

LYNX, RATTLERS DEADLOCK

Fumbled Kick-off Sets Up Rattlers' Lone Scoring Chance

A rugged defense and some great clutch running carried the Spearman Lynx to an 8-8 tie with the big Stinnett Rat-tlers in Stinnett Friday night.

A miscue on the second half kick-off set up Stinnett's lone score and was the only time they were able to get beyond the Lynx 40-yard line. A couple of fumbles and pen-

alties at critical times hurt the Lynx in their efforts against Stinnett's bulk.

It was the educated foot of Randy Moore that kept the Rattlers back in their end of the field most of the night. He punted five times for a 38ard average

Spearman threatened once in the second quarter, but failed to score six points. They did get a safety after giving up the ball though.

The drive started on the Stin-

nett 48 when Charles Shieldknight recovered a Stinnett

fumble.

Hal Shufeldt and Bobby Smith did the footwork in the drive. but it was a 32-yard strike from Shieldknight to end Har-

ley Reeves that put the Lynx within striking distance. Reeves was dropped on the 15, and from there Shufeldt, Smith and Jerry Holton got to the three with a first down. On the next play the ball got away and the play lost four yards. Smith and Shieldknight tried three times but could not get the yards and Stinnett took over on the three.

Seven plays later Stinnett was forced to punt from their own 24. The snap from center went over the head of Teddy Gaddis to the end zone. End Mike Hendrick was in on Gaddis and he had to fall on the ball in

the end zone, giving Spear-man two points.

Stinnett got a free kick from the 20 and Spearman failed to move the ball out to the 40

dropped Shields for an 11yard loss as the half ended.
On the opening kick-off of
the second half, the Stinnett
kick-off got away from a Lynx
back and bounced to the Spearman 28 where Stinnett

recovered.

It took the Rattlers eight plays and on off-side penalty against the Lynx to score. The Rattlers were facing third down at the Lynx six when Spearman jumped off-side and gave Jumped off-side and gave
Stinnett a first down at the
Lynx three, Shields got only
one, then big Keeton Johnson
bulled over for the score.
Spearman broke up the pass for
the extra points, but the officials rulled pass interference
and Stinnett got a second try
from the one. Johnson made it
this time to put Stinnett ahead
8-2.

Spearman started its scoring drive with the kick-off at the Spearman 28. The first three plays went for naught and Moore punted. A Rattler got too enthusiastic with an elbow and Spearman got a first down

too enthusiastic with an elbow and Spearman got a first down on the 15-yard penalty.

With a first at their own 45 yard line, Shufeldt put his head down and started moving the ball. He got help from Smith and Steve Jordan as they bulled the ball down to the Stinnett 19. On second down, Spearman was penalized five yards for being in motion.

With second and 10, Shield-knight went to the air only to have the ball batted down. On the next play Shieldknight was not to be denied. The big quarterback had his head in one man's middle and was dragging two more when he was stopped at the 13 with a first down.

Shieldknight, Holton and Shufeldt went on to the five where on fourth down, they needed two. Shufeldt slammed into the line and when the chain was put on the ball, the Lynx had the first by one inch.

Holton hit for one, then Shufeldt slammed the ball across with a foot to spare. Teddy

with a foot to spare. Teddy Gaddis blocked the Shield-

Gaddis blocked the Shield-knight try for the extra point.

After two punt exchanges, Smith gave Spearman the ball at the Stinnett 42 on an intercepted pass. With less than a minute to play, Spearman went into the shotgun offense and Shieldknight hit Reeves twice and Smith once to move the ball to the Stinnett 29.

On the last play Shieldknight dropped a short pass to Steve Holton who was an ineligible receiver. The penalty would have been 15 yards, but the game was over.

Should the results of the game be necessary to decide the district title, Spearman was leading in penetrations two to one. However, since Phillips is far in the lead, it is doubtful that the game will decide the title.

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Howard Klos collapsed after the game. He had been play-ing with the flu.



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

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High Plains Research Shows Value Of Program

The second year of opera-tion of the 504 1/2 acre J. Frank Triplett Research and Demonstration Farm of the High Plains Research Founda tion is showing the value of the Foundation's research pro-

gram as applied to a typical West Texas farm, according to Dr. Earl Collister, Execu-Vice-President and Di-

rector of the Foundation.

The purpose of the J. Frank
Triplett Research and Demon-

stration Farm is to demonstrate the value of research findings of the Foundation to achieve more "take-home money" for the agricultural industry on a

The first year of operation of this new venture by the Foundation was considerably handicapped by early hail and hea-vy rain, just as many farmers have experienced. The 1966 season has thus far been free from severe adverse weather conditions and excellent progress has been made in its opgress has been made in its op-eration by manager, Don Staggs. The Foundation staff assisted in the planning of the new operation, using the re-search findings achieved at the Research Foundation Farm

The High Plains Foundation Farming System is achieving results found through many years of research results on this System at Halfway. Cot-ton has been interplanted with grain sorghum and also castors on five different acreage areas. The grain sorghum harvested from the interplanted acres yielded 7,250 pounds per acre and it was ready for harvest ahead of the solid planted sorghum. The solid planted grain sorghum yielded 6,350

pounds per acre.

A sprinkler irrigation system has been successfully used this year. A lake pump has also been in operation, utilizing the accumulated tail and rain water received in the playa lake on the farm. Irrigation methods involving proper timing and minimum application for maximum results proven from years of research at the Foundation were found to be successful on a compression. successful on a commercial farm basis. Fertilization rates recommended by the Foundation staff also were successfully applied to large acreages of various crops. All major soils of the High Plains are found on the Demonstration

Dr. Collister said that utilization of the J. Frank Triplett Research and Demonstration Farm is another step in the Foundation's program of giv-ing the agricultural industry information which will make farming more profitable on the High Plains.
