### Bank Holding Company Approved



Gruver, Texas -- Mr. A. R. Bort, Chairman of the Board, and Kenneth Irwin, President and CEO of the Gruver State Bank in a joint statement announce that the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas, acting pursuant to authority delegated by the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System, announced its approval of the application of GSB Bancshares, Inc., Gruver, Texas, to become a bank holding company through the acquisition of Gruver State Bank, Gruver, Texas.

The statement also announced the formation of GSB Ag-Credit Corporation, an agricultural lending agency that will be a wholly owned subsidiary of GSB Bancshares, Inc.

In making the announcement, Irwin stated that there would be no change in policy, that these new entities were formed to broaden the lending base and to help meet the heavy loan demand particularly in the agricultural sector.

Irwin will continue his present position in the bank, as well as, assuming additional responsibilities as President and Chief Executive Officer of GSB Bancshares, Inc. and GSB Ag-Credit Corporation.

A complete slate of officers and directors of the holding company and the agricultural credit corporation will be announced at a later date.

### Countiss Sworn In As Appeals Court Judge

Richard Countiss was sworn in Wednesday as the new associate justice of the 7th Court of Civil Appeals, by former Chief Justice James Ellis in ceremonies in the small courtroom on the sixth floor of the Potter County Court House in Amarillo. Charles Reynolds, the new chief justice of the court, was sworn in by former Childress County Judge C.A. Williams.

Some 100 interested relatives, friends and guests were present when the two men took

their oath of office.

Countiss, the former 84th District Judge for Hansford, Hutchinson and Ochiltree counties was appointed to the post June 8 by Gov. Bill Clements.

J.E. (Chunky) Blackburn was appointed 84th District Judge at the same time by the governor. He has been county attorney here for several years as well as being in private practice.

Hansford County Commissioners have taken no action as yet to appoint a county attorney.

### Nominees Listed For Wheat Board Election

Four wheat producers will compete for three six-year terms on the Texas Wheat Producers Board in a mail election now in progress, according to C.L. Edwards, Panhandle, Chairman of the organization. The advertised deadline for receiving names from producers to be placed on the ballot ended mid-night June 12. Competing for a vacancy on the Board created by Delbert Timmons, Perryton, who had served two terms and declined to run again, are Robert Graves of Perryton and Eddie Wiley of Follett to represent the North Plains.

Incumbents in the South Plains and Rolling Plains, respectfully, whose names will appear for re-election are Leo Witkowski of Hereford and Winston Wilson of Quanah. Places are provided on the ballot for "write-in" nominations in all districts, Edwards said.

The Texas Wheat Producers Board was established in 1971 by a favorable vote of more than two-thirds majority of wheat producers voting in a referen-

dum and election of a nine-man board serving six-year terms with three terms expiring each two years. The organization conducts programs of market development, research, disease and insect control and other services designed to strengthen wheat and make it more profitable commodity. Producers support the Board and its activities with a one-half cent per bushel self-assessment on deliveries of grain at commercial elevators in a thirty-four county area of commercial wheat production in North Texas and the Panhandle. Ballots will be mailed June 22 to all producers subject to paying the one-half cent assessment with a deadline of return for canvassing by July 12, with results being announced and the winners certified as Board members by the Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, July 16.

Other members of the Texas Wheat Producers Board, in addition to Edwards, and Timmons whose term is expiring, and those up for re-election, are: Kenneth Kendrick, Stratford; Troy Sloan, Spearman; Otis Harman, Tulla; Dwight

A meeting to initiate the grasshopper treatment program and allow producers to sign up for the program will be Monday evening June 18 at 8: p.m. at the Extension Homemakers Clubroom in Spearman.

The USDA and Texas Department of Agriculture will be at the meeting and producers should be ready to draw their acreages on maps and deposit 60 cents per acre for their share of the cost of spraying.

The economic threshold for grasshopper nymphs is considered to be over 20 per square yard. Several areas in Hansford County have shown to be "hot spots" according to the survey conducted last week. These areas and counts are as follows: 11 miles north of Spearman, 40

per sq. yd.; 9 miles north, 1/2 East of Spearman, 27 per sq. yd.; 17 miles north, 1 1/2 miles East of Spearman, 21 per sq. yd.; 11 miles West, 1 North of Gruver, 27 per sq. yd.; 2 North, 1 East of Morse, 30 per sq. yd.; 17 North, 3 1/2 East of Spearman, 18 per sq. yd.; 10 1/2 North, 9 1/2 East of Spearman, 18 per sq. yd.; and 8 West and 5 North of Gruver, 18 per sq. yd.

It is imperative for producers to sign up Monday night and deposit their money then, if the program is to be launched in Hansford County. This is one "shot" thing as the USDA and TDA will not be back again no matter what the problem or interest due to the many other areas which are trying to initiate the program.

DRIVING ACROSS THE BORDER

If you're planning a vacation and it involves driving over the border - either north or south - it would pay you to talk it over with your insurance agent first.

In Canada or Mexico, a motorist involved in an auto accident could have his car impounded, or could even be jailed if he cannot prove financial responsibility.

Since Canadian provinces require limits of liability which are, in most cases, higher than the U. S. Driver may be required to carry, he should have a "financial responsibility" card from his U. S. insurance company.

If you're planning a trip to Mexico, it's a bit more complex. The safest advice is: Don't drive in Mexico at all without liability insurance from a Mexican insurance company. Again, consult with your agent before leaving.

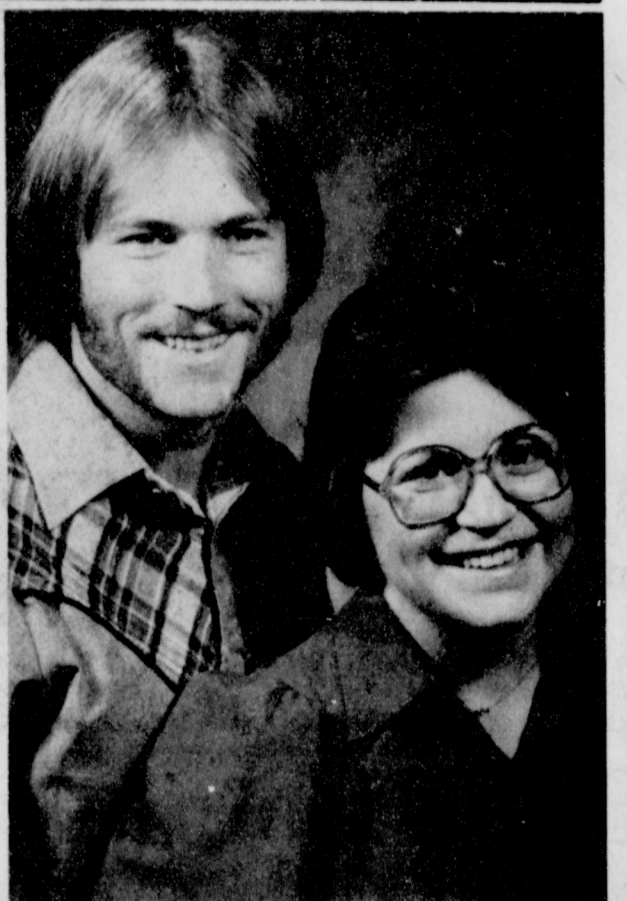

### Raymond Porter On Holy Land Tour

WHEATON, Illinois - Raymond A. Porter, Spearman, Texas is one of ninety-five students participating in Wheaton in the Holy Lands -- 1979 sponsored by Wheaton College.

Porter is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R.C. Porter.

Centered in Jerusalem, the program offers 12 hours credit in Biblical studies on the undergraduate level. The focus of the study program is the correlation of Biblical theological, archaeological, historical and cultural dimensions of the Old and New Testament worlds.

After an initial three weeks on Wheaton's campus, students fly to Greece for a week's study of early Christianity. Major locations visited by the Apostle Paul will be studied, including Athens, Corinth and other cities of Biblical importance. In Turkey they will examine Ephesus and other selected sites where both the Apostles Paul and John ministered.

A four-week program in Israel with the American Institute of Holy Land Studies will concentrate on Jerusalem, and also visit significant areas and biblical sites in the Holy Land. This period will also provide exposure to the contemporary religious, political, and cultural life of both Israeli and Arab peoples.

The program will conclude with a five-day stop in Italy to study the expansion of Christianity in ancient and modern Rome.

Wheaton College is a coeducational Christian liberal arts college located 25 miles west of Chicago.

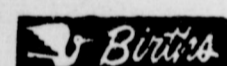

### Do You Like Your Self - Image?

COLLEGE STATION -- Do you like your self-image? Your life may depend on it.

If you don't like it, change it, says Jenny Reinhardt, a family life education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A & M University System.

#### OTHERS TEACH 'SELF-VIEW'

Other teach us self-worth or self-image from our earliest years on.

By the teen years, individuals have the mental maturity to decide how they will view themselves, however, Ms. Reinhardt says.

"At this point, individuals can take a serious look at the 'messages' others have given."

"Each individual then can choose which 'messages' to continue believing and which ones to discard.

#### DISCARD HARMFUL 'MESSAGES'

"This sorting process is important, because we all receive some messages from others that do not contribute to a strong and healthy self-image."

"Messages that hurt our self-image are the ones to discard, because a strong self-image is the foundation of sound mental health--and it may be the key ingredient in a successful and happy life," Ms. Reinhardt stresses.

#### A STRONG SELF-IMAGE

Building a good self-image is the most important task an individual has in his mental and emotional development--and it's among the greatest challenges of parenthood, she explains.

Individuals with high self-esteem are more likely to achieve the goals they have for themselves--and those others have for them.

Because every person's mental health and life's successes depend on a strong self-image, it's vital that we understand what our self-image is and how

it grows--so we can change it ourselves when it needs strengthening, the specialist says.

#### WHAT IS SELF-IMAGE?

A self-image is all of the thoughts, feelings and ideas a person has about himself or herself.

It is the overall judgement of self. It is how much we like, accept and respect ourselves.

In one way or another, most of the things we do are directly related to our feelings about ourselves.

Friends we choose, how we relate to others, our creativity and our achievements all are affected by our self-image, Ms. Reinhardt says.

#### HOW SELF-IMAGE GROWS

Individuals are not born with high or low self-worth. Our feelings about ourselves are learned--starting at birth and continuing over our lifetime.

Experiences in the first years of life form the basic foundation of those feelings.

After the first years, those feelings are constantly revised--upward or downward--throughout life by the results of each additional experience or undertaking, Ms. Reinhardt says.

For a very young child, self-image is dependent to a large extent on the people closely involved in his or her care--mother, father, grandparents or people providing child care.

As the child reaches adolescence, his friends, teachers and others also influence his feelings about self.

"Any time after that, it's important to start the sorting process--if we are to build a strong self-image for the rest of our life," Ms. Reinhardt says.

"From then on throughout life, we can receive 'messages' from others and keep them or discard them as we build and maintain our life's foundation--a strong, satisfying self-image."

### Price Authored Amendment On Ballot

AUSTIN. . . Senator Bob Price announced Wednesday the signing of Senate Joint Resolution No. 13 which was authored by Price during the 66th Legislative Session. During the public signing ceremony at the State Capitol, Governor Clements approved only 12 of the 193 proposed constitutional amendments considered by legislators. S.J.R. No. 13 will be one of the three proposals to be placed on the ballot in November.

If passed on the November ballot, S.J.R. No. 13 will provide for the issuance of \$10 million in state bonds to finance long-term, low interest loans to Texans who wish to buy farm and ranch land.


Briefly explaining the legislation, Price said, "It will provide the commissioner of agriculture with the authority to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas. Interest rates on the bonds would be set by the legislature of the State of Texas. The money received from the sale of the bonds would be deposited in the Farm and Ranch Loan Security Fund."

"This proposal," said Price, "would help and encourage more men and women to become involved in farming and ranching. During the last eight years, the number of farms and ranches has decreased by about twenty percent in Texas and a situation where a person starts out farming or ranching is practically non-existent. This guarantee of loans for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate would help those people who would otherwise not have the opportunity to pursue the profession of farming or ranching."





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**UIL Transfer Guidelines**

John was not an exceptional athlete but he worked hard his sophomore and junior years in expectation of starting at full-back his senior season. Odds are John would have started too, had a more talented player from across town not decided to change to his school to get on a "better team".

The new player told investigating officials he moved "for academic reasons" and who's to say he didn't? All John knows is that he's sitting on the bench his final year of high school football.

This isn't likely to happen in Texas, at least not for the time being. Under rules written by the state's school people, only those meeting specific transfer guidelines are eligible for varsity participation.

The rule states that a student who has represented a high school other than his present school in either football or basketball is ineligible, only in the sport or sports in which he participated, for one calendar year in the school to which he moves.

Save for specific exceptions, the rule is applied across the board. This purported "no exception" clause has brought the wrath of various segments of the press, legal world and other special interest groups.

Granted, some individuals are adversely affected by it. But no one has offered a viable substitute.

"There has been a strong push to hear every case on its merits," said Dr. Bailey Marshall, League director. "In the first place, I don't think people can appreciate the deluge of exemption requests school people would face because not only would athletes be seeking special consideration, so would participants in all the League literary and academic and music programs.

"In addition, every person believes he should be the exception to the rule," Marshall said. "That person could come up with a supposedly legitimate

and the individual replaced by the recruit suffer."

"The usurpation of transfer rules would not trigger an immediate recruiting war," Marshall said, but added the realities of athletic competitions would prevail.

"We don't think school people would start recruiting right off, but as these outstanding athletes begin moving to the "better programs," in order to get on stronger teams, then the other coaches will be forced to counteract by encouraging kids and parents to move to their schools," he said. "As they see the rich getting richer, community pressures to win will force them to react in some way."

"School people have long contended that 95 per cent of the students participating in high school football and basketball - the sports affected by the transfer rules - will never become college athletes," Marshall said.

"The rules", he added, "were written to protect the 95 per cent from losing their positions to recruited players as well as to shield the five percent from continual harassment by high school recruiters."

"Many moves are legitimate and those innocent students suffer to an extent by the transfer rule," Marshall said. "It would be great if exceptions could be made in these cases but law states that once an exception is made for one person, it must be made for all persons."

"There are not the resources to handle this large an undertaking, so the schools maintain the rules and protect the 95 per cent."

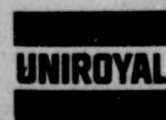
