

Former Pastor Writes From Uganda

Never have we been so far from home to still be at home-Plot 4, Impala Ave. Kampala, Uganda, Box 1734.

The Rev. Russell Pogue, former pastor of First Baptist Church, Spearman, and his wife are presently in the Third World country of Uganda on an extended missionary tour.

The Pogues are realizing a dream they held for the time he would retire as an active pastor and they have shared some of these "dream-come-true" experiences in the following letter sent from Uganda . . .

Here we are in the heart of Africa. We find people are the same all over the world-school kids skip, babies cry, high schoolers hold hands, girls wear high heel shoes, and young adults get married. Every high school boy, none of whom can afford a car, is trying to save enough money to buy and fix up a used bicycle which could cost as much as 8500 schillings. A part-time job will pay a boy about 1000 schillings per month. This page of paper would cost 5 schillings and a package of 200 sheets would cost about 1000 schillings or \$12.50, U.S. money.

There are some differences, the women carry all the household loads, including wood or charcoal, which they use in cooking. Last week we saw an older woman with a large basket, well filled on her head, as she walked, she was holding her back with both hands. We were led to believe that her back was aching. Men always walk in front, with the woman following by three or four steps. Often she has a baby strapped to her back and a load on her head.

If you have been worrying about our food, don't waste your time. We went to the market and found fresh lettuce, cabbage, okra, tomatoes, beans, carrots, pineapple at about the same price as we paid in the States. Peanuts are a bargain and tree-ripe bananas are the best, and cheap. Our meat has to come from Kenya.

On Friday, April 3, we travelled to Jinja over 50 miles of very rough roads to the east. We saw monkeys hanging from the telephone wires. No wonder the telephone service is so poor, with all this monkeying around. Russel had made an earlier trip to Jinja and had seen some baboons beside the road. While in Jinja, we went to Bujabugoli Falls, the Head of the Nile. Never have we seen so much swift water in our lives. This is where the water flows out of Lake Victoria into the Nile River. Five miles down-stream is Uganda's hydro-electric plant, the source of our electricity.

The rainy season began on March 28. The farmers are busy planting corn, sweet potatoes, ground nuts (peanuts to you), and other crops. Matoke is a staple in the national diet. It is green bananas, peeled, stewed, mashed and served with a sauce of some kind. It is almost tasteless and very gummy. But very filling. They all like it like Americans like mashed potatoes.

Flowers are everything beautiful. Trees are blooming, birds are galore, and here in Kampala, there must be at least one barking dog for every two people. We are home by 7:00 p.m. as are all people, regardless of age, except troublemakers. We change into lounging clothes. No company, no meetings, no phone calls. The sun goes down about 6:47 p.m. and rises about 6:47 a.m. We are less than 30 miles north of the equator, our altitude, about 4000 feet above sea level provides ideal weather. Nights are cool, and a sheet and light cover feels good. The days are pleasant, 78-85 and slightly humid.

Meet our missionaries, Dr. Rick Goodgame and his wife Susan from Houston and Florida. He teaches in the medical school in Makerere University. They have five children who call us aunt and uncle. Rick is one of our elders in the church.

Larry and Sharon Pumpelly are from Ohio, and they have two children. He teaches in the Religion department in the University and directs the Baptist student work there.

Jim and Linda Rice are from Virginia. He is the business manager for the Baptist mission of Uganda. She is the director of the Bible Way Correspondence School. More than 4000 are enrolled in this school. This is one of the most far reaching works of our missionaries.

Sunday, March 14 was our first Sunday here. After a good morning of Bible study and worship, a covered dish churchwide luncheon was spread under the trees in our front yard. It was a real welcoming event under the blooming Camel's Foot tree. We got our first taste of real African food. Matoke, fish sauce, ground nut sauce, white yams, rice and many other things too many to name. Russell and I ate plenty. But you should have seen the amount that these little men and all these college boys could consume. We have also been invited into several homes for a meal. It is quite exciting.

Many of you gave us supplies to bring with us. Our new church home, Valley Mills supplied so many wonderful things and the cash to bring them here. The crates have arrived in perfect condition and they have been unpacked and taken apart. Some of the wood and nails have already been re-used. How can we ever thank God enough for each of you.

April 4th the Kampala Baptist church installed their "new pastor and wife". The program was wonderful and missionaries, Baptist Union President, Executive Secretary and National Pastors came for the service. Never has such a service been held for the installation of this pastor. After the charge to the church and to the pastor, the members came by and laid their hands on us and prayed with us. We have never felt so close to our Lord.

Two missionary couples from the Ugandan Mission will leave on furlough in August, and then in January, another couple, our neighbors, the Rices, will leave. That will leave only three couples and this pair of volunteers to cover the nation of Uganda. Never have we seen the need for the living of the applied gospel before as here. Almost everyone has a Christian name...Moses, Elijah, Paul, Methuselah, Sara, Mary, Naomi... but living the life that has been changed by the power of God is not known by very many.

Some of the people came on public transportation as far as 200 miles for the installation and fellowship meal. We are simply overwhelmed by our reception. We are really having a wonderful

City council: 'A' (airport) to 'Z' (zoning)!

In a longer-than-usual session, Tuesday night, members of the Spearman city council considered a number of agenda items from A-Airport to Z-Zoning.

A public hearing on the zoning matters was almost at the top of the agenda. Under consideration was a re-zoning request involving lots five and six, block 22, original town, Hansford County and the south part of lot eight and the southwest part of lot nine, block six, original town, Hansford County.

One would permit the location of mobile homes for rental in a predominately residential neighborhood and the other would permit construction a quasi-modular unit containing two or three rental units in a predominately business area.

There were no objections to these zoning changes and they were approved by the council.

Involved in this agenda item also was ordinance number 487 amending chapter 14, planning and zoning of the Spearman municipal zoning code by amending certain district boundaries on the zoning map of the city of Spearman and providing an effective date.

This ordinance was approved the effective date was June 8.

When an item to authorize the mayor to enter into an agreement with the Hansford County Appraisal District for the collection of the 1982 tax roll, whether or not this had been already enacted was questioned. City Manager Jim Murray pointed out that the first action was simply the decision to let the district do it so it could be ascertained how many entities would participate, thereby fixing cost estimates. The action sought Tuesday night was the actual authorization. It was approved.

The council also extended the contract with the Spearman Independent School District for the collection of delinquent taxes from prior years. Again Murray explained that the Appraisal District would not become involved with collection of delinquent taxes until the year 1983 and would involve 1982 delinquencies.

Members of the council also approved a contract between the city and Johnny Gaither for labor expended at the sanitary landfill. Gaither, an employee of the county, has been doing this work on a spare time basis. The existence of such a contract removes him from the role of city employee and removes the city from certain liability responsibilities of this job.

The certified public accounting firm of Mason and Henton were appointed by the panel to do the city's 1981-82 audit. The firm's estimated cost for this service for this period was \$5,000. When members of the council commented on the low figure, the city manager made two explanations for it. First, an agreement with the firm must be based on an estimate. The CPA firm is classed with engineering firms and other such professionals and cannot submit a bid.

Murray also pointed out that assumption of the taxing burden by the Appraisal District takes a considerably onerous task away from the auditing firm.

Following discussion of a request by H and S Emergency

Medical Service for four-channel radios for ambulances, the matter was tabled for a time. Purpose of the four-channel sets would allow H and S emergency service crews and ambulances to go to the aid of other cities and counties in the event of a major disaster.

At present, ambulance radios have only medical service contact capabilities. The four-channel units would permit communication with law enforcement agencies without going through the Spearman Police Department dispatching switch board.

Mayor Ralph Blodgett suggested the tabling move to give him time to see if any financial help toward the purchase was available through the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission. He said he felt -- and the

was joined by the other councilmen -- since these were for service to a large area of the Texas Panhandle, the city should not have to stand the entire cost of them.

The council approved another partial payment of \$11,583.90 to Gifford Electric Inc. for work done in constructing airport lighting. City Manager Murray noted that this was a valid payment and usual practice in such cases.

Then the matter of a daily rental rate for T-hangars at the new municipal airport came before the council immediately reeking of old worms in a long-opened can. The subject of a daily rate was placed on the agenda Tuesday night after it came up in the discussion of "other" at the last regular

council session.

Initially, hangar rental has been on a three-year lease-purchase contract. However, the question of weather protection for transient planes came up and it was felt it would create a bad image for the city if there was no such protection made available.

At this point, the item and its consideration was aimed at visiting aircraft, but . . .

From the audience came an immediate criticism of the three-year plan and of the daily rental fee if it was extended to local plane owners. Criticism was also extended to the quality of the hangars.

Basically, councilmen stuck by their guns on the amount of daily rental but did agree they would not oppose a further

study of the hangar rental question. However, it was pointed out to those in the audience that short term rentals other than a day-to-day basis for visitors would require an airport administrative staff which was not budgeted and would, therefore, have the effect of making the city manager and his staff "room clerks and bellhops" for a flyovers motel.

As this discussion became more protracted time-wise

while moving in a tight circle accomplishment-wise, one of the councilmen pointed out that nothing could be acted upon Tuesday night but a daily rate for visitors since that was the only thing duly posted for the agenda.

The airport discussion ended then with all members of the

council agreeable to "going back to the drawing board" with hangar rentals.

Routine reports from the various city departments were considered and approved and all bills were approved and allowed for payment.

The next regular meeting of the council will be June 22.

B & T drill bits recovered

After a 50-hour non-stop cross-country surveillance and stake-out, Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin and Lee Phillips, security officer for Baker and Taylor Drilling Company, participated in a raid at Oklahoma City that netted some

\$32,000 worth of drill bits and two suspects in their theft.

Members of the Oklahoma City Police Department crime unit, including a surveillance helicopter, assisted the two Hansford County officers.

The majority of the recovered

bits had been stolen from Baker and Taylor at Spearman. Oklahoma authorities expect other arrests and another sizeable recovery within the next few days.

Neal Rosencrane, 34, Grand Junction, Colo., will be returned

here to face charges of theft over \$200.

Holly Waitman, Oklahoma City, was jailed there at the same time Rosencrane was arrested. He was charged with receiving stolen property and putting it up for resale. The drill bits and other pieces of stolen oilfield equipment were being sold out of Waitman's warehouse when the arrests were made.

A tip came to Hansford County after three other subjects were arrested at Oklahoma City last week with stolen drill bits in their possession. This information was valuable when McFarlin and Phillips, "tailing" their quarry with a truckload of drill bits taken from Baker and Taylor, lost the trail at Borger.

Acting on the Oklahoma City surmise, they regained sight of the truck near Elk City, Okla., and followed it to Oklahoma City where the crime unit there helped follow the suspect to lodgings and then to the warehouse.

Sheriff McFarlin said other arrests planned in the near future by Oklahoma authorities

should net some more of Baker and Taylor's missing equipment.

A white 1980 Chevrolet pickup truck belonging to Dr. Tom Latta and taken from the animal clinic May 4, has been recovered by the Ventura County, California sheriff and a suspect is being held for Hansford County.

A Jackie Cathey and a Richard Baudette were in the stolen pickup when sheriff's officers gave chase. Baudette escaped on foot but Cathey was taken in custody when he stopped the vehicle for officers. The white truck had been painted black and a crude attempt had been made to alter the identification number.

Cathey signed an extradition waiver and will be returned to Hansford County to face charges of auto theft and forgery. Sheriff McFarlin said he anticipated that additional charges may be lodged against Cathey after he has been returned from California.

The Hansford County Sheriff's Department also has the usual number of routine investigations underway.

Wind Erosion

TEMPLE, TEXAS. Wind damaged 1.6 million acres of land in Texas during the December to May blow season, the U.S. Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service reported this week.

George C. Marks, state conservationist for SCS, said this was a decrease from 1.9 million acres damaged during the last two years.

Counties reporting the most wind erosion were Cochran County with 95,400 acres; Gaines County, 95,000 acres; Wilbarger County, 85,750 acres; and Dickens County with 75,300 acres. Hansford County had approximately 5,000 acres of cropland damaged which represents about 2% of the cropland in the county.

Marks said erosion would have been much higher this year had it not been for conservation tillage farming systems carried out by many farmers.

SCS defines damaged land as that where soil removal or deposition by wind erosion has been enough to subject it to further erosion.

FNB celebrates 75 years

Senior Citizens get 'lift'

More than 1,500 persons stopped in at the First National Bank of Perryton Monday, to wish the bank happy birthday and to get a sneak preview of the ongoing construction and reconstruction of First Place.

Refreshments of pastries and hot drinks and cake and ice cream were served and as a special treat, the bank had a free drawing for two quarter-carat diamonds.

At the ribbon-cutting festivities at 9 a.m., the bank made a special announcement concerning the proposed Senior Citizens Center. Drew Ellis, chairman of the board, announced that the bank would be contributing \$15,000 to the construction of the center. This large sum of money will allow the coming fund drive to get off to an excellent start.

"We believe the Senior Citizens Center will be an important addition to the community," Ellis said afterwards. "It is a major program that deserves the complete support of the area and we're proud to be making one of the first donation pledges."

A crowd of about 75 persons was on hand for the ribbon-cutting, which ushered in a new era, sort of speaking, for the First National Bank. The ribbon consisted of 75 new one dollar bills, spliced together one after another and stretching for better than 37 feet.

Introducing the short observance was Randy Brillhart, senior vice president. Other presentations were made by John Cluck, bank president, Ellis, and Peryton Mayor Quentin Rizley.

Cluck told the crowd that First National Bank was sincerely proud to be a part of the Perryton community and that the bank's strength lies in its customers. Cluck said that the first 75 years of the bank's existence has been memorable and that the future of the bank and the Perryton community looks bright for years to come. He said that FNB has always been committed to progress for Perryton and that posture would not be changing in any way.

After the ribbon-cutting, the crowd filed into the bank to sign up for free gifts and to preview parts of the new building.

Indeed, the new FNB will be a magnificent architectural structure for the Perryton area.

In the belief of a strong Perryton economy and a completely modern facility, the bank's board of directors gave the green light to the \$1.6 million expansion early in 1981. In all, the construction period

will last about a year, with the grand opening scheduled for sometime in early September. The hundreds of people touring the facility Monday realize that the new First Place will be second to none in the small banking business.

Monday's ribbon-cutting and birthday celebration are just the beginnings of a big summer at First National. In August, the bank is bringing to town the touring group of Up With People. In September, the bank

will hold its grand opening, where a week-long celebration is planned.

Throughout the day Monday, people kept streaming into the bank for the excitement and fellowship. The bank extended its hours to 5:30 p.m., which proved to be a good move as interest remained strong until doors closed. It was seen as a fitting tribute to an institution that has been such a vital part of the area since even before Perryton was incorporated.

Weather Watchers pay own way

A spring filled either with violent storms or the threat of them has brought nine people into sharp focus for the rest of the residents of Hansford County and its centers of living, Gruver, Morse and Spearman.

These are the Weather Watchers. Now, when official weather warnings are sounded and storm clouds lower, there are a number of persons who get out and drive around in it on their own. These are the brave and the foolish serving their own curiosity. This story is not about them.

It is about the dedicated. These are the nine official Weather Watchers who started this unique service to their community with official training in recognizing the types of storm cloud formations, their names and their behavior. They have been officially trained to recognize and plot the path of a storm system—and to report all of this accurately to the National Weather Service where technical information from the field is vital to alerting other areas...to law enforcement personnel who must sound the mechanical warnings if needed and to community leaders who must

organize emergency measures if weather violence is inescapable.

Working closely with these Weather Watchers but not a part of this elite corps is the local radio station and its staff who transmit Weather Watcher findings to the general public. Either no one actually remembers the true beginnings of the Weather Watchers or they are covered up in a successful cloak of modesty.

--Be that as it may, the DO exist and function and this is the substance of the organization today.

Don Gross, Gruver businessman, heads the group. The Weather Watchers have their own base radio unit located in the Gross home. There are three other Weather Watchers--Lee Roy Mitchell--from Gruver and Joe Morris from rural Gruver.

Spearman is represented in the corps by John Wilde and by Loyall Turner of rural Spearman.

Then there is Lynn Davis and Scott Davis of Morse.

These Weather Watchers are unpaid. Not only that but they financed and maintain their own base unit. They pay for their own gasoline burned in patrolling vigils they keep while friends and neighbors are safe at home, knowing the task they have undertaken works to main-

tain that safety.

When Sheriff R.L. McFarlin and his staff or the crew at the radio station speak of "our" weather watchers, it is a word of pride, not possession. These nine, Don Gross, Lee Roy Mitchell, O.E. Gammell, Don Evans, Joe Morris, Lynn Davis, Scott Davis, John Wilde and Loyall Turner are their own folks.

They are not heroic people. Perhaps their reason for being as a corps of weather watchers was most aptly defined by one of their number when he said: "Our homes and our families are here, too."
