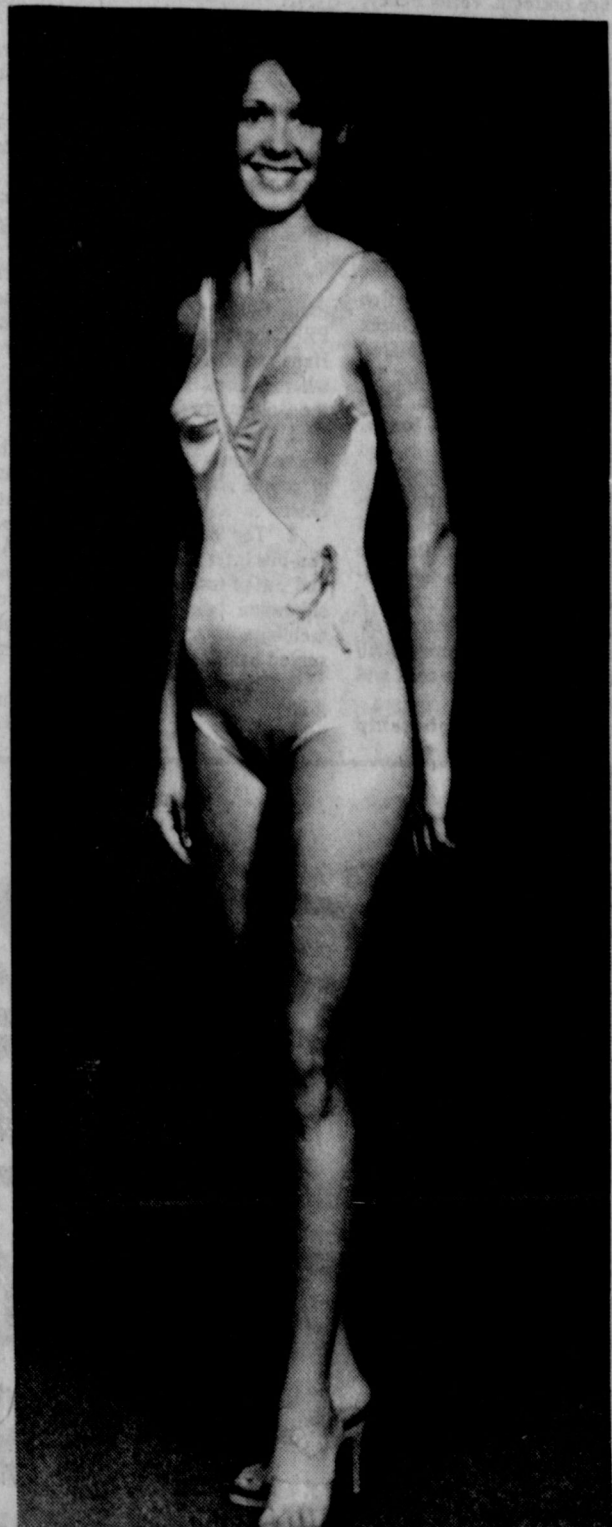


Jennifer McClain competing in Wheatheart contest



Jennifer McClain, Miss Hansford County, will be among the contestants competing in the Wheatheart of the Nation Beauty Contest August 13 at 8 p.m. in the Perryton High School Auditorium. She is sponsored in the contest by Spearman Moose Lodge.

Jennifer, 16, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jim McClain of Spearman. She was a speech honor student at Spearman High School in 1979, and was crowned Miss Hansford County at the pageant here in June. She is active in YMCA. Jennifer enjoys snow skiing, golf, swimming and tennis.

The Wheatheart of the Nation Beauty contest originated at the Perryton Celebration of 1947, when the event was conceived as a way to call attention to the record breaking wheat crop that year when Ochiltree County produced 11,000,000 bushels of wheat, at that time 1% of the nation's production.

The first contest was held at the Celebration dance in the county warehouse in Perryton, and Miss Jean Watson of Borger was the winner. The Wheatheart Beauty contest grew over the years and

provided national publicity for the wheat industry as the Wheatheart's picture moved over Associated Press, United Press, and television channels. The first few years, cash prizes were given to the Wheatheart winner. In 1951 the first prize was an expense paid trip to Havana, Cuba. Later winners had trips to Florida and for a number of years the Wheatheart was honor guest at the Canadian National Exhibition in Toronto, Canada. The Wheatheart was guest of honor at the Seattle World's Fair.

Several years ago the prize was changed to \$1750 in college scholarships. Miss Wheatheart receives \$1000 college scholarship, \$500 college scholarship goes to the 1st runner-up, and \$250 college scholarship goes to the 2nd runner-up. The Wheatheart of the Nation Beauty Pageant is now recognized as one of the top such events in the Southwest and attracts contestants who have won beauty titles and who make this an outstanding field. The Wheatheart of the Nation represents the entire wheat industry during the year of her reign and every winner has done an outstanding job as goodwill ambassador for the wheat industry.

counties of Texas, the Dallas-based Association said the county ranked 60th among the 202 counties having marketed production valued at \$100,000 or more, not including the sale of natural gas liquids. In addition to paying local, county, and state property taxes, producers in the county also supported state government through production tax payments estimated at \$5.1-million, according to the Association. Crude oil taxes amounted to \$205,000, while natural gas

E.C. Jenkins will teach Health & PE in High School and is also assistant coach. He is a 1957 graduate of Lovington, N.M. High School, and received his BS in 1967 and his Master's in Education in 1971 from Northeastern Louisiana State. He has 11 years of experience, having taught at Pampa 3 years, here 2 years, Texhoma 1 year, Texarkana, Ark., 1 year, Tucumcari, N.M., 2 years, and Bovina 2 years.

Enrollment for new junior high students to Spearman schools will be held Aug. 20, 21, 23 or 24 in the junior high building from 9 to 2 p.m., according to principal G.W. Robinson.

All junior high students are to report to the junior high auditorium August 27 at 8:20 a.m. Enrollment will follow a short assembly. Fifth graders enrolled here last year will enroll at this time.

Elementary students will enroll Friday, August 24 from 8:30 to 10:30 a.m. Any new students moving into the district who will be in elementary school should enroll on

Aug. 20, 21 and 22 from 9 to 2. These new students to the school system must have immunization records before they can enroll, stated Allen Alford, principal.

Classes will begin August 27 at the Pringle-Morse School at Morse, according to Roy Harris, superintendent. Buses will run on their regular route that day. Teacher In-Service will begin August 21.

Transpecto opens here

Transpecto I, a Joint Venture, consisting of Halliburton Services, Dorchester Gas Producing Company, Texas Energy Services, Inc., and Eagleton Engineering Company has opened an office in Spearman, Texas, to conduct an experimental enhanced oil recovery program. Transpecto has purchased the building at Davis and Main formerly occupied by the P.A. Lyons interests and is remodeling it to accommodate its initial office staff.

Purchase of right-of-way for a 85/8" pipeline from Borger to Spearman has begun. The pipeline will be used to transport carbon dioxide purchased from the Cominco American plant to several nearby depleted oil fields near Spearman. CO2 is an inert, non-flammable, non-toxic, non-hazardous material that will not only restore the spent energy in the oil reservoirs but will in addition alter the nature of the oil, water, and gas in the reservoir to make it much more producible. Construction of the pipeline and an 8000 HP compressor and dehydration plant, at Borger, will be started upon completion of right-of-way pur-

chases. Actual construction will take only three or four months with CO2 injection and enhanced oil production occurring soon after start of the injection operations.

An additional length of 6-5/8 pipeline will be extended from Spearman into Ochiltree County upon completion of the Borger to Spearman phase to service oil reserves already acquired there.

Transpecto will begin hiring office and production personnel, preferably from the local market, upon completion of right-of-way activities.

The planned program to utilize the CO2 available is of a pioneering nature, but if successful, should extend for 15 to 20 years and allow recovery of a considerable amount of otherwise unrecoverable oil from Hansford and Ochiltree County wells.

W.A. Stanberry, Petroleum Engineer, is manager of the Project. His son Lynn Stanberry has moved to Spearman as the advance representative and will function as well tester and assistant to the Project Engineer.

Graveside services will be held Monday morning, August 13 at 11 a.m. in the Gruver Cemetery for Orville Vane Walker, 88, of Gruver, who died at 1 a.m. Friday morning, August 10 in Hansford Hospital. Rev. Tom Fuller of the Gruver United Methodist Church will officiate.

Mr. Walker moved to Hansford County in 1902 from Bosworth, Mo. where he was born on July 26, 1891. He married Alice Spivey, June 24, 1916 in Texhoma, Texas.

He was a retired farmer and was Hansford County Deputy Sheriff from 1944 to 1970.

He is survived by his wife, Alice, three sons, O.V. Jr., Ross and Roy, all of Gruver, nine grandchildren and eleven grandchildren.

Agriculture News

Hansford County livestock producers should be alerted that a prussic acid build up may occur in certain plants grazed by livestock and serious cattle losses may result. There are many plants containing the toxic principle that can poison livestock. Some of the more common are Johnson grass, sorghum hybrids, sudan grass, choke cherry, black cherry, and even flax. The acid is not found in appreciable quantities in healthy plants. The acid develops only when the normal growth of plants has been retarded or stopped by periods of drought, bruising, trampling, wilting, or following a frost.

Prussic acid poisoning works rapidly in affected animals rarely surviving more than one to two hours. In the most acute cases animals become affected within ten to fifteen minutes of eating toxic material and may die within two to three minutes. Suspect material can be checked by the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Lab in Amarillo or a local vet if he has the test materials. If samples of forage are sent to the lab, about one pound of forage from different areas of the field should be collected, packed in a plastic bag, and repacked in a refrigerated container for shipment. This should be shipped through your local veterinarian to the lab.

Several Hansford County producers have sent samples in for testing. One sample sent in by Glen Mackie was reported by the lab to be the most toxic they had tested to date. Producers should have their pastures tested before turning in cattle to graze to prevent losses. If prussic acid poisoning is suspected call a veterinarian immediately as speed is important since the toxic principle works very rapidly.

CATTLE CALF INVENTORY
The number of all cattle and calves in Texas totaled 14,000,000 head on July 1, 1979, 7 percent below last year. The 1979 calf crop is estimated at 5,000,000 head, 6 percent below the 1978 crop. All cattle and calves on hand in the United States on July 1, are estimated at 118 million head, 3 percent below July 1 a year ago.

The calf crop is expected to be 43.5 million head, 1 percent less than the 43.8 million born in 1978 and the lowest estimate since 1963. This will be the fifth consecutive year for a decline in the calf crop since the record high of 50.9 million in 1974.

Hansford County is currently ranked number 6 in the state of Texas for all cattle and calves with a total number of 137,000 or 1 percent of the state total. Hansford County is also ranked 6 for cattle on feed with a total of 94,000 or 4.7 percent of the state total.

SOWS BREATHING RATE DETERMINES FARROWING
Many Hansford County swine producers are now busy farrowing sows for producing pigs for show. Watching sows breath may be the best way to determine when sows are going to begin farrowing.

According to recent studies sows begin breathing faster about 24 hours before farrowing. Sows respiration rate grows from a normal rate of 24 to 30 breaths per minute to a peak of 80 pants per minute about 5 hours before farrowing. Then respiration rate fell when sows were getting close to farrowing.

Hog producers usually look for the appearance of colostrum in the sows udder and nest building behavior, which usually occur about 12 hours before parturition. Both signs are not reliable because in many cases they appear a day or more before the first pig is born. It is important for producers to be with their sows when they are giving birth to insure all pigs nurse and assistance can be given if needed. This is extremely important now due to depressed hog prices as one pig saved may mean the difference between profit and loss.

KEOGH PLAN LIBERALIZED

The law establishing the Keogh plan has been in effect for fifteen years. However, it is now getting a great deal of attention because permissible contributions have been greatly increased. Prior to 1974, a person could only contribute 10% of his income to a maximum of \$2,500. The amount is now \$7,500 or 15% of income, whichever is less.

Self-employed individuals can participate in this plan. Anyone who owns all or part of a business or works for himself is eligible. Net earnings from self-employment are considered income under the Keogh plan, but interest on investments usually cannot be included. The advantage of this plan is that

taxes are deferred until the money is taken out. Any interest earned in an approved plan is also exempt from taxation while the fund is building.

An individual pays taxes on the money when he withdraws it at the time he retires. Since he usually is in a lower tax bracket at retirement, he gets a smaller tax rate on the funds—smaller than if the money was taxed at the time he made the contribution. This is a major benefit of the Keogh plan.

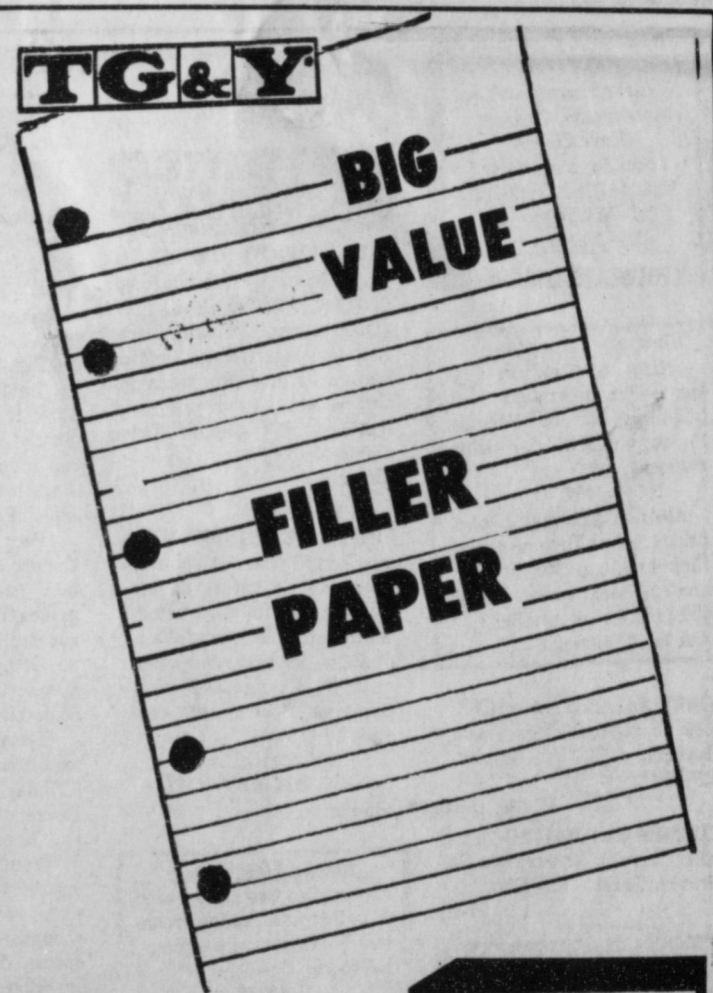

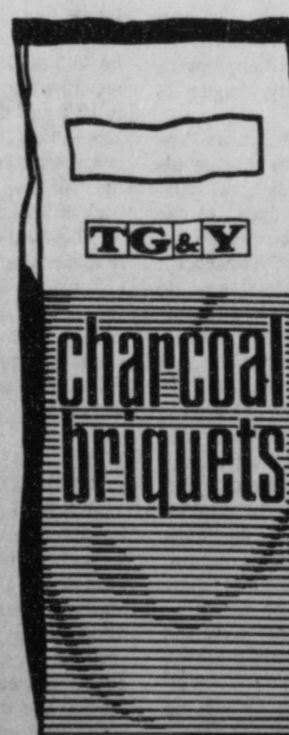

-- National Farmers Union President, Tony Dechant, will address the volatile situations of the world wheat market and the impact of both domestic and international policies on the future of the family farm when he addresses an area meeting of Texas Farmers Union District I, according to Jerry Gee of Spearman.

Gee is President of the Hansford-Hutchinson County Farmers Union which is host for the meeting scheduled for Monday, Aug. 13 at 8:00 p.m. at the County Barn in Spearman. A barbeque meal is also included in the agenda and any interested area farmers are invited to attend.

Dechant has been at the helm of the 300,000 member National Farmers Union since 1966 and is recognized policy leader both domestically and international-ly. He is the recent past president of the International Federation of Agricultural Producers, a vice-president of CARE, and a trustee of the American Freedom from Hunger Foundation.

His address to the District TFU members will center on the ever growing problems faced in international trade and the critical role of grain exports which could again be used as a political tool for bargaining, possibly through embargos rather than price agreements between food exporting countries, Dechant is also expected to discuss the role of farm organizations in the face of challenge coming from Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland for a national dialogue prior to the enactment of new farm legislation to replace the Agriculture Act of 1977.
