

# Computer Medicine At

Hansford Hospital has taken another big step into the Electronic Age, or to be more precise, computerized medicine. A national computer network, TELEMED Corporation, will soon be installing the instrumentation which will enable Hansford Hospital to "telephone-in" electrocardiograms taken on its patients. The ECG information will be transmitted to the Hosfman Estates. Illinois Computer view of the Hospital and patient and the patient's height, age, sex and weight. Two seconds later, the computer again informs the technical tendence of the Hospital and patient and the patient's height, age, sex and weight.







Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water develop-ment purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.




