For Palo Duro lake . . .

Board votes 'go-ahead'

A \$24 million project to build a dam and impound a municipal water supply reservoir on the Palo Duro Creek in Hansford county was given the go-ahead by the Palo Duro River authority board of directors at a Tuesday afternoon meeting in Spearman.

The 9-member board agreed unanimously to go ahead with the project. All nine members, representing Moore county, Hansford county and the City of Stinnett, were present. Four directors are from Moore county.

A water supply project for the North Plains, the development will be in two phases.

The first will be construction of the dam with 50 percent participation in the project by the Texas Water Development Board. Second phase will

be construction of a water treatment and distribution pipeline system to cities of Dumas, Sunray, Cactus, Gruver, Spearman and Stinnett.

"The board gave us the go-ahead Tuesday," reports Johnnie Lee of Spearman, PDRA manager. "Unless something - a problem - hits us, we will proceed with getting estimates together for a May 15 meeting with the state water development commission."

PDRA officials working with the Texas Water Development board staff will present a Palo Duro lake development project using both state funds and river authority financing.

Lee has explained that the water board staff proposes to "buy" half of the 4,900-foot long earthen dam from the sale of Texas Water Plan bonds.

The state funds will amount to a low-interest loan. The PDRA would then be able to "buy out" the state share of the lake at a later date.

The PDRA would finance its portion of the construction project with tax bonds voted by the district.

The proposed reservoir would impound 60,900 acre feet of water behind a 118-foot tall dam. The lake would have a surface area of 2,500 acres.

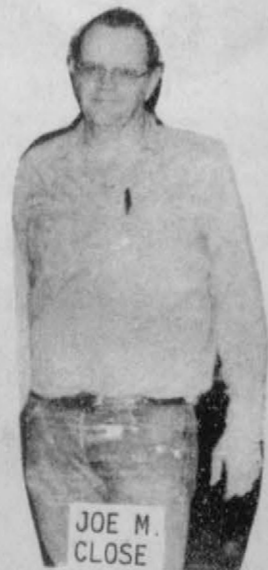
Land areas surrounding the lake would be developed for recreation.

Construction of the Palo Duro lake dam could be the first project funded by the Texas Water Plan, approved last November by state residents. It would serve as a model project for the water development board.

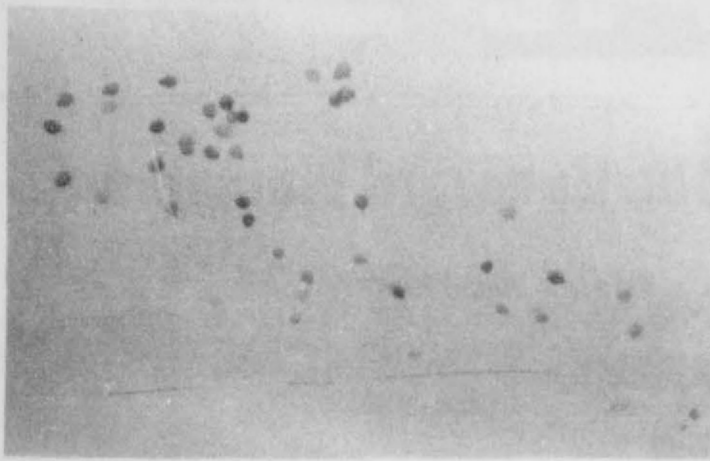

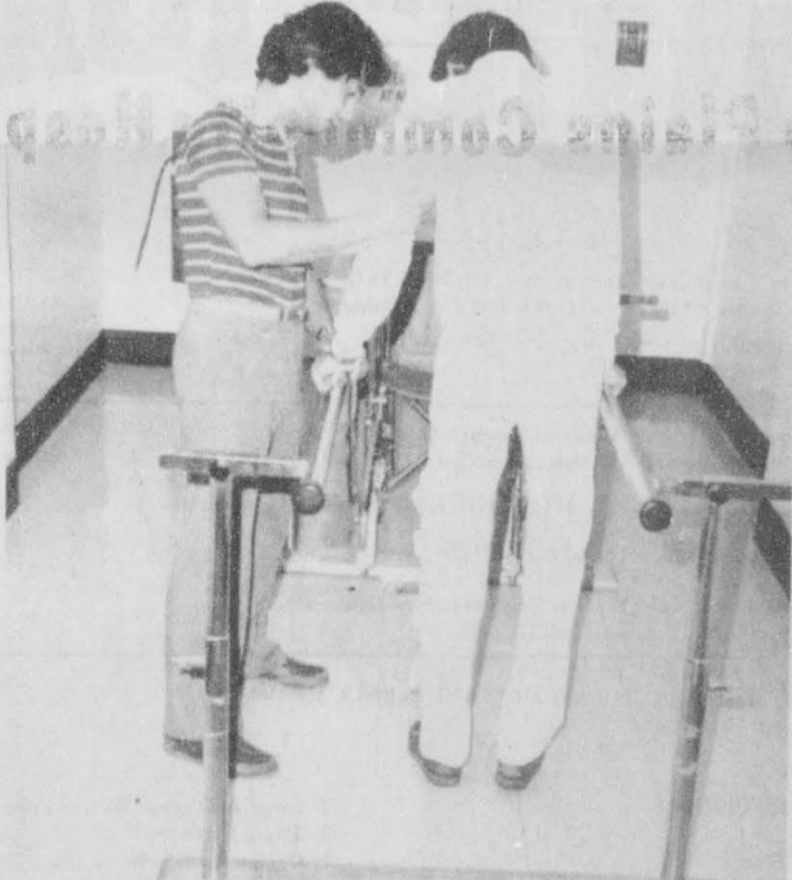
