Constitutional Amendment Poses Poll Tax Problem

The proposed Texas Constitutional amendment to abolish the poll tax as a requirement for voting in Texas elections has put this year's collection of the poll tax in a quandary.

County Tax Assessor-Collector J. B. Cooke says the poll tax must be paid between Oct. 1, 1963 and Jan. 31, 1964, however, if the amendment passes, a person may vote by paying a registration fee of 25 cents.

The following is a letter Sheriff Cooke is sending with all tax statements to explain the situation:

"Under the present law poll tax may be paid from October 1, 1963, to January 31, 1964, with a fee of \$1.50 each, which will qualify you to vote in all 1964 elections.

"We are voting on a constitutional amendment November 9, 1963, in the General Election to decide if Texas will abolish the Poll Tax Law and adopt a registration law for voting. If this amendment passes you may register for qualification to vote with a fee of 25¢. If the law passes the registration will become effective on December 1, 1963 and continue through January 31, 1964, and the years thereafter.

"If you have paid a poll tax prior to December 1, 1963, for the privilege of voting in the year of 1964, you will not be required to register in order to vote. However, you will not be allowed a refund on your poll tax payment.

"May I emphasize, that only if the law is passed can you vote by registration and a 25¢ fee. Otherwise, you will be required to pay a \$1.50 per person for your privilege to vote."

These awards were in the FFA division of the contest.

There were some 40 samples in the FFA wheat contest at the fair.

Court Having Repairs Made

The old part of the Hansford County Courthouse will get a face cleaning and the cracks repaired in the near future.

This week the Commissioners Court let a contract to J. Sivadon to overhaul the masonry surface of the old part of the courthouse.

He will clean the surface, clean out loose and decayed mortar, install scotch pins in bed joints of all loose stones, install cured mortar in all mortar joints.

Sivadon will furnish all equipment, labor, and materials other than sand.

County's Growth Provides Increase in Tax Money

County tax valuations have increased more than a half million dollars, Tax Assessor-Collector J. B. Cooke announced this week.

The increase in tax values is the result of natural growth, Cooke pointed out, and not an increase in property valuations.

The valuations for 1963

comes to \$26,683,519.

This valuation will yield \$548,807.73 in taxes that will be divided between the county, state, road funds, water district and school district nine.

The tax money will be divided in the following sums: State, \$106,906.62; County \$266,835.19; Special Road fund, \$76,361.80; Road District three, \$39,734.16; Road District Four, \$24,002.04; Water District, \$13,230.44 and School District Nine \$18,737.48.

Cooke said approximately 99.5 per cent of the tax roll last year was collected and the percentage went over 100 per cent when the delinquent taxes were added to the collections.

'Cop' Fighter Caught Here

A man wanted on a charge of assault to murder a police officer in Columbus, Ohio, was arrested here this week in a round-up of drunks, by Sheriff's officers.

Sheriff J. B. Cooke said Mark Bacus is awaiting extradition to Columbus on the charge. Bacus and three other men allegedly attacked two police officers in Columbus in August. The officers wounded one man and took him into custody. Another of the attackers were killed and two escaped. Bacus is allegedly one of the two who escaped.

Bacus was one of 16 persons arrested and jailed here during the past seven days for being drunk and disorderly.

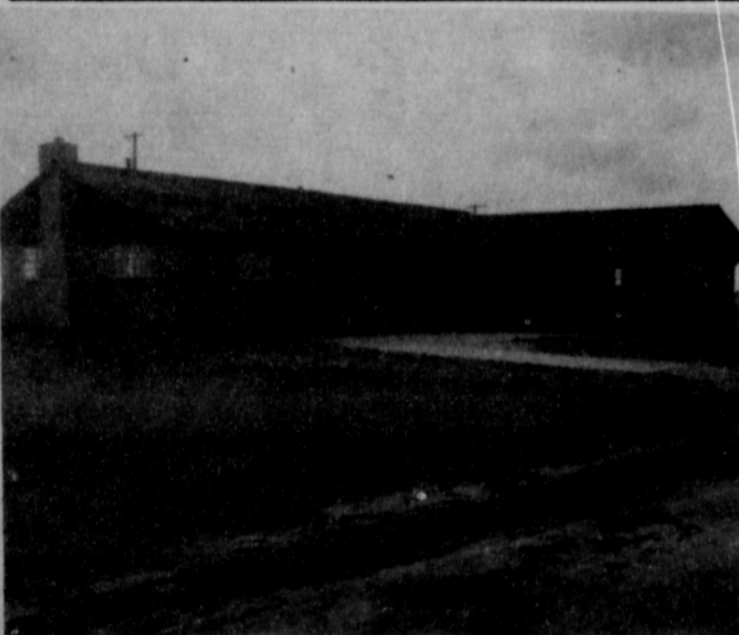

Football fans come in many shades of intensesness. Locally, some consider the Gruver-Spearman game the season, others the entire high school schedule, others all the college and professional season; but at our house football is a 12-month sport.

Now, we can work up a good head of steam for the game during the season, but until we married into a football family we did not realize the season could extend the year around and include a large number of high schools and colleges, of which my wife, Day, is an ardent fan.

Day comes from a family that has been actively involved in football and all other sports since before the U.S. Army started chasing Pancho Villa along the Mexican border. "Mr. D," that's my father-in-law, and his many brothers were playing semi-pro baseball when his National Guard unit in South Texas was called-up to chase Villa before World War I. However, when he was not in combat in France in World War I, he boxed and played baseball. He then played football and everything else at Southwest Texas State. He later coached and has been a strong supporter for sports in his schools. Mrs. Davis attended the University and was a life-long Longhorn rooter.

Day's brothers, Bill and Jim played for Memphis High, then Hardin Simmons and Arizona. Bill has coached at Panhandle, Canyon, Lamesa, Quanah and Gainesville, and Day attended TCU, Hardin Simmons and West Texas.

Just what does all this have to do with the length of football season. Day is a fan for all the schools and teams her family has attended, played for or coached.

In fact, it gets rather confusing at times just who we are supposed to be rooting for at a

certain game. When Texas and TCU play, it is TCU, when West Texas and Arizona tangle, Day and Jim argue. Two years ago when Quanah and Spearman met, she sat silent.

Distance means nothing to Day when it comes to going to see Bill's team play. Beginning in 1956 she saw all 10 Panhandle games, then missed only five of his 31 games as coach at Canyon. However, she saw only two of his Lamesa games. But when he was at Quanah she saw two regular season games and all five play-off games. However, last year she only got to one Gainesville game. It was at Mt. Pleasant, 500 miles from Spearman.

This should be enough teams to use up all her support, but the list is still growing. In the last two years she has added Winnboro, Texas because some of the kids she taught in grade school there are now playing. This week she also added Caprock High in Amarillo. Not because we lived in Amarillo, but because two more of her former students are playing for that school. We expect to add Texas Tech and a professional team next fall. They will be added if Danny Scarbrough from Quanah gets to play again for Tech and Jerry Richardson of W. T., who played for brother Bill at Canyon High, goes into professional football.

All these teams play during the same four months, but by the time the family gets all the games replayed after the season, it is time to begin looking at the prospects for the coming season.

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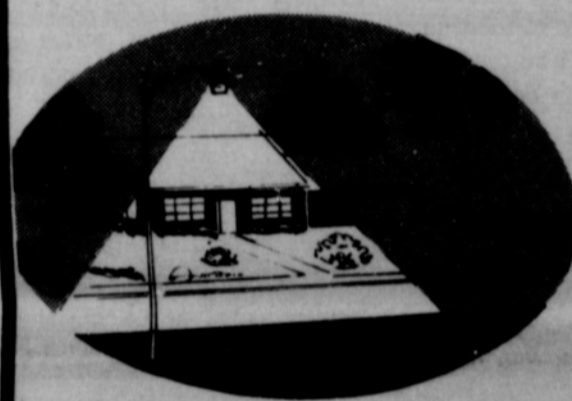

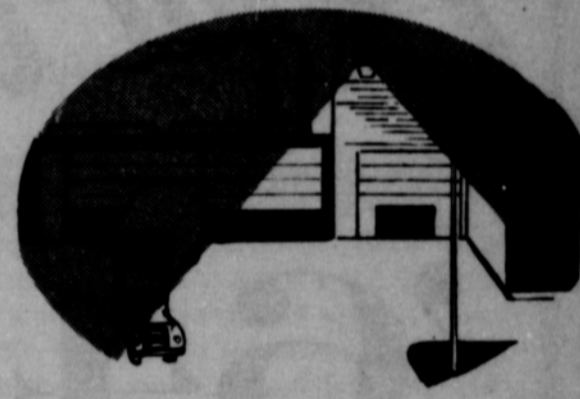
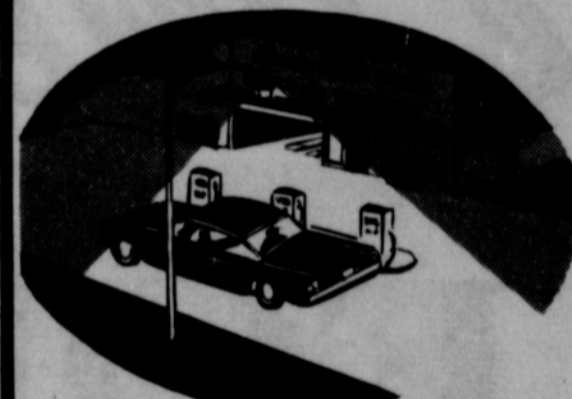

CONSERVATION TOUR

Farmers in the Gruver area or Zone 5 of the Hansford Soil Conservation District will have a supper and election on Tues. Sept. 30. The tour will start at 2:30 p. m. and will originate at the Gruver American Legion Building. Some of the stops will include recent conservation work, irrigated grasses, etc. The use of the electric log and water meter for irrigation wells will be explained.

A supper will be held at 7:00 p. m. in the Gruver School Cafeteria. This will be followed by a program and election of a supervisor for Zone 5 of the Hansford Soil Conservation District.

FERTILIZER MEETINGS

This is a reminder that a series of meetings on fertilizer will be held in Perryton Oct. 1-8-15 beginning at 7:30 p. m. in the North Plains REA Building. The subject matter will include: Role of plant nutrients, manufacture of various sources of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium; soil condition and soil management, principles on time and method of fertilizer application and how to determine need. In short, information on how much, what kind and when to put on and how.

FUTURE WHEAT ALLOTMENTS

Overplanting wheat allotments this year can reduce a farm's future allotments, according to R. J. Miears, agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. This effect on a farm's wheat history is one of several factors which farmers will want to consider in planning their 1964 crop operations.

Miears calls attention to a provision of the law passed in 1958 which can affect a farm's wheat acreage history. It directs that when no marketing quotas are in effect, farms exceeding allotments will receive that year's allotted acres as history for future allotments. Complying farms receive their base acreage as history, he says.

The agronomist cited this example of how this provision would apply on a farm with a 100 acre wheat base and a 1964 allotment of 60 acres. If a farmer complies with his allotment, his wheat acreage credit for 1964 will be based on the 100-acre history. But if he exceeds his allotment, he will be credited with only 60 acres in computing his 1966 allotment.

Overplanting for the 1964 wheat crop will not affect the 1965 allotment since national and state 1964 wheat acreage figures will not be available when allotments are determined.

Playday Set For Sunday

The first activity of the fall for the Spearman Riding Club will be the Playday this Sunday at 1:30 p. m. Two other playdays have been rained out.

There will be a 25 cent entry fee for each game. Riders may register from 11:30 a. m. until 1 p. m.

There will be baton relays, barrel racing, potato race, pole bending, wagon race and pony express for the pee wees.

There is no admission fee and everyone is invited to come watch the activities.

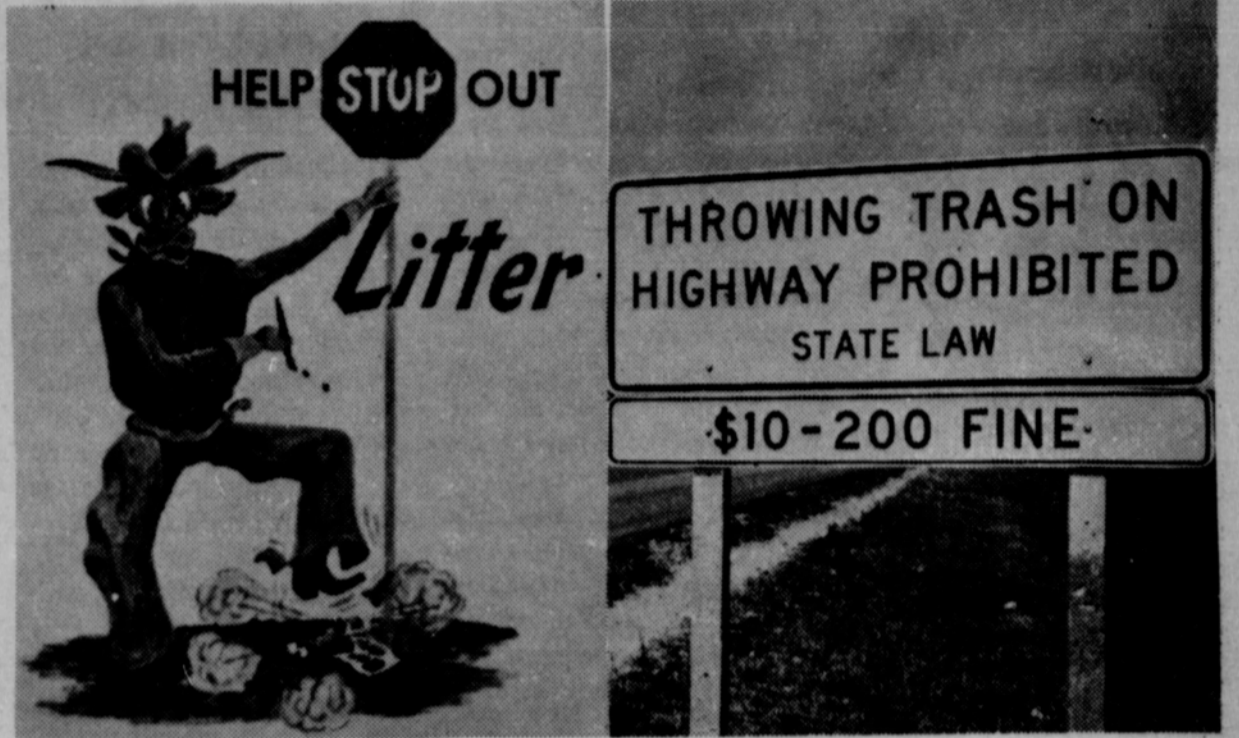
A farmer who overplants his 1964 allotment, Miears points out, can still avoid loss of base acreage history. He can dispose of his excess acreage by the deadline date for his county and still receive his 1964 base acreage as history credit in determining future allotments. By thus complying with his allotment, he also becomes eligible for price supports.

Farmers are urged to check with the local ASC office for further information on the 1964 wheat program, says Miears.

The Texas Highway Department has added two new methods to its continuing anti-litter campaign: a cartoon character printed on its Official Highway Travel Map and revised highway signs reminding drivers they can be fined from \$10 to \$200 for littering. The cartoon character, "The Litter Longhorn," pleads with the public to "Help Stomp Out Litter." The sign emphasizes that it is against the state law to litter. In 1962 the Highway Department had to spend \$1.4 million to pick up litter, an increase of about a hundred thousand dollars over 1961.

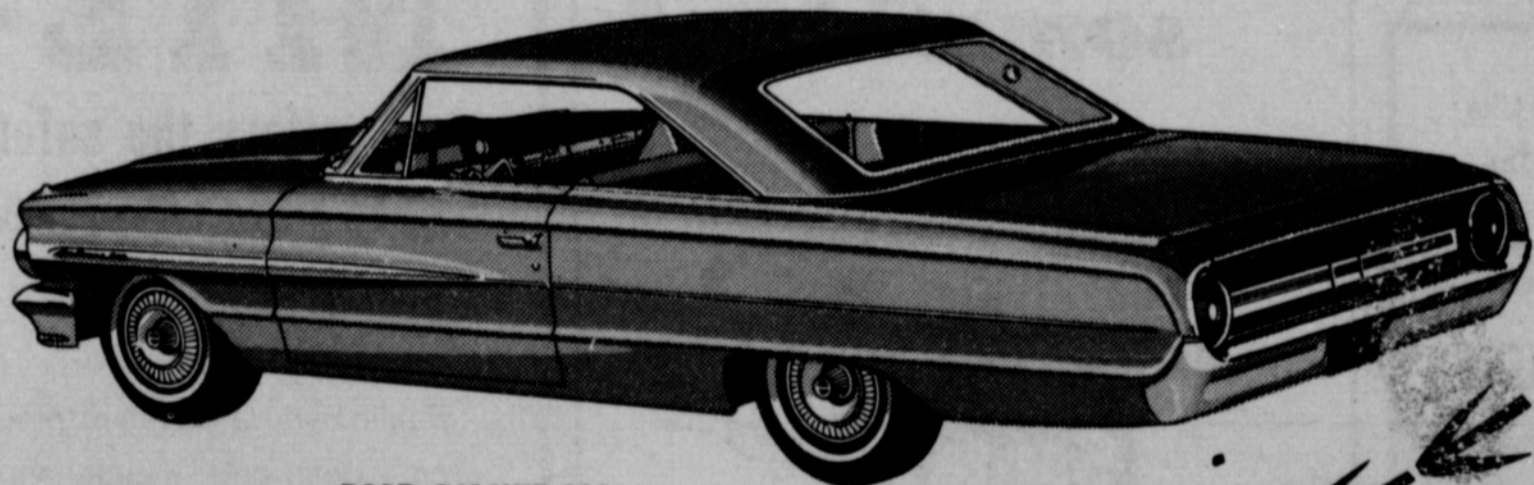

It was on the inside of the window. Rub as hard as I could, on the outside, the spot wouldn't disappear. I had to get on the inside.

What was true of the window is true of us, too. In order to be clean and pure, we have to be washed on the inside. Our heart is the spot that needs cleaning most of all.

God is the only One who can wash us on the inside. He wipes away all the smudges of sin that mar and spoil our holiness. God cleans us with the blood of Jesus, which the Savior poured out for us on the cross. The Bible puts it this way: "The blood of Jesus... cleanses us from all sin." (I John 1:7)

As we trust in Christ's cleansing in faith, this will affect what we look like on the outside. Instead of cheating oth-

ers, we will be honest and fair. Instead of insisting on our own way, we will consider the needs of others.

Colossians 3:5 says "Put to death therefore what is earthly in you;" and 3:9 says "Do not like to one another, seeing that you have put off the old nature with its practices." Chapter two tells this is done in the washing of regeneration of baptism where our old nature was put to death by Christ.

Please note---we are to have more than a mere moral reform. It is not enough to change deeds without changing our nature. 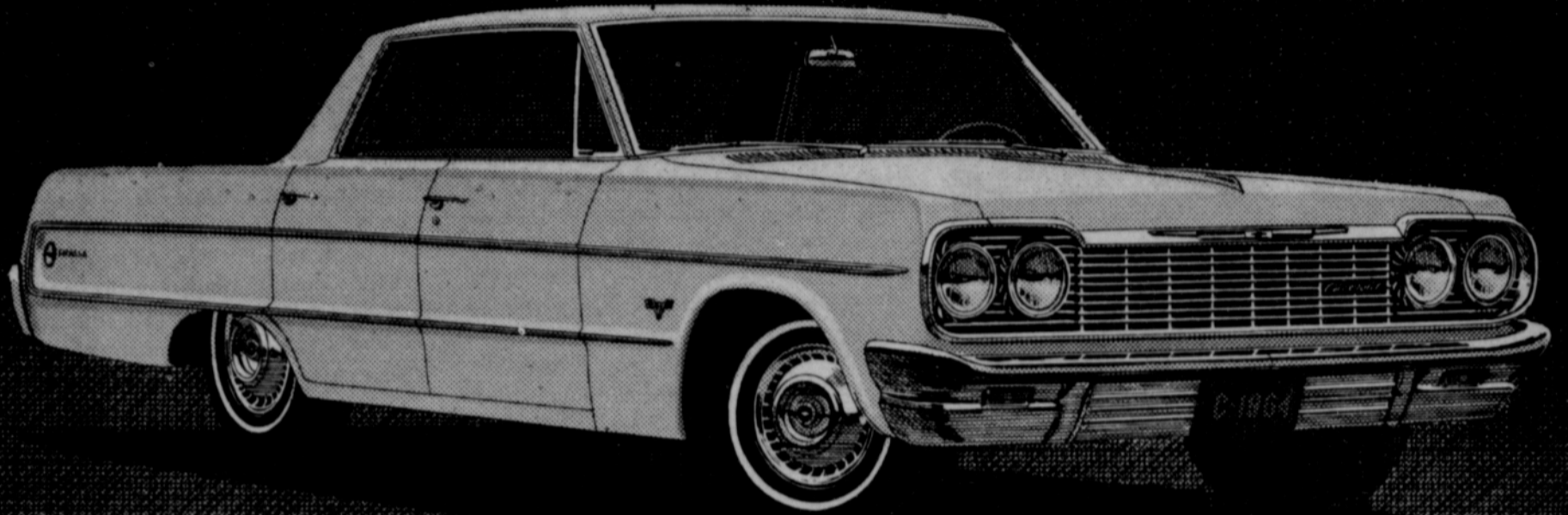

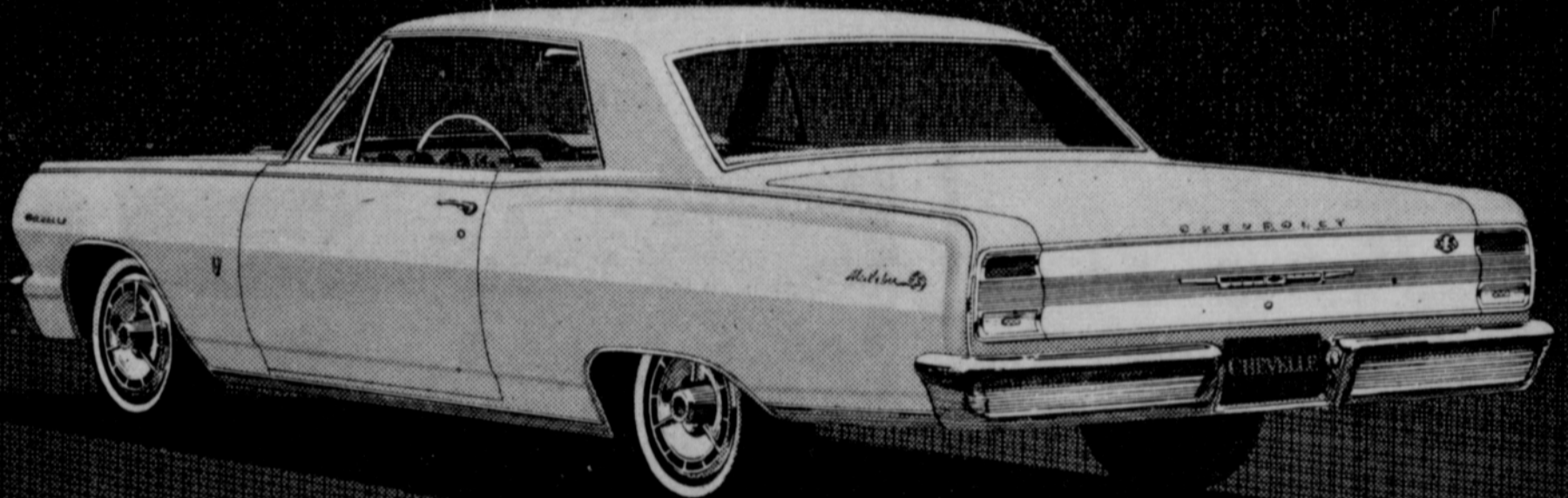

Memorial services for Lt. Cmdr. James R. Conrey, USN, were conducted Monday in Sanford, Fla. He is the brother of Spearman City Manager Kenneth Conrey.

Lt. Cmdr. Conrey was killed Sept. 19 in a jet landing on the aircraft carrier USS Independence operating in the Atlantic. His squadron was doing night landing on the carrier in rough weather when a sudden roll of the ship sent the plane slamming into the flight deck. It bounced over the arresting gear, broke up and went into the ocean. His body was not recovered.

Lt. Cmdr. Conrey had been in the Navy since 1946. He is survived by his wife, and four children, two brothers and his parents.

Laundering Still Presents Problem

Do you have a laundry problem?

Laundering has long been the most dreaded chore in the home, however it has been greatly simplified in the past fifteen years by the use of automatic equipment, and the many new easy-care fabrics. While this has been a wonderful time and energy-saver for homemakers, it has brought on other problems. It all boils down to the fact that even with our wonderful automatic equipment, Mrs. Homemaker still has to be smarter than the equipment to get good end results.

Have you heard this question: "How can homemakers get their husband's wash and wear shirts really clean?"

Well, it's like this -- we can't have our cake and eat it too. Laundry procedures which preserve wash and wear are not the best for good laundry. Do we want white laundry or do we want wrinkle-free? You may have been led to believe you can have both, but that is not so.

Warm to cool water is recommended because it minimizes wrinkling and preserves the wash and wear finish, but it is a recognized fact that hot water is necessary to get the garment clean. To dislodge some oils and dirt, water of 140 to 160 degrees is needed, and this will not preserve the wash and wear finish. You, Mrs. Homemaker will need to make the decision.

Another thing, many water tanks do not deliver 140 to 160 degree water for machines and this may be worth looking into if clothes are not as clean as you want.

Don't get "carried away" with the idea, though, that the hotter the water, the better, because water above 160 degrees can also create problems.

Farmers Meet To Study Erosion Damage to Land

Twenty to twenty-five concerned farmers met with Soil Conservation Service technicians in Gruver last Wednesday. These men requested the SCS engineers to design a waterway system to help prevent further erosion damage to their land. Wayne Chapman, Work Unit Conservationist of the local SCS Office promised this assistance. Bill Miller, SCS Engineer spent the remainder of last Wednesday working on the project.

The farmers involved plan to furnish some men to assist the SCS Engineers. Duane Bartee, Area Conservationist and Dan Huckabee, Area Engineer with the SCS also attended this meeting. They pledged to Buddy Ertling, who is the Supervisor for the Gruver Area of the Hansford Soil Conservation District their full support on this project.

Most of the drainage area of the watershed involved is in Sherman County in the vicinity of Sam Cluck's Headquarters. The tremendous amount of erosion was caused by 3 large rains of approximately 5" to 7" which came one on the heel of the other. Top Soil that can never be replaced was swept from the fertile fields. It was deposited along the roads and fence lines as much as 2 feet deep. Bar-ditches were completely filled with this precious top soil.

Applications for assistance

through the Great Plains Conservation Program were taken from the landowners at this meeting. Since a regular Soil Conservation District has not been formed in Sherman County SCS technicians can not work in Sherman County except under the ACP or GPCP programs. Mr. Chapman stated that if there are other landowners in this area who need to be in on this project to see him. Application blanks for the Great Plains Program may also be picked up at the Cluck Cattle Company.

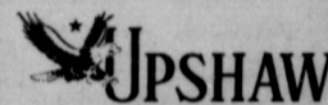

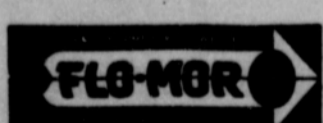

**THE TEST BAN TREATY—
THE BIG LIE**

Americans are being subjected to one of the biggest "snow jobs" we have ever witnessed in the administrations efforts to influence the Senate to ratify the test ban treaty. A large and impressive array of witnesses, many obviously politically influenced, has been marshaled before the Senate hearings to persuade the committee members to advocate adoption of this treaty.

Our President has urged all citizens to examine this treaty from all angles before coming to a decision. We have been constantly bombarded with propaganda FOR adoption from administration sources while those who oppose the treaty or who in any way question the wisdom of such an instrument are being branded crackpots. The major emphasis has been placed on the idea that this treaty is a giant step forward in an overall peace offensive. Let us examine this premise. The treaty in no way guarantees peace or the banning of the use of atomic bombs or other atomic weapons in the event of war. Its sole purpose is to stop atmospheric testing, as a step toward the banning of all testing, and would be accomplished without benefit of inspection. Its total effect is to tie the hands of the United States in any effort to keep up with our enemies in the development of high-yield atomic weapons and an effective anti-missile defense system. Past history has shown that the Soviet Union will honor any treaty or agreement only so long as it suits its purpose to do so. Of the last 53 agreements signed by the Soviets, 50 have been broken to date. We, on the other hand, have a long standing record as a nation that honors its agreements.

Those most vocal and articulate in their opposition to the treaty, and they include such notable scientists as Drs. Edward Teller, 'father' of the hydrogen bomb, and Stefan Posony, are being downgraded by administration spokesmen on the theory that their views on the subject are already well known and therefore do not carry much weight at this time! This would indicate that only those who have never before given any thought to the problems involved, or who have no previous knowledge of atomic matters or foreign affairs should be heard!

It is obvious that there are many in the military who have, at the very least, serious reservations as to the wisdom of ratifying this treaty. No less a noted

USDA Proposes Improved Standards

Acceptance of U. S. wheat in foreign markets is of critical importance to American growers since more than half of our total production moves into these markets, according to the USDA. And increasing competition in the world markets has intensified the need for wheat of more dependable quality, the Department adds.

For the past two years, the USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service has been reviewing the official U. S. wheat standards, in cooperation with members of all segments of the wheat industry, State Departments of Agriculture and other agencies, and with state and commercial inspection agencies. Through a series of meetings, attention was called to the real purpose of the standards, that is to constitute a measure of wheat value that can be used by the

buyer and seller, in terms that will measure end-use value.

Through these meetings, study and research, and discussions several weaknesses in the standards were exposed. Noted in particular was the wide variation of quality in each of the grades. Consequently, on August 1, the USDA proposed a revision of the present wheat standards.

The proposed changes are: To set maximum limits in the numerical grades for total defects, such as damaged kernels, foreign material, and shrunken and broken kernels. To lower the limits of shrunken and broken kernels. Both these proposals would provide a cleaner, more merchantable product, according to the Department.

Another proposed change concerns dockage, or the material other than wheat percent, instead of whole percent as at present.

Still another change would place wheat with more than 13.5 percent moisture in the "tough" category. Another change would

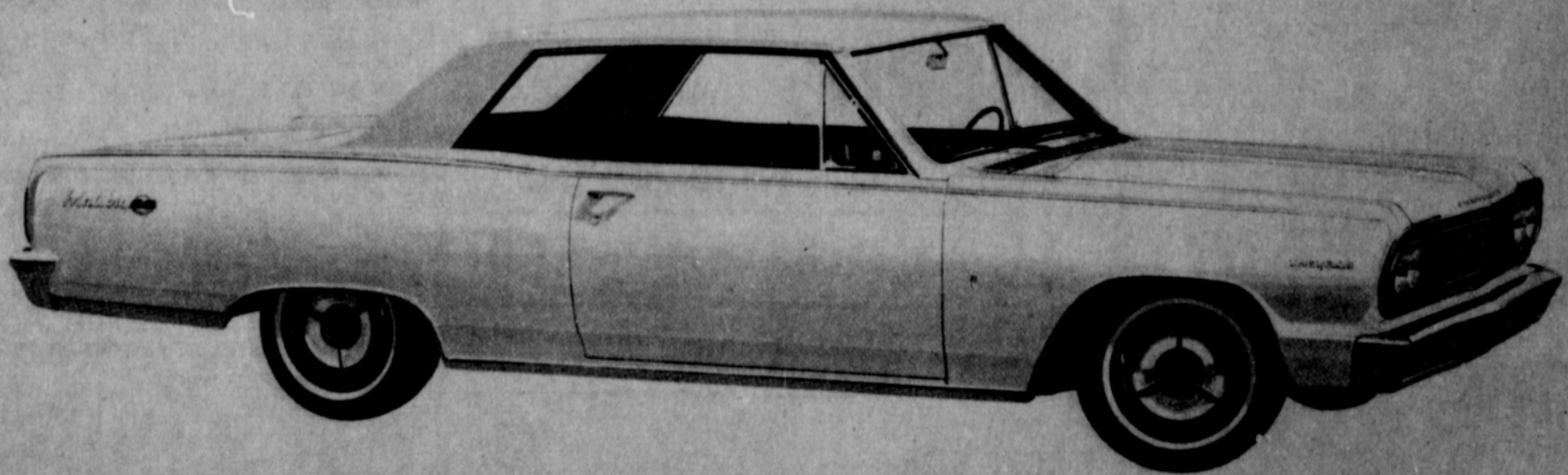
