

## **Booker Scores Twice On Lynx Starters**

Quick scoring bursts gave the Spearman Lynx a 42-14 win over the stubborn Booker Kio-

was here Friday night. The out-manned, but stub-born Kiowas, led by Jay Tros-per and Butch Henton, never gave up and scored twice on the Lynx first unit. Spearman scored the first.

time they got the ball when Ken Shufeldt got outside the Booker defense and outran the defender to the end zone from 16 yards out. Dave Clement kicked the extra point with Larry Butts holding.

The touchdown was set up The touchdown was set up when Booker's Trosper tried a running quick kick from his own 24. He kicked the ball into one of his blockers and it bounded back to the 10. Trosper recovered it there and ran it to the Lynx 16 before being swarmed under.

Four plays after the kick-off, Shufeldt intercepted a Trosper pass at the Booker 25, Booker got the ball back on the first play when they took it away from Clement as he was tackled on a keeper play.

Booker picked up one first down before having to punt from their own 41. This time Trosper put the ball to the

Lynx 16. Shufeldt and Clayton Coch-ran picked up two quick first downs, then Butts broke free over the right side and raced 59 yards to score. He and Clement again added the point after touchdown with a perfect place kick.

Booker got their first touch-down on the first play of the second quarter when Butts got off a 44 yard punt which Tros-per took on his own five.

The 125 pound quarterback took the hall straight up the
