

Dumas down-Guymon to go

Lynx will scrimmage Tigers

Well, the "Ding Dong Demons" from Dumas came to town Thursday night and went home with memories of how Spearman rings bells. Surely, they'll remember us until this time next year.

The JV teams started out the action, looking to be about even. The hitting was hard and the playing furious. If one was keeping score, two touchdowns were scored by Dumas to the one scored by the Lynx. Dumas' JV had a good strong team and our defensive juniors should be proud with a job well done. Our JV offense looked good, and with a little work on execution they should be able to handle anyone in the district. A few of the standouts were numbers 11, 21, and 42.

The two Varsity teams took the field, Dumas appearing to be fired up enough to win two games that evening, but a quick glance to the end zone where the Lynx were doing their warm-up exercises, displayed a well-disciplined group in orderly ranks. One may have gotten the impression that they were mildly prepared for what was to come, but that impression vanished when they started running exercises. Their enthusiasm couldn't be contained any longer, and it seemed if build and build until they took position for that first offensive play. The first action was an explosion and it continued that way both on the offense and the defense until the final whistle blew signaling the end of the scrimmage. The Lynx appeared to be a little rusty on the passing game, but all around execution on the running game more than made up for that.

Both Spearman and Dumas

took a lot at all three Varsity string. Dumas fielded some big strong boys, both on the line and in the backfield on defense and on offense. Their big quarterback was outstanding and seemed to always take three or four tacklers to drop the Demons' big running backs. The impressive thing was that Spearman always had the three or four blockers there when it was necessary. Reliable sources had told this reporter that their big won about the Lynx this year and their concern over the defense. Some wondered if the Lynx was going to be able to stop the big Dumas team. They can tell now, because Spearman's defense was superb. They not only stopped the Demons, they caught them behind the line of scrimmage time and time again. Dumas changed quarterbacks, early during the scrimmage, hoping to get a passing game started, and that turned out to be a fatal mistake. Our young secondary played their hearts out to the letter, forcing Dumas back to the running game and even more trouble. Surely Whitaker's broken arm must have troubled him, but one couldn't tell from the sideline. Doing that good of a job with a broken arm can only put fear into the hearts of future opponents when he's well.

The Lynx offense was great. Blocking was performed to the letter, opening holes that any back would have been proud to run through, but when the holes weren't there, our backs seemed to make their own. The quarterback's spot is not an easy one to fill, but Scott's maturity was impressive: particularly following the play when he was blind-sided, causing him

to lose the ball. Those kind of hits will make any quarterback heary, but Scott came right back and continued to play with cool calculation, making good fakes and smooth hand-offs. You may have thought the passing could have been better, but in defense of Scott, it's hard to pass when you can't see the receiver and those Demons were big and tall. But this reporter would like to send a word of caution to Spearman's first string quarterback. Impressive is a word that can also be used for number 10. Watch your job closely Scott. Reid played in Thursday's scrimmage like he is no longer satisfied with being number two. His execution was good and his running was great. Speaking of running, it was more than once we watched as number 23 dipped and danced his way across the defensive line and down through the secondary. And watch out District I-AA opponents, because little 23 wasn't the only one that kept showing up in that defensive secondary, number 40 got down field a few times, too. The offensive line should be commended for keeping those big defenders out as much as they did, and they performed their blocking task on the whole, the way blocking should be done. The result: Spearman 5 touchdowns; Dumas - 4. The Spearman football team and the coaching staff have done well, and done it fast but looks to be a long season, that is on the way and the little sign that hangs in the Lynx locker room tells it well. "You have to work harder to stay on top, than you did to get there. Are you willing to pay the price?" The sports writers put Spearman on top early. That means that this year we'll have more work cut out for us than usual!

Benefit show booked for Spearman

Tickets are now on sale for the big benefit show of 1977 in Spearman, the International Gospel Music Festival headlined by Mr. Gospel Music, Wiley Fowler and his Sounds of Nashville band and quartet, plus the Stars of Tomorrow talent contest to be held in the high school auditorium Sept. 14 under the sponsorship of Sheriff R.L. McFarlin and the Hansford County Sheriff's Department.

The four hour production begins at 8 p.m.

Proceeds from the sale of the admission tickets will go to charitable community activities in Hansford County, the sheriff reported.

Advance admission tickets are \$4 for adults and \$2 for children and students with a few choice up front reserved section seats at \$5 each and tickets are available from sheriff's department personnel and all participating merchants.

In addition to Fowler and his organization, the show features a host of performers from radio, television, records and stage fame, among them being the Fowler Family and band (all eight of them), Jeanette Lunsford, described as the Kate Smith of gospel music, and special guests.

All business, professional and individual citizens are urged to

support the Hansford County Sheriff's Department in this community effort by purchasing the admission tickets in advance and attend America's finest benefit show of family entertainment.

Local talent is invited to participate in the talent show portion of the entertainment, the sheriff reported. Representatives from Nashville will be in Spearman this week to announce plans for accepting local talent show entries as well as beginning the advance ticket sales, he added.

Ticket sales will commence Monday, August 22, according

to information at this time, with locations where they may be purchased along with other pertinent data about the music festival to be announced later this week.

Police check collisions

Spearman Police Department Chief Steve Wisniewski Friday, August 19, reported his department investigated two collisions, one on private property Thursday and one in a city street at 4:30 a.m. Friday in which there was some property damage but no injuries.

The Friday morning collision involved the vehicle operated by Odal K. McBroom of Spearman and a parked tractor-tanker rig filled with gasoline which was legally parked in the 200 block of East Avenue D. Heavy rain hampered driving visibility.

There was no damage to the tractor-tanker rig while McBroom vehicles sustained front-end damage. A damage estimate is pending completion of the investigation.

The Thursday collision involved a pickup truck and a car and there were no injuries and only minor damage to the vehicles involved.

County gross sales reported

Gross sales in Hansford County for the first quarter of 1977 amounted to \$8,897,314 with gross taxable sales for the county for the same period of time totaling \$3,401,386, according to the report last Wednesday, August 17, by State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

He reported that Texas businesses, including the 166 reporting outlets in Hansford County, reported gross sales of \$33.8 billion for the first three months of 1977, a 19.4 increase over the same period last year.

Out-of-state firms reported an additional \$3 billion in sales in Texas for January, February and March, up from \$2.3 billion for the same period last year.

The sales figures are contained in reports filed with the Comptroller's Office in Austin by some 233,000 businesses holding Texas sales and use tax permits. The figures for Hansford County show \$2,501,827 of the gross taxable sales subject to the tax.

Preventing Home Fires

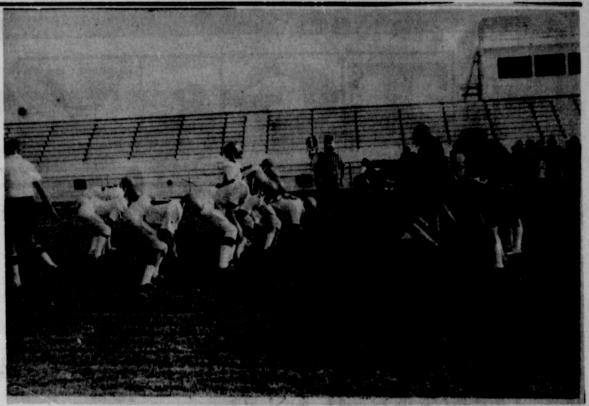
