





buys wholesale in quantity, maybe 10 cents. The trimmings on the McDonald quarter-pounder, for an example, are minimal-maybe 5 cents. That leaves a dollar for the meat and profit.

If one gets eight ounces of beef, and that's not guaranteed or always the case, the cost to the chain is probably 30 cents. That leaves a nice profit. Of course, the chain operation must include labor, napkins, rent, furniture, rest room maintenance, condiments and royalties.

That's where most of the expense other than food cost is. The profit margin on the fries and shake is higher.





From Oslo Community Hansford History

by Joyce Johnson HANSFORD COUNTY'S FIRST

TELEPHONE LINE ON BARBED
WIRE
The first telephone in Hansford

County started out on a barbed wire.
The boxes were ordered from Boston,
Massachusetts and the line was
constructed by Guy and Wallace
McKay.

The first line was on the ten barbed

This first line ran on the top barbed wire of the fences belonging to the ranchers. At the gates, the line was put up over the gate on long fence posts so it would not interfere with going through gates. The line started at Guy McKay's and ran on his fence, then on Jones' fence, then Les Cator's, then Jim Henson's, then Gus Ward's through the town of Old Hansford to Wallace McKay's fence.

The first night the telephone was in was a big event; the McKay's neighbors gathered at each McKay home to talk to each other.

The first description of the Western Frontier came back to Europe in the form of rumors of vast quanities of Gold and riches. But when Conquistador Don Francisco Vasquez de Coronado returned to Mexico from his devastating expeditons with empty pockets--the talk turned to the land itself.

The area that would become the Lone Star State was the Land of Promise.

For thousands of years before Europeans searched for cities of God, Indians had lived well off the land now called Texas.

Initially, explorers had difficulty comprehending the power of the land-it was awesome. Early Pioneer Mary Rabb (Rob) noted at the Colorado River crossing that there was "nothing but a wilderness."

Still, travelers and new settlers often stressed the beauty of wild Texas, usually in the spring when the land bore new life, color and

warmth.* Geography professor Robin Doughty knows that the makeup of Texas land. Doughty says in the Inaugural address to the First Congress of the Republic of Texas in 1836, president-elect Sam Houston called the land as "a spot of earth almost unknown to the Geography are."

Doughty says immigrants divided the area's physicall features into

three regions--The Coastal Prairie, the Rolling Prairie and the Mountain, or WEstern, Zone.

Doughty says it wasn't always clear where one region ended and another began. The middle ground became the focus of early settlement—where the natural "Parkland" of Wood and Prairie offered enormous promise.

ABC is pushing, with ads and commercials, its new programs. And it's true that Ted Koppel, at night, has the best late news on television.

HOWEVER, that best news coverage is still offered by CBS and NBC. and ABC seems to go off the deep end on features as the lead story too often. Peter Jennings is the best of all TV's commentators as to style and delivery.

BUT the CBS news evenings covers more news items and seems to have a better balance. All the evening news programs have gone increasingly for features and emotional film, unfortunately.

DISASTERS like the Mexican earthquake and the crash of the troop-carrying airliner in Newfoundland are zeroed-in-on and played as the lead story night after night--which shows there's really

little hard news.

ALL these programs feature people crying or under awful stress or grief-stricken. That's what TV wants; emotion and action and color. It suits film better than hard, significant news in many cases.

THE fare on cable television is more than enough to worry any concerned parent who buys a dish these days. The Playboy Channel--still picked up free by dish owners isn't the worst, although often it features a film which is mostly a stupid, transparent excuse to get people naked--and they're not even too attractive!

MORE objectionable, in this viewer's judgment, is a channel such as Ecstasy--which features raw sex. Not sexy and not beautiful, just physical.
