

BASKETBALL SEASON OPENS

Basketball season for the Spearman Lynx and Lynxettes and the B-teams opens tonight, Thursday, in Lynx gym against Stratford.

The B-teams for the boys and girls begin playing at 4 p.m. and the varsity games follow, with the Lynxettes playing first. The girls game will match two of the powerhouses of the

North Plains. Stratford is expected to battle Springlake again this year for the class A regional honors and Spearman is picked as an AA powerhouse. Both teams have dropped games to Tulia in pre-season clinic games. Stratford lost to Tulia at the Darrouzett Clinic and Spearman fell to the Hornettes in Plainview Saturday.

The Lynx and Elks will be going in their first game since putting away the football gear and will be shaking out the rust.

Lynx leader Allen Simpson had two lettermen from last year missing when workouts began Monday. Monte Black has married and cannot play

and Randy Moore decided against playing his final year. Experienced players back from last year include Carl Close, Charles Shieldknight, Carroll Day, Mike Hendrick and Gary Faries.

Debate Teams Win Against 4A Schools

Spearman High School's girls debate team, D'dee Collard and Linnie Bollinger, won the San Antonio Alamo Heights High School Debate Tournament in San Antonio last weekend.

Spearman had three teams in the competition and was the only 2A school invited to compete. There were 125 schools from over the country invited.

Not all the schools accepted, but there were 159 debate teams in the tournament.

One of the Spearman boys' teams, Hal Sanders and Gary Bengé won four of six rounds, missing making the championship elimination rounds by one win. The second team of Carroll Day and Steve Sheets won three of six rounds.

Each team in the tournament debated six rounds in the preliminary rounds, then had three rounds in the championship debate.

The girls had a 5-1 record in the preliminaries, defeating Austin Travis, San Antonio MacArthur, Corpus Christi King, Houston Furr and Houston Sam Houston. They beat San Antonio Roosevelt in the finals to take the senior girls' title.

Miss Collard also won third in girls' extemporaneous speaking. She spoke on "Public Support of the President's Viet Nam policy."

The boys' team of Bengé and Sanders beat Houston Furr, Austin Travis, Corpus Christi King, and Austin High. They lost to Houston Bellaire and Austin High.

The boys received excellent speaker ratings.

Coaching the teams is Mrs. Frank Porter. The teams paid their own expenses to San Antonio since the invitation was unexpected and had not been included in their approved schedule.

By paying in October and getting the full 3 percent discount tax payers saved \$15,116.09. Total taxes paid totaled \$503,966.36, less the discount making the net collections \$488,850.27. The total tax roll is \$562,729.99 this year.

This blood will be used in hospitals in this area, sent overseas for military use and made into plasma. The Red Cross furnishes a majority of the large quantities of blood used in the nation every day.

Bari Blevins Is Injured

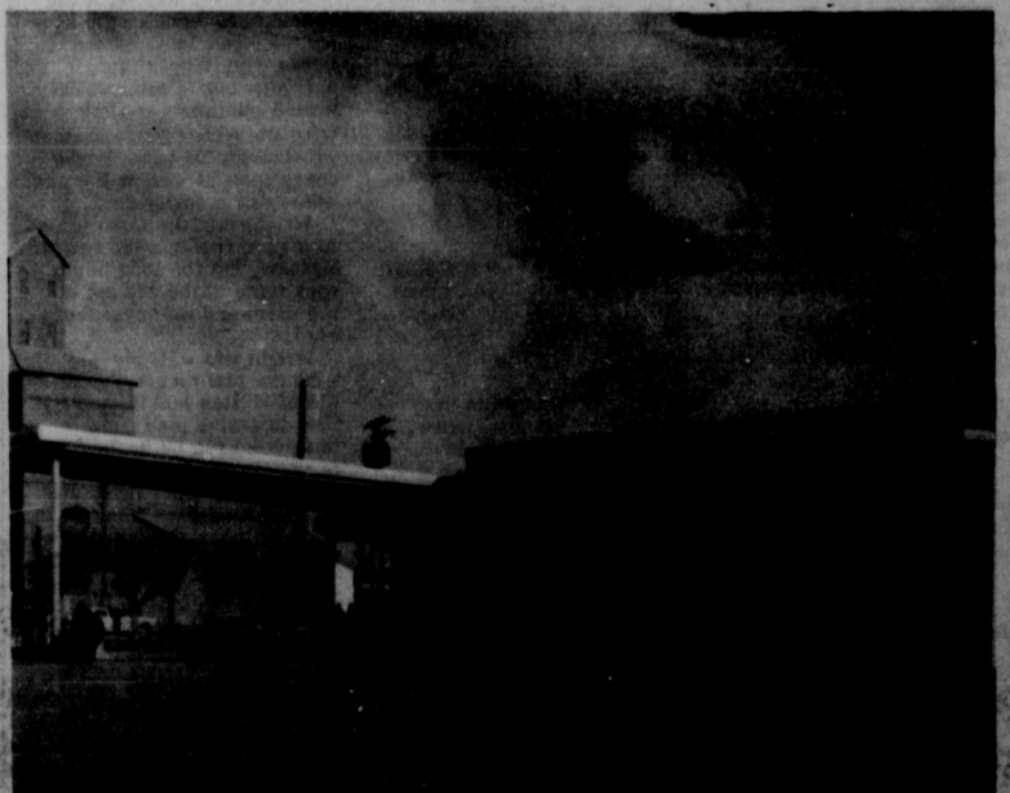
Bari Blevins of Spearman was seriously injured in a two-car accident near Muleshoe Saturday night.

Coach Wright said he felt the team had a good season, considering they dropped the first four games. "The boys came around and really demonstrated real character when the chips were down." He said he felt this was the best standing of a Spearman team in AA competition since they finished third in the eight team district.

Add to this backfield sophomores Mike Davis a defensive back, sophomore end Joe Vanderburg, sophomore guard and linebacker Steve Holton, junior end Mike Hendrick, center Karl Kunselman and tackle Monte Lusby and you see we have some good footballers returning.

Offensively the Lynx have three returning and seven on defense, but all 10 of the juniors and sophomores started some of the games and played lots of football.

They raised money for 40 blazers, a spirit wagon, made pep signs for the school and homes and had several other projects.

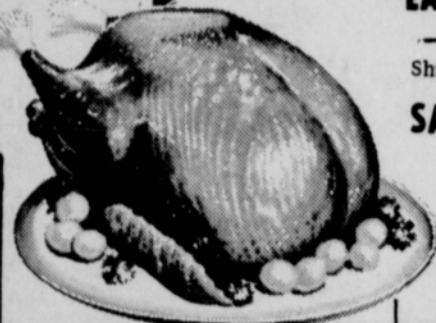

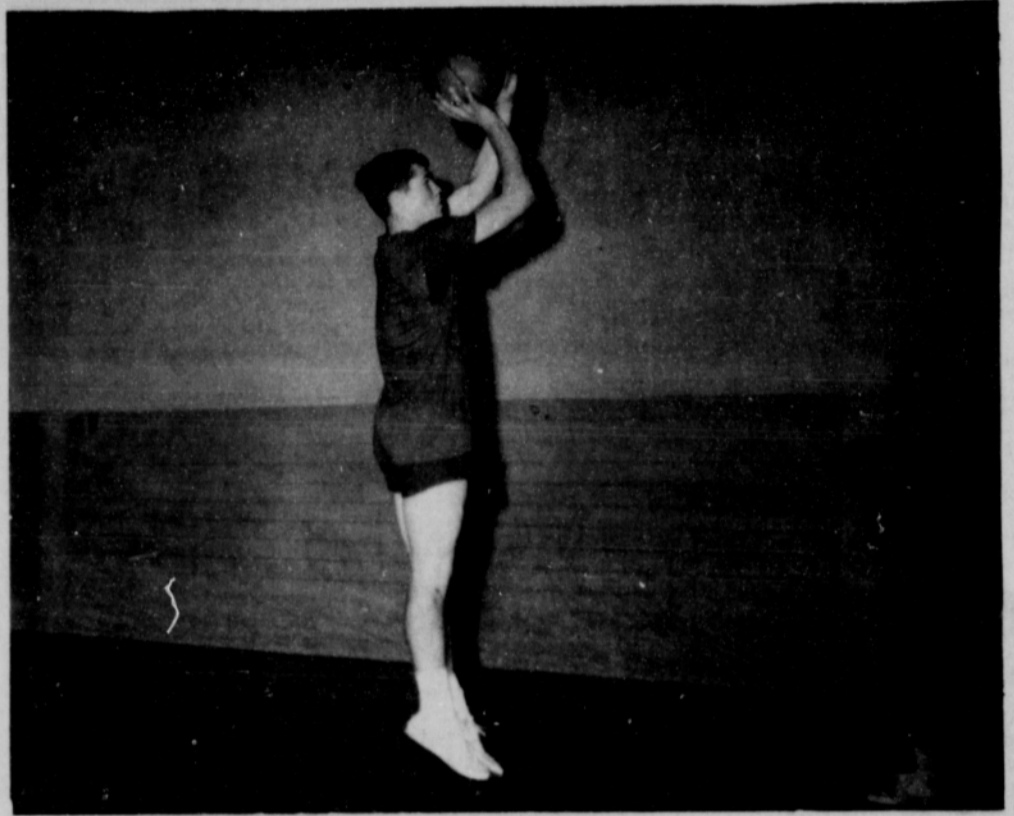

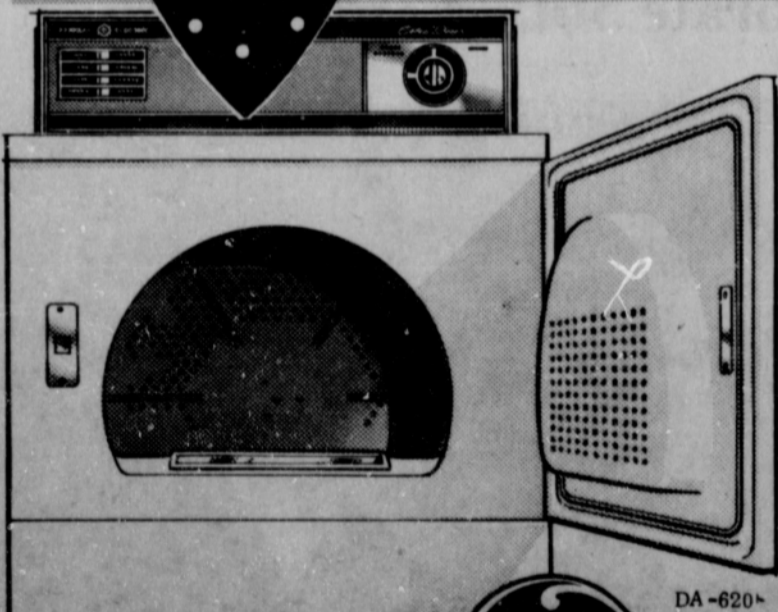
