Seymour Having Surgery F. Dawson Takes Helm

Spearman's head football coach Don Seymour has been forced to the sideline for the remainder of this grid season by ill health. Seymour was forced into the hospital Saturday and will undergo chest surgery at 10 a. m. today (Thursday) for the removal of a tumor.

Mrs. Seymour said Wednesday morning that tests made this week showed the growth was not malignant and was growing independently of any organs in the chest.

The coach's wife said Don first noticed the growth last summer, but tried to wait until after football season was over before having it removed. However, she said, the pain in his chest, coupled with a stomach ulcer, would not let him sleep at night. He decided Saturday he could not continue to ignore the situation.

Supt. James Bramlett said Wednesday that Assistant Coach Fred Dawson has assumed Seymour's duties as head coach and athletic director for the remainder of the football season.

Mrs. Dwight Hutchison is teaching the math classes the coach had in high school.

The coach is in Room 412 in St. Anthony Hospital in Amarillo. Mrs. Seymour said she did not know how long Don would be in the hospital or how much company he would be allowed to have.

More Funds Available For GP Conservation

The Senate committee on appropriations approved restoration of the appropriation for the Great Plains Conservation Program to the original budget estimate of \$14,640,000 for fiscal 1964 in which the government is now operating.

The \$2,000,000-plus increase over 1963's appropriation can mean an additional 500 farms and ranches insulated--as well as modern agricultural know-how can achieve it--against the dry years that are now not so far ahead, says Wayne Chapman, SCS boss here.

It would mean that the contracting process and the work of applying sound soil and water conservation on farm and ranch lands in the Great Plains Conservation Program can proceed without the usual spring letup when funds run out.

At the present time the Spearman Soil Conservation Service Office is working with a group of Hansford and Sherman Co. farmers who have applied for assistance under this program. They have a severe erosion problem which involves some 30 sections of land valued at over \$5,000,000.

There have been 55 farmers and ranchers in Hansford County and 10 in Sherman County de-

velop Great Plains Conservation Plans. Construction of waterways and diversion and range seeding have been the major conservation practices installed under this program.

Four Attend Texas A & M

Four area boys are students at Texas A&M University at College Station this fall, according to a report released by Registrar H. L. Heaton.

The four students are Charles L. Cox, Jr., Perry Sheets, James Snowden and Britt Jarvis.

Among the more than 8,100 Texas Aggies enrolled for the Fall Semester are residents of 244 counties of Texas, 44 other states, plus the District of Columbia and 48 countries around the world. There are a record 356 foreign students enrolled.

Tough Bucks Hosting Lynx In White Deer Friday Night

Spearman meets a big, tough opponent Friday night when they go against the White Deer Bucks at 8 p. m. in White Deer.

The two teams will be battling to stay out of the district cellar. White Deer has dropped two games, Dalhart and Stinnett, while Spearman dropped its opening district game to Shamrock.

If the Lynx can pull this one out Friday night, they will have a good chance of finishing ahead of the Bucks in the final standings.

At the first of the season White Deer was rated as a big, slow team with very little experience. They dropped some one-sided games early, but have been getting tougher each week.

Friday, a couple of quick touchdowns in the opening minutes of the game was all that saved Stinnett from falling to the Bucks.

The Buck offensive line starts in size with center Pat McKernan, 225 and goes down to guard Tony Horner, 140. Horner is the only lineman that is under 150.

In the backfield White Deer is without the services of fullback Edie Kliebrink, 205, but they have Larry Marlar at 180 to handle the power work. Ray Armstrong, a 130 pound speedster, is the Buck scatman.

Halfback Mike Morris is the only Lynx to come out of the Shamrock defeat with a lasting injury. Morris twisted his knee early in the game and saw no more action. However, he is expected to be ready for at least some action Friday night.

Several of the Lynx were shaken in the contest, but none

of them had to stay out of the game for long.

While most of the Lynx are ready for the game, head coach Don Seymour will miss it because of illness. He undergoes chest surgery today. First Assistant Fred Dawson will direct the team the rest of the season.

Bill Didlake of Borger met with a small group here Tuesday night and discussed the study and the construction of a home here.

Didlake recently completed such a home in Borger and is now constructing a senior citizens' home in Canyon. The home here will probably be built along the same plans as the Canyon facility, he said.
