Speeches by Department of Housing and Urban Development Secretary Patricia Harris, U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, U.S. Rep. Jim Wright, Gov. Dolph Briscoe and Houston Mayor Fred Hofheinz highlighted the Texas Municipal League Meeting in San Antonio, Texas, last week with Spearman Mayor C. Ralph Blodgett and his wife, Johanne, heading the local delegation.

Others in the local delegation included Mr. and Mrs. Bill Pittman, Mr. and Mrs. Gene Cudd, Mr. and Mrs. Kenny Loftin, City Manager, Mark Neff and City Attorney P.A. Lyons. Pittman, Cudd and Mrs. Frances Loftin are members of Spearman City Council.

Sen. Bentsen discussed the competition for federal dollars between the Sun Belt and Frost Belt States, utilizing the title of "The New War Between the States."

"The current War Between the States is not an abstract creation of the press, attempting to increase readership by reviving the specter of a reborn Union-Confederacy split. The war is very real -- the losses already are staggering -- and Texas should be aware that it is likely to continue into the indefinite future."

Rep. Wright talked about Preserve Your Right to Govern -- Local Control and Public Policy.

In her talk, Ms. Harris discussed America's Urban Policy, Experience and Prospects.

A serious presentation delivered with the light touch was by James Boren, an individual who is the president of the National Association of Bureaucrats. "When in Doubt, Municipal" was the title of his discourse which dealt with the bureaucratic approach to government and the checkreins imposed by the governmental rules and regulations, in many instances, on private enterprise.

Mayor Hofheinz addressed the session as the outgoing TML President.

His success is the Mayor of Monahans, Richard Hoyer, a certified public accountant.

Patrick Otis Powell, 39, of Fort Worth Friday, Oct. 21, in 84th Judicial District Court in Spearman was sentenced by District Judge Richard Counts to 15 years imprisonment in the Texas Department of Corrections for the shooting death July 16 of Jose Leon Gutierrez, 55, of Spearman.

A jury of four men and eight women returned the verdict of voluntary manslaughter Oct. 8 and later that day began an additional six hours deliberating before deciding on punishment of 15 years in prison for the defendant.

Powell had originally entered a plea of guilty to the murder of Gutierrez but later appeared in court to change the plea to not guilty.

Powell's attorney, Bruce Robinson of Perryton, filed notice of appeal. Judge Counts set appeal bond in the amount of \$30,000.

Powell will be transferred to jail facilities in Fort Worth where he is to face probation revocation proceedings in Tarrant County. Convicted of burglary of an automobile, he was placed on probation.

8th Graders remain undefeated; 7th loses 2nd

Coach Jim Bob Brown took his little Lynx 7th Graders to Boys Ranch Thursday night and lost his second game of the season. The Little Ranchers hit the field ready to play and hitting was the name of the game. The little guys tackled and hit like their older varsity counterparts. The game was pretty much a defensive battle with no scores during the first three quarters. Neither team seemed to be able to mount any offense. Part of this was due to close strit officiating. With 4:33 left in the game the little Ranchers ran a play around the end that went 48 yards for the TD. When the final horn sounded the 7th Grade Lynx were bested by the Boys Ranch 7th Graders with a score of 0-6. Coach Williams' 8th Graders had a little different contest. Eight grade action was hard, fast and furious. Boys Ranch scored first early in the first quarter on a 65 yard run for the touchdown. The PAT run was good making the score Boys Ranch 8 - Spearman 0. The game sea-sawed back and forth for a while and then Coach Williams turned the Lynx lose. With 7:17 left in the second quarter Stan, Sherwood broke across the middle for a 12 yard touchdown, only to have it nullified by a clipping penalty. With 3:06 left in the same quarter Spearman was on the attack again, this time Stan carried the ball over for 3 yards out for a TD that stood good. The extra point run failed. Spearman quarterback, Monte George, threw a 23 yard pass to one of his receivers who ran with the ball fumbling it into the end zone and another Spearman receiver jumped on to the ball for a touchdown. That receiver stood up and spiked the football bringing a fifteen yard penalty on the kick-off. Boys Ranch scored again in the first half making the half time score Boys Ranch 16 - Spearman 12. The little Lynx came out in the second half to play football, scoring in the third quarter with Stan Sherwood running 5 yards for paydirt. Stan added the extra two points on the run. Chuck Rigdon broke for a 92 yard TD with 1:14 left in the fourth quarter, but an illegal procedure penalty caused that one to be called back. Spearman finally scored the last TD of the game with Stan running 54 yards into the end zone. The final score was 26-16 and the 8th graders remained undefeated.

Many of the farmers that have dropped by have brought in a very good planner tool-namely, a farm map. The information a farm map may contain is endless. If kept up to date and filed year after year, these maps will also give past year's history at a glance. One thing the map should contain is where your weed problems are. This could help your decision on where to place your layout out ground. Also, look at your cropping balance to help next year's decisions for crop rotation. If you need your irrigation water in the "heat" of the season. If one well breaks down, where will you get water from?

The IWY Conference & What It Means To You

Local women to attend Houston rally against IWY

A group of local women who are very much against the National IWY (Inter-Action Women's Year) movement will attend the Pro-Family, Pro-Life rally in Houston, Nov. 18-21. They are Peggy Woodring, Cheri Jarvis, Deann Dunnahoo, Patti Spomoneur, Lisa Pippin and Karen Kern. Women at this rally plan to express their dissatisfaction at the conference. This same group has been appearing before local clubs and organizations trying to bring people's attention to this matter.

A request to the President and to Congress is being printed elsewhere in this paper, or you may contact any of the above ladies and they will see that you get a form to send. It is important that all citizens express their discontent with the issues that will directly affect the families of this nation, both now and in the future. What the movement really boils down to is that Federal female radicals and their ideas will be financed with your money. Do women's libbers, homosexuals and abortionists speak for you? This is what they intend to do at the National IWY Convention using your money. Your first reaction may be "How is this possible, when I don't even know what IWY means?" This is typical, because most citizens have not taken time to investigate the meaning of IWY.

Consider answers to questions asked by honest inquirers: "WHAT IS IWY?" The "What Is Nations designated 1975 as International Women's Year (IWY)." President Ford, by Executive Order, appointed a 35 member National Commission on International Women's Year. With Federal funds, the Commission attended the World Conference for Women in Mexico City in June, 1975, from which emerged the World Plan of Action.

"What Is The World Plan of Action?" In addition to endorsing the so-called "women's issues" it delves into many domestic and foreign matters, such as "equitable distribution of income" (socialism) and world disarmament. The U.S. delegation unanimously endorsed the World Plan and pledged to strive to implement it into law.

"How Does This Affect Me?" President Carter appointed a National IWY Commission, and Congress authorized \$5 million for State and National IWY Conferences. These state conferences have been completed: the National will be in Houston, Nov. 18-21. Bella Abzug (then Congresswoman who sponsored the bill) promised Congress the money would be used to "afford an opportunity for every kind of women, representing every viewpoint, in every State of this Nation to make a statement of her concern." This sounds good, and evidently Congress believed her; but the intent of Congress has been ignored and thwarted. The end result of these conferences will be a report to the President, which he must submit to Congress, supposed to give the "consensus of women's concerns" show what U.S. women want and furnish a blueprint for future legislation. This involves you. Laws affect your daily life. This involved your children and grandchildren. "What Does The Blueprint Include?" The National (women's lib) Committee has already drawn the blueprint (much of it condensed in a large book entitled "To Form A More Perfect Union") which was sent to the states to be rubber-stamped, sold to the citizenry, and returned to Washington. In effect their plan would create a Big Sister government, with sex quotas imposed on industry and government, and returned to Washington with sweeping new programs which would not only increase Federal involvement in our private lives but escalate taxes and inflation.

Blueprint notes include: Federally funded and controlled, 24 hour child development centers for children transferring responsibility for child-rearing from parents to government. Cost? Uncertain, but estimated up to \$40 billion annually. This government financed retraining centers for "displaced homemakers;" for school-bus programs in sex education and family planning (including providing contraceptives and abortion information); affirmative action (which includes quotas and hiring women over qualified men).

Other plans include: government-financed abortions on demand; the Equal Rights Amendment; public election financing; increased preferences for veterans; abolishing Robert's Rules of Order; giving full legal and social status to intermarriage; international interdependence; world disarmament; a guaranteed annual income; reduced national defense; reduced work week with no cut in pay. In view of these goals, nobody should have been surprised when, at the mention of Marxism, thunderous cheering and applause of approval erupted at the Texas IWY Conference.

"Who Is On The National IWY Commission?" Notable among the 42 members are Bella Abzug, chairman, leading feminist, who as Congresswoman introduced a bill to give "civil rights" to homosexuals, she spearheaded lesbian workshops in state conferences; Gloria Steinam, editor of Ms. Magazine, leading feminist who open proclaims "Overthrowing capitalism is too small for us, we must overthrow the whole patriarchy;" (patriarchy is the women's role term for the traditional, independent family concept); Jean O'Leary, Co-executive Director of the National Gay Task Force, is another Carter appointee; an avowed lesbian; an anti-sex Bias-Report on Sex Bias in the Public Schools;" recommends "School counselors should be required to take courses in which...a positive view of lesbianism is presented. Students...encouraged to explore alternate life styles, including lesbianism... Schools set up lesbian studies... use of lesbian books encouraged... Lesbian clubs should be set up in schools."

The Texas delegation to Houston includes three avowed lesbians and nineteen at others endorsed by lesbians. There is abundant documented evidence confirming irregularities in nominating, balloting and tallying votes, microphones turned off and literally broken to silence pro-family participants in the State Conventions.

At State Conventions, 1442 delegates were elected, a majority embracing the ERA/abortion/lesbian philosophy, and in spite of this, Bella Abzug has announced intentions to appoint about 500 delegates at large, further swelling the balance to her liking. So most delegates at the national meeting will vote the Abzug/Steinam/O'Leary choice.

Some of the legislation now pending which would implement IWY goals include 1. The National Commission lists the ratifying of the Equal Rights Amendment as top priority, for they understand it would lock in the Constitution many of their aims. For instance: 1. Pending bill HR2998 would make illegal any "discrimination" because of "affectional or sexual preference," translated this would mean that homosexuals could not be denied the right to adopt children, to serve as youth counselors (even in private camps), or to teach school (even in private or religious schools). This destroys the right of private administrators to parents to decide whom they prefer as role models for children. 3. Early Child Development legislation has been repeatedly defeated by alert parents. However, its advocates boast they will never give up until their aims are accomplished. Legislation has been introduced (HR2505), \$3 million has been appropriated for a 1979 White House Conference on Families. An amendment has been introduced which would require that half of the participants be from the private sector (parents). So ask your Congressman to support the amendment HR2505.

IWY supporters list for resolutions supporting all these issues to be endorsed at the National Conventions, forming the basis for the Report to the President and Congress. Effort will be made to convince lawmakers that this Report represents all women (53% of the population) and this includes you, if you are a woman. It also directly affects all men and children. What politician ignores a "mandate" from 53% of his constituency?

Represented individuals should write their U.S. Senators, Representative, talk with your minister, other church leaders, teachers, and youth counselors, businessmen and civic leaders, friends in clubs and PTA, and send a resolution to the President and Congress. If you are able to plan to attend a Pro-Family, Pro-Life Rally in downtown Houston, Saturday, Nov. 19 from 2 to 4, and contributions to help with the rally, may be sent to Citizens Forum, P.O. WHEREAS each human being from conception throughout the natural continuum of life has value and dignity before the law, and the killing of innocent human beings is an anathema to our society, and WHEREAS a mother and her pre-born child have an equal right to live, and all reasonable efforts and ordinary means should be used to save the lives of either or both persons when endangered, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Congress enact and the States ratify a mandatory Human Life Amendment to the Constitution to protect all persons born and pre-born from conception.

WHEREAS child-rearing is the God-given responsibility and privilege of parents, not the government, and WHEREAS Federally controlled Early Child Development Programs empower the government to choose the ideology by which young lives are molded, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that pre-school child development programs shall be controlled by the private sector, giving parents freedom of choice over the physical and philosophical environment of their children.

WHEREAS existing Federal laws guarantee equality of opportunity in important areas such as employment, education, and credit, and WHEREAS a strict constitutional rule requiring equality between the sexes at all times does not respect the difference between men and women in their child-bearing function and their physical strength, and WHEREAS the proposed Equal Rights Amendment would transfer enormous new powers from the States to the Federal government, BE IT RESOLVED that we oppose the ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment to the Constitution.

WHEREAS all personal individual rights are protected by the Constitution, and WHEREAS the traditional family has proven to be beneficial to society, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that homosexuality, lesbianism, or prostitution shall not be taught, glorified, or otherwise promoted as acceptable through the laws of society, through the adoption of children, or within institutions such as our schools.

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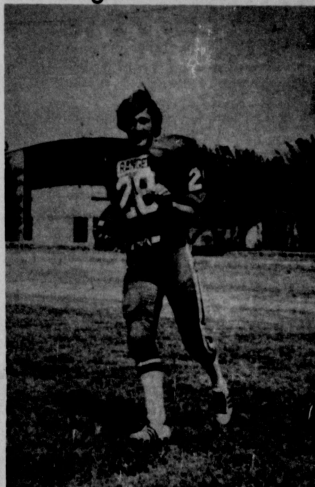
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On Ranger Football Team
