Political Filing Deadline Nears

Filing deadline for political offices on the state, district and county level will be February 2.

Persons wishing to run for political offices will have to file by 6 p.m. that day with either the Democratic or Republican county chairman.

These chairmen will certify those candidates eligible to run and give their names to the County Clerk for placement on the ballot soon after February 2.

Offices on the ballot this

year are district judge, district attorney, sheriff tax-assessor-collector, and county commissioners for precinct one and three.

Also on the ballot will be state representative, state senator, U. S. Representative, and President of the United States. The President will be included on the primary ballot in Texas for the first time.

Date for the primary election will be May 1. For the primary elections voters will need the new registration certificates

which go into effect on March 1.

New voter certificates can be obtained by going to the county tax collector's office and giving the office certain information about personal records, such as place of birth and social security number.

A person will have to register 30 days prior to the primary election to be eligible to vote.

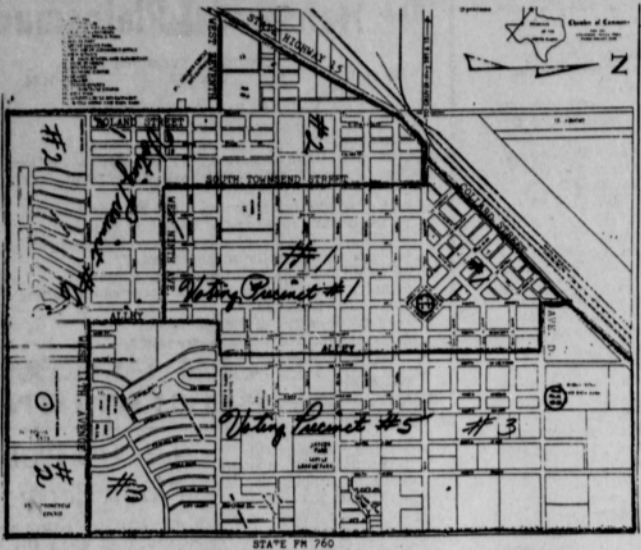

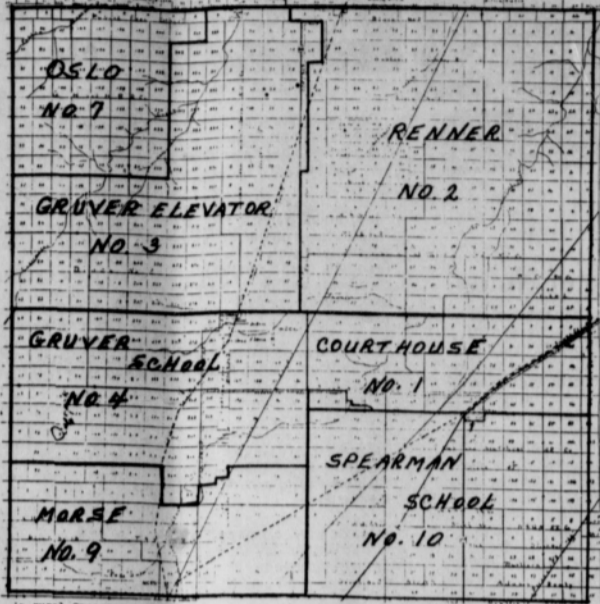

Civil Service Accepting Applications

The U. S. Civil Service Commission is currently accepting applications for Soil Conservation Technician, starting salary \$7,975 in North Texas. These positions are located in Clarendon, Dalhart, Decatur, Snyder, Tahoka, and Throckmorton, with a possibility of having future vacancies in other towns. Both full-time and part-time job opportunities will exist. Soil Conservation Technicians apply knowledge of soil conservation meth-

ods, techniques, and practices, and of agricultural land use. In order to qualify, applicants must possess a total of two years of experience, six months of which have provided a knowledge of conservation practices, of equipment used for installing and maintaining conservation practices, and a basic understanding of agricultural land use.

Applications will be accepted until February 26, 1976. Applications postmarked after that date may not be accepted. For early consideration applications must be postmarked on or before February 5, 1976.

Farmers Losing Control Of Ag Policy

COLLEGE STATION---Farmers are finding it increasingly difficult to be heard in Washington.

"Producer interests in agricultural policy are taking a secondary position to interests of foreign policy, consumerism and labor. Secretary Butz is no longer calling the shots on farm policy. Unless farmers are able to take charge, farm programs may actually be a noose around the producer's neck."

That's the contention of Dr. Ronald Knutson, economist in marketing and policy for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, who spoke at an Extension Service Press Day banquet at Texas A & M University yesterday evening (Jan. 15).

"Producers must consolidate if they are to regain a position of control over agricultural policy," emphasized the Texas A & M University System economist. Knutson listed two critical policy questions on

which producers must evaluate their position: (1) In whose interest is agricultural policy going to be made? (2) How much government involvement should there be?

The economist noted that the overriding concern of producers is the question of the conditions under which they will have access to international markets.

"Food has become an integral part of the policy of détente. As such, it may be used either as a carrot or a stick in diplomacy. The carrot policy involves freely exporting to make foreign governments more dependent on the United States as a source of supply. The theory behind this is that a foreign power will not bite the hand that feeds it."

"On the other hand, the stick policy makes access to U. S. grain dependent on support of U. S. policy by the recipient government. If food is used as a stick, the producer is in

danger of being denied free market access from time to time."

While food diplomacy receives a lot of attention, organized labor and consumerism stand as even greater threats to producer access to foreign markets, argued Knutson. In both 1973 and 1975 the impact of exports on domestic food prices was the primary reason for export controls. This reflects the fact that President Ford listened to George Meany more than to producers or Secretary Butz.

"Target prices, food reserves and the future of commodity programs stand as the major domestic farm policy issues," noted Knutson. "Farmers feel that in return for full production there must be reasonable assurance that prices will not fall below production costs. They are opposed to reserves because they lower prices. Commodity programs such as those on rice and peanuts appear to be on the way out."

"For agricultural producers to get a fair shake in future farm policies, they must make their voices heard--as one strong body rather than as individual commodity groups. IRS NEWS

Dallas, Texas--Christmas bills are coming in, winter cold forces the utility bills up and, if you are like most people, there is not a handy supply of spare cash you can get your hands on. What to do?

People do not usually think of the IRS as a source of quick cash, but, according to North Texas IRS director A. W. McCannless, the nation's tax collecting agency is willing and eager to help. "The majority of North Texas taxpayers will receive a refund from the IRS this year," Mr. Mc

Canless said. "This is true in most years, but especially this year because of the Tax Reduction Act of 1975, which substantially reduced the tax liability of the average taxpayer."

The federal tax official said that taxpayers who are due refunds will get their checks within four to five weeks if they file a correct tax return during January or February, when the IRS workload is relatively slow compared to March or April. File later than February, however, and the wait is likely to be as long as 10 weeks. Make a mistake on the return, such as a math error or an omitted signature, and the delay can double.

"Every year we urge taxpayers to file early," Mr. McCannless said. "With money as tight as it is, it makes good sense to get the return in as soon as possible. When a person sits down to complete the return, it takes just as long in April as in January to do it. Why not do it now?"

(Wichita Falls)-- Congressman Jack Hightower tonight announced his candidacy for re-election to the United States House of Representatives. The Congressman announced his candidacy during an appreciation reception for him and his family at Clark Center, on the Midwestern State University campus. Hightower pledged continuing vigorous efforts to help counter the prevailing attitude in the Congress that has produced legislation that can adversely affect people in the 13th Congressional District and to help enact legislation that will assist, rather than hinder, the district industries of the principal. He also pledged to encourage a growing Congressional awareness that

federal regulatory agencies must be made more accountable, both to the Congress and to the public. The Congressman told the Wichita Falls audience that he began his service to his constituents one year and three days ago with the realization that major issues confronting the Congress were also the principal concerns of his constituents. "After one year many of the problems of energy and inflation that confronted us last January remain our foremost concerns today," he said. The Congressman said that the 13th Congressional District was completely unique because so many of its people are producers of the products necessary to the day-to-day existence of other people throughout the nation and the world

-- food and fiber or petroleum. He said he knew that legislation affecting them was inevitable. "Congress passed an emergency farm bill intended to give some assurance of stability in the marketplace for 1976's crops," he said, "but it was unable to muster the necessary two-thirds majority to override a Presidential veto." "Congress passed several energy bills," he said, "but none of them will help provide the most critical need, an incentive to increase exploration, production and development of our domestic resources." "Congress will consider legislation this month that is likely to determine whether the nation will have a continuing natural gas supply," he said, "but it is going to be extremely difficult to get it enacted." "Congress took tentative steps to help assure accountability of regulatory agencies by passing a bill forcing the Environmental Protection Agency to consider the economic impact of some of its proposed regulations," he said, "and I am convinced we must force all agencies to accept similar responsibility." Hightower said his greatest challenge is to convince other members of Congress of some of the hard economic facts concerning the issues -- facts that his own constituents have understood and lived by most of their lives. "You do not encourage greater domestic production of petroleum by pay-foreign nations almost twice as much as our own producers receive for the same product. "You do not encourage maximum farm production by creating uncertainty about when or to whom the farmer can sell their products or how much they will receive when they sell them. "You do not reduce government spending and help reduce inflation by creating new programs or bureaucracies that will require billions of taxpayers' dollars to finance." The Congressman said he spent virtually every day of the Congress was not in session last year in traveling the sprawling 13th Congressional District and thus had the opportunity to visit personally with great numbers of his constituents. "These visits, plus comments I have heard in hundreds of telephone conversations and read in thousands of letters I have received, further reinforced my conviction that I know the needs of my constituents," he said. "I know what they believe, but more importantly, I share their beliefs and I feel that I am most capable of articulating these beliefs to my colleagues in Congress." The Congressman said the common sense approach of his constituents fires his enthusiasm to present those beliefs and make them known -- in personal visits with other members in committee hearings, in discussions on the floor of the House of Representatives, and with his votes.

On a busy day, taxpayer service representatives in the Dallas District's central telephone room will be able to handle 16,224 calls for help. Those area residents living in outlying areas who would incur toll charges by calling the Amarillo number can still use the IRS' toll-free number, 800-492-4830.
