## Native Featured Artist At Hall of Fame

Mary Louise Thompson was born in Borger, Texas, and grew up in a farming and ranching community 50 miles north, in Hansford County. A love for drawing surfaced before she started to school, and her first award for drawing came as a winner of such a school contest in the third grade.

Her childhood was spent on a combination farm and ranch, where horse back riding was a daily function, and she had learned to ride before starting to school. This, together with a western heritage passed down from her grandparents and great-grandparents, who were settlers of Texas and Oklahoma, gives her a deep love and understanding of the people, animals and land of the south west. All of her work is realistic, most subject matter is western or wildlife. However, she can't resist a floral from time to time, this interest comes from the fact that she is a graduate of the Cliff Mann School of Floral Design in Denver, Colo.

In the late 60's and early 70's she was part owner of a Western wear Store, where she learned the art of leather craft. This gave her a detailed knowledge of saddles, boots and all items related to ranching life, both old and new, as leather repair was one of the services offered. She has also trained and shown Quarter Horses, and still enjoys owning several, and rides both western and side saddle.

Thompson was always painting in her spare time, and studying anytime a new book

was located, or a good teacher was within driving distance. Some of her teachers have included William Henry Earle, Ramon Forman, Irby Brown and she has attended art courses at the University of Denver, Murray State College, and Paris Junior College. Her work was often bought by friends, class mates or family, and this has led to painting full time. She spends 5 days a week in her studio and 12 hours a day is not unusual. She has 7 years of teaching experience in Texas and Oklahoma, however, she currently limits her time spent in the class room to no more than four workshops per year. Her studio is located on a ranch near Brownwood, Texas, in the hill country.

Thompson has shown in Texas, Oklahoma and Washington, winning numerous ribbons, and in 1981 was featured in a one woman show by The First National Bank of Brownwood, Texas, and was accepted into the National Western Art Show and Auction in Ellensburg, Washington. In this show, her submission of a western to the Opening Night Auction brought the highest bid. Her work hangs in many private collections, and she is associated with the Bradford Gallery of Dallas, Texas. She is a member of the Society of Western Artists and of the Western Art Association.

Other shows include National Art Show and Auction, Kalispell, Mont.-September 1981.  
Ms. Thompson grew up in Spearman and is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carter Crawford of Spearman.

Deadline is Aug. 7. Fee must be paid by deadline date.

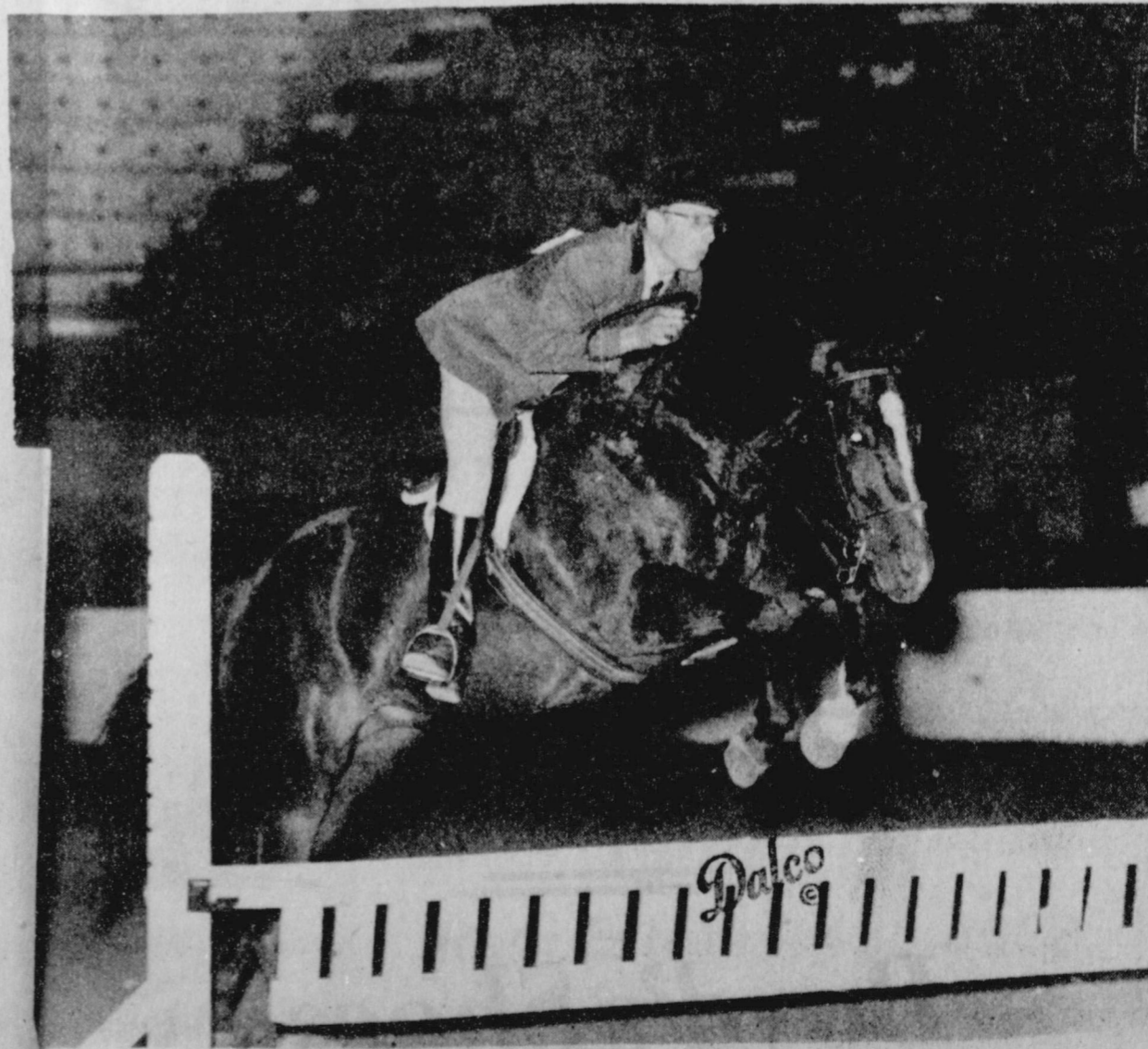

#### LIBRARY POLICIES CHANGED

The Hansford County Library Board held its regular monthly meeting on July 13 at 3:30 o'clock P.M. in the Library.

After the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting the Treasurer's report was presented and discussed.

The Librarian reported that a very successful Texas Summer Reading Program, Monster Madness, had been completed. The highest circulation for any one month had occurred during the month of June with 4,491 books having been checked out.

The Board discussed the increased cost of heating and cooling the Library building. Because of this increase, they felt that the rent for using the upstairs meeting rooms must be increased. In the past the small front room has rented for Three Dollars per day and the large back room has rented for Four Dollars per day. Each of the two rooms will now rent for Fifteen Dollars per day. These rooms may be rented by contacting the Librarian.

Also, the increased price of books and other items (Records, tape, etc.) will limit the number of items that a patron will be able to check out at any given time. Beginning the 1st day August, 1981, each person will

be allowed to check out only four items at a time. Only four books can be checked out at one time, or three books and one record, etc. In the past the policy did not limit the number of books that could be checked out one time, but from now only four items per patron will be permitted.

Board members present were: J.L. Brock, Mrs. Larry Murphy, Mrs. John Trindie, Mrs. G.R. Kilgore, and Librarian, Mrs. Terry Curtis.

The next meeting will be held the second Monday in August.

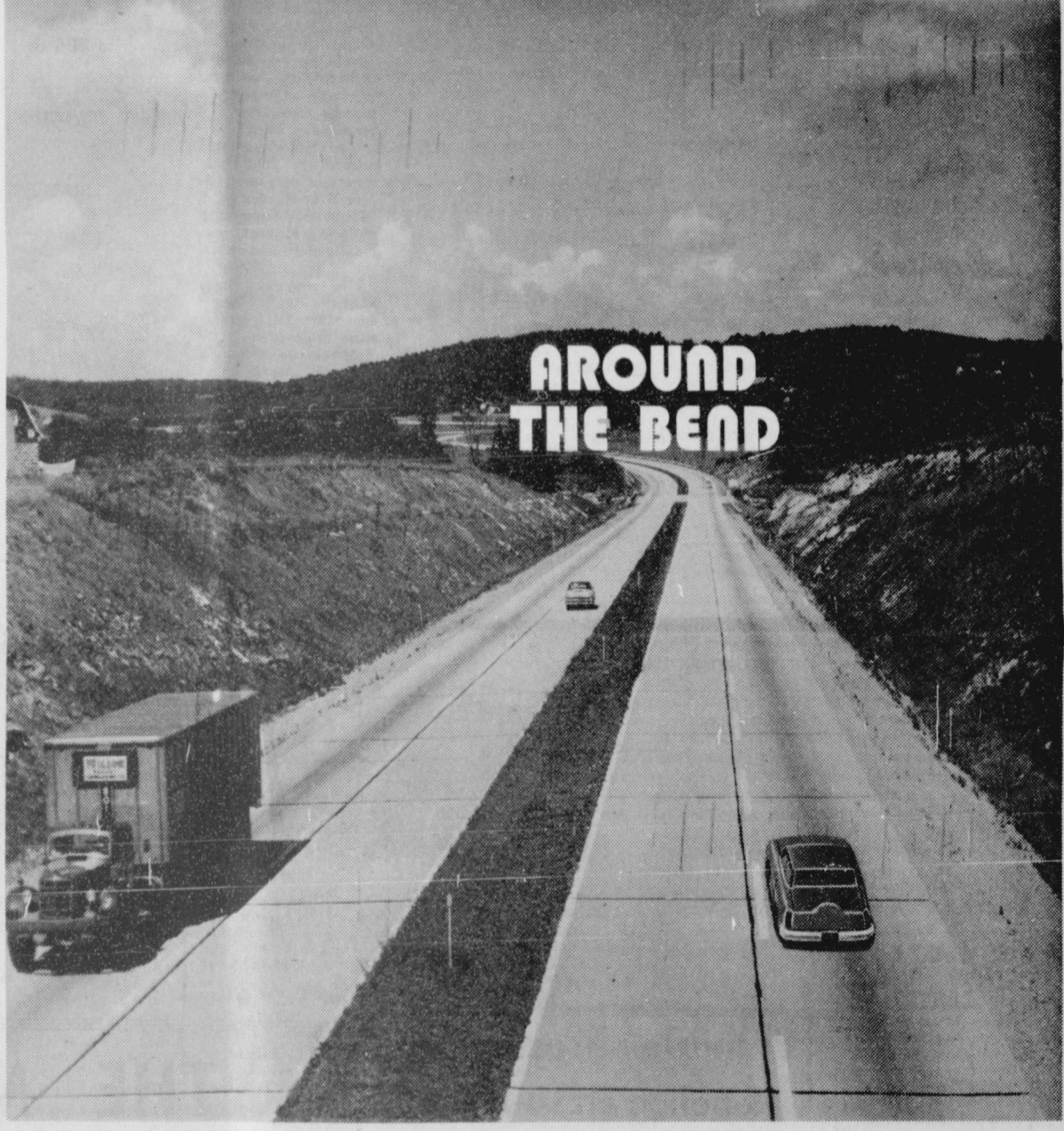

On June 29 in Milford, Michigan, the U.S. Postal Service issued a commemorative stamp calling attention to the International Year of Disabled Persons.

The United Nations General Assembly in 1976 designated 1981 as the International Year for Disabled Persons and urged all nations to give attention to measures and programs which would help the disabled.

In issuing the 18-cent Disabled Persons stamp, the United States joins other nations in the worldwide effort to promote education for the prevention of impairments and the encouragement of rehabilitation efforts.

The Milford township marked the 150th anniversary of its founding on June 29, and the first day of issue ceremony for the stamp was held in conjunction with the sesquicentennial celebration.

The stamp was designed by Martha Perske of Darien, Connecticut. This is her first stamp design effort.

Mrs. Perske conducted a series of nationwide interviews with persons having disabilities and professionals who work with them. From these conversations emerged the theme for the stamp design, which depicts a disabled individual in a wheelchair, working alone and unaided with a sophisticated microscope.

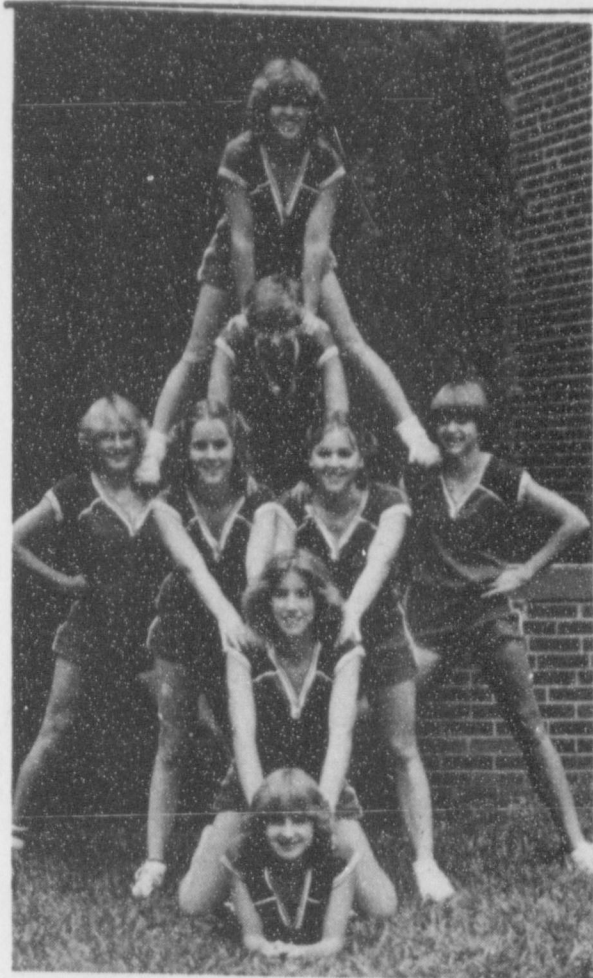

## Lubbock Experiment Station Plans Field Day

LUBBOCK--Research on potential new money crops, as well as on cotton, and scientific developments to help High Plains farmers cope with weeds, insects and weather will be demonstrated September 8 at the 72nd annual field day of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station (TAES) at Lubbock and Halfway.

The Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center just north of Lubbock International Airport is the host this year, said Dr. Bill Ott, resident director of the station. The annual program alternates between the facilities here and at Halfway, in cooperation with the High Plains Research Foundation.

Five major displays are planned on the tours of the research plots and facilities of the center on FM 1294 at I-27 (Amarillo Hwy.). Dr. Tom Archer, research entomologist at the center and field day chairman, said they will illustrate research being conducted on

grapes, cotton, ways of combating drought conditions, weed control and bollworm control.

Also featured on the tour will be tests being conducted at the center on crop varieties, soil fertility and insect control; stations where research scientists and Extension specialists can answer questions about irrigation and fertilization, and a display of equipment and machinery.

Tours will begin at 1:00 p.m. and end at 5:00 p.m. The field day is a cooperative presentation of TAES, the High Plains Research Foundation, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Agricultural Research Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Professional staffs of these participating agencies will be on hand to answer questions and discuss problems with agricultural producers, home owners and gardeners, Archer said.

## Hightower Report

WASHINGTON--Calling charges that the American people resent guaranteeing social security recipients a minimum benefit floor "nonsense", Congressman Jack Hightower today said he was pleased at yesterday's House vote on the subject of social security. The House of Representatives voted 405-12 to oppose a cut in the minimum \$122 social security benefit provided present retirees. The resolution established the House's renewed opposition to such cuts tentatively and hurriedly passed earlier this month as part of the Reagan budget cuts package.

Although many members were opposed to cutting the benefit floor earlier, there was only a brief opportunity to amend the legislation then and that failed on a voice vote to recommit the bill to committee. The social security provision was a very small item in the complicated and lengthy budget reconcil-

ation package.

"If our social security system is in such delicate shape that taking benefits out of the pockets of the elderly and the truly needy now is the only way to save it, then we are in much greater trouble than we think," Hightower told the House in urging adoption of the resolution on the floor during debate and in comments afterward.

"We've simply got to maintain at least a minimum floor because for many people, that is their only margin of survival," Hightower explained today in a post-mortem discussion. "I think we can do a better job of screening to make sure that minimum amount goes only to those who need it," Hightower said. "We've just got to have that floor, however. To remove it from present recipients is irresponsible social policy."

Hightower was one of the majority who voted for the resolution sponsored by Rep. Jim Wright of Ft. Worth.

## Farm Safety Week

July 25 - 31

Farmers and ranchers across the state will observe Farm Safety Week July 25-31.

Both President Reagan and Gov. Clements have signed proclamations designating this week for emphasis on farm safety activities, points out Jim Smith, County Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Theme for the weeklong observance is "Enjoy Life-Safely."

Farm Safety Week, sponsored by the National Safety Council, Texas Safety Associ-

ation and the state Cooperative Extension Services is supported by many organizations serving agriculture. These organizations are asking farmers and ranchers nationwide to assist in their efforts to reduce accidents and to promote safety in all recreation.

All accidents involving Texas Farm and ranch residents accounted for more than 400 fatalities and nearly 38,000 disabling injuries in 1980, points out Smith. Agricultural work-related accidents claimed about 200 lives and caused about 20,000 disabling injuries.

Ten percent of all agricultural accidents occur in Texas.

Total cost of accidents to Texas Farm and ranch people exceeded one-half billion dollars last year while the figure topped \$5 billion nationally, adds Jim.

Farm Safety Week is designed to call attention to both leisure-time and work safety as a necessary part of efforts to control off-the-job, profit-eating accident losses, says Smith.

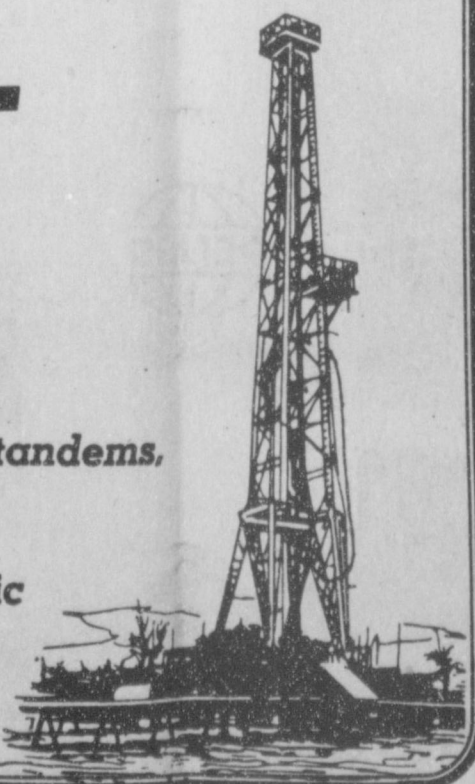

Dr. Reif is a native of New

Mexico. He attended New Mexico State University, and received his veterinary degree from Colorado State University in 1974. Before coming to Dalhart, Dr. Reif practiced in Clayton, New Mexico.
