



Mr. Kleppe, who has been nominated as Secretary of the Interior, said the SBA would not change its interpretation of the act without clear statutory expression of eligibility. "This bill will provide that expression," he said. The bill must now be passed by the full House and Senate and be signed by the President before becoming law.

"I will do whatever I can to assure its passage,' Hightower said, "and to assure full compliance by the SBA with the intent of Congress."

Washington, D.C. --Congressman Jack High-tower today amounced significant legislative progress toward granting to farmers and ranchers full eligibility for Small Busines Administration Learn

Buines Administration Loans. The House Small Buiness Committee, of which Hightower is a member, this morning approved H. R. 9066, which was drafted to ame the Small Business Act. "The bill's principal purpote was to make it absolutely clear to the Small Business Admin-istration that small farm-ers and ranches are el-igible for full SBA assist-ance." Hightower said. As the SBA interprets the act today, farmes and ranchers are eligible "The committee's action today makes it very clear that we believe farmers and ranches are business-men and should be treated accordingly," Hightower said. said. Hightower said that during subcommittee hearings he and other congressmen advised the SBA Admin-istrator, Thomas Kleppe, that the Congress never intended to exclude small farmers and ranchers in the original SBA act.

Except as otherwise authorized by the con-stitution, members of one branch may not exercise any power properly at-tached to either of the others.

Article III, The Legis-lature, is amended to: Continue the present structure of the legisla-ture consisting of a se-nate with 31 members and a house of represen-tatives with 150 mem-bers. The present organi-zation and procedure of the legislature are con-tinued except that the provision allowing closed executive sessions of the senate is omitted. Provi-sions on the conflict of in-terest of members of the legislature are con-tinued, as is the governor's power to veto bills or line items in ap-propriation bills. The ar-ticle provides for ingle-member senator-ial, representative, and compensation commis-sion is created to recom-mend the compensation and allowances to be re-ceived by members of the legislature. The legisla-tive compensation, set by law, may not exceed this general election. The ar-ticle provides for annual sessions of 140 days in odd-numbered years and 90 days in even-numbered years, and a veto session of 15 days upon request of three-fibhs of the membership of each house. 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
