# 1976 National 4-H Week ... October 3-9

National 4-H Week, October 3-9, will provide a challenge for youngsters across the United States to fulfill this year's theme, "4-H. Room to Grow".

With a 7.8 percent increase in membership nationwide, this year's enrollment includes 5.6 million young people between the ages of 9 and 19 who will try to increase membership and leadership during the weeklong observance.

"National 4-H Week is scheduled annually by the Cooperative Extension Service to bring public attention to the values of 4-H as an informal, youth educational program that stresses development of practical skills, leadership and citizenship," points out Dr. John T. Pelham, state 4-H and youth leader from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Some 120,000 4-H youngsters across Texas will also be participating in different countrywide activities, notes Pelham.

Texas enrollment includes about 3,000 youth under nine years of age, 45,000 in the pre-teens (9-11), 46,000 in their early teens (12-14) and 24,000 between the ages of 15 and 19.

A little over half of the Texas young people enrolled in 4-H live in towns with populations over 10,000. The rest of the youngsters live in the ever-increasing suburbs and on farms.

"The 14 Extension Service districts in Texas will have different activities planned during National 4-H Week in an attempt to attract new members as well as to encourage current members to expand their involvement in 4-H and thereby increase their learning experiences," adds Pelham.

### 4-H HELPS YOUTH TO GROW

4-H, the informal educational program for youth administered by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of

the Texas A&M University System, provides opportunities for youth to grow physically, mentally and spiritually, points out County Extension Agent Jim Kuykendall.

That's why the 1976 theme of National 4-H Week, October 3-9 is "4-H--Room to Grow".

This theme is appropriate because it focuses on how 4-H programs help youth achieve self-fulfillment. 4-H emphasizes the development of "real life" skills: learning "how to learn" for today and for a lifetime; using one's knowledge to improve the quality of life for self and for others; relating to social, technological, environmental and economic change; and growing through the pursuit and achievement of self-imposed goals.

These skills are desperately needed in a society that increasingly must cope with problems of apathy, unemployment, crime, deterioration of the family as a social unit,

and crises in health and morals. Today's youth need to be involved in meaningful activities that will affect their lives and society for the better, and 4-H can play a key part in this effort, contends Kuykendall.

Through the 4-H program, young people can develop the practical skills and citizenship-leadership abilities that contribute to personal growth and to concern for family, community, nation and world. National 4-H Week is designed to salute all 4-H members, their parents, volunteer leaders, businesses and others who make 4-H a viable, contemporary youth program.

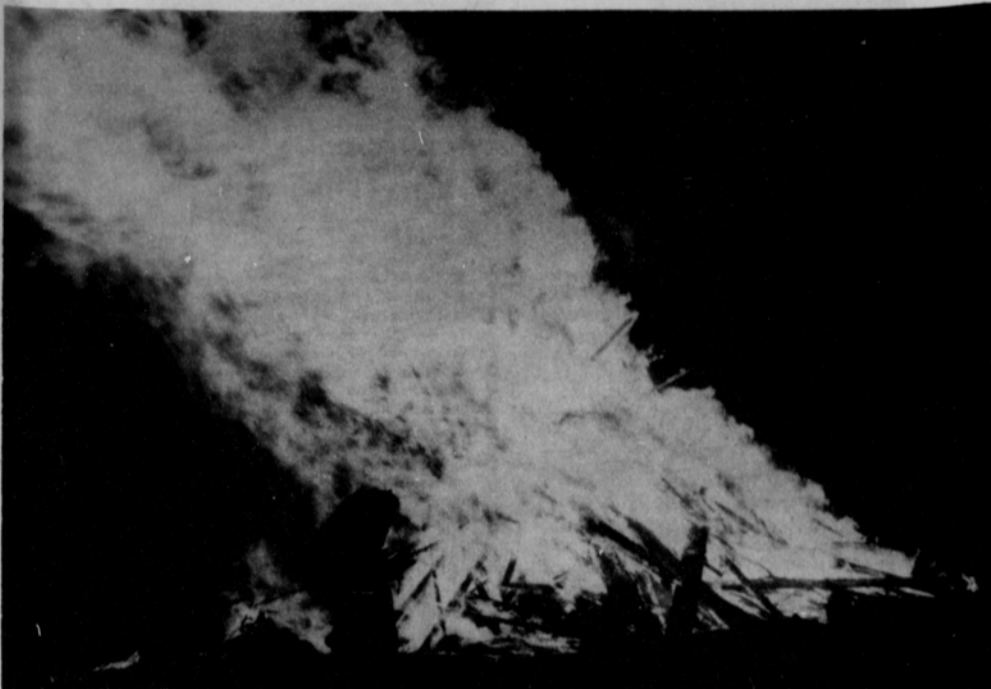

## AN OPEN LETTER TO THE VOTERS OF THE 13th CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT FROM CONGRESSMAN JACK HIGHTOWER

Two years ago I was elected to Congress by an overwhelming margin against an incumbent Congressman. During the 1974 campaign I refrained from any personal attacks on my opponent.

At that time I made it a point with my volunteers and my staff that they should treat anyone who opposed me with the utmost respect.

I thank all of my friends, supporters and staff for keeping the 1974 campaign on the highest level possible.

Responsiveness of government was a key issue. Our government does a poor job when it compounds our problems with red tape and burdensome regulations. Bureaucratic brush-offs of legitimate requests are very frustrating. I decided to organize my staff in such a way that people could deal at the local level with the bureaucratic maze of the federal agencies.

I promised two years ago that you would be able to call a number in the district and get an answer. When I took office I immediately established district offices in Amarillo, Vernon, and Wichita Falls—staffed by personnel who have been instructed personally to be responsive to the wishes and needs of my constituents. I am pleased that many people have told me they appreciate the work and attitude of my assistants. This is the only way I know to have a responsive Congressional office and I assure you I intend to try to improve this service constantly.

The Postal Service has been a bigger mess than ever since the Nixon Administration reorganized it. This is one reason I have chosen not to flood the mails with political propaganda such as newsletters. My alternative has been to communicate through the news media and to come home to the district at every opportunity for personal contact with constituents. All you ever heard about Washington having an artificial atmosphere is true. It has been my experience that the worst Congressmen are those who rarely come home. I am not going to let that happen to me. My policy is to talk with the people at home to see what they are thinking, and return to Washington and vote their philosophy and interests. I live in the district and commute to Washington.

As many of you know, I am being attacked, broadside, by my opponent in this 1976 campaign. His allegations and innuendos are based upon a misrepresentation of the record. I have voted in my two committees—Agriculture and Small Business—and on the floor in exactly the way I have reported to you and as I promised. My record is conservative by any measure. It is also independent of domination either by the Democratic leadership of the House or the Republican White House. I am neither an obstructionist nor a rubber stamp.

As this Congress adjourns, its overall record is mixed. This Congress has done some things it should not have done and left undone some things it should have done—such as enacting a "sunset" bill to cut down on federal bureaucracies or formulating an effective energy plan. We have been able to enact a bill to provide for prompt payment for the cattleman. We were able to pass a bill to provide for some relief on the estate tax problem which should benefit everyone who wants his or her property to remain in the family. These steps are not enough but they are movement in the right direction.

All of us feel sometimes that our views are not reflected properly in Washington. I would prefer a Congress that holds a tighter rein on spending, but I do not choose the other 434 members of the House. I work with them and try to influence them, but I cannot dictate their votes. I feel my job is to represent you—the people of the 13th District—and I pledge to do my best to represent you well.

# Texas School Bus Safety Week

Governor Briscoe has officially proclaimed the week of October 3 through October 9, 1976 as Texas School Bus Safety Week.

School Bus Safety Week has four distinct goals which are: 1. Emphasize the need for increased care when near a school bus. 2. To make the public aware of the laws regarding where and when not to pass a school bus. 3. To make safer drivers of all school bus operators. 4. To educate the public regarding the importance of a school bus in the total educational program.

The Spearman I.S.D. transports 200 students on seven regular routes. The daily distance of the routes' busses is 719.4 miles. The routes, drivers and distance are as follows: Rt. 10-Mr. Buddy Benton, 76 miles; Rt. 11-Mr. Travis Angel, 118.6 miles; Rt.

12-Mr. Wallace Price, 103.6 miles; Rt. 13-Mr. Jerry Orr, 87.8 miles; Rt. 14-Mrs. Debbie Cates, 110.8 miles; Rt. 15-Mr. Edwin Pearcy, 83.6 miles; Rt. 22-Mrs. Idella Rondall, 139.0 miles.

Each school year, the activity busses travel approximately 20,000 miles transporting the students of the Spearman I.S.D. to various curricular and extra-curricular activities.

The Spearman I.S.D. bus drivers have completed a 20-hour bus driver training course and are certified by the Texas Education Agency.

Mr. Bob Wright is the bus maintenance supervisor and keeps the busses in top condition at all times.

In relation to the public, the major problems of the Spearman bus drivers are as follows: 1. Motorist passing busses that are stopped at the side of

the road loading or unloading students. The Texas Drivers Handbook reads as follows: "Drive with care when you near a school bus. If you approach a school bus from either direction and the bus is displaying flashing red lights, you must stop and not pass until (1) the school bus has resumed motion, or (2) you are signaled by the driver to proceed, or (3) the red lights are no longer flashing.

2. Parents using the turntable at the Jr. High-Elementary Schools to pick up children. This area should only be used for teacher parking and the busses.

3. Students not being ready for the bus when it arrives at their house. Parents are encouraged to see that children are ready when the bus arrives. This problem can cause undue lengthening of the time required to run the bus routes.

A trip down memory lane with the incomparable Pat Walker

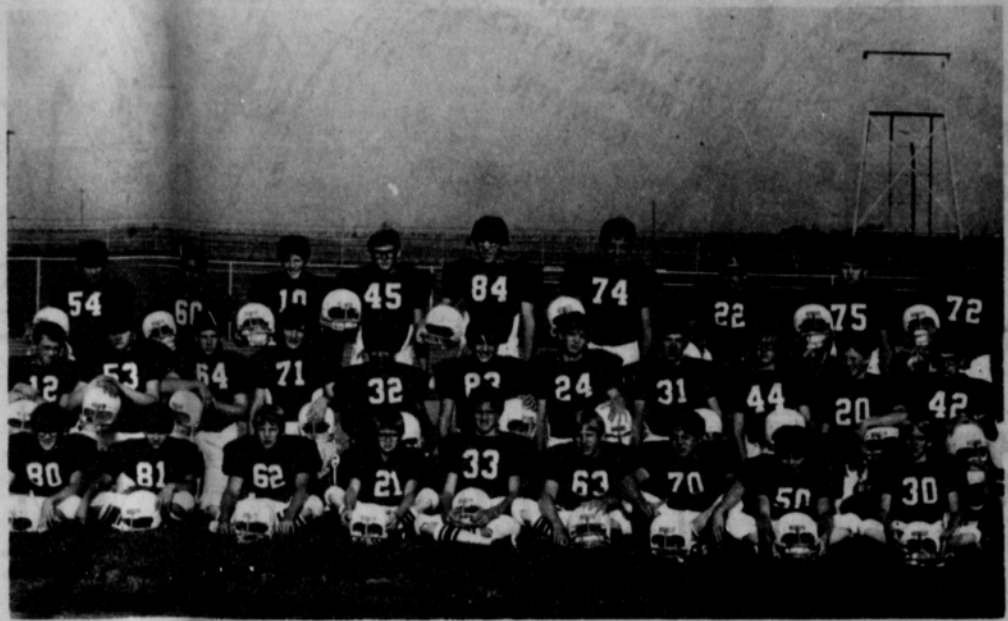

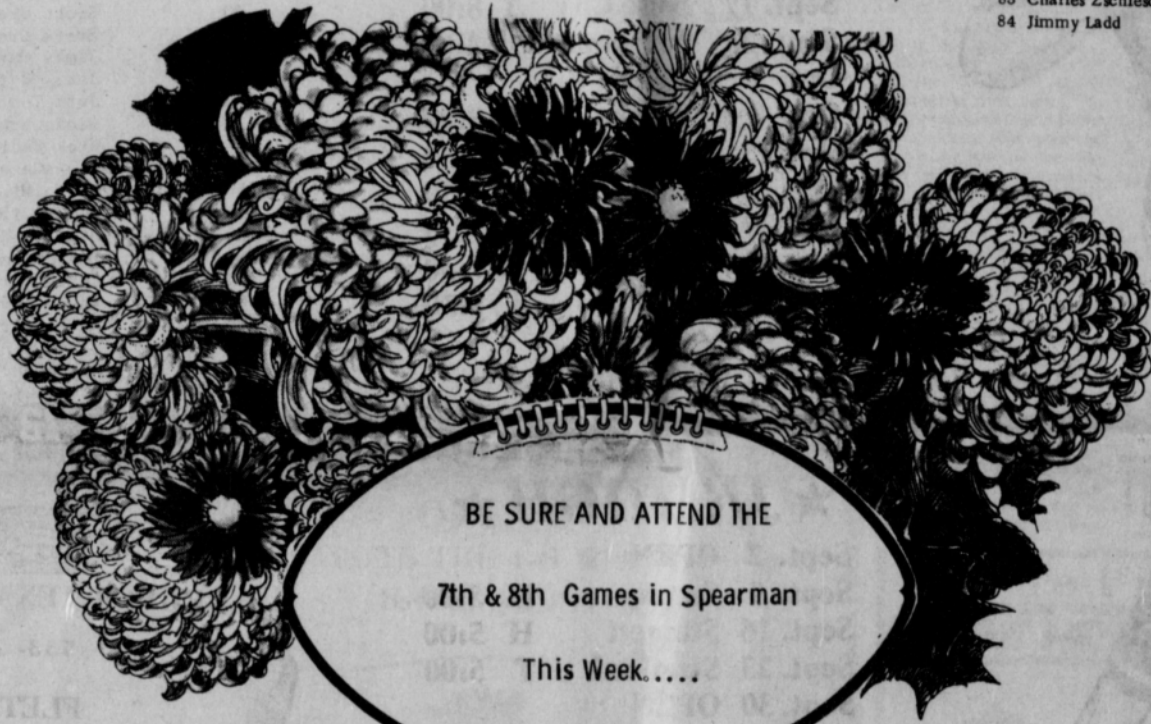

### In Memoriam

The Patsy I Knew:  
Mrs. Kingsley, I told you I would somehow write to you the things I know about Patsy whom we both love. I am not a writer, in fact, if you would check with my relatives, I must hold the family honor for being the poorest communicator via the written word. But, I do want you to know what is in my heart, and since words fail me in this time of sorrow, I will write this down.  
Patsy contacted my husband (Coleman) and me about a year ago. She had just gotten to town and was at the the Dollar Inns. We picked her up and ate supper together at Furr's Cafeteria. She told us her problems and some of her wishes for her life and asked for nothing from us but our spiritual and moral support. She honestly felt Albuquerque would be a place where she could raise Regina and John with little racial prejudice, and within the bosom of the Church there would be none, we assured her.  
She began canvassing and found a job with the Children's Center, and at one time during this period held a job with Furr's playing piano two hours each evening and teaching piano lessons for babysitting, so she worked from 12-14 hours during this time. It was very hard, but she would never take a penny from us. However, she could get credit, and in fact one time she did borrow money to relieve a financial hardship. As you probably know, she had a difference of opinion with the Children's Center manager, so she called us saying she would like to do something else. Perhaps teach in the Fall, but felt she would like to do construction work during the summer because it paid better and she could hold down one job leaving time for the children on weekends. Coleman put her in touch with Kent Nowlin (a fine Christian) and she got the job where she had her tragic accident.  
We told her we didn't want her and the kids to ever be hungry or in need, and our home could be hers at her asking. She would never take us up on that, but she would run by for a visit and to tell us how she was doing. She never seemed lonely because everyone she met loved her. The people she met at work somehow wanted to work her into their lives, too. Patsy kept her direction straight and was so objective about her relation-

ships with people. She never talked Reggie down to us or to the children. We did know some of the problems he had and in fact that they had together.  
Patsy and I philosophized many times when we were together about the world in which her children would grow up in. She was optimistic about life and never expected handouts.  
I never saw Patsy cry, but I felt many times she had a lot to make her want to cry. She always smiled and when we talked of this, she said she usually could manage to smile, so tried to smile instead.  
She was truly one of the most beautiful young persons I have ever known. She honestly proved a lot by her life. She attempted a mixed culture marriage in which we learned a great deal about feelings of people from her and her experiences. She tried very hard to get this marriage to work, but had, as I understood filed for divorce very recently. Patsy and I never talked about this. We knew she was planning divorce when she first came, but for a short while we all thought maybe Reggie could adjust to the Albuquerque area and see what Patsy saw as a potential home for the children. He never could feel comfortable in Albuquerque and would never accept her commitment to Christ, in fact stood in the way of her getting the children and herself to church.  
Another thing Patsy did, she attempted to move into a world of work which is not ordinary to women. She made a good hand and earned the respect of the persons she worked with. She and I talked of how the men treated her, and she was careful not to expect them to do her work, not to think she was there in a man's job for the attention of men. She was a very independent thinker and had such great courage to tackle the hard things in life, and then smile.  
I am so happy I had this acquaintance with Patsy. She

will be a highlight to my life. I wish now I had helped her more, been a better friend, and in so many ways as I reflect I could have done more for her. But, Patsy was independent and had had to rely on her own resources so much she just did not call for help until she was at her rope's end. We knew when Patsy called, she really needed us.  
Last Thanksgiving Patsy was with us for dinner. She and John had baked a 7-Up cake for our dinner. We spent the day together eating, watching football, chatting, and being lazy. To me it was like having my own daughter home for a holiday.  
I loved her very much and her year in Albuquerque has made all of us that knew her a little better as a result. She was a young person with such idealism, dedication to the Lord, great love of life, and very little thought for herself. She always had time for her children as earning the living allowed. Her children were happy, which always speaks well of the environment in which they live. How she was able to keep this attitude for them was known only by her.  
Bless you in this loss, but it is a loss felt by everyone who knew her.
