It's almost time to pick 'em up--your Cystic Fibrosis Fabulous Fifties Dance-a-Thon sponsor forms, that is! These forms will be available from September 3 at six locations--Spearman Rexall Drug, Gordon's Drug, T.G.&Y., Dairy Queen, and the junior high and high school principals' offices. Anyone wishing to "rock around the clock" from 8 p.m. to midnight Saturday, September 20 at the Community Building should get a sponsor form and start collecting these sponsors right away. A sponsor is a friend, neighbor, relative, local businessman, or local club or organization that is willing to pledge any amount of money for each hour you dance.

You'll be dancing to the sounds of original 50's artists right here in our own Community Building. Among the festivities that evening there will be prizes awarded for those who with the most sponsors and the best 50's costumes--male and female. A dance contest will determine the best 50's dancers. Homemade refreshments will be for sale. After all the pledges are collected, an additional award will be given to the individual who has raised the most money. All the proceeds from the Dance-a-Thon will go to support care, research, and education programs for children suffering from lung-damaging diseases. The most serious of these children's lung diseases, cystic fibrosis, is the number one genetic killer of children. Cystic fibrosis affects one out of every 1,500 infants born each year and occurs when a child inherits two genes for the disease, one from each parent. The parents don't have the disease but they are among 10 million carriers of the gene for cystic fibrosis.

Although incurable, cystic fibrosis can be effectively treated. Diagnosis and treatment of cystic fibrosis and other children's lung-damaging diseases are provided by more than 100 Cystic Fibrosis Centers across the country supported by the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. Six of these centers are in Texas.

## Experience-Packed Lynx Favored in I-AA Grid Race

"It looks like Spearman has the houses, and the rest of us have the ponies." With that comment, Boys Ranch head football coach Ben Adams offers his District I-AA pre-season prediction, one few are arguing with. Last year, Spearman compiled a 13-3 record, finest in the school's history, en route to the state finals where the Lynx were beaten by Newton. Since Greg Sherwood arrived at Spearman two seasons ago, the Lynx have developed an enviable reputation for winning--they've lost but twice in the last 21 games--and because of impressive returning experience this season, the Lynx are apt to continue their winning ways. Fourteen lettermen, including four offensive and seven defensive starters, return off last year's Spearman team, plus Sherwood has in his fold transfer David Steele, a 6-3, 180-pound quarterback who guided Hooker, Okla. to a 16-1 mark last year as a junior. Steele's father, Chuck, was hired during the summer to fill a coaching staff vacancy. Spearman, though without the offensive big-play antics of speedy all-state back Donnie Davis, now graduated, does boast a seasoned corps of returns, topped by linebacker Roger Jones and center Terrill Evans, both returning all-stars. Jones, 6-3, 190, gained a reputation last season as being one of the surest, quickest and most versatile linebackers in Texas as schoolboy football. Evans, at 186, gives Sherwood a seasoned performer at an important skill position. Steele, considered one of the area's top passers a year ago when he hit nearly 900 yards worth of tosses, will give Sherwood's squad an uncharacteristic dimension. "Sure we plan to throw a lot more," says Sherwood. "It would be foolish to have a passer like him and not use him."

He throws the ball better than any quarterback I've ever been associated with, and he has a lot of poise." Other returnees on offense include Jeff Beady (188) at split end, fullback Mark Fox (178), and fullback Kent Hargis (188, he subbed for Fox during the playoffs and gained 665 yards in those five games).

### I-AA Forecast

Spearman...The Lynx' defense should hold opponents until their offense matures, then they'll really be tough to beat. Dalhart...The Wolfpack, thanks to new enthusiasm, is due a return to contention for the title, but will need a break. Phillips...Barring a rash of injuries, the Blackhawk could surprise some folks, thanks to better backfield balance. Boys Ranch...The Ranchers also have the potential to surprise some folks, but they'll need to mature in a hurry. Panhandle...The Panthers simply lack the experience to contend for the title this year. Defensive veterans back also include tackle Bo Darrmand (200), tackle Leon Hagerman (188), linebacker Cary Collier (172), end Mark Cunningham (178) and Reggie Robertson (168) and cornerback Phillip Archer (178). "Our defense is our strength right now, especially our linebacking with Jones and Collier. We're inexperienced in our offense right now. Hargis covered a tendon in his left hand about a month ago and has been out, although he could be starting for the first game. "Our quickness won't be as good as last year, especially our offensive line--we lost every one of them except except for center and split end. The key to our season will be if our continued on page 8

## Physicians Licensure

The shortage of doctors in the rural Panhandle communities and the importance of medical service in strengthening the rural counties has surfaced as a real need in the region. Many communities are pursuing the possibility of recruiting foreign trained doctors to man their currently unmanned or understaffed clinic or hospital. The Indo-Chinese Refugee Resettlement Program has triggered a lot of activity among local "search committees" in this region. The foreign trained physician must be certified to practice medicine. In Texas, the applicant must pass an examination administered by the Texas State Board of Medical Examiners and prior to that examination, there are several other requirements which the applicant must meet. If the communities which are sponsoring these foreign trained physicians do have successful candidates for licensure in Texas, they will well be on their way to alleviating their doctor shortage. This will also result in a lessening of the burden of the over-worked doctors who are carrying, in many instances, an unreasonably heavy caseload. Among the communities who have acquired foreign physicians who will be seeking licensure are: Gruver, Booker, Canadian, Shamrock and Claude. Other involved in the search are Farwell, Pampa, McLean, Silverton, Dalhart, Dimmitt and Vega.

**DRIED ARRANGEMENTS** are attractive in the fall and winter. You may want to spray some items to get additional color in your arrangement. Okra that get too large to eat are attractive when left on the stem to dry. Or use wire stems for pods with weak stems. One last hint is to use scissors to cut items for dried arrangements so stems will stay firm and erect.

4-H\*RS will be beginning project work soon. We have some excellent new guides in personality development and home environment (home furnishings). Foods work will also begin now. If you are willing to help 5-6 girls for a series of 4 project lessons of 1-1 1/2 hours each please let me know. These are held at times and places determined by you and your group. ## Betty Crocker Search Underway

A special event of the tour is announcement of the All-American Family Leader of Tomorrow, who's scholarship is increased to \$5,000. Second, third and fourth place national winners receive scholarship increases to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 respectively. The Betty Crocker Search is on the advisory list of the National Association of Secondary School Principals.

## Crime Prevention Film Available

The regional crime prevention program took on a new facet recently, with the addition of a 16 mm sound motion picture projector and several color crime prevention films. The films run about 17 minutes each and cover the following topics: residential burglaries, commercial burglaries, personal fraud and rape. The residential burglaries film deals with the crime and how to prevent it. The residential burglary film gives the average citizen ideas on how to make his or her home safe. The 23 minute personal fraud film contains tips on how to spot and prevent hot check writing and how to guard yourself against con artists and con games. ## TWELVE MONTHS TO MAKE A TELETHON

Every year when the Jerry Lewis Labor Day Telethon Against Muscular Dystrophy goes off the air after 21 1/2 long, entertaining hours, everyone goes home exhausted, collapses and forgets about it until it's time for the next one, right? Wrong!

Meanwhile, 15 leading corporations from every area of industry sponsor nationwide fund-raising drives for the benefit of MDA. The proceeds raised through these year-round campaigns are presented to Jerry Lewis on the Telethon.

Then about three months before the next Telethon, the operation goes into high gear. Volunteers sign up for phone duty and to organize transportation for those who

### Refrigerator Death Traps

An old, abandoned refrigerator on your back porch - or your neighbor's - could be a death trap for your child. Many children have climbed into these tempting cubby holes and closed the door only to be pulled out dead from suffocation after a long, heartbreaking search. It doesn't take long for these tightly insulated refrigeration units to snuff out a life. A child becomes unconscious in ten minutes and dies within twenty-five minutes. And surviving even a short time without oxygen can cause permanent brain damage. Advice: If you have small children, use the key that came with your freezer -

certainly when the unit is left empty. Advice: If you have an unused refrigerator, turn it around so the door is against the wall, padlock the door handle, or remove the door altogether. And don't assume that magnetic doors are childproof. Many children will just curl up and go to sleep once inside.

**Gruver Enrollment Nears 600**

**SCS Has Wildlife Packets Available**

The Hansford Soil and Conservation District is again cooperating with the Texas Forest Service in an effort to get wildlife plantings in the District.

Wildlife packets are available which contain 150 seedlings - 50 Russian Olive, 50 Honey Locust thornless and 50 Red Cedar. The packet of 150 seedlings is \$7.50.

If you want other plantings you can get them at the rate of \$5.00 per 100 seedlings. Other seedlings available are Austrian Pine, Chinese Elm, Oriental Arborvitae, Osage Orange, and Ponderosa Pine. These seedlings are for wildlife habitat or wind breaks plantings and are not ornamental plantings. Please place your order with the Soil Conservation Services Office.

## Change In Motorcycle Title Law

Effective September 1, 1975, no persons (other than a dealer) may sell, trade, or otherwise transfer a motorcycle within this State unless a Certificate of Title has been applied for and issued in the name of the owner as of September 1, 1975.

All new motorcycles sold on and after September 1, 1975, must be transferred on Manufacturers' Statements of Origin, with the following exception: Any new "non-street legal" motorcycle, which a dealer has in stock on the effective date of this Act and for which the dealer cannot obtain a Manufacturer's Statement of Origin, may be transferred on an invoice or bill of sale, provided there is a statement noted thereon verifying the fact that the vehicle was in the dealer's stock prior to September 1, 1975.

An individual who is the owner of a "non-street legal" motorcycle as of September 1, 1975, must

secure a Certificate of Title in his name before such vehicle can be transferred to another owner. In such instances, the basic evidence of ownership may be any one of the following items:

1. A Manufacturer's Statement of Origin properly executed and assigned to the Applicant.
2. An invoice signed by an agent of the company or firm selling the motorcycle. The date of sale shown on the invoice must be prior to September 1, 1975.
3. A bill of sale properly executed by the seller and dated prior to September 1, 1975.
4. In the event any of the above evidence is not available, and Affidavit of Ownership, Form D12-330, must be executed by the owner as of September 1, 1975, and such owner must be the person that is applying for title.

## Nitrogen and your wheat.

Some farmers were unable to apply enough nitrogen to wheat last year. The result was nitrogen-deficient, lower-yield wheat. The nitrogen supply situation has improved over last year. Therefore, it is possible for growers to return to higher nitrogen rates and higher yields. For example, an application of 80 pounds of actual nitrogen per acre typically results in 15 extra bushels of wheat.

### Nitrogen demand for wheat.

line play comes along."

Should the Lynx stumble, Dalhart, Boys Ranch and Phillips are given shots at upsets.

Dalhart, under new head coach Hugh Massey, returns seven lettermen off last year's 5-5 team. Among the Wolf-pack's strengths early are expected to be a new big-play, gambling defense Massey hopes "will make enough big plays to stop offenses. It's the Arkansas monster defense which is based on quickness, stunting and moving in the front."

Defensive stalwarts back include lineman Malcolm Green (200) monster Ricky Carmack, linebacker Ronnie Ramirez (190) and noseguard Pat Whiteaker (195). Mike Smith, pushed by sophomore Joe Strong, has the edge at quarterback; Jim Bob Matthews (180) has moved to tight end and linebacker from quarterback and Donnie McWhirter (180) will move to fullback.

"My main concerns are the lack of overall team quickness and at filling the tailback spot. We haven't had a tailback come forth with the combination of being able to drive in like a power runner on short-yardage situations but break for the big gain on options or sweeps."

Boys Ranch, 7-3 last season, its best in more than a decade, counts 10 lettermen, but only three offensive and two defensive regulars back. Graduates of a 9-0 freshman team last year are sure to help, however.

Starters back include back-noseguard Daniel Rains (166), fullback-defensive end Butch Bawcom (183) and center Mike

Taylor (165).

"Our inexperience right now is a big concern," says Adams. "When you begin with only two or three starters, you don't have much experience. We have a little more speed in our offensive and defensive backfields this year, but we need to get our offensive line working together. We have the potential to have a good season if we can just get it going like we did last year."

Phillips, 2-7 last season (one filled with injuries), figures to field a more-balanced and bigger offensive backfield, but a lack of depth still remains an obstacle, possibly a fatal one if injuries reoccur enmasse.

Coach Cozel Foster counts six offensive and five defensive regulars back, including four seniors who started playing on the varsity as sophomores—quarterback Kim Gipson (165), lineman-linebacker Jamie Sullivan (160), end-linebacker Randy Key (160, will be moved to halfback both ways this fall) and Hank McWilliams, a running back-linebacker who suffered a knee injury before last season began. He weighs 170 and will fill the fullback spot.

Other starters back include defensive lineman David Rhoten (170), tackle Mark Brittain (187) and center Allen Holland (185).

Transfer Chris Purcell (from Caprock High School) at 168 is expected to be a big help in the backfield.

"But our whole team lacks quickness," says Foster. "We'll only probably make one change from offense to defense at first, so we don't have any depth."

Panhandle, off a 3-7 year and under new coach Rod Ivy,

counts only five starters back, leaving the Panther coaching staff with a rebuilding situation.

Returnees include tackle-linebacker Richard Crawford (180), split end-cornerback Lee Powell (130), running back-

defensive end David Rowland (150), back-linebacker Mike Kirkland (159) and center Dale Gabel (165), who's been moved to tackle both ways.

The Panthers lack size and experience and will be hard-pressed against some of the loop's more seasoned clubs.

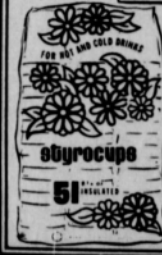

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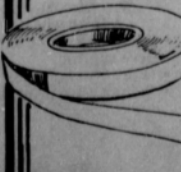
