It is good to see students from Spearman High School earning such scholarships. It speaks well of the program of instruction our school has.

Counselor Vern Laws tells us there are many scholarships available for students at many colleges and universities around the country.

Laws has several books and lists naming the scholarships, their value and the requirements. It would be a good idea for interested parents and students to contact Laws and begin the paper work required.

With all the scholarships available and the many student loan funds available, there is no need for any students not going to college, if he wants to attend.

Had an inquiry this week as to why the county road equipment is used on private property. We did some checking and found out how it is used.

Judge Johnnie Lee told us the county equipment can be used, if it is available, but an hourly charge is made according to the kind and size of equipment being used. The prices are comparable to that charged by private equipment.

The only exception is in building a road from the county road to a farm homestead. Roads built to other parts of the farm are charged for. Also, all culverts used are charged to the person having the work done.

Judge Lee said the county normally does not buy as much heavy equipment at one time as it did this month. The commissioners learned that a big price increase will go into effect Jan. 1, 1966, so it was decided to purchase the equipment before the price increase.

The Christmas rush is upon us. There is just four more weeks until the biggest holiday of the year. Between now and then the pace will pick up rapidly.

Since we have done our Christmas shopping, already, we feel sorry for all you slowpokes. Especially, those who feel they must go to Amarillo to do their shopping.

If a small town merchant is ever going to have a chance to keep business at home, it would seem, now is the time to make the effort. One or two trips through the Amarillo traffic trying to get from one shopping center to another, should make anyone appreciate shopping at home.

### Spearman, Gruver To Renew Basketball Battles Friday

It will be another battle of county enemies this Friday night. Spearman will host the boys and girls basketball team from Gruver in Spearman gym.

The Greyhounds started their season on a good note Monday night with a sound 47-27 whipping of the Sanford Fritch Eagles.

Sam Tipton served notice he is going to be tough again this year as he stuffed in 22 points.

Gruver lost little from the team that went to the state tournament last year.

The Gruver girls had a tougher time whipping Fritch 36-35. Fritch is expected to be one of the tougher teams in 1-AA competition this year.

Gruver lost only two girls, States and Crawford, via graduation from last year's team.

The Lynx will have two games under their belts when they meet Gruver. The Lynx beat Sunray Friday and play-

ed Borger Tuesday night.

A remodeled version of the Lynxettes will get a tough test against Gruver. Spearman has beaten White Deer and Sunray. They played White Deer here Tuesday

night.

The Lynx have yet to develop a scoring leader. Barbara Wilde has been leading the Lynxettes, but Susan Hutchison and Karen Gibson can score with ease.

### Commissioners Appoint Cox County Surveyor

A County Surveyor was appointed and two utility companies granted permission to go ahead with work around county roads by the Hansford County Commissioners Court Monday.

Charles Cox of Spearman was appointed county surveyor. Cox is a licensed surveyor. He recently retired from the military service and re-

turned to Spearman to make his home.

General Telephone Co. was granted permission to lay some underground telephone lines along road right-of-ways south of Spearman.

Western Gas Service Co. was given permission to cross county roads in Morse with gas lines. The company is installing a gas system there.

## McFarland To Speak To Conservationists

Tom McFarland of Lubbock will be the speaker at the seventh annual Hansford Soil Conservation Bankers Award Ban-

quet in the Spearman Grade School Cafeteria at 7:30 p. m. Dec. 2.

McFarland is manager of the High Plains Water District. He is an outstanding speaker on water conservation. He has, also, been active in securing legislation favorable to water conservation.

He has served on the Texas Water Commission and the West Texas Water Institute.

The outstanding Conservation Farmer and the Outstanding Soil Conservation District Supervisor will be recognized.

This annual banquet is sponsored by the Gruver State Bank and the First State Bank of Spearman.

Several farmers are nominated for the Conservation Farmer award. A selection committee tours the nominated farms and selects the farmer doing the best conservation job.

## Two New Foes Added To Schedule

Two new foes have been added to the Spearman Lynx football schedule for 1966, according to the schedule released this week by Dr. Bill Reeves, Superintendent.

Booker and Stratford have been dropped from the schedule and Canyon and Panhandle have been added.

The Lynx will play three non-conference and seven district games without an open date. The first game will not be played until Sept. 9.

Sunray will be here for the opening game, then Gruver comes to town. The Lynx will play Canyon and Phillips on the road, then come home for Boys Ranch. They meet Fritch at Fritch and Stinnett at Stinnett. Shamrock comes to Spearman again this year and the Lynx go to Panhandle to meet the new team in the district. Dalhart will come to Spearman on Nov. 11 for the last game of the year.

Miss Pattison applied for the scholarship through the assistance of school counselor L. L. Laws.

It was awarded on the basis of Miss Pattison's grades and school achievements.

Miss Pattison is the daughter of Mrs. Clyde Yeary of Waka. She is a member of the honor society, plays basketball, has been a member of the band and is active in many other school activities.

## Fourth Paper In County Coming Soon

The office for the new off-set publication is in the Gruver Hotel. The paper will be set in type and pasted up in Gruver and printed in Amarillo.

Miss Jones was editor of the Gruver Independent for two years. Since quitting that job she has compiled and written a history of Hansford County.

The publishing of news in Hansford County is one of the county's fastest growing industries. Just over six years ago there was only one newspaper in the county, The Spearman Reporter.

Since then two other papers have been established, The Hansford Plainsman in Spearman and later the Gruver Independent.

An FM radio station has also been founded in the county.

## General Seeks To Improve Service

## Homemaking Notes

Among plentiful foods this fall are apples—delicious, and versatile in cooking. I would like to pass on to you a couple of apple-based recipes I enjoy.

**FRUIT SHORTCAKE RAVE**  
1 cup chopped fresh cranberries  
1 cup chopped apples  
1 diced banana  
2/3 cup sugar  
6 shortcake biscuits  
Whipped cream

Mix together chopped cranberries, apple and banana. Stir in sugar until well blended with fruit. Place in refrigerator for two or three hours so that flavors will blend. Split biscuits. Spoon fruit mixture between layers and over top of biscuits. Garnish with whipped cream.

**DUTCH APPLE CAKE**  
1 1/2 cups sifted flour  
1/3 cup sugar  
2 tablespoons baking powder  
3/4 teaspoons salt  
1/3 cup butter or margarine  
1 beaten egg  
1/2 cup milk  
3 medium-sliced apples  
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
2 tablespoons butter or margarine  
2 tablespoons mild syrup  
Sift together flour, 3 tbsps. sugar, baking powder and salt. Cut in butter or margarine until mixture is crumbly. Combine egg and milk and add to dry ingredients. Mix to a soft dough, but to not over-mix. Spread dough in greased 8 x 8 inch shallow baking pan.

Pare, core and slice apples, placing apple wedges on dough in overlapping rows. Mix remaining sugar, cinnamon and sprinkle over apples. Bake in 375 degree oven for 40 to 45 minutes. Remove from oven and drizzle the two tablespoons syrup over the apples.

CHOCOLATE-OAT COOKIES

Boil one minute:

2 cups sugar

1/2 cup milk

1/3 cup butter

1/2 cup cocoa

Add three cups oatmeal and 1/2 cup peanut butter. Drop by teaspoon on wax paper and let set.

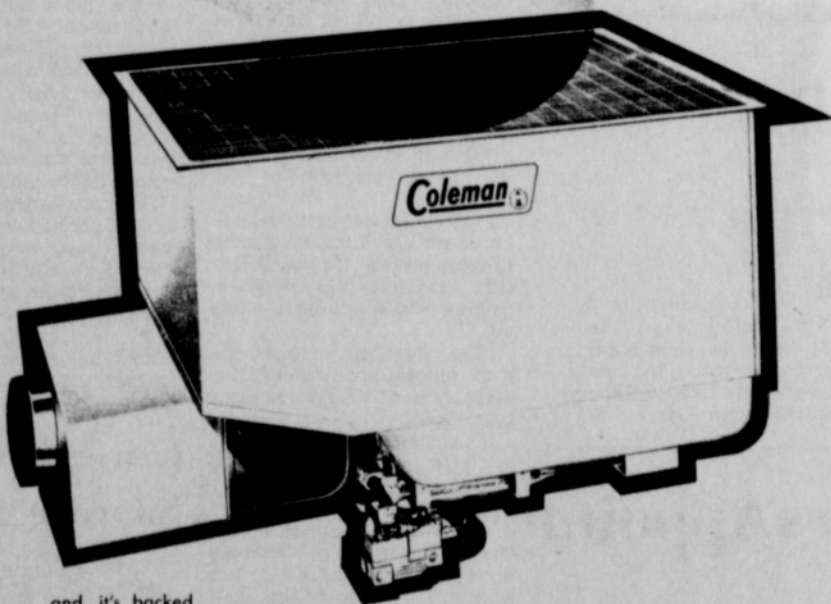

# Highway Map Fails to Match Like-Named Cities, Counties

Names sometimes have to do double-duty in Texas, especially on the Official State Highway Map published by the Texas Highway Department.

You'll find Dallas in Dallas county, El Paso in El Paso county, Lubbock in Lubbock county, Nacogdoches in Nacogdoches county. But that doesn't prove a thing.

You might suppose that Huntsville would be in Hunt county. But it isn't. It's in Walker county. And Jefferson, the town, should be in Jefferson, the county. Actually, it's a good 200 miles north of Jefferson county, in Marion county.

Jefferson county does include the community of Sabine, but Sabine county is about 75 miles away. Sabine county, on the other hand, is the site of a town named Milam — but Milam county is a far piece west in central Texas.

Cameron is the county seat of the county — Milam county, that is, not Cameron county. Brownsville is the county seat of Cameron county and Brown county is hundreds of miles north in west central Texas. Oddly enough, Brownwood is its county seat.

Not confused enough? Okay, let's look again. Start with Caldwell county. Don't bother to look for the city of Caldwell there. It's in Burleson county. Burleson, the town, is in John-

son county; and Johnson City—you've heard of this place—is miles away in Blanco county.

Or take Houston. Houston is in Harris County, but Houston county is three counties north, and the city of Crockett is its county seat. Crockett county is in far west Texas.

Look up Dimmitt county on the map. It's in south Texas. But the town of Dimmitt (with an extra 't') is in Castor county in the Panhandle. Yes, Castorville is back down in south Texas, in Medina county. Medina is in the next county north, Bandera.

If you still are dizzy, check Smithville — in Bastrop county. Smith county is in east Texas and includes the City of Tyler. Tyler county is further south, and it includes the town of Woodville. Wood county is further north, in east Texas next to Smith county.

There are others, but by now you should have got the idea. You can find them all on the Official State Highway Map.

And at the same time you may want to start planning your next vacation or week-end outing in beautiful Texas—America's Fun-Tier.

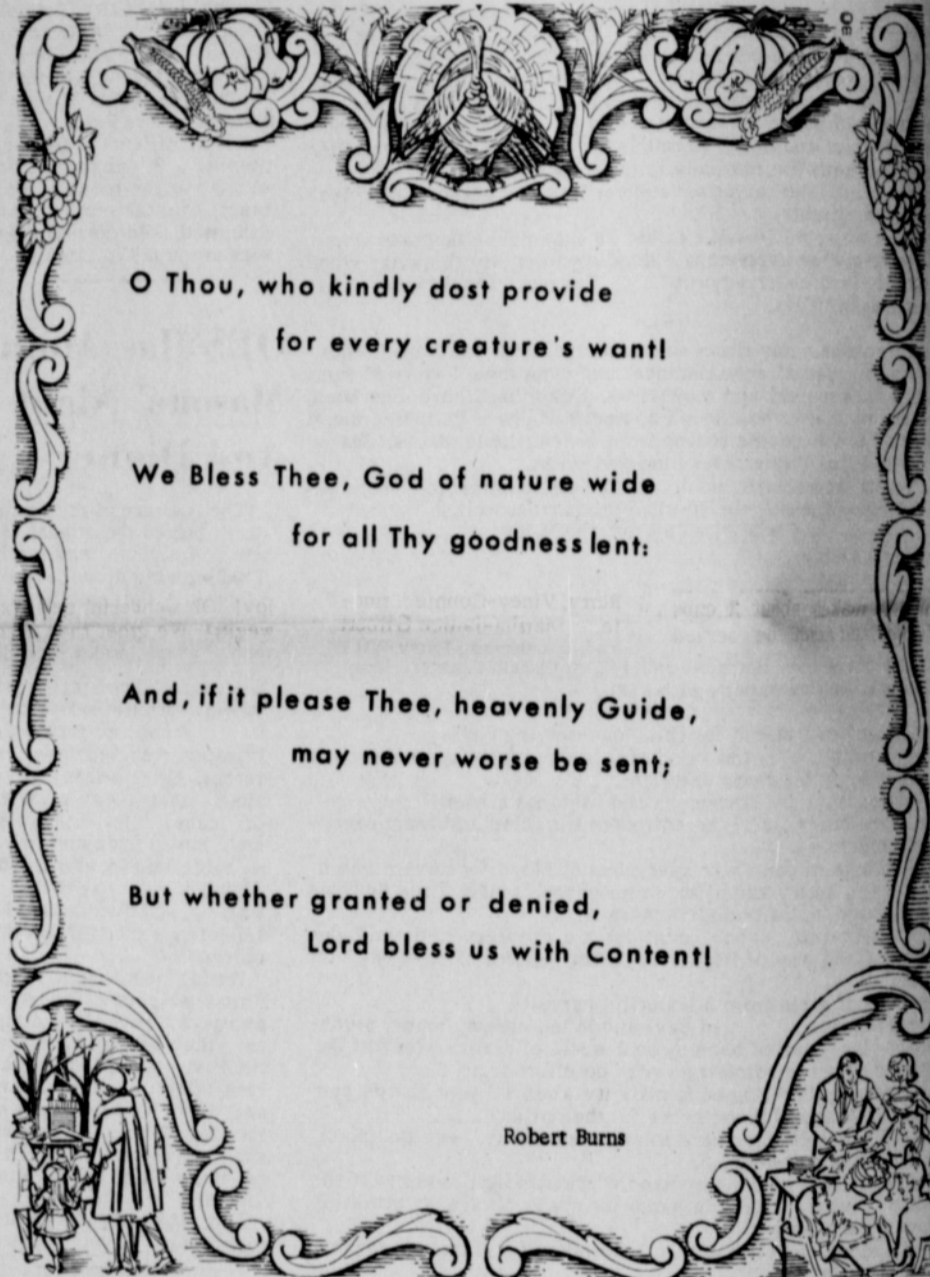

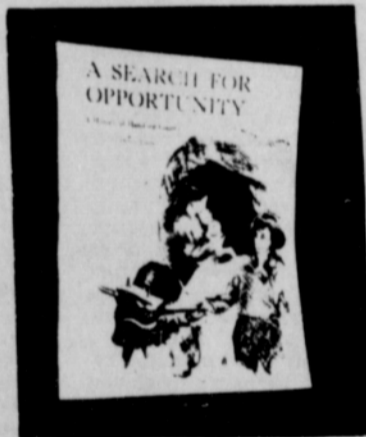

## Turkeys Top Plentiful Food List In Nov.

COLLEGE STATION — November in the United States traditionally has been "Turkey Month."

Turkey Month 1965 will be just that, for turkeys are plentiful, says the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Also termed plentiful this month are onions, cabbage, rice, split peas and sweetpotatoes, as well as apples, prunes, and frozen concentrated orange juice.

Potatoes, onions and rice are scheduled to be on hand in abundance, reflecting record crops. The fall potato crop is estimated at 20.9 billion pounds, 22 per cent above last fall, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Production of late summer onions for storage is set at over 20 billion pounds.

Better than average split pea supplies this November should make excellent low-cost food buys, while cabbage is expected to be in better supply than last year—about 8 per cent more.

Apple production this year is expected to rank second largest since 1949, with a total commercial crop estimated at 133.2 million bushels.

And with USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service adding prunes and frozen orange juice to the list of plentiful foods, lots of good fruit and fruit juice buys should be in the offing.

Food shoppers also will find sweetpotato stock well above last year. In fact this year's crop is expected to run about 200 million pounds more than in 1964.

So for wise November shopping, shop plentiful foods.

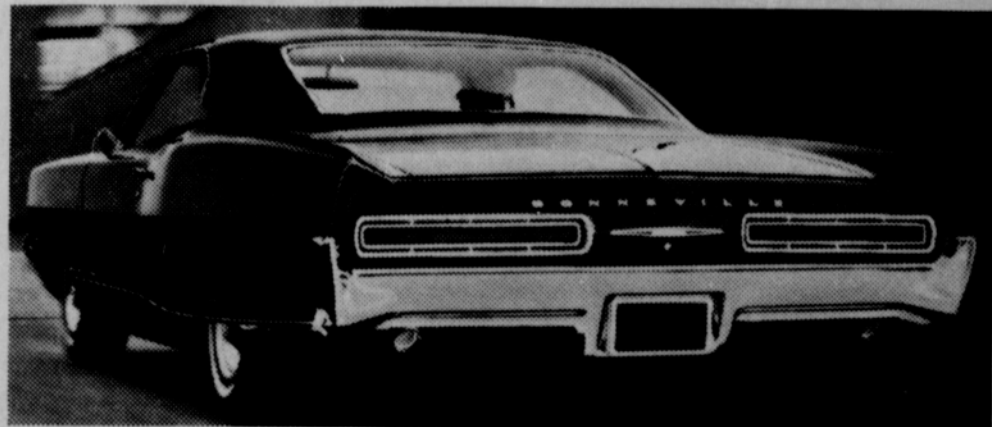

# Reseachers Look Into Factors To Boost Tourism

When Horace Greeley pointed his finger in our direction and gave the famous counsel, "Go west, young man," he had a captive audience. Easterners.

Nowadays America's population is too scattered to hit so easily. And easterners by and large are reluctant to "Go west" — at least on their vacations—because the west is simply too far to reach in two weeks.

Such facts emerged from two searching studies of America's vacation habits and its feelings about Texas. The studies, plus a third one probing Texans, themselves, were sponsored by the Texas Tourist Development Agency, the tax-supported operation that's helping Texas get a larger share of the \$10-billion-a-year U. S. vacation bonanza.

Belden Associates researchers, aided by the Gallup Poll, interviewed thousands of Americans to help the agency decide the best appeals and most promising markets for advertising the glitter of Texas as a vacationland. Vital and heretofore unknown patterns bearing on the future of Texas tourism emerged from a wealth of data which had never been gathered before.

For instance, research indicates that tax dollars that might be spent to advertise Texas extensively in two of the wealthiest U. S. travel markets — those of the extreme east and northwest — could be allocated more effectively elsewhere. Those markets are simply too far away to profitably overcome the time-and-distance barriers built into two-week vacations.

Most Americans, including Texans, tend to vacation within a day's drive from their homes, the studies showed.

Nevertheless, there are some Americans who are not loath to drive considerable distances to reach such a many-splendored vacationland as Texas. The Belden organization discovered, for example, that a sizeable proportion of midwesterners are most favorably disposed to the notion of visiting Texas. The same thing is true of southerners.

But they have to be reminded, researchers emphasized. Most midwesterners when asked—without prompting by any list—what states they would consider for a vacation, came up with "California" and "Florida." But aided by a list that included Texas, the Lone Star State ranked higher in appeal than several well-established "tourist states."

Increasingly now is in its regional advertising programs the TTDA is "reminding" specific population groups — pinpointed by research as prospective visitors — that Texas is "A World of Difference." And a peerless place for a holiday.

The Belden studies indicate, not surprisingly, that the "basic" market for tourism in Texas rests among Texans, themselves. But there is reason to believe that more Texans can be sold on vacationing in Texas. Last year, 40 per cent of vacationing Texans left the state. An extensive in-Texas program of public service advertising is now underway to help curb the Texodus.

# County Agent's Report

## WHEAT RUST

Three different rusts have been found on wheat in Texas. They are stripe rust, stem rust and leaf rust. Wheat rusts are caused by fungi.

The wheat here in Hansford County has leaf rust. The leaf rust fungus enters the leaves through leaf spores or stomata. Leaf pustules appear on the upper or lower surface of the leaves as small, round, orange-yellow pustules and are not as large as the elongated pustules of stem rust. About ten days after the fungus enters the leaves it produces these orange-yellow pustules. These spores germinate in rain or dew and cause new infection on other plants. As I stated, the color is much lighter than stem rust and the pustules are limited to the leaf surfaces, whereas stem rust is found also on stems and other plant parts. A heavy leaf rust infection on fall wheat can cause extensive damage to the leaf foliage and may kill very small plants. When plants are thus weakened from loss of foliage they are less resistant to extreme cold or dry weather. Winter killing appears to be worse in areas where leaf rust has been severe in the preceding autumn. Leaf rust is occasionally found in the spring but is not as heavy as in the fall. Leaf rust will not over-

winter in this area. As the weather gets colder, there will be less infection on new growth. The yellow and rusted leaves infected now will die. The spores are not very active if temperatures are in the 40's. I have no information as to the temperature needed to kill the spore. Grazing will help to eliminate the spores that would normally infect new growth.

Many farmers ask "How do we get the rust?" It is not caused by the dew or moisture but this helps to germinate the spores. Leaf rust spores are dispersed by wind movement. Spores are able to overwinter in Mexico and extreme South Texas. The southerly winds in the spring move spores onto the winter planted wheat in North Texas and the Central States. As spring wheat begins to develop in the Dakotas and Canada, the rust moves with the crop and spends the summer on spring planted wheat in these areas. As the spring wheat is harvested in the late summer, north winds carry the spores southward and they in turn infect the fall planted wheats in the Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas area. The rust eventually moves back to the winter home in the South Texas and Mexico areas.

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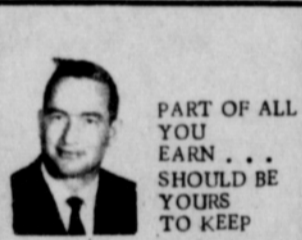
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## New Engineer In Irrigation Grissiam

W.M. Lyle, agricultural engineer-civil defense on the headquarters staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service since July 1, 1964, will move to Lubbock December 1 to become area irrigation specialist. He replaces D.W. Sherrill who retired several months ago.

Lyle will be replaced by Thos. W. Neumann, according to the announcement by Extension Director John E. Hut-

chison.

In his new assignment, Lyle will work in an expanded area, including all counties of Extension Districts 1 and 2 and parts of Districts 3, 6 and 7, the director said. This expansion, he added, is in response to requests for more assistance, especially on conservation and use of critically important irrigation water in western and northwestern areas of Texas.

Neumann will have statewide responsibilities for providing engineering assistance on programs relating to civil defense to other staff specialists, county and district Extension personnel and will work with other groups including county civil defense directors.

Lyle is a native of Lubbock but grew up in Crosby County. He holds a B.S. degree from Texas Technological College and an M.S. from Texas A&M University, both in agricultural engineering. Before joining the Extension Service, he did research work for the City-County Health Department of Lubbock and the Agricultural Engineering Department at A&M. He has also done survey work in Dallas.

As area irrigation specialist, Lyle will provide leadership for the Service's educational programs dealing with all phases of irrigation. He will also work with groups and organizations in the same field outside of the Extension Service.

Neumann is a native of Falls County and for many years was an outstanding 4-H and FFA member. He attended Tarleton State College for two years before enrolling at Texas A&M University. He holds a B.S. in agricultural engineering from A&M. He was employed by the Soil Conservation Service for summers and from 1958-63 served in the U.S. Army's Corps of Engineers. He held the rank of captain at the time of his discharge.

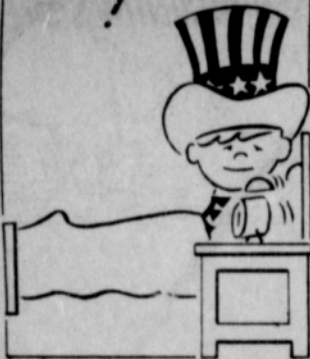
