON THE MUNICIPAL GAS SYSTEM. Motion was

made by Nicholson to authorize the city manager to take sealed bids for a leak survey on the municipal gas system. Second by McClellan. Motion unanimously carried.

First Baby



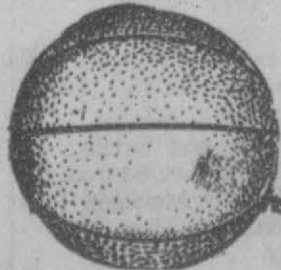

Our first New Year Baby has arrived. His name is Shaun Michael Graham son of Mike and Bonnie Graham. Baby Brother to Joshua Adam.

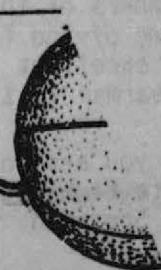
Shaun was born on Jan. 14th at 2:01 p.m. and weighed 6 lbs. 8 3/4 oz. He was 21 inches long.

FARM FAMILIES IN CRISIS

In response to the farm crisis in the Diocese of Amarillo, which has come to the forefront as a major concern of the church, Bishop Leroy T. Mattheisen Jan. 8 called together a representative group of people of the diocese to explore ways in which the Catholic Church might respond to the situation of farm families in crisis.

"The Church can and must provide spiritual strength in any crisis," Bishop Mattheisen said. "This is one and we must be there."

"We cannot bail all families out," he said, "but we can help them find the way out of difficulties. We can be present with understanding, love, and support, and we can provide prayer, counseling, referral services, and emergency assistance."

Education of urban people to realize that the farm problem is a city problem as well and the provision of assistance to individual farm families in crisis were listed by the representative group as two major ways in which the Church can help.

These conclusions were reached by Deacon Richard Riley of Amarillo, director of the diocesan Human Concerns Commission; Larry Watson, Catholic Family Service; Deacon Jerry Grossman of Canyon, Diocesan Rural Life Director; Ronald Kotara, Panhandle farmer and member of the Diocesan Pastoral Council; deacon candidate Joe Schwertner of Dumas, also a farmer and member of the DPC; Mrs. Pat (Steve) Meiwes, Vega farm wife and president of the Diocesan Council of Catholic Women; Atonement Father Joe Egan of Hereford, a farming community; and Genevieve Nobile, Farm widow and associate editor of the West Texas Catholic.

To implement the twofold goal recommended by the group, the following plans were made.

*To arrange for church bells to be rung at noon on Ash Wednesday

throughout the Texas Panhandle; *To provide intercessory prayers and homily helps for priests and deacons of the diocese for use in Lenten Masses and homilies;

*To provide a prayer and reflection material for Lenten devotions;

*To provide a priest director active in farm crisis intervention for the quarterly day of recollection for the priests of the diocese, tentatively scheduled Wednesday, April 30, at the Bishop DeFalco Retreat Center;

*To arrange immediately with Catholic Family Service to provide referral and counseling services for farm families already in crisis and as they arise in the months ahead;

*To provide "Wheat Baskets" this year in place of the traditional "Rice Bowls" for use in Lent. Each family in the diocese will be invited to take a Wheat Basket home, place it on the dining room table, and throughout Lent to place in it coins the price of a loaf of bread each day. The money collected will be made available to Catholic Family Service for use in counseling, referral, and job placement services and for crisis intervention;

*To enlarge the annual Sunday afternoon Farmers' Mass and meal, traditionally held near the Feast of St. Isidore, patron saint of farmers, May 15. This function has been held in the past several years in the Hereford, Vega, Nazareth, Happy areas. It may be enlarged to include the entire diocese or it may be celebrated in several regions in the Panhandle.

"We know we cannot solve everyone's problems, but we can surely help our farm families now in crisis to work through the feelings of guilt, frustration, and even despair that some are beginning to experience," Bishop Mattheisen said.

The group, now named the Isidore Farm Task Force, will meet again Wednesday, Feb. 5, at 12 noon at the Diocesan Pastoral Center.

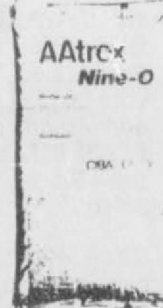

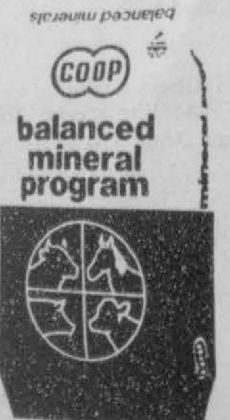

National Grain Sorghum Producers Association has filed a protest with U.S. Department of Agriculture over their announced plans to lower the moisture level of sorghum going into the government loan program.

According to a CCC order recorded in the Federal Register on November 21, 1985, The maximum moisture level of grain sorghum

accepted in the loan will be reduced from 14% to 13%. The national sorghum association has requested that this order be rescinded, according to its Executive Director, Elbert Harp.

"There is no logical reason for this action being taken against grain sorghum," Harp said. "It has been proven that grain sorghum can be stored for years without loss of quality when placed in storage and maintained at a maximum moisture level of 14% as required under the present regulations. To further dry the grain will cost farmers two percent of hte grain for each one percent of moisture removed, therefore, this action will lower farmers' incomes by two percent on grain placed in the government loan program. This change, if enacted, will forced many additional grain sorghum farmers out of business and off their farms."

The order is open for public comment until January 21, 1986. Harp believes most grain sorghum producers are not aware that they face this additional loss of income. He is urging them to register their views with their congressman and USDA immediately. The appropriate USDA address is:

SESQUICENTENNIAL NOTES

Ancient Caddoan mounds in East Texas are baffling today's Texans almost as much as the first American travelers who noticed the figures over 150 years ago.

Studies by archaeologists indict the Caddos were industrious people who were more complex than their prehistoric neighbors to the West.

For eleven-thousand years. Most prehistoric people who lived in what we now call Texas were hunters and gatherers organized in small, migratory bands.

A more settled way of life based on farming developed in late prehistoric times, that included Caddoan-speaking tribes in the late woodlands of Northeast Texas.

Anthropologist Dee Ann Story says the cultural tradition of the Caddos can be traced back more than a thousand years, to at least 800 A.D. They dominated an area that extended from the central portion of East Texas northward into the Ozarks.

The evident success of the Caddos came from the mixed nature of their economy and from the social and religious systems. They integrated individual villages into large social groups.

Story says the Caddos' ceremonial centers are distinguished by the presence of the earthen mounds.

The centers vary in size and complexity, which may reflect the degree of socio-political integration among Caddoan Groups.

The smaller, less complex centers appear to have been special places for rituals. The major centers, among them the Caddoan mound state historic site on the Neches River. Served as seats of civic, economic and religious power.

By the time of European colonization in the 17th century, most of the Caddoan mounds had been abandoned.

Researchers believe a social hierarchy still existed, but on a more localized scale.

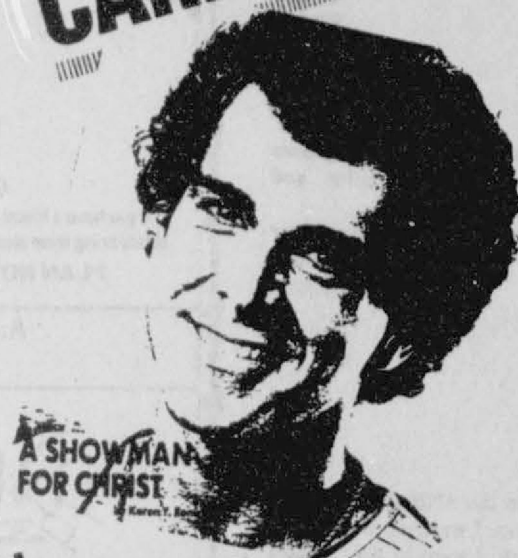
