recession had a strong im-pact in Hansford County in the rast year, as it did every. where else, its effect on siness was less severe than in many other cor

According to figures just released, consumer spending in local retail stores -- for food, clothing, fumiture and other commodities--remained at a higher level

Despite the fact that the cost of goods and services rose sharply in the year, more than offsetting the gains in personal income in nost families, business activity in the area was relatively good. Home buying and auto sales were ex-

The details are contained in a new market study and Data Service. It shows just how the average local family spent its retail dollar in the year. Comparable data is given for other sections of the country.

In Hansford County, it shows, stores selling food and automotive equipment captured a large part of the consumer dollar. Between them, they attracted 30 percent of all local retail

The outlay for food alone in local supermarkets, butcher shops, bakeries delicatessens and the like totaled \$5, 427, 000, com pared with the prior year's \$4,590,000.

This was solely for food bought for home consumption. It does not include the amount that was spent in restaurants, lunch rooms and other eating and drink-

automotive equipment and supplies, including cars, orcycles, boats and trailers, they accounted for \$6,513,000. The previous year's volume was \$6,950,000.

Most other retail lines ended the year in fairly

the consuming public was more restrained than usual

in its spending.
Sales of general merchan dise, in department stores and variety shops, came to \$711,000, as against the

Stores selling shoes, hats, gloves and other articles of clothing took in \$652,000. The year before it was \$577,000.

Those specializing in furniture and home furnishings had sales of \$544, 000, compared with the previous year's \$461,000.

Higher prices for me dise in general, due to in-flation, accounted for much of the increase in dollar

Surely that thought must have crossed the mind of to stand in line at motor vehicle registration time. Well, now there is a better

way. At least, beginning January 1, 1978, there will be. If all goes according to plan, the traditional long waiting lines prior to the registration deadline (April 1) will be a thing of the past.

As if to complement the "multi-year" license plate opted this year, Govern Dolph Briscoe recently signed House Bill 1974 providing for a year-round motor vehicle registration system in Texas. The bill was authored by State Representative Bob Simpson of Amarillo, and ed by both houses of the 64th Legislature.

Under the new licensing system, there will be 12 re-gistration deadlines, instead of one. No longer will Texas motorists be forced to register within a 60-day period. De pending on the date assigned each motorist, vehicle registration will occur during every month of the year, similar to the safety auto

According to Bob Townsley. Director of the state's Moto Vehicle Division, "Eighteen states now follow this "staggered system of motor vehicle registration and have proven

"Not only will it relieve some of the pressure on mo-torists, " said Townsley, "but it will also relieve the all-too-familiar burden placed on the county tax ass

collectors."
He added, "By effectively distributing the registration workload evenly throughout the year, county tax offices will be able to conduct other than the state of t phases of their work, such as voter registration and pre-paration of property tax rolls, without interruption." For all practical purposes, April 1, 1978 will be almost

everyone's vehicle registra-tion deadline -- FOR THE LAST TIME. Renewal notices will inform motorists as to their renewal date thereafter. Fees will be calculated on a proata basis to that date.

Upon registration, moto ists will be issued two 11cense plate stickers -- one for the year and one for the month of the subsequent renewal. Once a vehicle is assigned to a particular expiration date, it will remain on that annual renewal cycle thereafter. The month sticker first issued for a ve-hicle will remain on the license plate, and new month stickers will not be used

each year,

sticker will serve as a resticker will serve as a re-minder to the motorist, just as the windshield auto in-spection sticker does. Since renewal notices will be mailed during the month preceding the month in which renewal fees will be due, motorists should have no problem in renewing regis-trations in plenty of time. The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for June, 1975, shows a total of 572 accidents resulting in 25 persons killed and 355 persons injured as compared to June, 1974 with 466 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 261 persons injured. This was 106 more accidents, six more killed, and 94 more injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

month of June, 1975, occ-urred in the following countie one each in Clay, Floyd, one cach in Cisy, Floyd, Garza, Wichita, Young Amstrong, Childress, Coll-ingsworth, Donley, Hardeman, Randall, and Roberts; two each in Carson, Cochran, and Lamb; and seven in Lubbock.

National Farm Safety Week, July 25-31

Though "safety" should be a by-word for all rural peopl anytine, a special week has been designated as Farm Safety Week with President Ford proclaiming the week beginning 25 July as Nation-al Farm Safety Week.

Theme for this year's ob-Week is "Planning Prevents Accidents". This marks the 32nd consecutive ob-servance of the annual na-

servance of the annual na-tional safety event, Accidents in 1974 claimed the lives of more than 5, 500 farm residents and caused more than 500,000 disabling injuries with more than half injuries with more than half of the deaths occuring in motor vehicle accidents, motor vehicle accidents, according to the National Safety Council. About one-fourth of the deaths and more than 150,000 disabling

including farm fires is estirated at almost \$3 billion.

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
