## Lynxettes in Irish Finals; Lynx Lose

The Spearman Lynxettes were in the finals of the Shamrock tournament Saturday against the unbeaten Shamrock Col-leens.

The Lynxettes made it to the finals by beating Canadian and Lefors in two one-sided con-tests. They beat Canadian 45-17 and Lefors 56-29.

The second round ended the Lynx participation in the tournament. The boys dropped a close one to McLean 47-42. The boys won the first game from Canadian 63-43.

The boys had an easy time

with Canadian, then went cold and scored only 22 points in the first three quarters of the game with McLean. They came alive in the final eight minutes and pumped in 20 points, but were too far behind to pull the game out.

Lynxette boss Dean Weese used his entire squads in the two run-aways for the girls. Barbara Wilde led the scoring with 16 in the first and 23 in the second game. Marsha Shieldknight had 15 in each game.

## World Population Requiring Greater Food Production

The world's growing population requires that better conservation of soil and water be carried out, Dr. Gerald Thomas, Dean of Agriculture at Texas Tech said here Thursday night.

Dr. Thomas was the principal speaker for the annual Bankers Soil Conservation Award Banquet. It was held in the Spearman Junior High Cafeteria.

Dr. Thomas said that underdeveloped nations are going to have to increase their food production 4.5 percent per year to meet the growing food needs of the world. He said these nations are unable to do this now.

There are two theories on food production, he said. One group believes that more scientific production will take care of feeding the world. The other theory is that these breakthroughs are a long way away and better land use and higher production per acre will be required. Dr. Thomas said he belongs to the second group.

The dean said that currently only one third of the land on the earth is suitable for producing food. The rest is too cold, dry, hot or non-productive.

Also, he pointed out that every year millions of acres of the best land are going under concrete and asphalt for cities and highways. Therefore, we are losing many acres of land needed for food production.

Thomas said a group of scientists has predicted that by the year 2026 the world's production will reach the point that it cannot feed itself.

He believes a food and population balance will be reached before then.

The specialist said the United States cannot feed the world, but we must use caution in the use of our soil and water. We must use better conservation practices because we are going to need every acre we have in the future.

Thomas said the short-sightedness of politicians in complaining about surpluses, which have disappeared, have caused people to be unconcerned about the food problems. It may have been the biggest mistake of our times.

Don Hart, a Gruver farmer, was named Outstanding Conservation Farmer in the Hansford Soil Conservation District this year.

He farms 11 sections and used conservation cropping systems, crop residue use, stubble mulching, land leveling, irrigation pipeline, surface irrigation, tallwater recovery systems, grassed waterways, diversions, irrigation water management, pasture planting, farm ponds, range seeding, deferred grazing and proper range and pasture use.

His major crops are wheat and grain sorghum and with these practices he continually surpasses the county production averages.

The award was presented to Mr. and Mrs. Hart by Clay Gibner, President of First State Bank of Spearman.

J. C. Harris of Gruver presented the Outstanding District Supervisor's Award to Charles Brillhart. He was elected in 1965 and has been very active.

He is Vice-Chairman this year. He helped organize a Panhandle Association of Conservation Supervisors this year. He also attended the State Soil and Water Conservation Convention this year.

Entertainment was by Wade Parks of Morse, who presented a magic act.

Kenneth Irwin was master of ceremonies and the welcome

was made by Peyton Gibner. Willard McCloy made the response.

Bob Crawford, work unit conservationist, presented a brief slide show on the conservation practices being carried on in the county.

There were 114 attending the banquet sponsored by the First State Bank of Spearman and the Gruver State Bank.

Eddie Papay scored 19 points for Morse and Joe Shields had 16 for Morse.

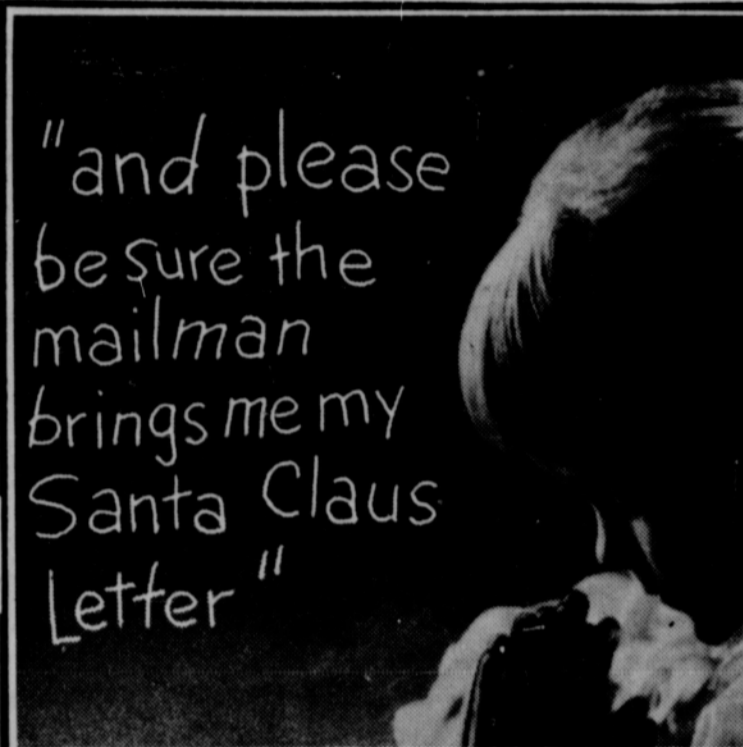

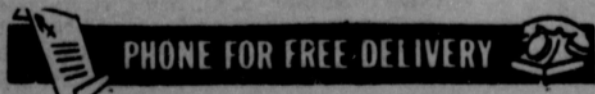

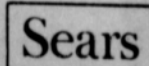
