"Take Pride In Spearman Day" Proclaimed

Tuesday is "Take Pride In Spearman Day."

Mayor Ralph Blodgett's proclamation makes it official. It will take real pride on the part of every citizen to make it work." City Manager Jim Murray emphasized following the signing of the document that makes Tuesday a special day.

It is part of a project sparked by the Chamber of Commerce to "police the grounds" and spruce up the city. Members of the Chamber of Commerce have been the prime mover in a "clean-up" campaign of some sort every year for some time now.

Proof of the effectiveness of their efforts is the neatness and order that marks the city of Spearman.

Despite such effectiveness, the cleanest city in the land-like the home of the most spotless housekeeper-needs a regular cleaning. The story has been told of such a spotless housekeeper married to a man whose life style in dealing with newspapers, magazines, cigar butt, ashes and the like was very casual. When asked how she could put up with it, she replied:

"I just look on it as the 'Lint of living' and sweep it up regularly."

When it comes to an entire city, the accumulation from living in it becomes something more than lint and it takes a concerted effort.

The city is cooperating in that effort. If you have considerable refuse to be rid of, you can call city hall and arrange for a flatbed truck to be parked at your place so you can load it up. The city driver will return for it at the appointed time.

"Of course city personnel can't be dedicated for the entire clean-up job," Murray said. "It takes all our workers time away from providing goods and services to the citizens of Spearman just to keep our part of the city neat and clean."

"However, I would suggest this if an unusual clean-up problem is encountered, call the Chamber of Commerce. Their plans for the clean-up just may include a solution to the problem. If not, we will be happy to talk it over to see how it has been handled in the past."

The city manager could speak with confidence because if has been handled in the past as

witnessed by the cleanliness and order that pervades Spearman. However, as one chamber member pointed out, the very success of the very first clean-up program and the changes it makes, causes the need for clean-up on a regular basis. The cleaner a city becomes, the more unsightly small accumulations of dirt and debris become.

The Chamber of Commerce was the logical force to take an active interest in such a program. The chief efforts of the Chamber and its members are dedicated to growth. Growth comes by attracting more business and industry with resulting jobs-and more new families to supply an adequate work force for the job growth.

None of these are interested in moving to a city of dirt and disorder.

So, take a part in "Take Pride In Spearman Day." When the work is all done, you can rare back and really beam and throw out your chest.

Oh, yes. If in so doing you bust a button off...

Marie Gould resigns combined clerks post

Marie Gould has tendered her resignation as clerk of the courts effective Sept. 25, completing some seven years in office.

She was elected to the combined offices of county and district court clerk and assumed her duties Jan. 1, 1975.

She will be going to work at Oklahoma City, Oct. 1. She will be employed by the law firms of Linn and Helms and Kirk and Burkett of Oklahoma City. Linn and Helms formerly practiced law in Spearman.

During her tenure here, she has judiciously and systematically upgraded the equipment with which she and her staff had to work in the office. This has, in turn, made services rendered by the office and its staff more efficient.

There have been a number of innovations, too, including the microfilming of vital documents that are a part of the records of the offices. In addition to the availability of these records in the county-district clerk's office, there will be copies in storage elsewhere as an added measure of precaution against accidental destruction.

Now it falls the lot of the county commissioners court to appoint a replacement to serve in the clerk capacity until the next appropriate election.

Monday is the regular meet-

ing of the commissioners court and it will convene as usual taking care of the business spelled out in the agenda.

Following this, the court will recess until six o'clock Monday evening when it will reconvene in executive session to interview possible appointees to the temporary clerk post.

Should a decision be reached in that executive session, commissioners will return to open session to officially vote on said appointee.

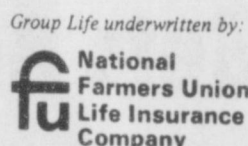

The Great Plains Experience Film To Be Shown Here

Hansford County Library, together with Stationmaster's House Museum of Spearman, is one of the 4 area libraries and museums chosen by Amarillo Public Library to implement a series of 6 films, museum exhibits and discussions on "The Great Plains Experience". Spearman programs begin Sept. 10, 7 p.m., at Hansford County Library and continue on successive Thursdays.

Dr. Frederick W. Rathjen as program leader for the first film, "The Land", will also be on hand to lead a discussion on the Texas Panhandle as part of the Great Plains region. Second program in the series, "The Lakota: One Nation on the Plains", will be conducted by Roberta D. Speer, area archaeologist, and deals with cultures preceding the coming of the Anglo-American to this area.

The cooperative project involving libraries, museums and various historical societies, university professors, and other humanities scholars is funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities through the University of Mid-America at Lincoln, Neb. The Amarillo Public Library was named as one of nine libraries nationwide to participate in a programming project on "The Great Plains Experience". UMA has been awarded \$486,148 by NEH to carry out the project in the nine areas from Georgia to Montana. The Amarillo area project is the only one in Texas, and will be implemented at 7 Panhandle sites.

The Panhandle-Plains Museum at Canyon has participated in planning exhibits at each program. Also cooperating as discussion leaders for the 6 films in the program series will be Dr. Fred W. Rathjen, Dr. Garry Nall, and Dr. P.L. Petersen, professors of history, WTSU; Bobby Weaver, PPH Museum curator of ethnology, William C. Griggs, museum director; and Roberta D. Speer of Amarillo, anthropologist.

Byron Price, PPH Museum curator of history, was assisted by Carol Daffern in exhibits consultation by the area museums. Mary Louise Loyd of the Amarillo library is project director, with Anite G. Pitts assistant. Dr. Joe F. Taylor, retired, Amarillo College history department, is evaluator for the project.

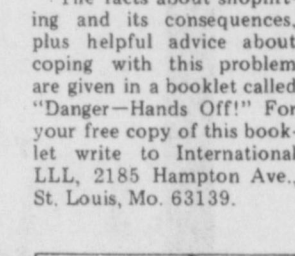

Colonel Aikin says the law (the Military Selective Service Act) still requires all young men to register with Selective Service at age eighteen.

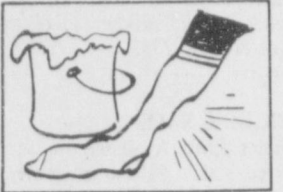
Currently, men born in 1963 are required to register within 30 days before or 30 days after their eighteenth birthday. Re-

If any young man failed to register on time, he may clear his record by registering as soon as possible.



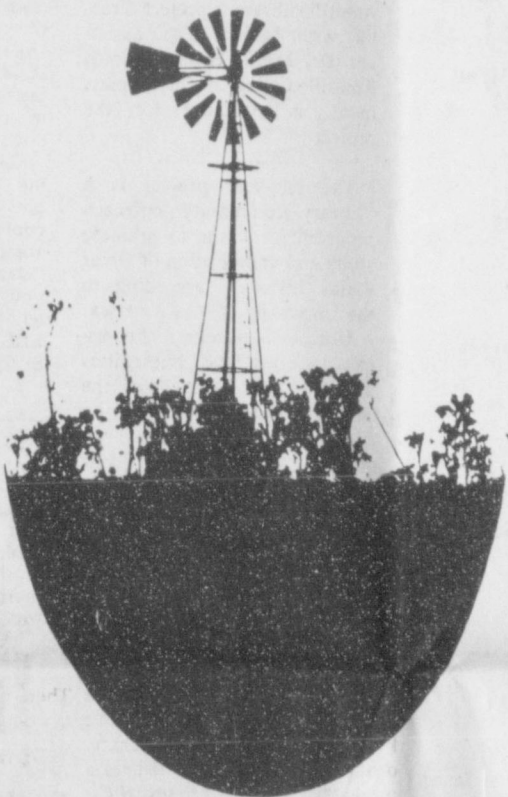

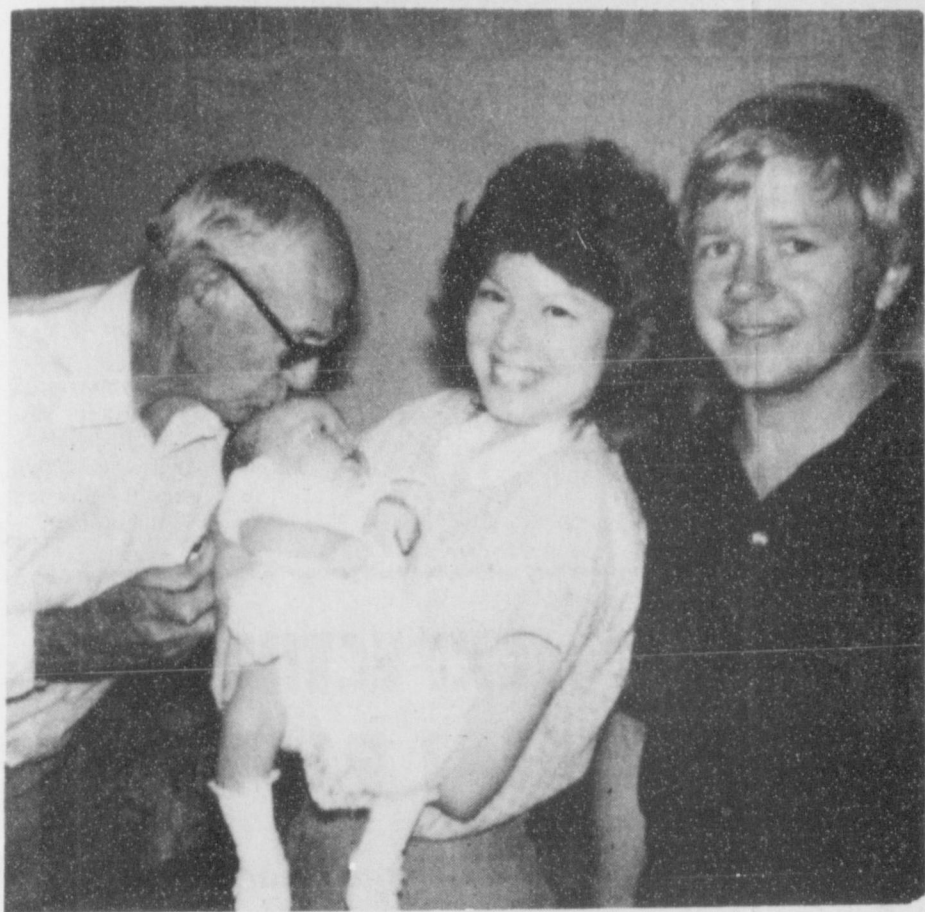

Gruver's Mayor J. C. Harris declared September 23, 1981 as "Kiss Your Baby" Day in Gruver by signing an official proclamation. "Kiss Your Baby" Day will be held as part of National Cystic Fibrosis Week and the local CF Breath of Life Campaign.

Stressing the need for greater public health education in Gruver, Mayor Harris said that "Kiss Your Baby" Day is designed to particularly help parents recognize the symptoms of Cystic Fibrosis in their children.

One of the signs of CF is a salty taste to the skin. Mothers have sometimes alerted doctors to the possibility of CF when kissing their babies and tasting salt, explained Mayor Harris.

Cystic Fibrosis is inherited by approximately one of every 1,600 American babies. It occurs when a child receives a gene for the disease from each parent. So far, there's no cure for CF, but early diagnosis and treatment are helping to lengthen lives. Today, 50 percent of CF patients can be expected to live past age 19, where once few survived to school age.

The signs of Cystic Fibrosis include: recurrent wheezing, persistent coughing with excessive mucus, pneumonia more than once, excessive appetite with poor weight gain and clubbing (enlargement of fin-

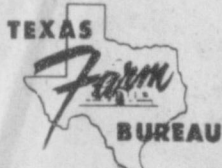

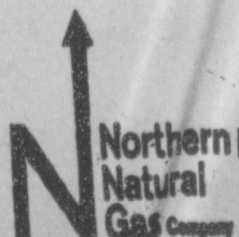

Felony theft of service charges were lodged against Mike Shelby, Don Winegard and Raymond Hill of Fort Worth and David Hackney, Childress.

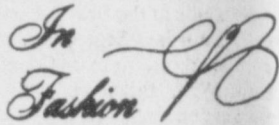
Misdemeanor theft of service charges were filed against Robert Andrews, Lubbock.

PUBLIC NOTICE

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 3, 1981

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize cities, towns and other taxing units to grant exemptions from ad valorem taxes on an unproductive, undeveloped or blighted area in order to encourage its development. The amendment would also allow the legislature to authorize a city or town to issue bonds or notes to finance this development and to pledge future increases in ad valorem tax revenues from the property in such areas to repay these bonds or notes.

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 117 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize a person to receive a patent to land from the Commissioner of the General Land Office under certain conditions. Application for the patent must be made within five years from approval of the amendment. The land must be surveyed, public free school land not previously patentable. The person must have a properly recorded deed to the land, which he acquired without knowledge of the patent defect and which title he and his predecessors in interest have held for at least 50 years. The person and his predecessors in interest must have continuously claimed the land and paid the taxes for at least 50 years. This amendment does not apply to beach land, submerged land, or islands. An applicant may not use this provision to

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 38 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the authority to manage state funds. Funds constitutionally dedicated to specific purposes would not be subject to committee management. The committee would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Chairman of the State Affairs Committee, and the Chairman of the House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee.

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that one-half of the surplus tax revenues

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 81 authorizes the governing body of a county, city, school district or other political subdivisions to exempt from taxation a portion of the market value of a residence homestead. The portion exempted may be as much as 40% for 1982-1984; 30% for 1985-1987; and 20% for 1988 and after. The amount of an exemption may not be less than \$5,000 unless the legislature by general law prescribes other monetary restrictions on the amount of the exemption. An eligible adult is allowed to receive other applicable exemptions provided by law. An exception is made where ad valorem tax has previously been pledged for the payment of debt.

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell an additional \$250,000,000 in bonds increasing the Veterans' Land Fund's total bond issuance authorization from \$700,000,000 to \$950,000,000. The amendment would increase the maximum interest payable by the state on these bonds from 6% to 10%, and permit an even higher rate, if specified by the legislature.

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 49 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt livestock and poultry from taxation. Currently, farm products in the hands of the producer and family supplies for home and farm use are exempt. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of additional bonds to finance the veterans' land program and to increase the maximum interest rate allowable on veterans' land fund bonds."

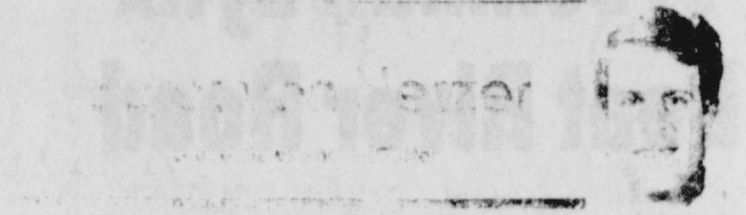
