Youth Drowns In Palo Duro Creek Bake-Off Winners

The search for a 17-year-old Texarkana boy was ended at 7:25 a.m. Friday morning when his body was found one mile east of the Mcloy Feed Lot. He was drowned in the raging flood water of South Palo Duro Creek. Hutchinson and Hansford County sheriff's departments, and scores of volunteers from the Morse area joined in the search for Jim Jones all day Thursday, and began again early in the morning Friday. Neighbors said Jones, who had been working for the Mc-Cloy Feed Lot since he moved to Morse a couple of months ago, left the lot on horseback early

Thursday to round up some horses whose safety was threatened by the flood waters. His horse was found dead about 8:30 a.m. on a creek bank. The waters, rushing out of banks at depths estimated at 17 to 20 feet above normal, had apparently caught the animal and carried him some distance from the point where Jones had attempted to cross the creek. The horse had drowned and its saddle was missing. It was found about 100 yards west of Texas Highway 136 on the Palo Duro Creek Bridge on Texas Highway 136, at a spot that is about four miles south of

Morse, near the Hutchinson County line. The search for the body was concentrated in an area within a two-mile radius of the bridge, but officers said it might have been carried farther down. Shortly before noon, searchers found Jones' hat at the bridge. Several teams of horsemen and other searchers on foot were combing the water-logged area, assisted part of the time by two low-flying aircraft. Most of the volunteers were from the Morse-Pringle area. Heavy thunderstorms Wednesday night and early Thursday

morning had sent the waters of the creek on a rampage as the stream pursues its course from Moore County and into Hutchinson counties. About 9:30 a.m. Thursday, Roy Harris, superintendent of the Pringle-Morse Consolidated School District, brought a canoe to assist in the search, and later

in the morning two more boats were launched into the deep, muddy waters. Morse residents said Jones came here about two months ago with two friends, both of whom got jobs with Palo Duro Feeders, south of Gruver, while Jones went to work for the McCloy Feed Lot.

County Commissioners B.J. Renner, Joe T. Venneman, and George Lowe along with County Judge R.L. McClellan spent an interesting morning July 29 as they judged baked products submitted by thirty-two of the best cooks in Hansford County. The Bake-Off has been sponsored for three years annually at the Hansford Celebration by the Home Demonstration Council. Coconut Cream Pie placed top for Mrs. Lewis Burkhart for Martin's Steak Garden. ALL CAKE entries won blue ribbons but Mrs. Joe Close received the honors with her Italian Cream Cake. A tie in the YEAST BREAD division meant two champions—Mrs. G.I. Brown with White Loaf Yeast Bread and Mrs. Benny Byers with her Whole Wheat Cinnamon Rolls. One of Gruver's loveliest longtime matriarchs, Mrs. Homer (Effie Pearl) Cluck died Sunday morning leaving many beautiful memories for her family and friends.

Memorial services were held at 10:00 A.M. Tuesday at the Gruver Church of Christ with Jim York of Brady, Texas, and Claude Sloan of Olustee, Oklahoma, officiants. Offering solace during the service were members of the Spearman Church of Christ choral group under the direction of Jimmy Green who sang "Precious Memories," "When You See the Lord," and "In the Garden."

The concluding service and interment was at the Gruver Cemetery. Grandsons of Mrs. Cluck served as casketbearers and included Bob Cluck, Dean Cluck, Homer Cluck, Ben Cluck, Bobby Archer, John Cluck, Joe Cluck, Laddie Cluck, Louie Bretz, Perry Lamb, and Del Cluck.

Mrs. Cluck, who celebrated her ninety-first birthday January 10th of this year, had been in ill health for a bit over a year but prior to this time was one of the most active of Gruver residents. Born in Wise County in Texas, she had been a resident of Hansford County since 1915. She died at 4:00 A.M. Sunday, July 31 at Ochiltree General Hospital in Perryton.

She and Homer Cluck were married in 1903 at Hobart, Oklahoma, and they filed on a claim in the Panhandle of Oklahoma in 1905, moving to the Texas Panhandle in 1916, making their home about fifteen miles southwest of Gruver where Mr. Cluck was a farmer-rancher.

Mrs. Cluck moved to Gruver town in 1948 and has resided here ever since. She was a member of the Gruver Church of Christ.

Preceding her in death was

her husband who died in 1940; a daughter, Jewel; and a son, D. G. (Durward).

Futures Workshop Is Planned

Area Agriculture producers need to use all available tools if they are to survive the cost-price squeeze which agriculture producers are in. One such tool which many producers fail to pursue is the Futures Market. Many fail to pursue it because they do not know how it works nor how to get started in it.

There will be an area wide Futures Workshop with emphasis on wheat pasture cattle held in the County Barn in Spearman on August 10. The purpose of the all Day Workshop will be to give producers a working knowledge of the Futures Market with primary interest on how it relates to wheat pasture cattle.

Dr. Ray Sammons, Area

Economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will present the program which will cover numerous parts of the Futures Market. Dr. Sammons will acquaint the participants with the principles and give them a working knowledge of the Futures Market. This workshop is designed especially for those producers who have no dealing with the Futures Market.

Area producers and their spouses are invited to attend this Futures Workshop with emphasis on Wheat Pasture Cattle on August 10th at the County Barn in Spearman. The program is scheduled for 9:00 a.m. - 12:00 noon and 1:00 - 4:00 p.m.

Agricultural Credit Conditions Not Improved

Agricultural credit conditions in the High Plains of Texas have not shown much improvement since last summer, according to a July 1 survey of area bankers by the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas. Repayment difficulties and a large number of farm loan renewals persists, in spite of recent gains in livestock receipts. Sharply lower wheat yields have hampered the efforts of crop farmers, especially, to overcome cash flow and income problems. Loans averaged 65 percent of deposits at survey banks compared to 67 percent in July 1977. Thirty-six percent of the banks in the latest survey had loan-to-deposit ratios of 70 percent or greater.

While fewer bankers indicated that they have had to refuse a farm loan due to a shortage of loanable funds, a larger number indicated that that were not actively seeking new farm loan accounts. Funds for new loans have been limited by an unusually large number of renewals and extensions. Accordingly, referrals of loans to correspondent banks and non-bank credit agencies have increased from the year-earlier levels.

Most area bankers expect the volume of farm loans to increase during the next three months. Feeder cattle loans and farm operating loans are at the top of the list. Survey respondents reported that some farmers are in a critical period with large debts to service, but most expressed cautious optimism that this will be a better year for farmers than 1977.

Among the survey results reported by Don A. Riffe, agricultural economist for the

Dallas Bank, were these: Where last year 32 percent of the bankers surveyed reported a greater than usual number of referrals to nonbank credit agencies, this year 48 percent did.

Both this year and last year, 25 percent of the respondents reported that the availability of funds was less than usual.

Where 28 percent indicated that they were actively seeking new farm loan accounts a year ago, this year only 9 percent did.

Banks estimated that "good" irrigated farmland, dryland, and rangeland have all increased about 2 percent in value from July 1, 1977. And with a degree of uncertainty about the future, 86 percent expected land values to remain stable in the months ahead.

Continental Singers To Perform

Traveling from 100 to 500 miles daily by bus, boat and plane, they will perform nightly during the summer tour. Concerts are held in churches, auditoriums, outdoor pavilions, military bases and hospitals. They are completely self-contained with their own sound and lighting equipment.

They have recorded 12 record albums on the Word and Light labels. Their latest two albums are from New Life Records, entitled "Come Bless the Lord," and "Sing It With Love."
