

Mayor: 'Your Phone Service Stinks!'

Two utility companies serving the city heard stern words of criticism from every member of the Spearman city council present for the regular meeting Tuesday night.

Three representatives of General Telephone Co. including one from Oklahoma City, heard Mayor Ralph Blodgett say bluntly:

"Your services stinks!" Admitting to this prejudicial bluntness, Mayor Blodgett asked them to hear from other members of the council regarding their experience with telephone service in the private sectors of their lives other than as members of the council.

Ed Garner was polite but firm citing a log for the day he had kept of 14 long-distance phone calls he had attempted in the course of transacting business for Baker-Taylor.

Also covered in a discussion lasting some 45 minutes, was the fact that, for reasons known only to the company, some calls to the repair service department are not made a matter of record. Thus, when an irate subscriber -- irate because he reported trouble some time ago and it had not been fixed -- calls back, he or she is told there is no record of the call. It was also noted that this "no record" answer is made in a

tone that implies disbelief the call was ever made rather than an error of company records -- or worse, disregard of the trouble.

The defense of the company was frail for while General Telephone System has some new and wonderful equipment working at various points, none of this equipment based on recent electronic advancements is compatible with the antiquated system in use in the Spearman general area.

At the close of the discussion on telephone service, the council adopted a resolution which will both go to the Texas Utilities Commission and to

those cities that worked in concert with Spearman against any rate increase until service was considerably upgraded.

The resolution lauds and supports TUC's efforts to get an improved quality of service from General Telephone Co. and demands greatly improved service within the city of Spearman by Feb. 1, 1981. If it is not improved, the resolution further pledges rigorous support of TUC's efforts to remove General Telephone's franchise in the state of Texas. This TUC has pledged to attempt if significant improvement is not forthcoming.

Also in the course of the

meeting, Community Public Service drew criticism from the council regarding the rate structure now in effect. It was noted that private users expecting a 14 percent increase had received bills up to 40 percent higher.

CPS explained that this was due to the demands of the Texas Utilities Commission on rate structure and basically was out of company control. However, CPS representatives at the meeting said the company was exploring every avenue where they might comply with the TUC ruling and still find a billing practice offering a spread of the burden.

In the course of the discussion it was noted that CPS has a man, Rich Melton, who does energy "audits" seeking to discover energy losses in homes either due to construction or practice.

Compared to the almost two hours of utilities discussions, the remainder of council business seemed brief indeed.

The council opened bids for a true-lease method of financing hangers at the new municipal airport then opened bids for actual construction of four "T" hangers and an alternate. Two bids were received on each proposition. Financing bids were deferred to the city staff

for review and hanger construction bids were deferred both for staff review and study by the architect, represented by Mike Boyett at the meeting.

Bill Stephens represented Stephens Management Consultants Inc. and presented a comprehensive report on that firm's survey of city wages and salaries. The report was approved as presented. From that point, the city will make further studies of implementations as needed reflected by the survey.

The council failed to approve application for a grant from the Texas Aeronautic Commission for the year 1981 but did approve making such applica-

tion for such a grant for the year 1982. At the same time a pre-application to the FAA for a grant for the year 1982 was authorized. The mayor is the city officer authorized to process these instruments.

Dr. R.L. Kleeberger was re-appointed city health officer for another term.

Following a few other routine matters of city government, the lengthy meeting was adjourned.

September meetings of the city council were set for Sept. 9 and Sept. 23. Meetings convene at 8 p.m., and are open to the public.

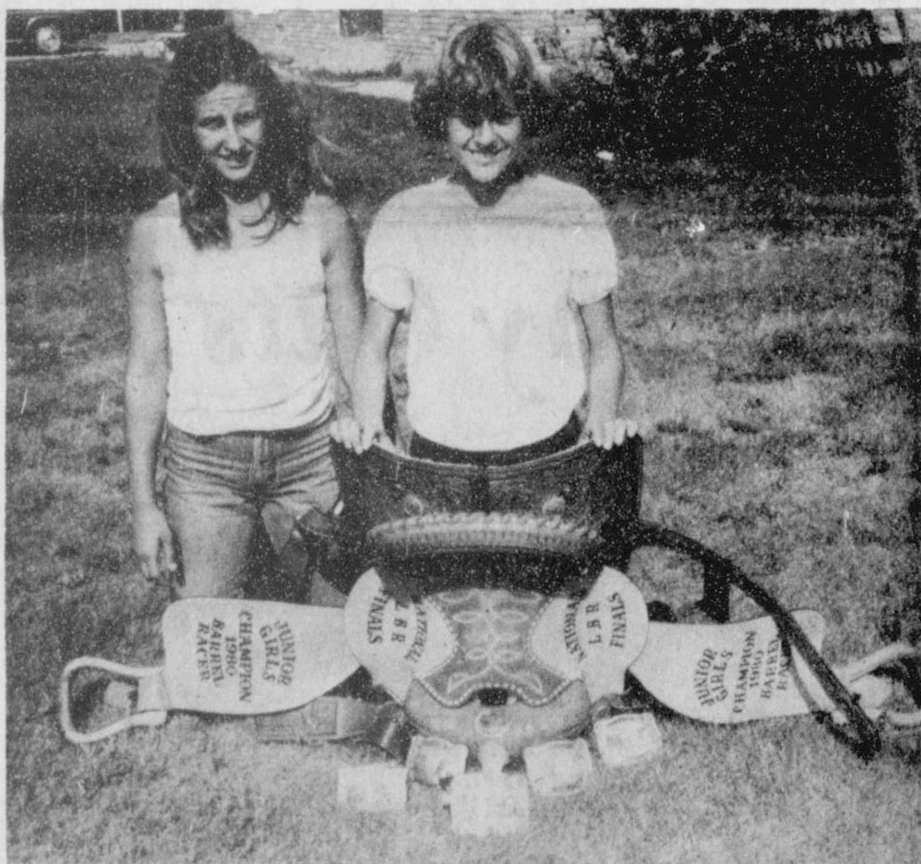

Martin Receives Jr. World Championship

Spearman's teen-age Donna Martin recently made believers of folks from 17 states that "Little Britches" wear a saddle real well out here on the High Plains.

Donna rode to first place in the 1980 "Little Britches" Barrel-Racing event at Colorado Springs to cinch the Junior World Championship with a time of 16.983 seconds!

Donna was up against 48 other competitors from 17 states in the trials staged Aug. 18-24 at Colorado Springs.

At any age-level of competition, Barrel-Racing is considered one of the most demanding forms of competition staged in the world of horsemanship. Rider and mount race around the drum pylons that mark a competition course almost as just one living entity. The entire performance is one of timing. That timing must be just so as horse and rider round each pylon or that big drum could be a scary "bugaboo" for the horse instead of a signal to make the rounding turn.

Thus each turn of a barrel is almost a single event in the mind of the rider with the final time that determines winning or losing sort of "put on hold" until horse and flash out of the last stage of the course and time is stopped.

--And to demonstrate that Donna's win was no fluke but that horsemanship is a major talent in the James Martin family, her sister Diane placed high in every event she entered in the "Little Britches" competition and was edged out first place in her main event only by a hair.

So, the pride of the James Martin family has spread to Spearman and Hansford County with local congratulations still coming in.

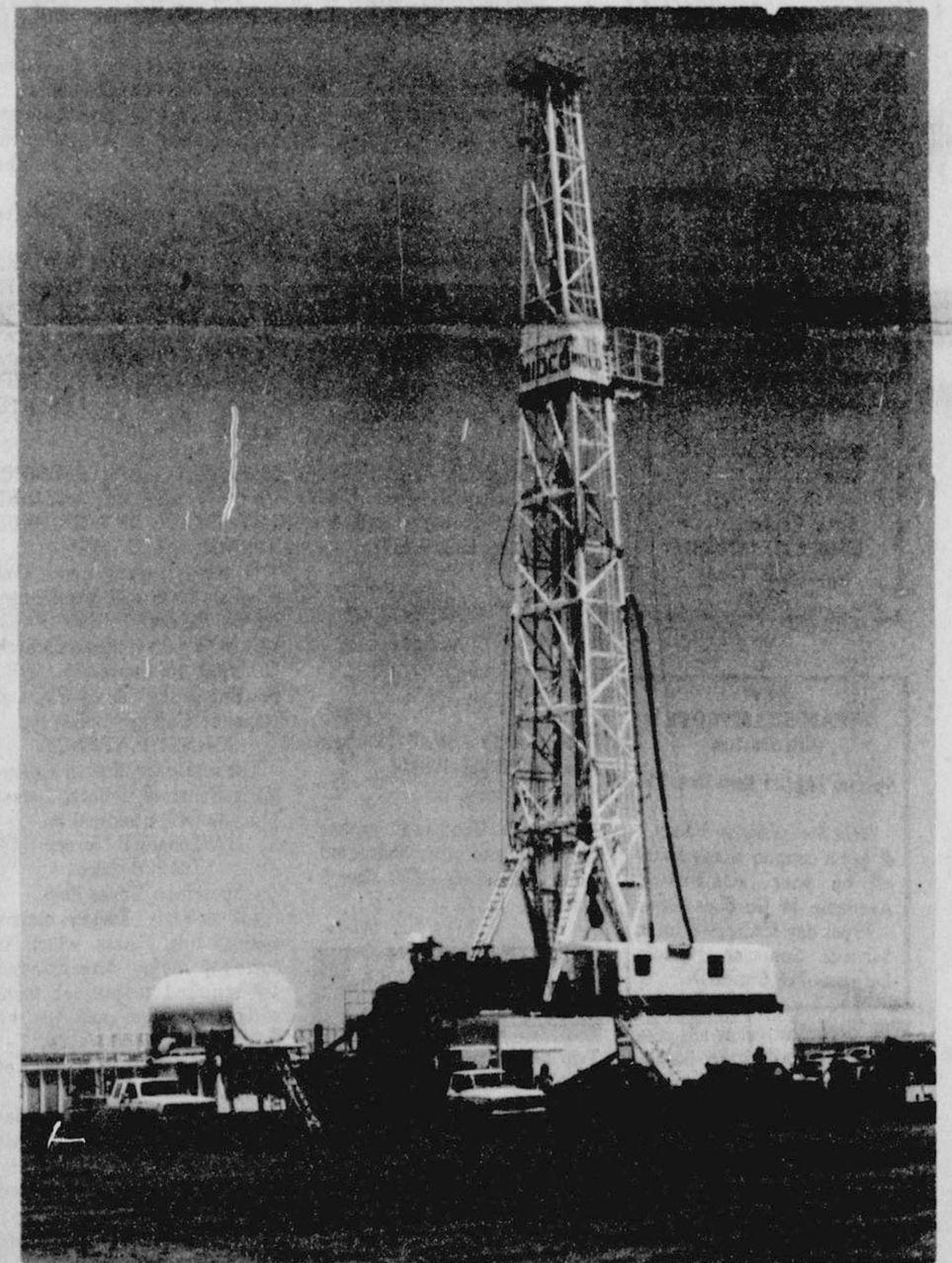
Services Held

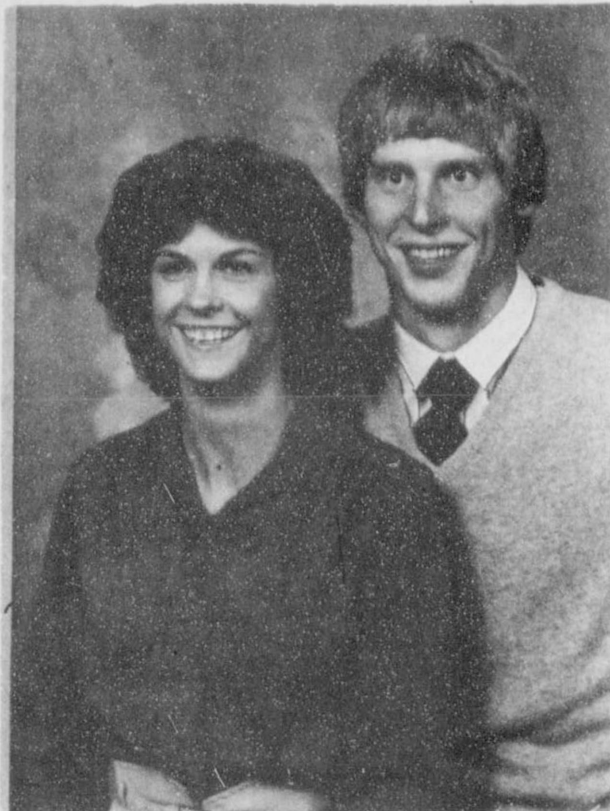

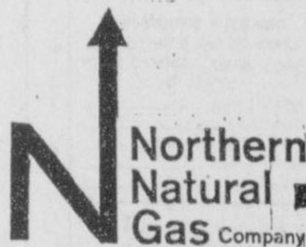

Last year, 137,800 fires were caused by smoking an average of more than 375 a day. The careless use of smoking materials is the number one cause of fire deaths, accounting for 31% of the total and leading all other causes by an enormous margin.

A study of fire deaths found that 14 out of 16 persons who died while smoking in bed had been drinking. The risk of fire deaths increases with any increase of alcohol consumption.


