World Population Requiring Greater Food Production

The world's growing popula-tion requires that better conservation of soil and water be car-

vation of soil and water be carried out, Dr. Gerald Thomas, Dean of Agriculture at Texas Tech said here Thursday night, Dr. Thomas was the principal speaker for the annual Bankers Soil Conservation Award Banquet, It was held in the Spearman Junior High Cafeter-

Dr. Thomas said that underdeveloped nations are going to have to increase their food production 4.5 percent per year to meet the growing food needs of the world. He said these na-tions are unable to do this now.

There are two theories on There are two theories on food production, he said. One group believes that more scientific production will take care of feeding the world. The other theory is that these breakthroughs are a long way away and better land use and higher production per acre will be required. Dr. Thomas said he belongs to the second group.

belongs to the second group.

The dean said that currently only one third of the land on the earth is suitable for produc

the earth is suitable for producing food. The rest is too cold, dry, hot or non-productive.

Also, he pointed out that every year millions of acres of the best land are going under concrete and asphalt for cities and highways. Therefore, we are losing many acres of land needed for food production.

Thomas said a group of scientists has predicted that by the year 2026 the world's production will reach the point that it cannot feed itself.

He believes a food and population balance will be reached before then.

The specialist said the United States cannot feed the world, but we must use caution in the use of our soil and water. We must use better conservation practices because we are

tion practices because we are going to need every acre we have in the future.

Thomas said the short-sighted-

ness of politicians in complaining about surpluses, which have disappeared, have caused people to be unconcerned about the food problems. It may have been the biggest mistake of our

Don Hart, a Gruver farmer, was named Outstanding Con-servation Farmer in the Hans-ford Soil Conservation District this year.
He farms 11 sections and used

He farms 11 sections and used conservation cropping systems, crop residue use, stubble mulching, land leveling, irrigation pipeline, surface irrigation, tailwater recovery systems, grassed waterways, diversions, irrigation water management, pasture planting, farm ponds, range seeding, deferred grazing and proper range and pasture use.

His major crops are wheat and grain sorghum and with these practices he continually surpasses the county production averages.
