County Has New Official

Only one new county officer took office this year and it was an appointed position.

The four other county offices are filled by re-elected officials who were unopposed in elections this past year.

The new officer is County Health Officer Dr. Damon Gregg. The office is filled by appointment and local doctors alternate in filling the position. Dr. R.L. Kleeberger has been serving as Health Officer for the county.

The re-elected officers are Sheriff J.B. Cooke, County Attorney James P. Linn, County Commissioner Precinct One, Joe Day and County Commissioner Precinct Three B.W. Renner.

Sheriff Cooke is the senior office holder of the group of elected officers. He was first sworn-in as Sheriff of Hansford County 20 years ago, Jan. 2, 1945.

He had served as a deputy sheriff under Hix Wilbanks since the early 1930's.

The re-elected officials will be sworn-in in ceremonies Monday morning.

Cagers Back To District

Spearman's varsity basketball teams plunge right into the district races this week. The boys have had a long Christmas vacation, but the girls have been in the Duncanville AAU tournament in Dallas all this week.

They won their first two games very convincingly, but were dropped by Jordantown 57-50 in the third game. The Lynettes were to meet Tulia in the battle for third place Saturday evening.

Although knocked out of the race for the title, the Lynettes knocked off one of the teams rated high in the tourney. They beat Decatur 66-37 in the second game.

Tuesday night Spearman will be on the road to meet Dalhart in the Wolves gym.

Thursday night Spearman will play at home against Shamrock.

Sugar Beet Farmers Raising Millions For Etter Refinery

The North Plains area has a strong chance of getting its own sugar refinery, if the farmers of the area can raise \$6.5 million dollars to finish financing a farm-owned refinery at Etter.

This was the information received by three local men attending a meeting of the North Plains Sugar Beet Association in Dumas last week.

Kenneth Evans, Dee Jackson and Chamber Manager Don Floyd attended this meeting of farmers and bankers to discuss the possibility of raising the money.

The refinery and sugar beet acreage became available, after an allotment for Maine could not be used. The allotment was made available to Maine, but they cannot grow the beets on their potato land.

The soil there is an acid soil that will not grow beets. If the soil is neutralized for beets then it will not grow potatoes.

North Plains Sugar Beet Association has already secured \$15 million in financing from two sources, now farmers of the area must raise the remaining money.

Floyd said the proposed plan is for farmers to buy stock in the refinery at the rate of approximately \$200 per acre of allotted beets.

The bankers told the group that banking laws would not allow them to loan money for the proposed eight years pay-out, but they would help them secure the money from a private estate.

Floyd said the money was available from an estate in Dallas and the plan discussed was for each farmer interested to sign the note and be liable only for his share of the loan.

The 30 bankers attending the meeting said they could help the farmers in this type of obligation.

This proposed mill would be operated by the North American Sugar Co. They will have a 10 year contract to operate the mill. The firm wants an option to buy the refinery in three years, but the Associa-

tion did not want to sell it that quick. The firm will accept an option to buy it at a later time.

There is 35,000 acres of beets to be grown for the mill if it is built.

Floyd said the group was told the area has a 50-50 chance of getting the refinery and allotment.

Bruce Sheets Sells Drug Store To Orvil Brummett January 1

One of Spearman's older business firms has a new owner, but there will be few changes in the business.

Bruce Sheets announced Jan. 1, that he has sold his Spearman Rexall Drug to Orvil Brummett, a pharmacist in the store for two and one-half years.

The new owner said no personnel changes were planned in the store. However, two women employees, Mrs. Bob Potts and Mrs. Dave Hand resigned their jobs at the store, effective the first of the year.

Brummett and Jesse Davis, a long-time pharmacist in the store, will continue to serve the prescription trade. They will be assisted by Sheets.

The former owner said he was not retiring, just arranging for more free time. He will work some as a pharmacist in the store.

Sheets first opened a drug store in Spearman on April 15, 1933. He operated as a partner with Mr. Sanford of Perryton. Sheets assumed full ownership of the store in 1939.

At one time Sheets owned both drug stores in Spearman, but then sold the Corner Drug.

Six years ago Sheets built a new building and moved the store into its present location.

Brummett is a native of Perryton, graduating from high

school there. He has been a pharmacist for six years and

worked in Perryton before coming to Spearman.

The results were not announced until the Chamber board canvassed the election at its regular meeting this week.

Labor Office Opens Monday

The new Texas Employment Commission office for Spearman will open on the second floor of the courthouse Monday morning.

Richard L. Curtis will be in charge of this sub-office of the Berger TEC office.

The office is planned primarily to supply farm labor, but will handle requests for employment for both agriculture, industry and retail firms.

Curtis urges everyone seeking employment or employment to file their requests with the office.

Farm Workers To Pay SS Tax

Special Federal Social Security tax rules apply to farm workers, sharecroppers, farm workers, and farm crew leaders, Hubert B. Hamill, Administrative Officer of Internal Revenue for the Amarillo office, reminded today.

Employers of agricultural workers may be required to file Form 943 and pay Social Security taxes on wages paid to certain employees.

"Farmer's Tax Guide" which furnishes more detailed information on this subject is available upon request from the Internal Revenue Service.

Change Hair Color Only For Right Reasons

Business Population Up In Hansford Last Year

The business population of Hansford County is up 1.2% in January, 1965 as compared with January, 1964 announces Charles L. Swanson, manager of the Amarillo office. He states that figures obtained by a physical count of the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book for January 1965 totaled 166 manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers in the county as compared with 164 in January, 1964.

Mr. Swanson noted that this month Dun & Bradstreet, Inc. is sending requests for financial statements to almost three million businesses listed in the Reference Book. These statements are essential to the credit reports issued by the business information agency. The requests are sent to all businesses regardless of size, from the corner grocery to the

million dollar manufacturer. Because of the constant flux in the American business community, nearly 6,000 changes are now occurring daily in Reference Book data. Thus the mammoth volume must be re-issued every two months to keep up-to-date credit facts in the hands of manufacturers and wholesalers. The credit report which stands behind each entry in the Reference Book contains such information as the firm's current payment record, history, ownership, operation, financial stability.

Spearman played Tulia for third place Saturday night and were expecting to start home early Sunday morning.

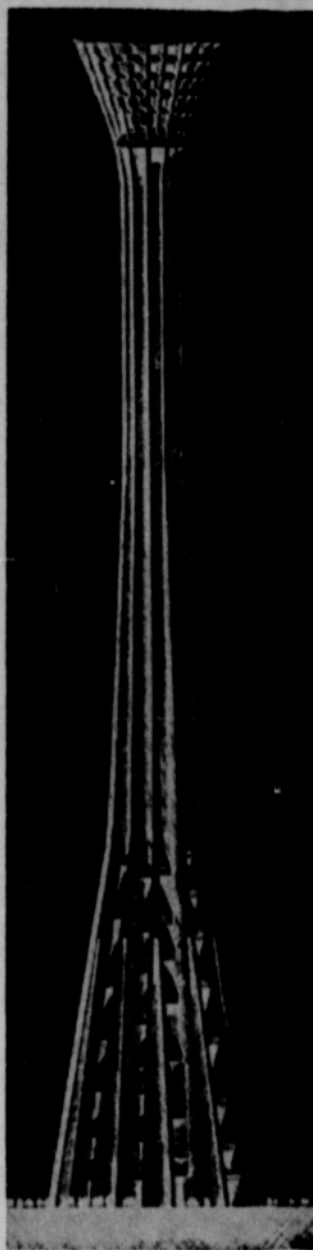
