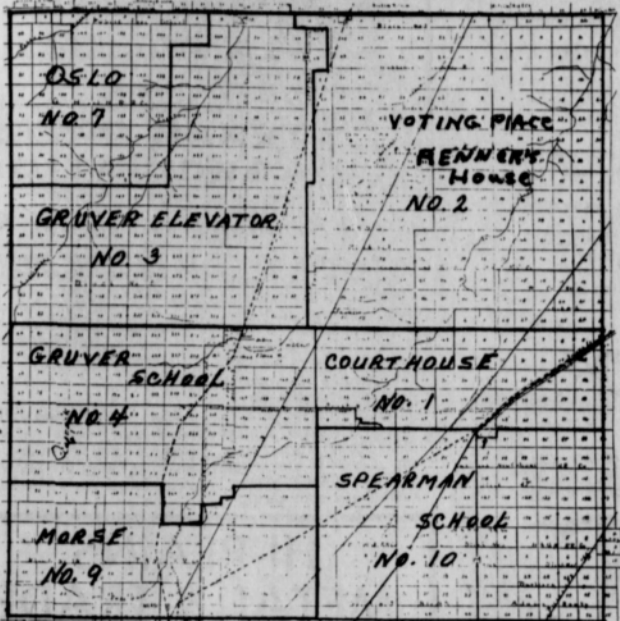
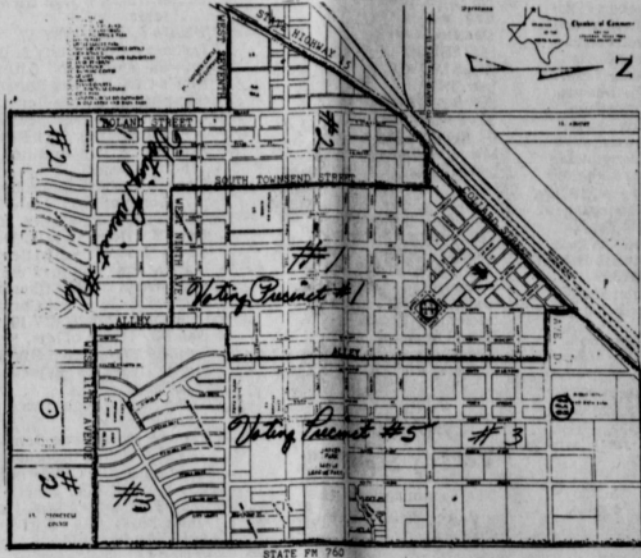


# Commissioners re-districting baffles voters!



In Rural Spearman, Voting Precincts No. 1 and No. 10 were unable to fit into one Voting Precinct called Voting Precinct #1.



This re-districting change only applies to the County Commissioners' Precincts numbered 1 through 10 and only affects the City of Spearman, so far as this map is concerned.

Needless to say, the re-districting of the county, is a mystery as far as the voters in the county are concerned. We are going to try and explain the re-districting so that each of you will know where you vote, or we might even succeed in making the re-districting even more confusing to you.

First off, we will start with Precinct 1. Precinct 1 goes from the top of Collard street, down to West Ninth Avenue, North and South. East and West it goes from Townsend over to the alley between Endicot and Hazelwood. Precinct 1 includes voting precincts 1 and 10. Also, it is interesting to note that Precinct 1 includes all of the land from Section 109 East to section 9, then south to Section 56 and back West to Section 19 (approximately). This takes in approximately 200 square miles.

Precinct 2 includes the area West of the school house known as the motorcycle course area, and the block where the high school and tennis courts is located, on West to Pioneer Manor and the Glover Terrace addition, then North up Roland Street to West Seventh, then West to Highway 15, then North East to South Townsend Street, then South to West Ninth Avenue back to the alley on South Benice, down to 11th Avenue and East to the East boundary of the motorcycle track. Precinct 2 includes approximately 200 square miles, from Section 12, East to Section 22, then South to Section 24, then West to Section 9 (approximately).

Precinct 3 starts at West 11th Avenue on the South, and North to the Rodeo grounds and goes approximately from the swimming pool on the west to the State FM 760 on the East. Precinct 3 includes vot-

ing precincts 7 in the Oslo Community. This includes Section 1 going East to Section 11, then South to 48, then West to Section 63, approximately 200 square miles.

Precinct 4 includes the towns of Gruver and Morse, from Section 64 East to WDC Hull land, then South to Section 20, then back West one mile South of Section 27. This includes approximately 200 square miles of land.

To further enlighten our readers on the issue, we might remind them that there are 3,029 eligible voters in the county, as of November 1975. Precinct 1 has a total of 762 eligible votes. Precinct 2 has a total of 809 eligible votes. Precinct 3 has a total number of 749 eligible votes. Precinct 4 has 709 votes. To further confuse our readers, voting precincts 1 through 9 are as follows: (now remember these are voting precincts and not commissioners precincts).

Precinct 1, 661 votes  
Precinct 2, 93 votes  
Precinct 3, 157 votes  
Precinct 4, 709 votes  
Precinct 5, 507 votes  
Precinct 6, 716 votes  
Precinct 7, 85 votes  
Precinct 9, 101 votes.

Now if you will take your voting precincts and the total of the above and see which voting precincts vote in Commissioners' Precincts, you will arrive at how we figured the 4-way split of the eligible 3,029 votes in the county! Confusing, it really isn't if you will study the maps and figures we have given you! And, bear in mind that this is the law, the counties must be divided up according to "bodies" and not square miles or number of anything except people! No one in the county, or any of the cities made the law, it was made somewhere else! And, it is the law.

### Law Suit Filed Against Candidates

A law suit has been filed in District Court by Ruth Gumfory of Gruver, against two candidates that have filed for the position of commissioner, precinct 3, subject to action of voters in the Democratic primary May 3.

The plaintiff, Mrs. Gumfory, maintains that the two candidates, Dan Desimone and L. M. Womble do not fulfill the requirements of residency in the precinct and is asking that their names not appear on the ballot.

A hearing has been set for March 15 in the District Judge's chambers.

### Commemorative Coins On Sale

The second commemorative coin series of Hansford County are now on sale according to Mary Lou Wyrong, manager of the Chamber of Commerce.

There will be a limited edition of the 1976 serial numbered medals which are certain to grow in prestige and value thru the years. Only 75-24 karat gold on .999 fine silver, 15 .999 fine silver, 500 antique silver and 300 antique bronze medals have been struck. The first individual gold coin will be numbered 51; the first individual silver coin will be numbered 101; the first individual antique silver and antique bronze will be numbered 251.

The present owners of the first (1974) issue, serial numbered coins, have exclusive right and ownership of all future issues if they so desired. All other orders will be filled on a first come, first served basis.

The gold coins sell for \$50.00; silver, \$25.00; antique silver numbered \$5.00; antique silver unnumbered \$4.00; bronze numbered \$3.50; bronze unnumbered \$2.50.

The sets of coins include the 4 coin set starting at number 11 for \$100.00, 3 coin set, starting at number 61, \$35.00; 2 coin set, starting number 111, \$10.00. The first 10 of each set will be auctioned off.

Also on sale will be necklaces with unnumbered coin \$10; numbered coin, \$11.00; key chains with unnumbered coin, \$5.00; numbered coin, \$6.00; plain necklace, unnumbered coin, \$7.95 and numbered coin \$8.95. Bolo ties, in black and brown will sell for \$8.00. All sales are subject to

### School Trustee Election

First item of business at the school board meeting Monday evening, was Miss Roden, librarian for the Spearman High School. She discussed the European Studies Program with the board. She informed the board that a student can sign and go on the tour this summer to Europe, and it would give the student credit on their transcript, but this will not help any student towards graduation.

The board read the minutes of the last meeting and approved them.

The business manager gave his regular report and the board approved and paid the bills for the past month.

The board considered contracts for the principals and athletic director at the meeting Monday evening. High School Principal Clemmons, Jr. High Principal, Robinson and Elementary Principal Alfred were all recommended for new 2 year contracts, along with Athletic Director Greg Sherwood.

New business included the ordering of an election for April 3, 1976. The terms for Wilson McClellan and Joel Lackey expire. Deadline for entering the school board election is March 3rd (only about 17 days left), if you plan to enter the school board race.

The board authorized purchase of 2 new buses for this year.

Two in-service days were changed for the teachers, to March 19th and April 10th.

The board listened to recommendations from the principals and athletic director for teachers and coaches for next year. The board will not take any action on hiring or firing until the 1st Monday meeting in March.

The Superintendent report included the following items: The enrollment is down 3 students from 1054 to 1051. Lunchroom report stated that the lunchroom had served 14,815 meals the last 30 days, up from 13,292

the previous 30 days.



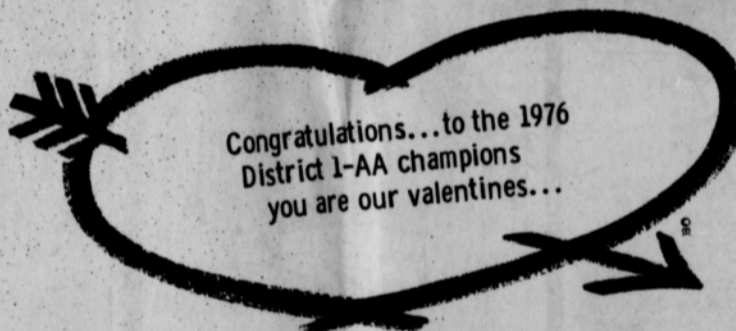

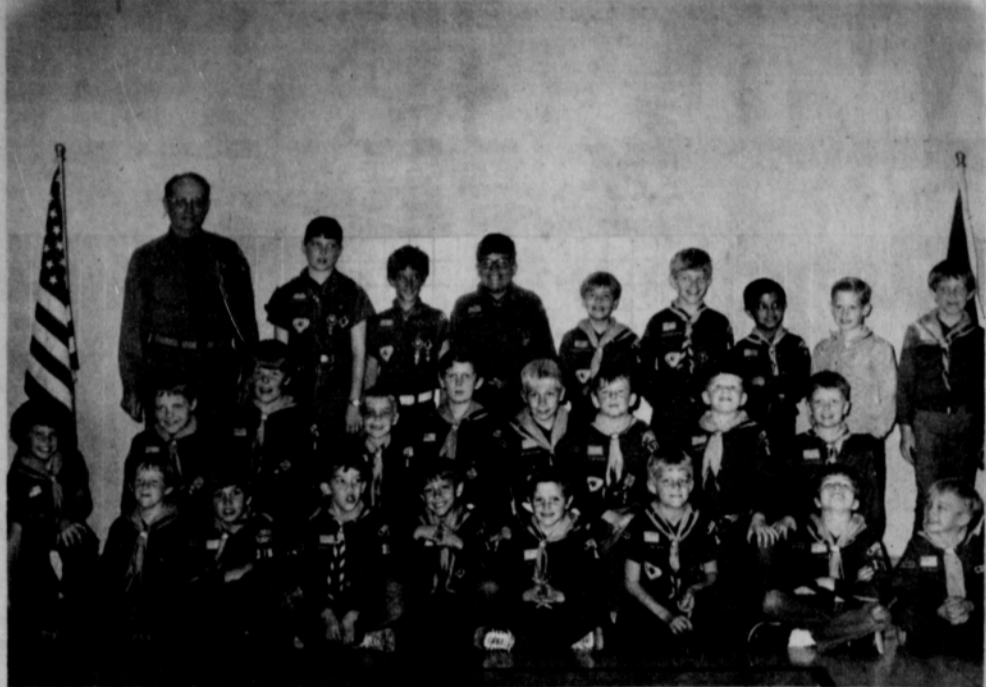

## IRS News

Dallas--Certain North Texas farmers have until Monday, March 1, to file their federal income tax return and pay any tax due, according to a Dallas official of the Internal Revenue Service (IRS).

A. W. McCannless, IRS district director for North Texas, said today that farmers who did not file a declaration of estimated federal income tax by January 15 should file their 1975 tax return and pay all tax due by March 1 to avoid a possible penalty.

Farmers, for federal income tax purposes, are defined as those persons who earned at least two-thirds of their 1975 gross income from farming.

IRS Publication 225, "Farmer's Tax Guide," and Publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Declaration of Estimated Tax," provide additional information and are available by mail from the Dallas office of the IRS, 1100 Commerce, Dallas, TX, 75202.
