





Austin, Texas--A list of Selective Service registrants born in 1962 and the first part of 1963 has been posted in the Hansford County Courthouse.

According to Colonel Paul Dean Ailin, the State Director of Selective Service for Texas, the Military Selective Service Act requires that the names of Selective Service registrants be posted in a public place within each local board area.

Local Boad tentative assignments have been made based upon the Zip Code of the registrants permanent home address.

Colonel Aikin says the law (the Military Selective Service Act) still requires all young men to register with Selective Service at age eighteen.

Currently, men born in 1963 are required to register within 30 days before or 30 days after their eighteenth birthday. Registration forms may be completed at any United State Post



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

Cystic Fibrosis is inherited by approximately one of every 1,600 American babies. It occurs when a child receives a gene for the disease from each parent. So far, there's no cure for CF, but early diagnosis and treatment are helping to lengthen lives. Today, 50 percent of CF patients can be expected to live past age 19, where once few survived to school age.

The signs of Cystic Fibrosis include: recurrent wheezing, persistent coughing with excessive mucus, pneumonia more than once, excessive appetite with poor weight gain and clubbing (enlargement of fin-

Officers move fast on stolen pickups

At press time, Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin was awaiting the arraignment of Rodger Lee Campbell, 29, Sunmy for theft of a pickup.

Shortly after Louis Hender-son, who lives 12 miles north of Gruver, reported the theft of his pickup, authorities at Borger arrested Campbell while he was driving the stolen vehicle.

According to the investigaion of the incident, Campbell allegedly took the car of an aquaintance without permission and wrecked that vehicle at Borger. Making his way back to Hansford County, he apparently pok Henderson's pickup and returned to Borger where he was taken in custody.

He was returned to Hansford County to be arraigned on car theft charges. Sheriff McFarlin said he had recommended a bond of \$5,000 in the case.

Also under investigation by the Sheriff's Department is the theft of another pickup this week in an incident unrelated to Campbell's arrest.

Tony Harper, Gruver, reported the theft of his 1976 GMC pickup and Sheriff McFarlin said a warrant had been issued for a suspect in this case.

Hutchinson County Sheriff Lon Blackmon noted that law enforcement officers on the High Plains of the Texas Panhandle were fortunate in the case of stolen vehicles.

"There are no main roads through broken country and there are no clusters of heavy traffic. Any vehicle traveling this country sticks out like a sore thumb." he said and added: "--And if suspects are headed south they invariably come through Borger although some of them are native to this country and know other roads.'

Both the Hansford and Hutchinson sheriffs have an excellent record of suspect arrest and vehicle recovery in stolen car or truck cases.

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION

ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitution al amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize cities, towns and other taxing units to grant exemptions from ad valorem taxes on an unproductive, underdeveloped or blighted area in order to encourage its development. The amendment would also allow the legislature to authorize a city or town to issue bonds or notes to finance this development and to pledge future increases in ad valorem tax revenues from the property in such areas to repay these bonds or notes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize cities. towns, and other taxing units to encourage the ment, or redevelopment of certain areas through property tax relief and issuance of bonds and notes."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 117 proposes a constituamendment that would authorize a person to receive a patent to land from the Commissioner of the General Land Office under certain conditions Application for the patent must be made within five years from approval of the amendment. The land must be surveyed, public free school land not viously patentable. The person must have a properly recorded deed to the land, which he acquired without knowledge of the patent defect and which title he and his predeces sors in interest have held for at least 50 years. The person and his predecessors in interest must have continuously claimed the land and paid the

taxes for at least 50 years. This amendment does not apply to beach land, lands. An applicant may not use this provision to

NOVEMBER 3, 1981 This amendment will not apply to land mined to be state-owned by a court of competent jurisdiction or that has a ease on the effective date

of the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years as of November 15, 1981."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 38 proposes a constituwould enable the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the authority to manage state Funds constitutionally dedicated to specific purposes would not be subject to committee management. The committee would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Chairman of the Senate State Affairs Com mittee, and the Chairman of the House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the power to manage the expenditure of certain appropriated funds."

ment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the use of a portion of the excess revenues of the state for water development, water conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes; au thorizing the use of the state's credit, not to exceed five hundred million dollars, to guarantee the bonds of cicounties, towns and other units of local government, in the financing of projects for such purposes; increasing the interest rate that may be paid on previously approved, bonds; and authorizing a program to retire state bonds."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 49 proposes a constitutional amendment that would livestock and poultry from taxation. Currently, farm products in the hands of the producer and family supplies for home and farm use are exempt.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional ment to provide for the inclusion of livestock and poultry with farm products as exempt from taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 81 authorizes the governing body of a county, city, school district or other political subdivisions to exempt from taxation a homestead. The exempted may be as much as 40% for 1982-1984: 30% for 1985-1987 and 20% for 1988 and af ter. The amount of ar exemption may not be less than \$5,000 unless the legislature by general prescribes monetary restrictions on the amount of the exemption. An eligible adult is allowed to receive other exemptions provided by law. An exception is made where ad valorem tax has previously been pledged for the payment of debt.

The amendment further directs the legislature to require that notice be given to property owners of a reasonable estimate of tax on their property in certain situations.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amend ment authorizing a political subdivision provide property tax relief for owners of residence homesteads and changing certain property tax administrative procedures.'

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution al amendment that would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell an additional \$250,-000,000 in bonds increas ing the Veterans' Land Fund's total bond issuance authorization from \$700,000,000 to \$950,000, The amendment would increase the maximum interest payable by the state on these bonds from 6% to 10%, permit an even higher rate, if specified by the

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

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
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
