sources---gold, coal, oil--and a soil sourcess-gold, coal, oil--and a soil
and climate which make any seed you plant sprout and grow almost instantly. But this wealth in resources doesn't translate into
dollars that trickle down to the main population base, and these are the very poor people you see in great crowds everywhere," h

tional and economic opportunities as their main incentives.
"I'm prouder now to be from this country than I ever have been," Doug adds quietly, and
tells the following story. He had been living in several months when the Ameriof July celebration and invited all
the U.S. citizens in Lagos to come. The party, which took place at the ambassador's home, featured ho dogs and volleyball and other
"home" treats. But it was the playing of the national anthem while raising of the American flag that made Doug break out in goose bumps.
"It had been so long since I'd heard the national anthem that
was really moved." he comments The Fourth of J uly bash, inviden ally, took place in February! Tuly is right in the middle of the rainy season," " Doug explains,
"and that's a terrible time to have big outdoor party in Nigeria! Doug anticipates spending another year in Nigeria before ransferring to another Wester Atlas location, and hopes to trave Kenya for vacations. "I will always look back on these years in Africa as being a good ex perience," he reflects.
