Emergency Farm Loans Available

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by this past summer's drought and extremely high temperatures are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Perryton, FmHA County Supervisor, Mark Latham said.

Hansford, Ochiltree and Lipscomb Counties are three of the 171 counties in Texas named by Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses.

Mr. Latham said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses, or the operating loan needed to continue in business, or \$500,000 whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate on the first \$100,000 borrowed is 5 percent; interest rate is 8 percent on the balance borrowed over that amount. For farmers who can obtain commercial credit but who choose to borrow from FmHA, the interest rate is 13.75 percent.

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan, Mr. Latham said. Farmers participating in the PIK or federal crop insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until September 26, 1984, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly carry over into the new farming season, Mr. Latham said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens, and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

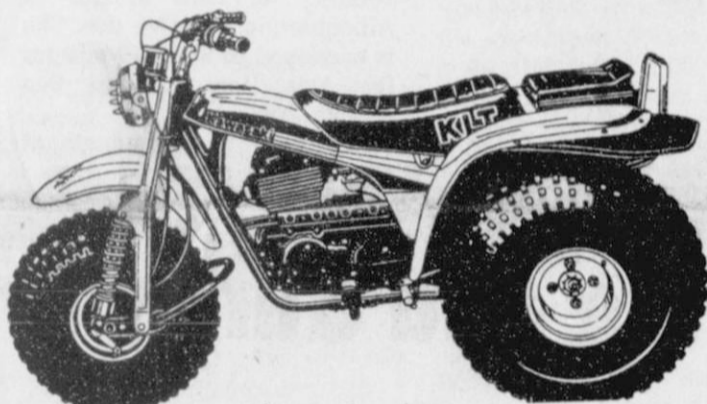

Man Held On \$10,000 Bond

Sheriff R.L. McFarlin reports this week that Oscar Roy Mach, 34 years old of Seminole, Tx., is being held in the Hansford County Jail on a \$10,000 bond.

Mach was originally arrested for a DWI and fined \$400 plus \$86 court cost and served 3 days in jail.

He was arrested again this week while driving a welding truck. It turned out that the welding truck was stolen from Seminole, Tx.

Besides Seminole, Lubbock has a warrant on Mach for theft by check and Perryton wants him for probation violation. Missouri and Wyoming have also issued warrants on Mach.

He is presently incarcerated in the Hansford County Jail on a \$10,000 bond.

history around the festival of Pentecost.

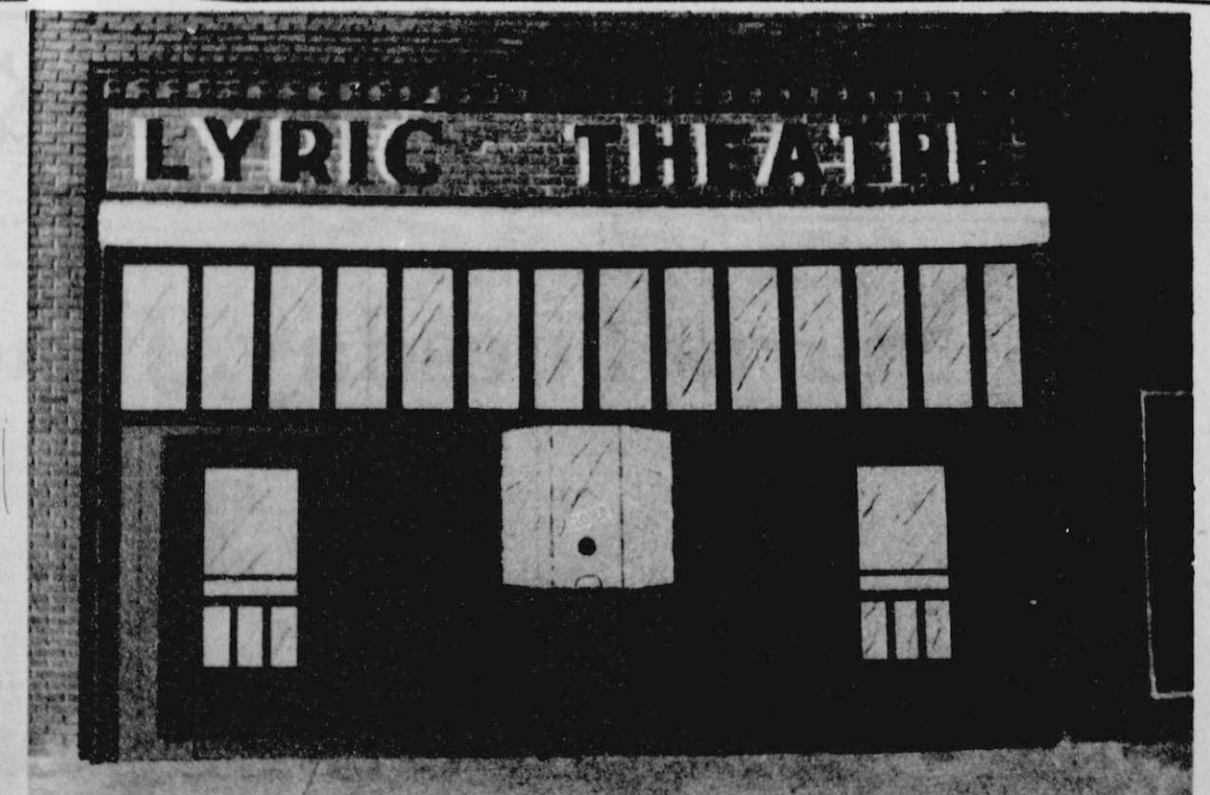

Crunchy Carrot-Zucchini Salad
2 medium zucchini, cut into julienne strips.

2 medium carrots, cut into julienne strips.

1/2 cup coarsely chopped walnuts.

3 tablespoons oil.

2 tablespoons lemon juice.

1 tablespoon chopped chives.

2 teaspoons Dijon-style mustard.

2 teaspoons sugar.

1/2 teaspoon dill weed.

1/4 teaspoon salt.

1/8 teaspoon pepper.

Place zucchini, carrots and walnuts in medium-sized bowl. Thoroughly combine oil, lemon juice, chives, mustard, sugar, dill weed, salt and pepper. Add dressing to vegetables, stirring to coat. Cover and refrigerate about 2 hours before serving.

Yields 4 servings.

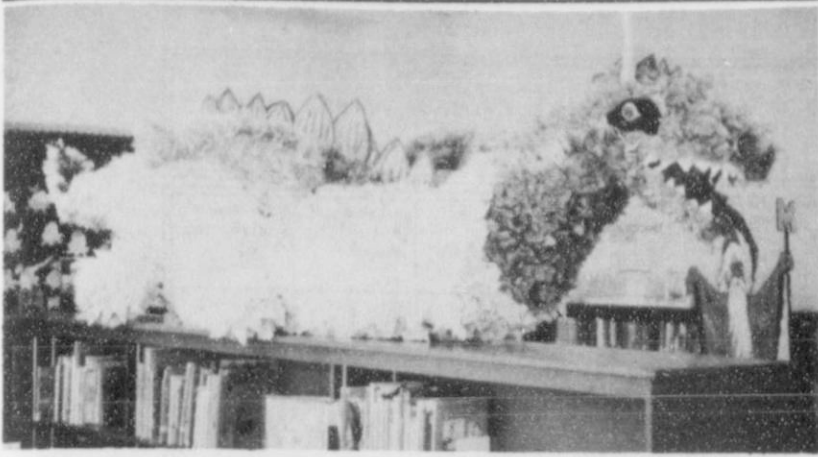

Rotarians hear strip mining program

Hugh Barclay of Amarillo was guest speaker at the Spearman Rotary Club meeting Monday.

He used 35mm slides to show that land that has been strip-mined can be reseeded and be productive.

He showed that in the Panhandle area they try to have the "floor" of a quarry or whatever perfectly level, then they grade around the outside perimeter to prevent any runoff of precious water, because the evaporation rate is 5 times the normal rainfall rate. The ground is then planted with native grasses, such as buffalo to prevent erosion.
