More Funds Available For GP Conservation

The Senate committee on velop Great Plains Conservaappropriations approved restoration of the appropriation for the Great Plains Conservation Program to the original budget estimate of \$14,640,000 for fiscal 1964 in which the government is now operating.

The \$2,000,000-plus increase over 1963's appropriation can mean an additional 500 farms and ranches insulated--as well as modern agricultural know-how can achieve it--- against the dry years that are not so far ahead, says Wayne Chapman, SCS boss

It would mean that the contracting process and the work of applying sound soil and water conservation on farm and ranch lands in the Great Plains Conservation Program can proceed without the usual spring letup when funds run out.

At the present time the Spearman Soil Conservation Service Office is working with group of Hansford and Sherman Co. farmers who have applied for assistance under this program. They have a severe erosion problem which involves some 30 sections of land valued at over \$5,000,000.

There have been 55 farmers and ranchers in Hansford County and 10 in Sherman County de-
