10 Arrested On Drug Possession

Sheriff R. L. McFarlin reports that the Sheriff's Department arrested 10 persons for possession of illicit drugs and marijuana.

Arrested and charged with possession of Marijuana Wednesday, was one juvenile and one adult. The adult was Tito V. Martinez who is 20 years old and gives his address as Spearman.

Five persons were arrested during a road-block operation south of Spearman. Arrested were: Timmy Cook, age 17; Denaro Martinez, age 17; Edward C. Gemmer, age 23; Henry James Bentley, age 18; and one juvenile of Spearman. All were charged with possession

of Marijuana in County Court.

A Spearman man and his wife were arrested Thursday morning after a search of their residence revealed that they had a quantity of marijuana in their possession. Arrested were Steve Nemsgerm, age 26; and his wife Tina Nemsgerm, age 20, who give a 307 1/2 South Dressen Street as their address.

Arrested Thursday night following a search of his residence was Steve Hen-

drickson of Spearman who had a large amount of marijuana in his possession. Also found in Hendrickson's residence was an assortment of illicit dangerous drugs.

Smoking pipes, cigarette rolling devices and other smoking equipment was found during the recent drug arrests in Spearman.

Assisting Sheriff Office officials was Gruver Chief of Police, Jim Ratliff. The following were charged in county court with

possession of marijuana: Steve Nemsgerm, \$300.00 fine, \$30.80 court costs, 1 year probation; Tina Nemsgerm, \$300.00 fine, \$30.80 court costs, 1 year probation; Tito V. Martinez, \$300.00 fine, \$30.80 court costs; Genero (Levi) Martinez, \$300.00 fine, \$30.80 court costs; Henry James Bentley, \$300.00 fine, \$30.80 court costs; Edward Cordell Gemmer, \$300.00 fine, \$30.80 court costs, 2 months probation; Timmy Cook, \$100.00 fine, \$30.80 court costs, 6 months probation.

Steve Hendrickson has not been arraigned at news time.

163 Residents Take Glaucoma Test

The Free Glaucoma Screening program held Thursday evening, April 24, 1975 at the First United Methodist Church Fellowship Hall was attended by 163 residents of Spearman and surrounding areas.

Of that number, 13 adults 35 years of age and over were found to have symptoms of glaucoma. They learned they had increased pressure within

their eyes, one of the early danger signals of this blinding disease and were advised to seek further medical examination.

During the two hour period, local medical doctors, members of the Top O' Texas Medical Society administered the tests, assisted by nurses, members of the Texas Graduate Nurses Association, serving as a public service.

Sponsors of the screening were the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness and the Spearman Lions Club. Members of the Lions Club, the wives and members of the Spearman Chamber of Commerce participated in the program as volunteers.

The disease is responsible for one in every eight cases of blindness. Sight destroyed by glaucoma cannot be restored; however, if

medical treatment is begun early, in most cases the disease can be arrested and the victim's vision saved.

Rites Held For Irene Close

Funeral services were held at the First Christian Church here Saturday, April 26, 1975 for Mrs. Irene Close, 65, who passed away Thursday at 8 p. m. in Hansford Hospital after a long illness.

Mrs. Close was born Feb. 21, 1910 in the Black Community, Ochiltree County. She married Marion Close on August 6, 1927. She had been a resident of this area all her life. Her husband Marion died in 1972.

She was a member of the First Christian Church of Spearman.

She is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Idella Randall of Spearman; three sons, Billy of Spearman, Bob of Ft. Gibson, Okla., Darrell of New Orleans, La.; three sisters, Mrs. Ethel Cookston and Mrs. Holly Riley of Spearman and Mrs. Edith Ferguson of Stinnett; 15 grandchildren and 9 great grandchildren.

Out of just 155 surveyed, 114 preschool children would benefit. This survey shows a definite need for a Day Care Center in Spearman.

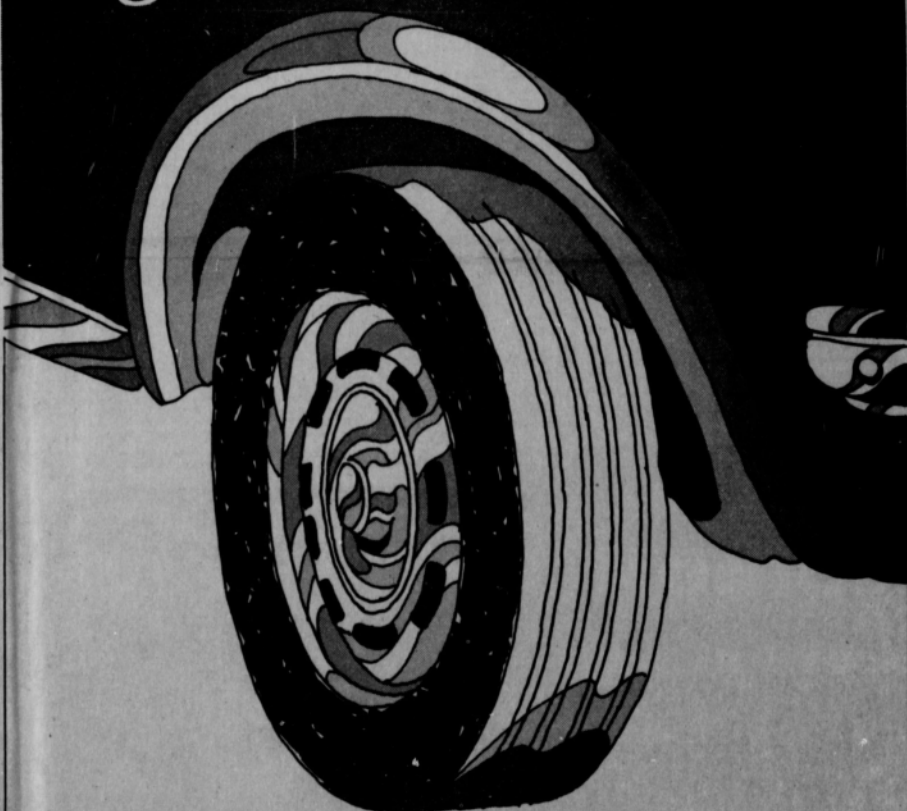

International Wheat Council staff members in London are the accepted authority on the prediction of supply and demand of the world's most important grain. According to the predictions of the Council, the 1974-75 wheat crop may total nearly 13 billion bushels with as much as 2.2 billion produced from the winter wheat crop in the United States. Council members also predict this year's consumption of wheat will exceed the 13 billion bushel production. Excess demand this year apparently can be satisfied with surpluses produced by the 1973-74 record world wheat crop of 13.6 billion bushels. Significant to area wheat growers is the indication by the Wheat Council that although production remains high, demand seems to be growing at an even faster rate.

Athletic Banquet Speaker Named



DAL SHEALY

The speaker for the annual athletic banquet scheduled for May 13 at 7:30 p.m. at the high school cafeteria has been selected. He is Dal Shealy, Assistant Head Coach at Baylor.

Shealy has the same game plan in life as he does in his profession, live the Golden Rule, work hard and never be satisfied with yesterday's achievements.

The 36-year-old ex-Marine officer, who once removed five starting players from his Carson-Newman College squad the week of the national NIAA championship game for disciplinary reasons, knows no compromise to principles. On the football field

Shealy is an innovative thinker, an expert tactician and a man who gets the ultimate from his players. Among his achievements at Baylor was the devising of a "Power Runner" machine made of automobile tires that was credited with cutting fumbles by 50 per cent in a single season and developing Baylor's first 1,100 yard runner, all-SWC Tailback Steve Beaird.

Shealy and Head Coach Grant Teaff have much in common. Both are strict disciplinarians, both are sound with fundamental football knowledge and both are nationally-known Baptist lay speakers.

Shealy played high school football at Batesville, S.C., where he was all-state guard and captain of the football, basketball and baseball teams and the senior class president. He was a four-year starter at guard and linebacker at Carson-Newman, making Tri-State all-star honors twice and honorable mention All-American. He graduated in 1960 and went into the Marine Corps as a lieutenant, playing on the national champion service team at Quantico and in the Missile Bowl and Leatherneck Bowl. After discharge from the service he became head football and track coach at Laurens, S.C., High School where he won three conference track titles and in 1962 posted the first winning football season in eight years in the school.

In 1965 he went to Marrs Hill College as assistant football coach and head track coach, and then returned to Carson-Newman the next year as offensive line coach and head track coach. In 1968 Shealy returned to Marrs Hill as head coach, and in 1970 was called back to Carson-Newman as head coach. In 1972 his record compiled a 10-2 record and was No. 2 ranked in the nation. He was named "Citizen of the Year" by Jefferson City Chamber of Commerce. His overall record at Carson-Newman was 31-13.

In 1971 and 1972 he was honored as the NISA "Football Coach of the Year" and NAA "Track Coach of the Year" in 1968. He has had 10 football players to sign professional contracts and turned out four all-American performers.

National Conservation Agency Established 40 Years Ago

Washington--In an atmosphere of national emergency resulting from violent dust storms in the south and midwest, President Roosevelt today signed Public Law No. 46, directing Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace to establish an agency to be known as the Soil Conservation Service to provide for the protection of land and water resources.

Under the new legislation, the Secretary of Agriculture has broad authority to conduct survey, investigations, and research for the control of erosion by wind and water. He is authorized to conduct demonstration projects, to carry out a wide range of preventive operations and to give aid to private persons and public agencies.

Secretary Wallace immediately issued a Departmental Memorandum establishing the Soil Conservation Service in the Department of Agriculture. He named Hugh Hammond Bennett, Director of the Soil Erosion Service, Department of the Interior, Chief of the New Agency. Bennett has led a dedicated campaign for several years for a national program to control soil erosion. He has traveled and spoken throughout the country to make professional workers, farmers, and the general public understand the danger of Soil Erosion on Agricultural Land.

A native of Anson County in the Piedmont North Carolina, Bennett is a

graduate of the University of North Carolina. He joined the USDA Bureau of Soils in 1903, and was made Director of the Soil Erosion Service, Department of the Interior, in 1933. He is the Author of several technical papers, including the USDA Circular 33, "Soil Erosion, a National Menace."

This is probably a familiar story to many residents of Hansford County. You can remember the dust bowl days and problems of that era.

During the past 40 years a great deal has been accomplished by your work and cooperation with the Soil Conservation Service.

We will continue to dedicate ourselves to conservation of our land and water.

A very successful kill of dandelions and other weeds was accomplished last week in City parks and other city property by application of 2-4-D weed killer by commercial weed sprayer. The secret of success is to apply spray on warm days.

Home flower gardener hints: apply a root stimulator to all newly planted plants, roses, holly, trees etc. This reduces the shock of transplanting and gets new plants off to a much better start.

Another problem for home flower gardeners is if you plant roses, small trees, shrubbery etc. near concrete that is five years or less in age poor growth is the usual result. The trouble results because the walk, curb, foundation etc. causes soil to be very acid. To counter this frequent application of iron feeding is most effective. Liquid iron is the best.

Applications may be secured at the City Hall.

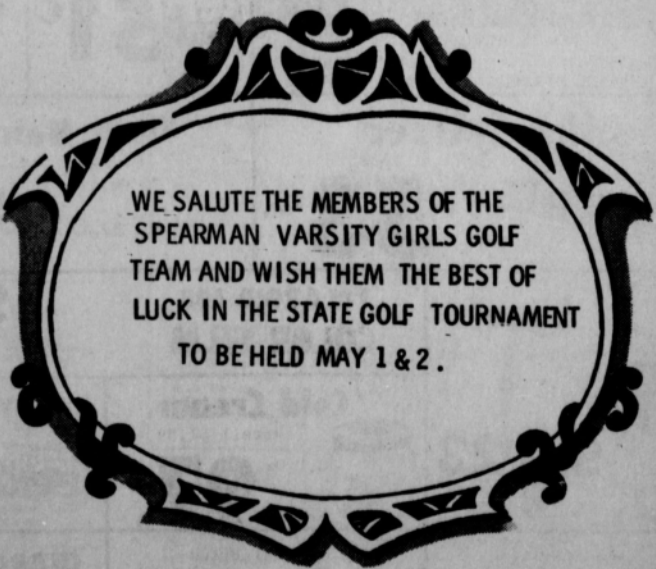

LONG CORDS - UNSAFE

In New Hampshire recently, a mother was brewing hot coffee in an electric coffee pot on the kitchen table. The lengthy cord stretched along the floor to an outlet on a nearby counter. Unknowingly, her three-year-old tripped on the cord and received permanent burn damage over a large portion of his body from the scalding coffee. According to a recent report from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, thousands of accidents per year are attributed to entanglements in appliance cords.

As a result, Underwriters' Laboratories, the watchdog of the nation's electrical safety codes,

revised its standards to provide coffee-makers and other liquid heaters with cords that are a minimum of 2 feet and maximum of 3 feet long. This should greatly decrease the number of household burn accidents. Take a hint: If you're using a cord that's overlong, shorten it for your own safety.

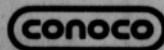

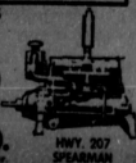

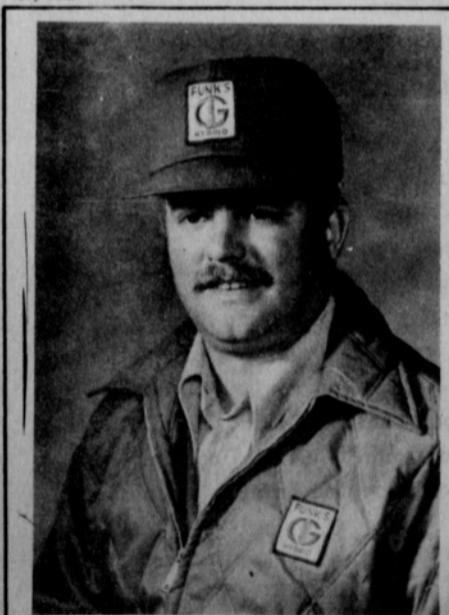
