Farmers Lo COLLEGE STATION ----Farmers are finding it in-creasingly difficult to be heard in Washington. "Producer interests in agricultural policy are taking a secondary pos-ition to interests of foreign policy, consumerism and labor. Secretary Butz is no longer calling the shots on farm policy. Unless farmers are able to take charge, farm programs may actually be a nosse around the producer's neck." "That's the contention of Dr. Ronald Knutson, economist in marketing and policy for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, who spoke at an Extension Service Press Day banquet at Texas A &M University yesterday evening (fan. 13). "Producers must con-solidate if they are to regain a position of con-trol over agricultural policy," emphasized the Texas A&M University System economist. "Anuson listed two cri-tical polition con-

System economist. Knutson listed two cri-tical policy questions on

agricultural policy going to be made? (2) How much government involve-ment should there be? much government involve-ment should here be? The economist noted that the overriding con-cem of producers is the question of the conditions under which they will have access to inter-national markets. "Food has become an integral part of the policy of detente. As such, it may be used either as a carrot or a stick in diplo-macy. The carrot policy involves freely exporting to make foreign govern-ments more dependent on the United States as a source of supply. The theory behind this is that a foreign power will not bite the hand that feeds it.

"On the other hand, the stick policy makes access to U. S. grain dependent on support of U. S. policy by the recipient govem-ment. If food is used as a stick, the producer is in

danger of being denied free market access from time to time." While food diplomacy receives a lot of attention, organized labor and con-sumerism stand as even greater threats to producer access to foreign markets, argued knutson. In both 1973 and 1975 the im-pact of exports on domes-tic food prices was the primary reason for export controls. This reflects the fact that President Ford listened to George Meany more than to pro-ducers or Secretary Butz. "Target prices, food re-serves and the future of commodity programs stand as the major domes-tic farm policy issues," noted Knutson. "Farmers feel that in return for full production cetts. They are opposed to reserves because they lower prices. Commodity programs such as those on rice and pea-





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
