For conservation . . .

USDA schedules second signup

Washington, April 17-Farmers who want bid to enter their highly erodible cropland into USDA's conservation reserve program may do so during the program's second signup period, May 5-16.

Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng said producers will be offered the option to bid for a conservation reserve program contract beginning with either the 1986 or 1987 crop year.

For contracts which are effective immediately, annual payments will be made beginning Oct. 1, 1986. Producers can not harvest any 1986 crop planted on land to be placed in the program. Any producer who has had or will have a crop mechanically removed from the designated area is ineligible for a 1986 contract.

For contracts which become effective on Oct. 1, 1986, or later, producers will be allowed to harvest their 1986 crop, and no annual payments will be made before Oct. 1, 1987.

USDA will establish maximum acceptable rental rates after the end of the signup and bid data

have been evaluated. Additional signup dates for the 1987 crop year will be announced

for the 1986 signup, designated cropland may be grazed until the Commodity Credit Corporation enters into a conservation reserve program contract with the producer and notifies him that livestock must be removed to comply with contract provisions.

Land that is designated for 1987 contracts may not be grazed after Oct. 1, 1986.

Agricultural stabilization and conservation state committees may re-establish pool boundaries for the second signup period.

The only acreage limitation that applies for the second signup is that a maximum of 25 percent of the cropland in a county may be entered into the program.

During the first signup period, which ran March 3-15, 838,356 acres of highly erodible cropland were entered into the conservation reserve program. Accepted bids ranged from \$5 to \$90 per acre, and the average bid was \$41.82 per acre.

Mr. Vela was born in Rio Grande City and lived in the Spearman area 20 years. He was a farmer and a member of Sacred Heart Catholic Church. He was



Falwell's Point

The Rev. Jerry Falwell, disgusted with the hostility he has encountered among so many American publications, toward evangelists, has announced the founding of the Christian antidefamation league.

He says those who defame evangelists and fundamentalists will be asked to account for their words and "bigotry." Falwell hopes to enlist hundreds of evangelical ministers and millions of Americans in this Liberty Federation effort.

Falwell has met with the editorial boards of most of the country's major publications, the overwhelming majority liberal and hostile. He cites cases such as Newsweek magazine, which, he says, has a religious editor

openly hostile to evangelists. Citing the power of such organizations as the Jewish antidefamation league, Falwell says the sixty to seventy million American Christian fundamentalists ought to have a similar organization. (There are an estimated 8 million Jews in the

U.S.) Falwell charges current hostility to the possible presidential candidacy of Pat Robertson is typical of the prejudice fundamentalists encounter these days

in the media. Why didn't anyone raise a voice against a clergyman running in 1984 when the Rev. Jackson was a candidate? He says that's because Jackson is a

liberal. He seeks to end this double standard with the new Christian anti-defamation league. The league will monitor the print and broadcast media and use the economic boycott if necessary, to gain fair treatment and respect.

Falwell's appeal reaches home to many Americans, especially when he cites examples of legal actions liberal groups regularly take against traditions in schools, cities and counties connected, even indirectly, with Christmas or the Christian religion.

If an active, effective Christian anti-defamation league emerges from this effort, it will have a major impact on political campaigns and candidates in the future. Whether one agrees to all the specifics accepted by fundamentalists, recent history shows that Christians sustain and support a moral, and uplifting way of life. Thus, unless one can offer something better, demeaning fundamentalists is destructive of U.S. society and many of its finer characteristics.







Following the air strike of five Libyan targets, President Reagan appeared on television regularly for several days. In these appearances he was greeted by cheering audiences; the president smiled back like a hero.

One feels this behavior about a strike that unintentionally killed a large number of civilians a bit misplaced.

The air strike was a regrettable necessity, employed as the lesser of two evils--doing nothing and encouraging terrorists or using force and death to deter terrorists. It was a demonstration of courage and skill by U.S. military forces.

Grim determination and regret that such a step was found desirable were the proper tone and demeanor. Mr. Reagan boasted that Colonel Qaddafi had found he wasn't toying with a toothless tiger. In effect, he seemed to relish the success of the military operation and his having ordered it.

Time will reveal whether such military strikes deter the terrorists. Meanwhile, the nation hopes so, and mourns the loss of two aircrewmen who did their duty and paid with their lives. Their loss, in itself, should muffle the cheers, grins and hurrahs.
