Loans Are Up Deposits Down At First State

Conditions look good, but loan money is still tight, said First State Bank President C. A. Gibner this week.

At the end of business on Sept. 20, loans were up and deposits down a bit, Gibner said. The Statement of Condition for the bank on that day showed it had loans total \$5,459,706.90 and deposits were \$8,821,673.32.

Gibner said at this last call loans were up some \$165,000 over the June 30 statement of conditions and deposits were down some \$560,000.

The President said he expected loans to go to \$6.25 million this fall as more cattle are bought for wheat pasture.

Money is hard to get right now for loans, he said, but the bank will be able to take care of reasonable demands, just as we have in the past, Gibner said.

The banker said conditions look extremely good for the area. He said the maize crop is excellent and the wheat pasture prospects for the winter are outstanding.

He expects the bumper milk crop to put a large amount of money in circulation in the county during the fall and winter.

New Cars Being Shown

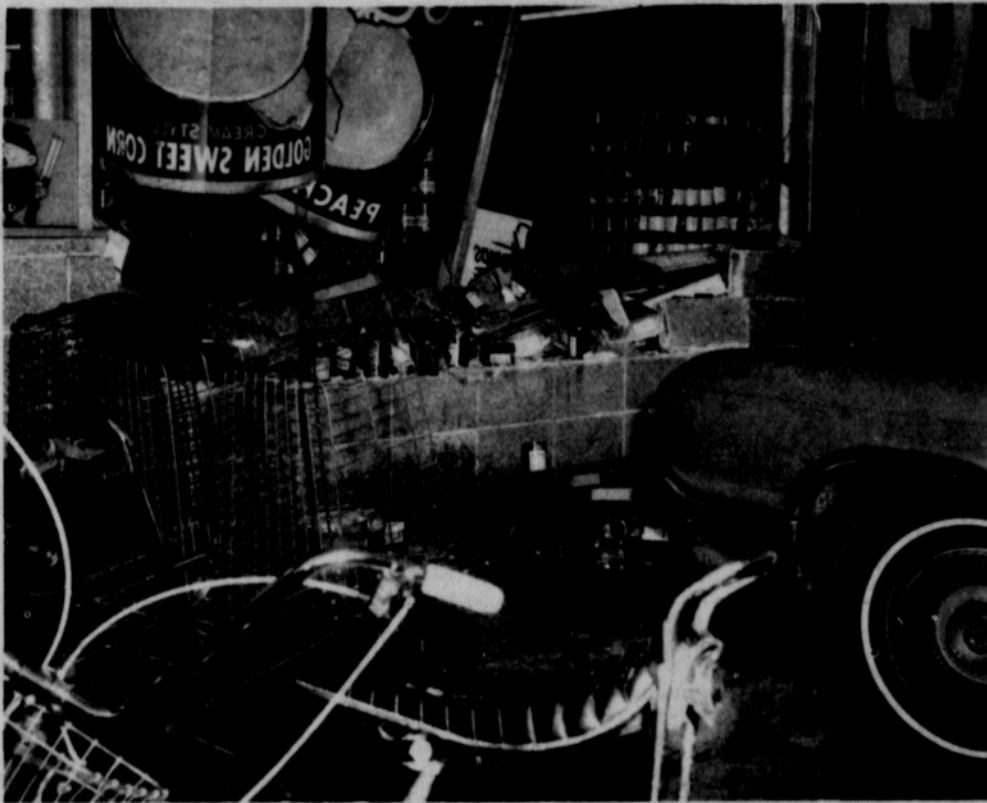
The refreshments will be plentiful in Spearman Thursday and Friday as all of the car dealerships will have their new car showings.

District I-AA Competition Opens; Lynx Meet High Flying Hawks

District competition in 1-AA begins Saturday night at 8 p. m. for the Spearman Lynx and the high flying Phillips Blackhaws in Hawks' stadium in Phillips.

The Hawks rated in the top 10 class AA outfits in Texas will be throwing an explosive ballclub against the Lynx defense that proved tough in the three losses of the season.

Phillips will be the big favorites in the homecoming battle as they have a 2-1 record with wins over Canyon and Hereford and lost to Dumas only 8-0. All are AAA schools.

Spearman has three losses, Sunray, Gruver and Canyon, but the Lynx battled Canyon all over the field before falling 6-0 last Friday night.

Phillips will be led in the backfield by a junior fullback, Hatley. Coach George Wright said this week if you watch number 44 (Hatley) you will see a fullback with both power and sprinter's speed.

Wright said the boy is definitely an all-state candidate. Wright laid out a big job for his team Saturday night. He said the Lynx must contain the Blackhawk speed and stop their trap plays up the middle.

He said the Blackhaws are a very explosive team who play like they intend to stay in the top five ratings in the state.

Wright said, "Frankly, I don't think Phillips has been hit as hard as we hit Canyon this past week."

Wright said the Lynx offensive punch had improved in the Canyon game, but not as much as the coach had hoped it would.

"We moved the ball on a fine AAA ball club, however, we are still short of the "knock-out" punch which must be developed."

Wright said the offensive line was better, but the coaches are still working on the line "firing out" faster and staying low.

He said the backs were running too wide on the "inside" plays, plays into the line.

"Our defense continues to shine and I am extremely pleased with this phase of our game," the coach said.

He said Mike Hendricks played an excellent game at defensive end and Joe Vandenburg came through at the other defensive end spot.

Hal Shufeldt and Bobby Smith were also praised for their work as cornerbacks on defense. Shufeldt made one of the top tackles of the night. Smith, the coach pointed out, has improved his pass defense tremendously. He broke up

several passes and the film showed he definitely had the football on the disputed interception on the Lynx five.

Jerry Holton did an outstanding job at middle guard. He is developing into one of the finest in the area, Wright said.

Canyon hurt our linebackers some, but considering the weight advantage and excellent power attack of the Eagles, it could have been worse had the line backers let up, but they stayed in there and slugged it out.

Wright said Wesley Jenkins made a typical sophomore mistake when he came up too quick to help tackle a runner and let a pass receiver get behind him, but otherwise he and Gary Cates did a good job. Cates intercepted a fourth

Hutchison Wins Tri-State Baking Queen's Contest

After years of competing in baking contests, a Spearman girl has won the Tri-State Baking Queen's contest at the Tri-State Fair.

Miss Rebecca Hutchison won the title Saturday at the Rural Youth Day Show. She baked a two crust fruit pie and batter rolls to win the title.

Miss Hutchison won third last year in the contest. Her 4-H leader, Miss Linda Webb, said the high school junior had been entering the county bake show since she entered 4-H as a nine year old. She won the county show last year and this year.

The winner received a \$100 Savings Bond as her prize in

the contest.

This is the second big award in 4-H projects for the honor student this year. She won the county 4-H dress revue this summer and then was one of the five district winners in Amarillo.

She will leave Oct. 13 for Dallas and the Texas 4-H Dress Revue at the State Fair of Texas.

Second place in the bake show in Amarillo was won by Leahwana Nowlin of Perryton.

Rebecca is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dwight Hutchison who live southwest of Spearman.

She beat 18 other county winners for the baking title.

Tax Roll Largest In County's History

Continued growth in Hansford County has given the county the largest tax roll in the county's history, according to Tax Assessor-Collector J. B. Cooke.

Total property valuation in the county for tax purposes is \$31,674,267. The total tax bill on this property will be \$581,729.99.

The value of property in the county for state taxes is valued at \$30,231,888.

County taxes will be \$316,742.67 and the state tax bill will be \$142,088.91.

Special Road taxes will total \$90,696.55 and the additional road tax in precinct two

will be \$16,466.16.

The tax bill for the North Plains Water District will be \$15,735.70.

This year the state tax rate has been increased from 42 cents per hundred dollars valuation to 47 cents. The extra five cents goes into the fund for state colleges and universities.

The county rate remains at \$1.35, thus making the total county tax rate \$1.82. The rate in Precinct Two is 20 cents higher to pay for the special road bond sinking fund.

The County Commissioners Court approved the tax roll at its meeting this week.

Cooke said his tax office staff has all of the tax statements ready to be mailed and they will be in the mail around the first of the month.

The regular three percent discount in October, two percent in November and one percent in December is allowed on the payment of taxes.

Car Opens Front Wall At Ideal

A misplaced foot sent a late modeled car crashing into the front of the Ideal Grocery on W. Kenneth in Spearman Tuesday afternoon.

The car driven by Mrs. Cora Lindner of 315 S. Archer in Spearman hit the front of the store and broke a large section of plate glass and caved in the brick wall at the bottom of the window.

Officers said Mrs. Lindner told them she was parking in front of the store when she apparently stepped on the accelerator instead of the brake pedal.

The front of the car was damaged by the force of the impact.

City Budget Is Approved

A budget of \$384,405 was approved Monday night for the City of Spearman by the City Council at the public hearing. There was no one in attendance. The tax roll was approved.

The general fund income and expenses have been set at \$134,405 for the coming fiscal year. In the gas and water

An Editorial

Can't Quit School

It was called a new minimum wage law when President Lyndon Johnson signed the bill Friday. But, in truth it was a law making it practically impossible for a boy or girl to quit school short of high school or college graduation.

With the minimum wage going to \$1.40 next year and \$1.60 the following year, there are going to be few places for the man or woman without education or a trade to find employment.

With practically all jobs now covered by these high wage laws, the employer is going to take a long look at every person seeking employment. If the job requires special training, the employer is going to seek the man or woman who can be trained quickly. Trainees cost an employer and he is not going to pay high wages for nonproduction for a slow learner or a person not interested in learning. And, a person who quits school just because he does not like it, or will not work hard enough to pass has demonstrated he is a poor training risk.

The higher wage law also places a greater burden on our public schools, since employers are going to require more, the schools are going to be required to produce students better fitted for college or employment.

For the student who wants to or must go to work after high school graduation there must be more vocational training and guidance such as the current Industrial Cooperative Training program in the Spearman Schools.

Over the past years people trying to keep students in school

have stressed how much more money a graduate makes than a dropout.

Under the old system a graduate made 16 percent more in a lifetime than a person with one to three years of school. Under today's new plan the gap will be wider. It will now be the difference between a poverty program handout and a good salary.

Every industry from cooking to space exploration is looking for employees with training or who have the intelligence to be trained, but no one is looking for the dumb heads and dropouts.

Why Delay Aid

The division, confusion and delay in making a categorical decision whether to send or not to send aid to Vietnam in the form of an Engineer Battalion with armed escort is a sign of weakness and unconcern of some of our leaders in this particular problem which may spell disaster not only to us in this country, but the whole of Asia and the world.

We are in favor of sending aid to Vietnam, whose people really need our help, and whose leaders have been sending requests for our help. Why should we deny them? Did we not send our soldiers to South Korea before?

Have we forgotten that we are a chartered member of the SEATO, with an agreement that if any member nation is at war or attacked by a non-member of the said organization, that it is our right and duty to come to help her?

Some of our leaders who are opposed to help Vietnam have argued that the war in Vietnam is the war of the United States, and not of our own making. Such an argument is silly, if not downright--selfishness.

Our government has taken the stand against communism and we have no diplomatic relations with any Communist countries. We have consistently stood against permitting ourselves to become friends with the Communists and even to give permission to anyone of our citizens who wishes to visit any Communist countries. Why? Simple because we do not want to be contaminated with communism.

Now, if North Vietnam would triumph in this war because of the help of Red China, Russia and other Communist countries, the next victim of communism will surely be the neighboring non-communist countries, such as Malaysia, Thailand, Burma and the Phillipines.

Shall we wait until such thing will happen? We must change our thinking now--not later.

Villereal and other Filipino leaders have seen the danger ahead, and have decided to help Vietnam whose people need our help. We must follow our leaders. No sane Filipino is afraid to fight at anytime when provoked by an enemy. And Communists have been provoking us for a long time now due to our strong stand against communism.

So, we must decide now to come to the aid of our embattled neighbor and friend--the people of South Vietnam. Later will be too late!

Old O'Loughlin Stationery Shows Original Design

Recently a descendant of the late Charles and John O'Loughlin found some old stationery and envelopes the two pioneer ranchers of Hansford County used.

The paper and envelope was sent to Mrs. John R. Collard, a longtime friend of the family.

The paper is a heavy grade of bond paper and has very light blue lines on it for writing in longhand.

This stationery was printed sometime between 1910 and 1919 for it has a line for the date that is preprinted 191--.

In the upper lefthand corner of the paper is printed "Raisers, Breeders and Traders of fine Cattle and Horses." The right

hand corner of the paper carries the ranch's earmarks and their Cow brand and Horse Brand.

In the middle of the sheet is a picture of a cowboy on a horse roping a longhorn steer. The horse and the steer bear the O'Loughlin brands in the proper places.

The address of the ranch is 35 miles south of Guymon, Okla., and 16 miles northeast of Hansford, Tex. They did not put their zip code on the address.

On the envelope there is the same picture as on the stationery. The return reads: "If you don't lasso him in 10 days return to Charles and John O'Loughlin, Hansford, Texas."

systems fund the income and expenses have been budgeted at \$250,125.

Operating costs for the city administration, police, fire, health and sanitation, and street departments, community building and swimming pool totaled \$97,953.50.

Interest and sinking funds for bonds, warrants and contingencies total \$36,451.50.

The costs of operating the gas and water systems have been budgeted at \$181,686 and the interest and sinking fund for bonds, transfer to general fund and contingencies is set for \$68,439.

The park fund expects an income of \$3,600 and costs for maintaining the parks and equipment and park employee in the summer is set at a like amount.

Total property valuation is almost \$200,000 from last year. This year total valuation for tax purposes in the city are \$6,900,384. This will give a tax income at the \$1.50 rate of \$103,505.76.

City manager Darc Foshee said the increase was from normal growth within the city.

City tax statements will go in the mail in time for payments to begin early in October.

Increase Enrollment Announced

Panhandle A&M College had an increase in enrollment of 8.7 per cent over last year. A total of 1166 full time students were enrolled as compared to 1073 last year. In 1964 the college had an 8 per cent increase and in 1965 a 12 per

cent increase.

Of the total enrollment, there were 774 boys and 392 women. The class break-down is as follows: freshman 397, sophomores 308, juniors 248, and seniors, 213.

The total of in-state students

is 780 and out-of-state students numbered 373. Thirteen students are enrolled from foreign countries.

Twenty-five states are represented with Texas having the most out-of-state students with 133, Kansas was second with 107. Pennsylvania has the most students from states east of the Mississippi River. They lead with eight students. All dormitories are full as

well as married student apartments. Forty-eight single students are also being housed in six of the ten new duplexes with married students living in the other four.

**Conservation
Tour Slated**

A conservation tour will be held September 29th starting at 1:30 p.m. The tour will be organized at Nancy's Cafe in Gruver.

This agenda will be followed on the tour:

1. Don Hart-Tailwater Recovery System. A pond has been built and a system of diversion terraces and waterways have been installed to protect land from floodwater as well as collect tailwater. A pipeline has been installed to carry water back up the irrigation run to be used again.

2. W.L. Harris-Cattle grazing Midland Bermuda grass using a 3 pasture rotation system. Cattle all graze in one pasture while the other two are being rested and watered.

3. J.C. Harris-A grassed waterway has been established to a good stand of western wheatgrass. Grass was planted in a clean listed seedbed last September and watered up.

4. D.L. Mathews-Sudan has been planted for a dead litter cover into which native grasses will be seeded. Sideoats grama and blue grama will be seeded next spring.

5. James Stedje-Farmstead Windbreak-A windbreak around the farmstead not only helps to keep the wind and dust away from the house, but adds natural beauty to the farm.

6. Ruben Hindergardt-Diversion Terrace & Parallel Terraces-Terraces have been constructed the same distance apart to avoid point rows. This makes the terraces more desirable to farm.

7. Johnnie Venneman-Range Seeding & Livestock Water Facility-Sideoats grama and blue grama have been established to an excellent stand. Also a livestock well and storage facility have been installed to improve distribution of grazing.

Draft Test Will Be Taken In November

Around 60,000 bulletins of information about an upcoming draft test for students, plus application blanks for taking it, are scheduled to be mailed to state draft boards Friday.

The test will be administered November 18 and 19. Applications for taking it must be postmarked no later than Friday, October 21.

Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said students could get the bulletins and blanks by writing their local boards, or calling at any board.

To be eligible to take the test, the applicant must, on the testing date, (1) be registered with a draft board, (2) intend to request occupational deferment as a student, and (3) not previously have taken the test.

In some college and university towns, arrangements may be made with colleges and universities to have the information bulletins and application blanks on campus.

Taking the test is entirely optional with students, Colonel Schwartz pointed out. He said he had no idea how many would take the November test. About 30,000 took the test given in May and June.

Full details about the test will be found in the bulletins of information, available at the boards. Purpose of the test is to furnish information to the draft boards.

The application blanks to take the test must be mailed to the Selective Service Examining Section, Educational Testing Service, P.O. Box 988, Princeton, New Jersey 08540. A preaddressed envelope will be furnished with each bulletin of information.

The test is scheduled to be given on 25 college and university campuses in Texas. They are located in: Abilene, Alpine, Amarillo, Austin, Beaumont, Brownsville, Corpus Christi, Dallas, Denton, El Paso, Fort Worth, Houston, Huntsville, Laredo, Lubbock.

Also Nacogdoches, Odessa, San Angelo, San Antonio, Texarkana, Tyler, Uvalde, Victoria, Waco and Wichita Falls.

The state director of Selective Service said Friday he did not know yet the identity of the schools at which the test would be given. Arrangements are made with the schools by the Educational Testing Service.

witches' costumes. Today, youngsters have a spirited but not always spooky variety of costumes that range from Batman and Robin to Chiquita Banana outfits!



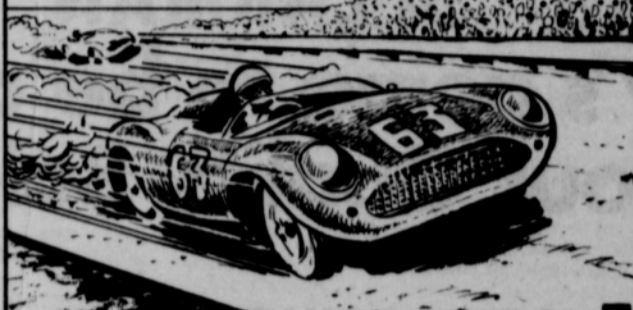

County Agent's Report

County Agent's Report by Robert Adamson

NATIONAL 4-H CLUB WEEK
The fourth generation of 4-H boys and girls and some 24 million adults who once were 4-H Club members celebrate National 4-H Club Week, September 24 through October 1.

The main objectives of National 4-H Club Week is to acquaint more parents and youngsters with 4-H so they will join the program. Parents can become local club or project leaders, and their children active members.

Total enrollment in 4-H this year exceeds 2 1/4 million. The youngsters--from 9 to 19 years of age--reside in every county in every state. They are about equally divided between farm and non-farm residents, reports the Cooperative Extension Service which supervises and conducts all 4-H work, including training of 525,000 adult and junior vol-

unteer leaders. This youth program also extends to Puerto Rico which boasts nearly 33,000 members. Texas enrollment is approximately 84,000. There are 150 4-H members enrolled in the 8 clubs in Hansford County. There are 96,000 clubs throughout the nation in which the members hold office, plan activities and work on a variety of projects. As interests of youth have changed 4-H has changed and expanded. Private support of 4-H has kept pace. Business firms, foundations and other friends help to finance state 4-H Foundations, national and regional award programs, scholarships, training and teaching aids.

Nationally, 57 donors this year pledged well over \$1 million, according to the National 4-H Service Committee of Chicago. These funds are used for long established 4-H programs and some brand new ones.

Scholarships alone will amount to \$146,500, and an estimated 1,600 deserving boys and girls will enjoy national recognition for superior achievement and receive trips to the National 4-H Club Congress held in Chicago the week after Thanksgiving.

A tractor engine takes in about 8,000 gallons of air for every gallon of fuel it uses. A large tractor burning 4-1/8 gallons of fuel an hour takes in about 250,000 gallons of air in a 10-hour day. That's a lot of air and it includes a lot of dirt which can ruin an engine in half a day's work.

Proper air cleaner care insures longer engine life. An efficient air cleaner removes the dirt and dust particles from the air and does not restrict the carburetor intake.

Generally, the air cleaner cup should be removed and the old oil discarded every 10 hours of engine operation. Scrape the dirt from the bottom of the cup, wash the cup in kerosene and refill to the oil mark with clean oil.

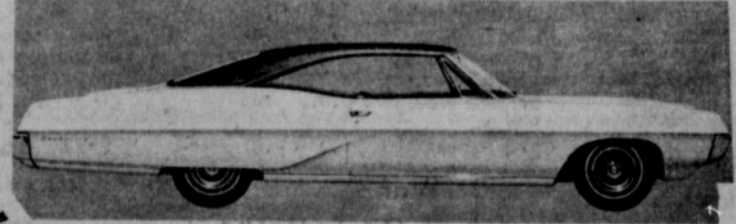

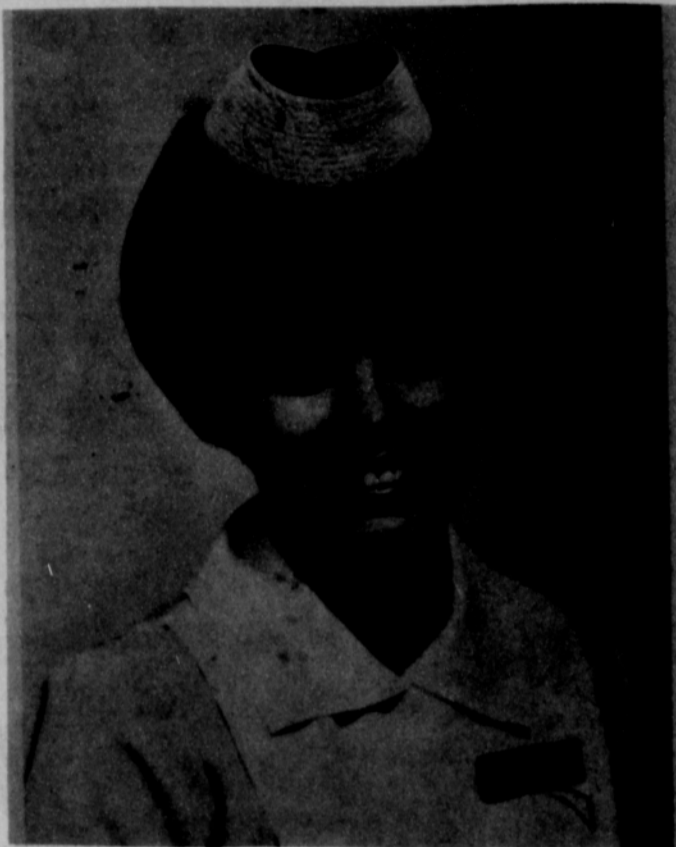

Homemaking Notes

HOW TO REMOVE GREASE FROM PATIOS

It's hard to remove greasy stains from concrete or cement patios. But here's some concrete advice on how to remove those smudges left from summer cookouts and barbecues.

Try an absorbent substance, such as Fuller's earth or lime. It will act as a blotter and may remove the grease stains without further treatment. Just sprinkle it on, leave it alone for awhile, then sweep it up.

If that doesn't remove the evidence, then hose down the patio with clean water. This process will saturate the concrete and serve as a kind of seal to prevent dirty water from soaking in. Then scrub briskly with a stiff broom dipped in thick detergent suds. Hose again to rinse.

Should the grease spots still persist, sprinkle dishwasher detergent on the wet concrete. Let it stand a few minutes--then rinse with a kettle of boiling water.

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTAL TASK OF TEENS

Today's teenagers have three major developmental tasks to accomplish, according to a Missouri family relations expert who spoke at Texas A&M University recently.

"These are developing a sense of identity, establishing independence from adults and understanding the socially accepted roles of adolescence," says Arthur McArthur, Extension division family relations specialist at the University of Missouri.

McArthur explained that the roles were seen in terms of the teenager's peer groups and members of the opposite sex.

The family relations expert was one of several major speakers who addressed the Texas A&M University Family Life Education Workshop this past spring.

Young people today have many choices of identity roles, he told home demonstration agents participating in the training. "There is no ascribed role for youth today, as there was in more primitive societies. In those societies, however, ascribed roles served to give youth a sense of security. There's considerably more decision-making today for teens. The family relations expert

said that "if parents and educators are going to prepare young people for leadership roles, then they must help them to grow up and be knowledgeable about all types of people."

McArthur suggested that parents give young people guidance in recognizing bonds between all groups, despite the differences which must necessarily exist between these groups.

He defined the "spoiled child" as a child of "chicken-hearted parents." "But, who isn't afraid of many issues of the day?"

McArthur urged parents and teachers to re-examine each expectation they have for a child to determine if these aspirations are basic and valid and child-centered.

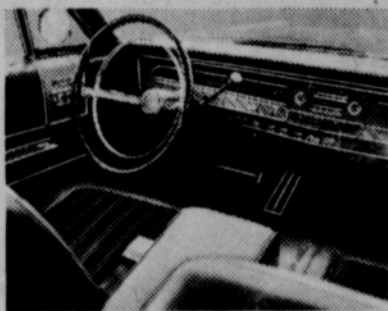
