

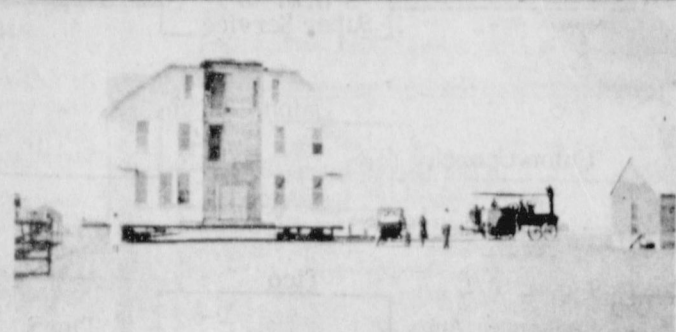

The newest activities in Perryton's Wheatheart Celebration are running events: The Wheatheart Country 10,000 Meter Run and a One Mile Fun Run. Both events will be Saturday morning, August 22, in Perryton. Entries are now being accepted for the two runs. The events are sponsored by First National Bank in Perryton.

The Wheatheart Country 10,000 Meter Run (10 Kilometers equals 6.214 Miles) begins and ends at City Park. The race starts at 8:30 a.m. The course is flat, allowing for some of the best times of the summer season. There are six age divisions for Men: up to age 14, 15-19, 20-29, 30-39, 40-49, and Masters (50 and over). There are three age divisions for Women: up to age 14, 15-29, and 30 and over. Trophies or medals will be given to the top five finishers in every age division.

The One Mile Run begins and ends at City Park also. The race starts at 8:40 a.m. The course is on Main Street, Perryton. It is

open to all ages of men and women, boys and girls. Ribbons go to all finishers.

All runners—in both the 10K Run and Fun Run—receive special T-shirts.

The fee for pre-registration is \$6.00. Late registration will be \$7.00 (from 7:30 a.m. to 8:15 a.m. on Saturday morning).

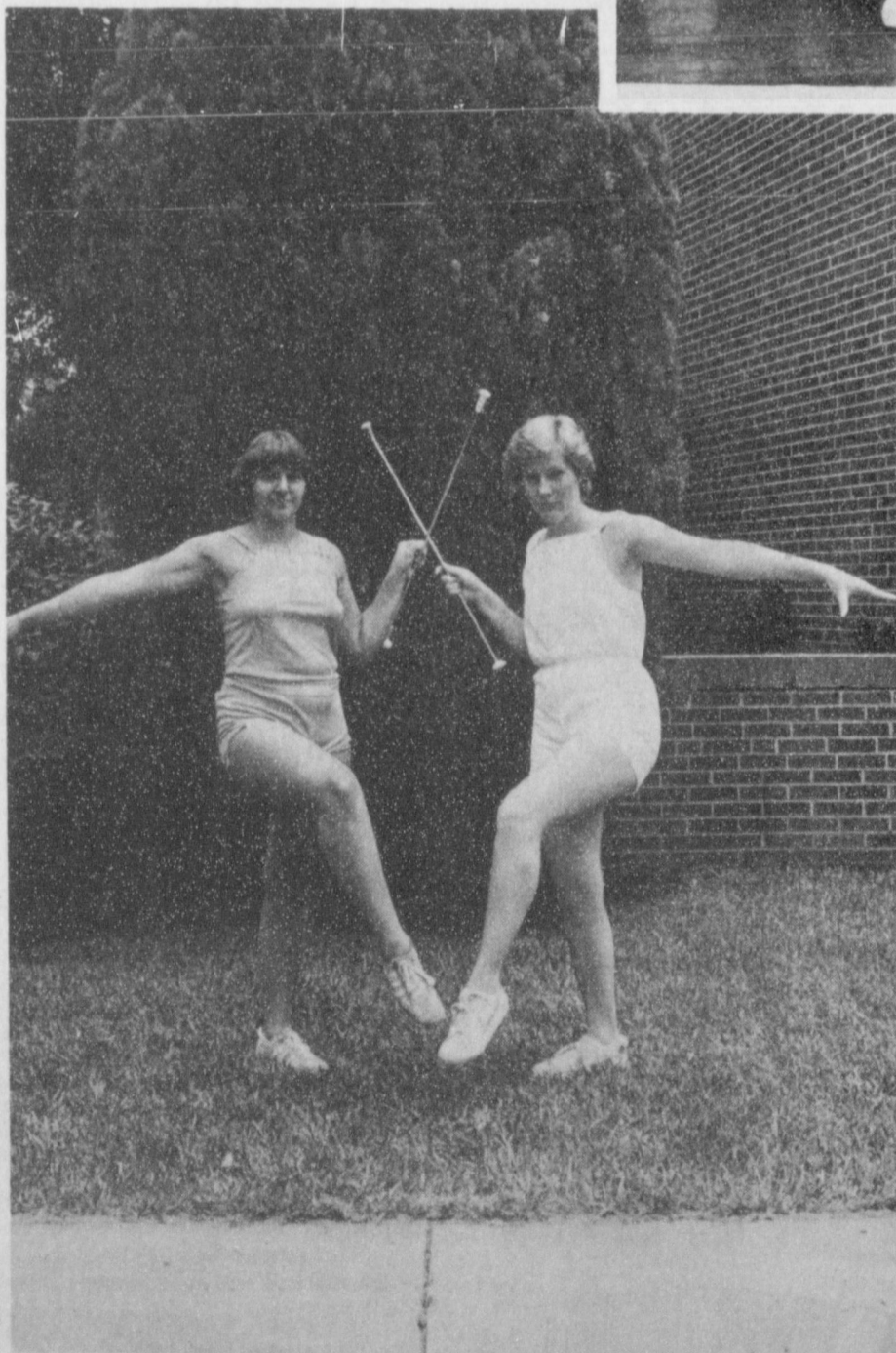

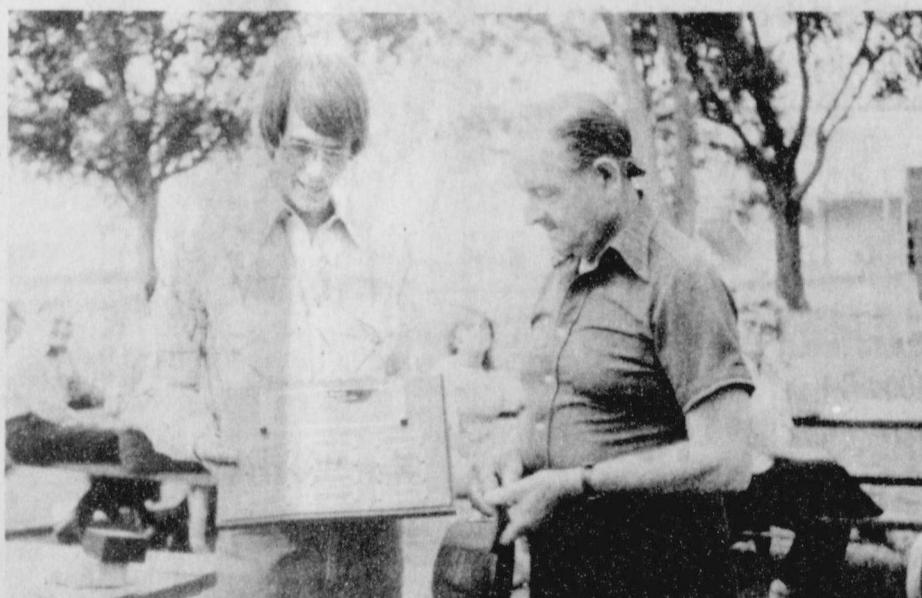

Leo Dacus Honor Goes To Ernest Newcomb

Employees of the city of Spearman enjoyed picnic and play in a park setting, Thursday evening, plus the informal presentation of service awards including the prestigious Leo Dacus roll of honored employees.

The latter went to Ernest "Ernie" Newcomb with City Manager Jim Murray doing the honors. Newcomb became only the fourth person to receive the Leo Dacus recognition since its inception in 1977.

For more than a half-century, Leo Dacus was a one-man powerhouse in the promotion of the city of Spearman, its growth and development and all-

ways—service to the citizens who made it so. In 1977, after his passing, a memorial award was created.

A plaque of polished hardwood and brass plating bearing the inscriptions was created and hangs in the foyer at city hall. The designation plate reads: "Leo Dacus Memorial Award" then "In memory of Leo Dacus, in recognition of employees that have exemplified the ideals of public service through loyal and dedicated service to the city of Spearman."

Beneath that are the individual plates inscribed with the names and dates of recipients of the award. It is not given every

year—only when a worthy employee is decided so by his or her peers, the long-time employees of the city.

At its inception in 1977, the names of Louie Karnes, William P. Martin and James Riley were affixed by vote of their fellow workers. Newcomb is the first to be honored since that time.

William "Pappy" Martin figured in the ceremonies, Thursday night, also, receiving a watch in recognition of 25 years of service as city employee.

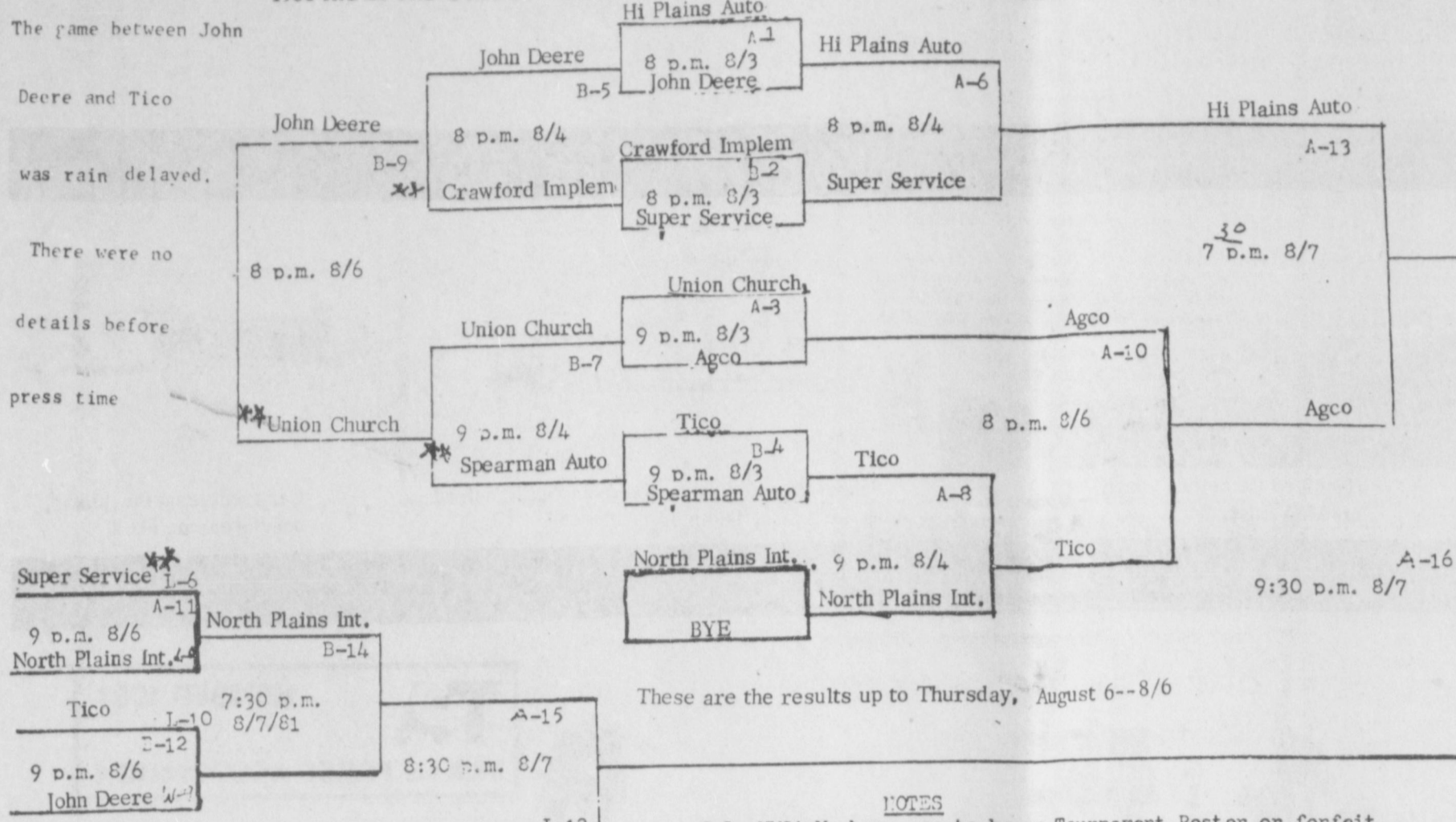

Sarpalius Receives Sunset Post



AUSTIN--Senator Bill Sarpalius (D-Hereford) Monday was appointed to the Texas Sunset Commission. The Sunset Commission is an arm of the Legislature that reviews the function of all state agencies on a periodic basis, and recommends to the Legislature whether those agencies should continue their existence. It is composed of four Senators and four House members.

"I promised in my campaign that I would work to eliminate waste and red tape in government, and this is my chance. I'm very pleased with this appointment," Sarpalius said. Sarpalius said he also was excited about the opportunity to examine several agencies with rate-making authority.

"We will examine the Public Utility Commission, the Railroad Commission and the State Board of Insurance. All these agencies set rates for the general public. All of them have a direct impact on the pocket-books of the people. We will look at them very closely," Sarpalius said. Sarpalius added that the Sunset Commission will also review several agencies that deal with banking, energy and industrial accidents.

"There is no one to look over these agencies and see if they are doing their jobs when the Legislature is not in session. For example, many people tell us that they have complained to a state agency about some industry that agency is supposed to regulate, but no one will listen to them. Others tell us that they have to go through so much red tape to file a complaint or open a new business that it's just not worth the trouble. That's the kind of thing we want to work on," he said.

The Hereford Senator expressed a hope that the people who have dealt with state agencies would come to him with complaints and recommendations.

"Many people have told us they are upset about utility rates, phone service, or insurance rates. That's what the Sunset Commission is all about. I hope we hear from every person in this state that has a complaint about these things," he said.

Sarpalius said the Commission will review 28 different state agencies during 1981 and 1982, reporting its findings and recommendations to the 68th Legislature in early 1983.

The Sunset Commission was established in 1977. Since that time, its recommendations have led to the abolishment of 11 agencies it considered obsolete and to the modification of many others.

"Government has a way of overstaying its welcome. We need to check it over continually to keep a lid on spending and red tape," Sarpalius said.

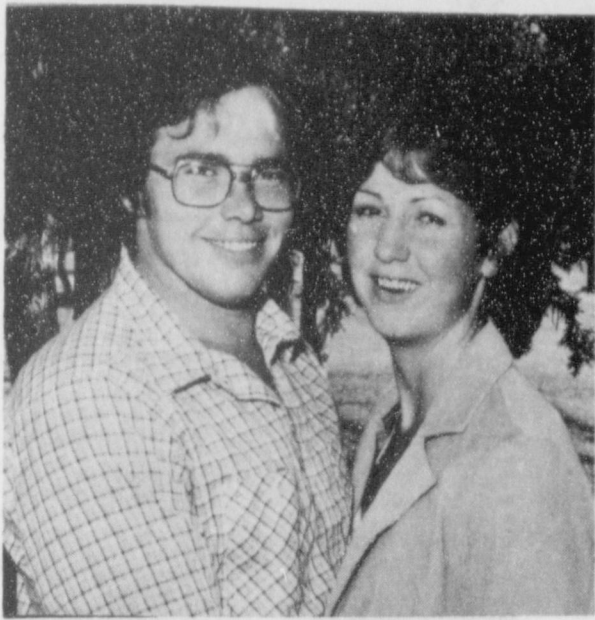

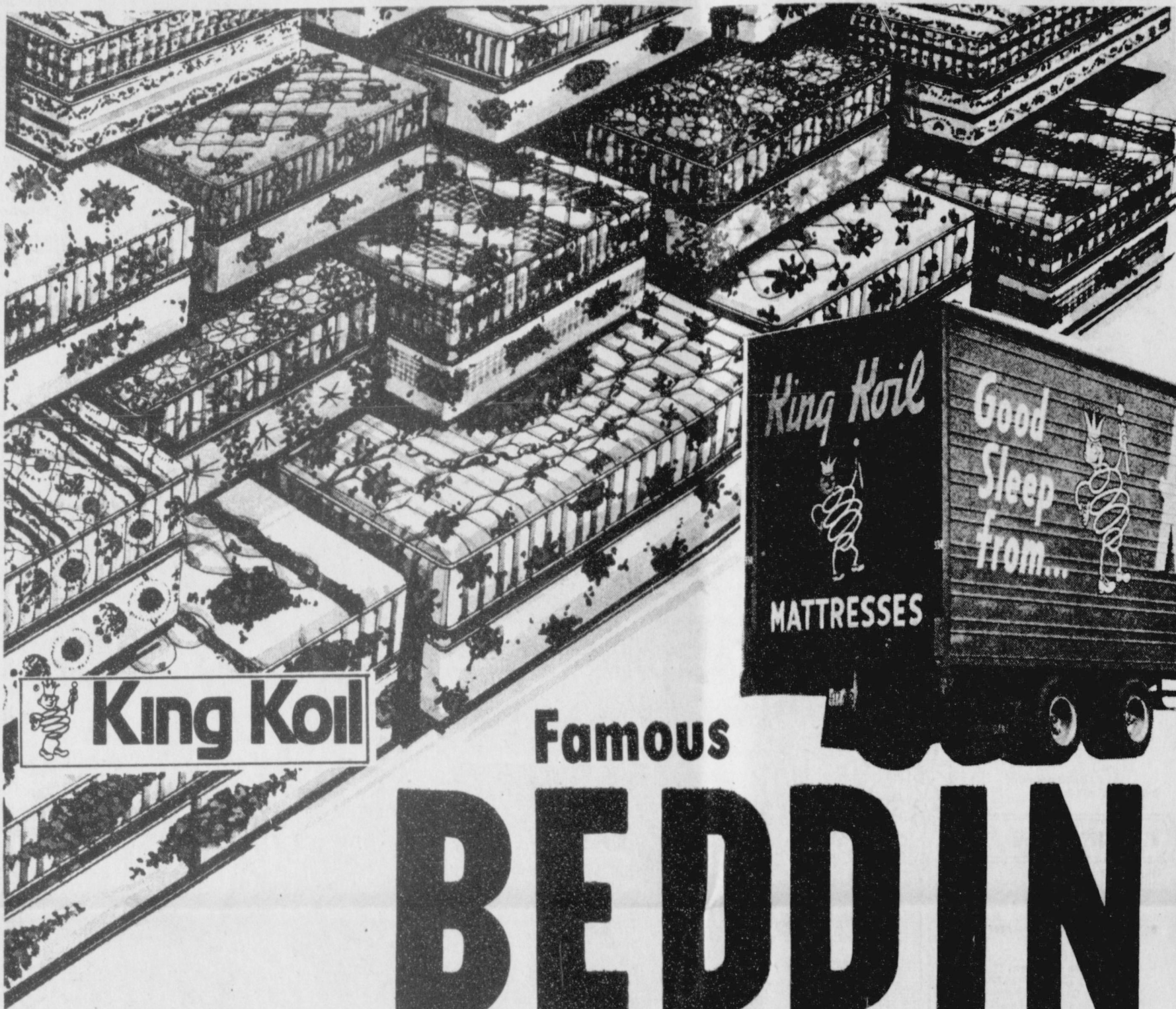
