Flowers' address was concerned with the governor's anti-crime program and he was well qualified to speak for the state's chief executive having served as chief enforcement officer under three Texas attorneys general.

He reviewed 10 bills now before the current session of the legislature he said derived from a search by the governor's office to provide "tools" for law enforcement officers and prosecutors to deal with the criminal element. He noted that some of these measures were actually amendments to existing legislation to eliminate shortcomings of the existing laws that often led to mistrials and expensive

new trials The first measure he touched was the wiretap bill which all were interested in because it has been so heavily opposed. Flowers explained the way it would work should the measure pass and noted that it was--in proposal--restricted to the 'high-roller" suppliers in the state's drug traffic. It would be administered by the Department of Public Safety with permits issued for 30 days only and the possibility of only one 30 day extension if the case

warranted it. Flowers told his audience that 37 states now have wiretap legislation in some form or another, had had it for some time and not one state had seen fit to repeal that legislation.

Older Worker

Older Worker Week is planned for March 8-14, according to the U.S. Department of Labor. Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb, Inc. is encouraging employers to recognize their older workers during this week.

Evidence that the older worker is a high-quality employee is mounting. According to a survey made recently among some of America's largest corporations, 84% of the personnel directors queried thought that older employees are more productive. Older workers were also more satisfied with their jobs than younger workers, according to the survey conducted by the Corporate Committee for Retirement Planning. Older workers were found to have better attendance and lower accident rates as well.

Green Thumb is a rural older worker employment program funded through the Department of Labor and is working to eliminate the unfounded prejudice against older workers. Local people employed under the Green Thumb program are Edna Hays who works as reassurance worker with the Golden Spread Center daily calling over twenty homebound senior citizens and checking on their needs and Ernest Newcomb who is employed at the Stationmaster's House Museum as photographer, builder of displays, carpenter, janitor, and general handyman.

Green Thumb directly hires nearly 1,000 workers 55 years of age and older, on a part-time basis. Green Thumb employees are placed in community jobs throughout the 107 county area in which the program operates. These workers not only demonstrate the value of accumulated experience and wisdom acquired with age, but also contribute services that their communities might not other-


