

Sheriff says "no" to dope!

Sheriff McFarlin reports that nineteen arrests were made by his department over the past week. Daniel Leroy Burton, white male, 42 years of age, was arrested for auto theft. Burton was also wanted in Utah for theft. Muriel James Shackelford, white male, 43 years old was arrested in Gruver for drunk and creating a disturbance. Ernesto Miranda, white male, 49 years old was arrested and charged with drunk and disturbing the peace in the city of Spearman. Peter Mike Vigil, white male, 41 years old, was arrested and charged with D. W. I. Samuel James Breeding was arrested in Lipscomb County and was brought back to Hansford County where he was wanted for worthless check-warrant. Thomas Wesley Brown, age 23 years, Douglas Rodney Hogan, age 20 years, Jacqueline Elaine Hogan, age 20 years, Cathy Jean Cook, age 18 years, were arrested and charged possession of marijuana, over four (4) ounces and also possession of controlled substance. Kenneth Lee McClellan, age 19 years, James Jeffrey Platt, age 20 years, and Joe David Womble, age 18 years, and Phillip Tarbox Lair, age 20 years, were arrested in the City

of Spearman and charged with possession of marijuana over four (4) ounces. Terry Keith Burch, age 21 years, Gary Ray Upchurch, age 21 years, were arrested and charged with possession of marijuana and also possession of a controlled substance. Ray Andrew Salter, age 25 years, George Hollis Treadway, age 26 years, and Anita Ray Salter, age 21 years, were arrested in the City of Spearman and charged with possession of a controlled substance and possession of marijuana. The subjects arrested on the drug charges and the arrests began on the night of Tuesday the 14th of October at approximately 11:30 with the last arrest ending at approximately 4:30 Wednesday, the 15th day of October. One other subject, a juvenile 15 years old was arrested at approximately 1:30 Thursday afternoon, charged with possession of marijuana. Bonds were set on these subjects ranging from \$5000.00 bond on the felony charge of possession of a controlled substance to a minimum of \$200.00 on misdemeanor charge of possession of marijuana. Items confiscated in the drug raid were cocaine, marijuana, speed, hashish, L. S. D., plus a large quantity of

narcotic paraphenalia. Some of the marijuana had been locally grown in Hansford County. Also confiscated in the drug raid were two pistols taken from the Ray Salter residence in Spearman. A 38 pistol which had been stolen in Lubbock and a 22 pistol which had been stolen in Phoenix Arizona. Officers assisting in this raid were Chief Deputy R. A. Masingill, Deputies Bob Dennis and Jim Ratliff and Texas Highway Patrolmen Joe Sanders, John Sims and Joe Hataway. Also assisting was Doug Davis with the City of Spearman police department. These drug arrests follow several months of investigation by the Hansford County Sheriff's office. Chief Deputy R. A. Masingill has advised that as long as there are drugs in Hansford County, there will continue to be investigations and drug raids by the Hansford County Sheriff's Office. Sheriff McFarlin also stated that he and members of this department have received several threatening anonymous phone calls, but he advises that these actions would not be tolerated and that the drug investigations would continue in Hansford County.

7th Grade Blasts Wolves

The Spearman 7th grade blasted the Dalhart Wolf Pups at Lynx Stadium Thursday evening 20-16. Kevin Russell opened action Thursday afternoon by returning the opening kickoff 55 yards for a Lynx touchdown. Tylon Pierce scored again on a beautiful 60 yard touchdown run, to put the Lynx ahead. McIntyre recovered a fumble for the Lynx on the Dalhart 25 yard line just before halftime to set up another Lynx touchdown. Steele passed to Ladd for 20 yards and a first and goal on the five. Tylon Pierce raced into the end zone as the whistle blew to give the Lynx 7th grade a 20-8 lead. The Dalhart pups had scored in the second. There was no scoring in the 3rd stanza, but the Wolf Pack scored in the 3rd, and almost caught the Lynx. Kerry Bodey did some very fine kicking for the 7th grade team, and the entire group had to play well to defeat the equally fine team from Dalhart!

EDA Grant Hearing Held

A meeting was held Wednesday afternoon at City Hall with Clara D. Seay, Public Works specialist of Economic Development Agency of the U. S. Department of Commerce, from Austin; A. L. Miller, Chief of Public Work, Austin; L. W. Crawford, from the P.A. Lubbock; John W. Grist, of Dumas, who is the consultant for the City of Spearman on federal programs; L. D. Bums, Dumas; City Engineer, Billy Taylor, of the Economic Development Administration of Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, Amarillo; Mayor Coy Palmer, all city councilmen with the exception of James Jackson; city attorney, J. E. Blackburn; Mary Lou Wysong, manager of Chamber of Commerce; Don Platt of North Plains Water District; Chamber of Commerce president, C. D. Riggins; city manager Ed Thompson and assistant city manager Mark Neff.

The purpose of the meeting was to determine if a grant could be obtained by the City of Spearman for use in the water and gas systems. The city manager and assistant manager presented an analysis of the present system and the needs of the city in getting the systems to a point that industry could be attracted to Spearman. At the present time, the systems are inadequate to take on future customers of an industrial nature. All elevators in Spearman use natural gas in their grain dryers and they are needing to increase their drying capacity and city manager Thompson stated that at the present time the gas was not available for much expansion. According to Thompson, Ms. Seay asked most of the questions at the meeting. After hearing the case of the city for application for a grant, the EDA officials stated that they would let the city know within a week if they could file a formal application for the grant. The grant being asked for is \$300,000 which is 60% of the projected cost of the project. City manager Thompson stated that the other 40% he thought could be obtained by time warrants, or on a portion of expected revenue from the systems. The grant would be used for additional water wells and water storage for the city, and to rework the gas system. Thompson stated that losses in the gas system had been reduced 25% from a year ago and that this reduction saves the city a good deal of money each month.

Suit Attacks Existence of PRPC

A suit was filed Thursday in 47th District Court in Amarillo asking Judge Bryan Poff to stop payment of tax funds to support the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission and to declare unconstitutional the law authorizing formation of PRPC. The suit was filed by Dr. Donald Todd of other plaintiffs "as a class." The other plaintiffs are characterized as "residents, taxpayers and citizens of the State of Texas." The plaintiffs contend that payment of tax funds for support of PRPC is "unauthorized and illegal" saying that consolidation of functions of government in Texas requires approval of a majority of the voters in each political subdivision--and that PRPC has been functioning without voter approval. The petition says that the statute authorizing formation of PRPC omits provision for voter approval and is therefore unconstitutional.

Other plaintiffs are Cleatus E. Hyatt, I. C. Phillips, Wanda Casias, M. H. Dwight, Bryan L. Denson and J. Ernest Stroud, Sr. of Amarillo; Fletcher Sims, Jr. of Canyon, Albert Johnson of Farwell, Carl Martin of Shamrock; John S. Skelly, Jr. of Pampa; Wesslie B. Owen of Hereford; Florence Traweck of Hereford; Clarence Morris of Perryton; Gus O. Birdwell of Spearman and Raymond Jarvis of Borger. Defendants are officials of Randall County, the City of Canyon, the City of Amarillo, Potter County, Pamer County, the City of Farwell, Wheeler County, the City of Shamrock, Gray County, the City of Pampa, Deaf Smith County, the City of Perryton, the City of Spearman, and the City of Borger.

Also named as defendant is George Louder, executive director of PRPC. PRPC encompasses the 26 counties of the Panhandle.

City Receives Sales Tax Check

AUSTIN--Comptroller Bob Bullock mailed checks totaling \$14.2 million Thursday to 824 Texas towns and cities for their monthly October city sales tax rebate.

The October payments were smaller than the previous month's. Bullock said this is because the September checks included receipts carried over or coming in late from the last round of quarterly tax payments sent in by merchants.

During the first two months of each three-month cycle, he noted, payments are not made to cities whose allocation is less than \$500.

Bullock said the monthly rebate program has proven a boon to cities in its first several months of operation. The City of Spearman received \$3,427.22 and the City of Gruver received \$613.43.

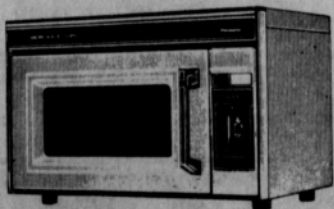

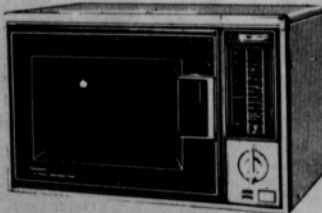

November 4, 1975 may possibly be one of the most important dates for Texans and for the State of Texas for that is the date set for voting on the proposed changes in the Constitution of Texas.

In a concise talk last Wednesday before the members of the Gruver Lions Club and other citizens of the area, Representative Bob Close of the 64th District gave a comparison between the present Constitution and the proposed changes, pleading with the concerned citizens that their votes do count and it is important that each voter make up his own mind as to how he stands on the individual propositions which will appear on the ballot, November 4, 1975.

Paramount is the fact that voters should be able to know for what they are voting. On the ballot, the various proposals are listed as Propositions One through Eight—each of which is to be voted upon separately and if any one of several propositions meet the approval of voters, that particular one or those ones will be added to our present constitution. If none pass, the original constitution will remain in effect to be amended and amended again. If all eight of the Propositions pass (which is most unlikely), they will form the basis for a new State Constitution which, in turn, will stand before the voters for amending if necessary.

A brief introduction to the matter of the Constitution which is a document which established the basic principles and laws by which we are governed, assigning the powers and duties of government and guaranteeing certain rights of the people it serves.

According to Representative Close there are three fundamental reasons for having a written Constitution including (1) to limit the power of government, (2) to set forth basic rules by which Government is organized and operates, and (3) to distribute power between the central and local governments. These are the basis by which one can judge the original Constitution and the proposed changes and then decide how to vote.

Texans have lived under six Constitutions since 1836 when the first was adopted creating the Republic of Texas. Our present Constitution was drafted in 1875 and adopted by voters in 1876. Since then it has been amended 220 times. In the hundred years following there have been numerous attempts to revise or rewrite that document—all unsuccessful until 1971 when the Texas voters (you and I) approved an amendment calling for the 181 members of the State Legislature to sit as a Constitutional Convention in 1974. To shorten the details of this important Convention, a Constitutional Revision Commission made up of Citizens was created and held 19 public hearings across the State to find out what the people really wanted with over four thousand citizens attending these meetings and 900 of them testifying before the Commission. Citizens' Advisory Committees also aided in this process.

In December 1973, the Revision Commission met with members of the Texas State Legislature to discuss their proposed document and on January 8th, 1974, a Texas Constitutional Convention met to rewrite our State's basic governing document. Speaker of the House Price Daniel, Jr., of Liberty was elected president of the

Convention with various committees being appointed to write each article of the new Constitution after much study.

Under the rules adopted by the Convention, each separate Article (Proposition) required only a simple majority vote for approval and yet the whole document had to be approved by two thirds of the delegates or 121 votes. The chances for final approval of the Constitution grew slimmer and slimmer with pressures arising from every side. On the final night of the Convention, the new Constitution failed to receive the necessary 121 votes, fall-

ing 3 short, and pursuant to the Constitution of 1876 the Convention was adjourned.

Leaders of our government felt that the work of the Convention should not just go down the drain with the thousands of hours of work and millions of dollars which had gone in the Constitutional Convention and the State leaders of the 64th Legislature proceeded to decide that the voters of Texas should be given the opportunity to approve or reject the proposals of the Convention and this task became the first major undertaking of the new Legislative session.

From the work of the two

Constitutional Revision Committees appointed by Governor Hobby in the respective legislative houses, came Senate Joint Resolution II which proposed a series of amendments to revise the entire Constitution except for the Bill of Rights. The Senate passed the Resolution in one day... the House took two... and thus, the voters of Texas were going to be given the opportunity to decide on the Document in a state-wide election set for November 4, 1975.

Eight Propositions are on the ballot, one of them combining three closely related articles dealing with separa-

tion of powers, the Legislative Branch, and the Executive. Proposition 1: For or against--The Constitutional Amendment revising the Separation of Powers, Legislative, and Executive Provisions of the Texas Constitution contains three articles, II, III, and IV.

Article II deals with the separation of powers in state government insuring the integrity of each branch and prohibiting one from exercising powers accorded to another. This section is basically identical to the 1876 Constitution, altho shorter and simpler in wording using 15,000 words in comparison to the 1876, 60,000 words.

Article III deals with the structure and duties of the Legislature with the new Document requiring single-member Senatorial, representative and Congressional Districts, a major change from the past system which had permitted multi-member at-large Districts. Adoption of the single-member District concept would allow legislators to represent a smaller number of citizens, make them more directly accessible to their voters, and hopefully, better able to consider all the points of view which they represent. By making smaller Districts, campaign expenses could also be substantially lowered.

This section also provides for limited annual Legislative sessions instead of the present biennial session. This change is based on the belief that our Texas government which deals in billions of dollars, has grown too big and too complex to be plan-

ned for only once every two years.

Included also in the legislative article is the creation of a Salary Commission to set a ceiling on compensation and allowances for elected representatives. Article IV sets out the Executive Branch of State government, the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Secretary of State, Comptroller, Treasurer, Commissioners of the General Land Office and Agriculture, and others provided by Law are members of the Executive Department and all are still elected. The provisions for four year terms for Executive Department officers are continued but the Governor would be limited to two consecutive terms. The Legislature

could grant budget execution authority to the Governor, thereby providing for fiscal management of State Government.

Under this Article, the Governor also has appointment and limited removal power (for cause) over officers of State agencies and must report to the Legislature every two years on the organization and efficiency of the Executive Branch. All agencies having statewide jurisdiction, except institutions of high learning, would have a life of not more than ten years unless renewed by the Legislature, thereby mandating the Legislatures and the Governor to review the performance of State programs and agencies in conjunction with the needs of the State. 3 Accidents In County

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for September, 1975, shows a total of 551 accidents resulting in 29 persons killed and 314 persons injured, as compared to September, 1974, with 471 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 213 persons injured. This was 80 more accidents, 12 more killed, and 101 more injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

The 29 traffic deaths for the month of September, 1975, occurred in the following counties: Six in Wise; three each in Donley and Moore; two each in Archer, Floyd, Lynn, and Gray; and one each in Jack, Lamb, Lubbock, Wichita, Young, Castro, Potter, Sherman and Wheeler.

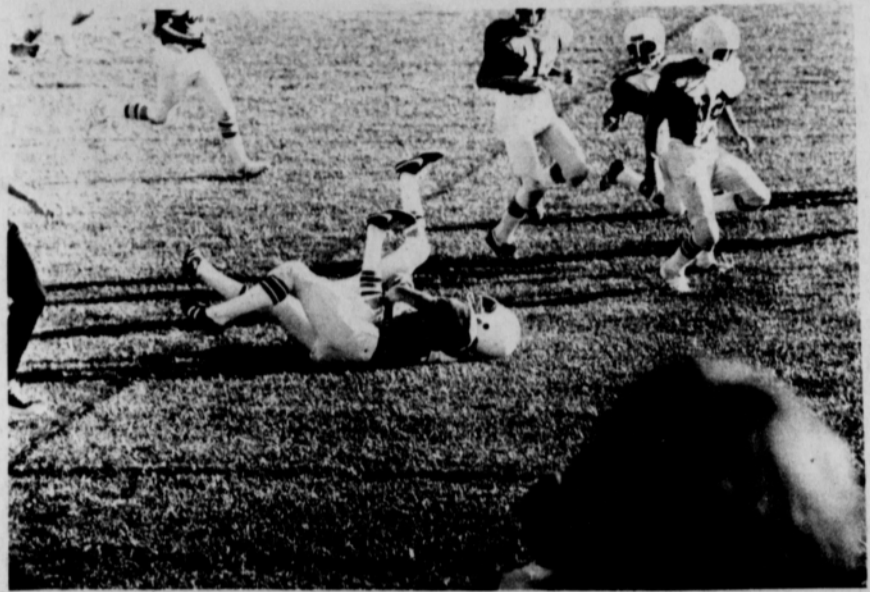

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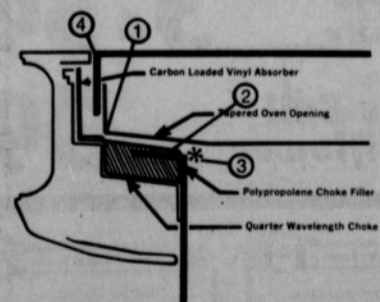

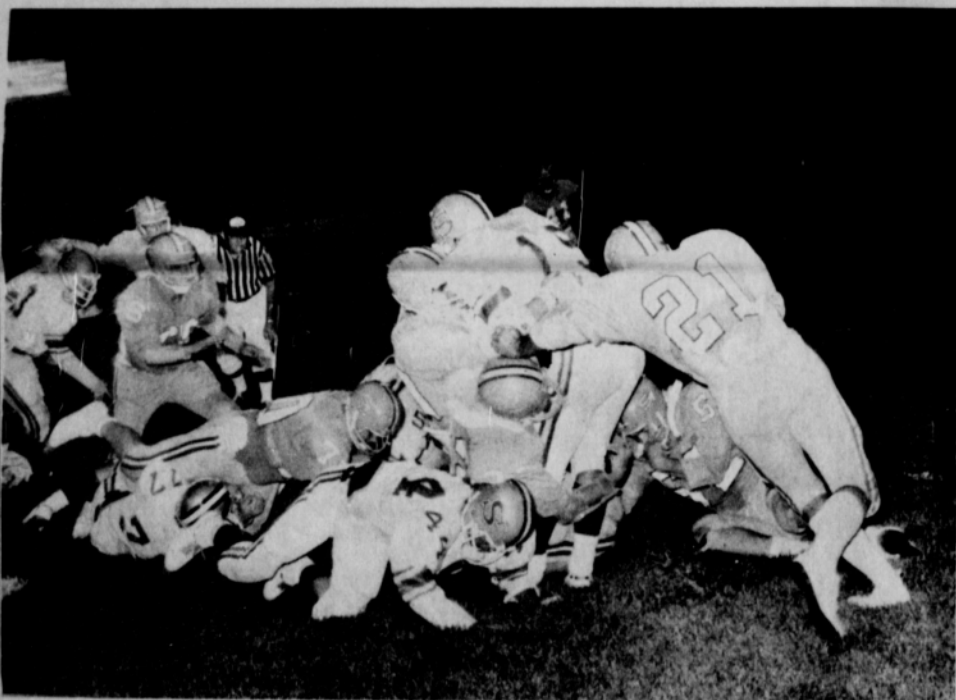
