Lea Ann Gibner was named to the University of Texas at Austin Liberal Arts honor roll for the 1983 Fall Semester.

To be eligible for the liberal arts honor roll, students must earn at least 52 grade points during the semester, passing all courses undertaken. Students who earn 67 grade points and above are named to the list Summa Cum Laude. Those who earn 61 to 66 grade points are listed Cum Laude Ampla Et Magna; 58 to 60 grade points, Magna Cum Laude; 55 to 57 grade points, Ampla Cum Laude, and 52-54 grade points, Cum Laude. Total grade points are calculated by multiplying the number of semester hours undertaken by the value of each grade (A equals 4 points).

Lea Ann was listed on the Cum Laude roll. She is the daughter of Mary Alice Gibner of Spearman. She is a 1983 graduate of Spearman High School. She was valedictorian of her class.

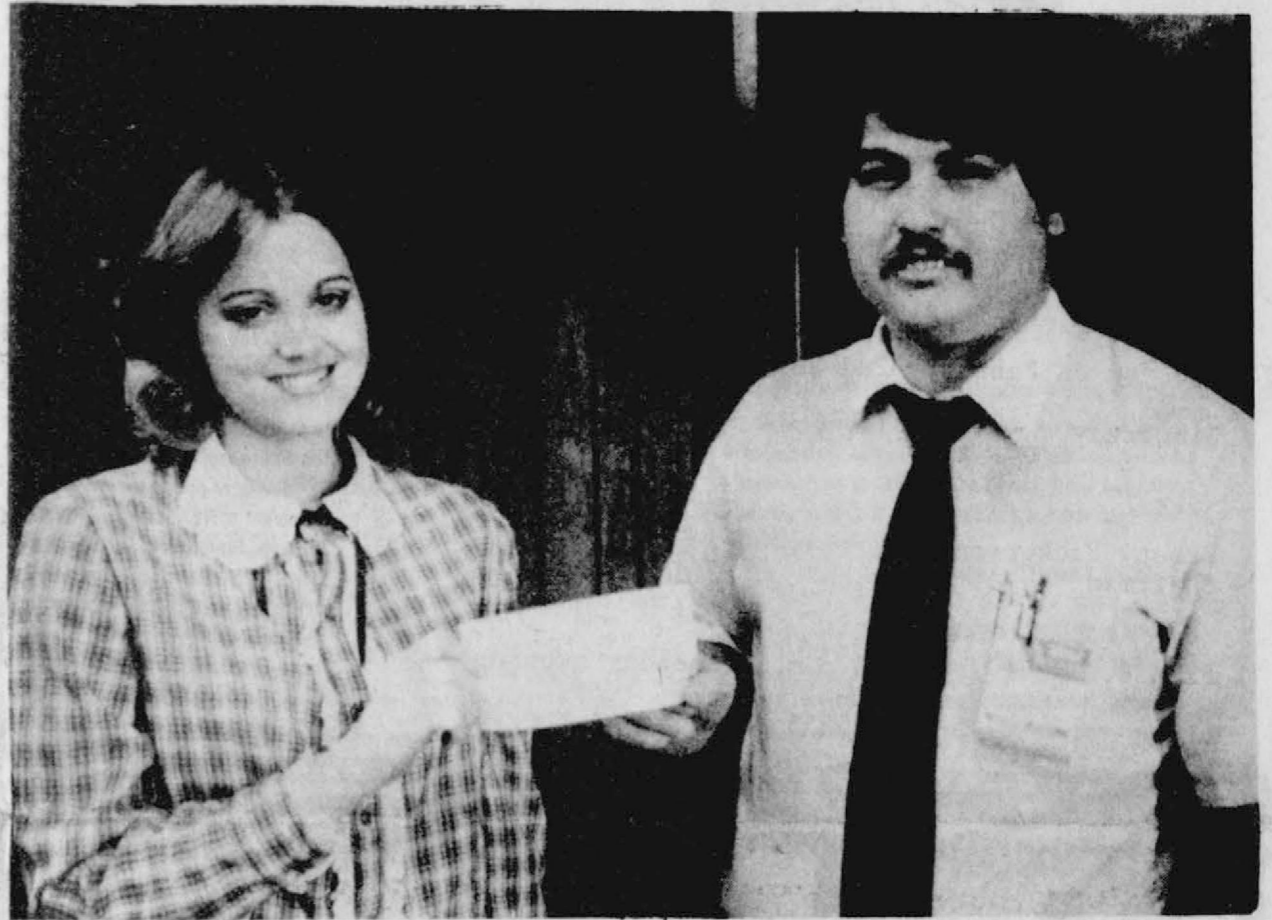
James Hicks' mother dies

Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Anthony standing with the tapestry that they donated to the library.

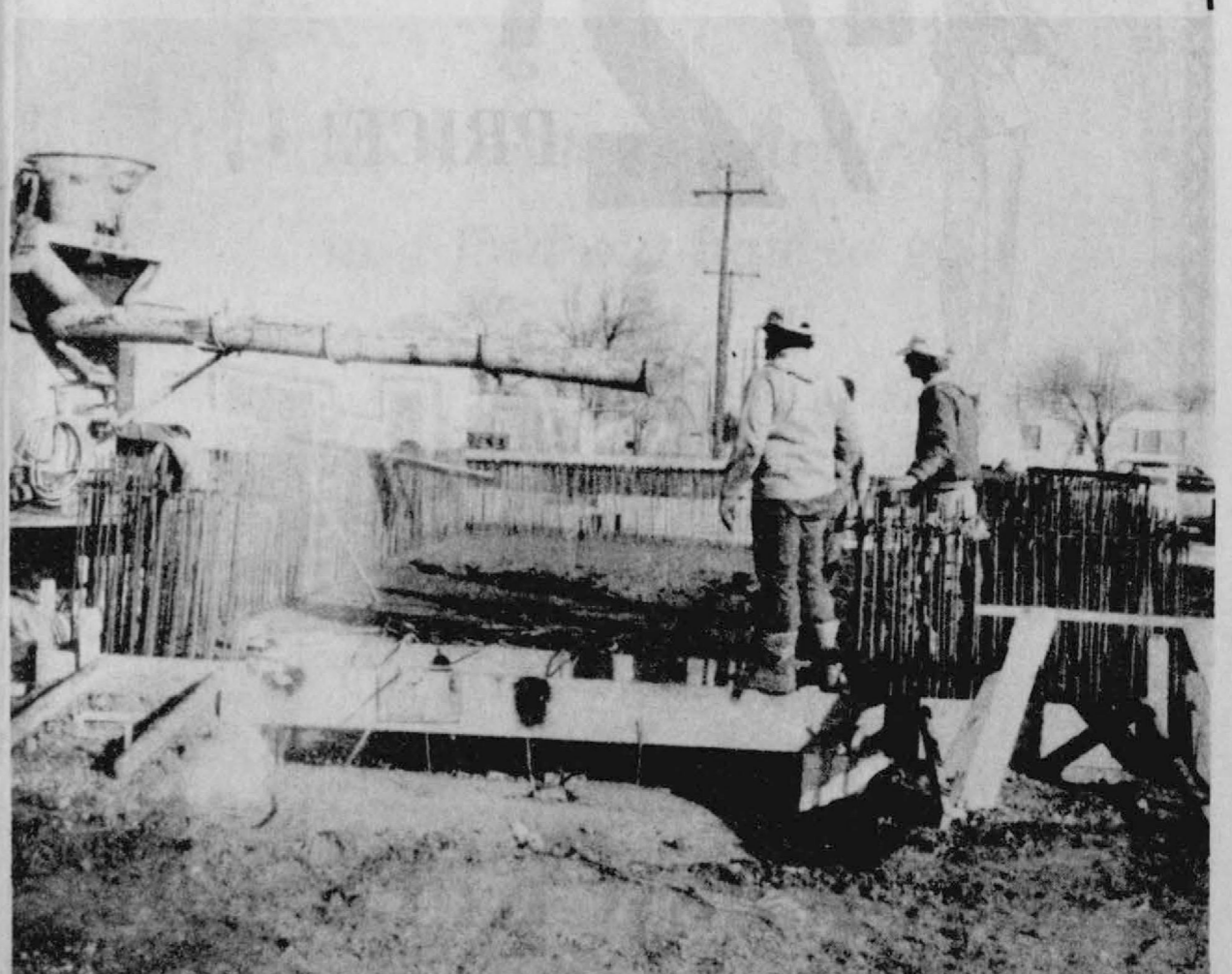
Mr. & Mrs. Lawrence Anthony have donated a beautiful tapestry to the Hansford County Library.

Large dog is prowler

On January 21, 1984 at approximately 8:27 a.m., an officer was dispatched to a Spearman residence in reference to a prowler. Upon arrival, the officer was met by the complainant who advised the officer that he had a prowler the night before and directed the officer toward the South side of the house to show the officer some tracks in the snow. The officer observed some tracks leading up to a window. The tracks go back towards the East part of the house to a back door and then go toward the alley. Upon observation of the tracks, the officer found that the tracks were not made by a human, but by a large dog. Case closed.

On January 26, 1984, at approximately 6:30 p.m., two white females entered the Spearman Police Department and wanted to file a complaint. The female subjects identified themselves. One of the female subjects advised that she had gone to a Spearman business to make a purchase and a white male subject made a comment towards her and then followed her out of the business. The male subject then kicked front of her car and spit on it. The male subject approached the left side of her car and acted like he was going to hit her or the car. At this time the female subject came to the Spearman Police Department to sign a complaint. A complaint was signed and a warrant was issued for the arrest on the male subject. The male subject was arrested and brought before the judge. A fine was paid and the subject was released.

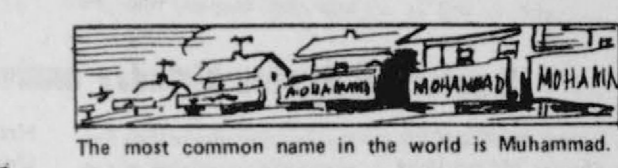

He completed his second self-built car, a 1951 Ferrari model with a 301 cubic inch Buick engine, and brought it to Dumas for his parents' inspection and approval during the record-breaking cold spell before and during the Christmas holidays.

"It was the first time I had seen Dallas at only 35 miles per hour," laughs the tall, lanky, former policeman about one of the many cities he drove through during the 40-hour trip.

It took Smith about two years of his spare time to combine the chassis, constructed of spare parts, and the fiberglass body for the finished product.

To build the mechanical dynamo, he took the concept and detail from a Ferrari brothers design "and built it that way."

Although the sports-car is built to meet

street requirements, the professional scuba diver opted to build it as close to Indianapolis 500 racing standards as he could.

The Porsche transmission and 5-speed gear box add to the speed of the Ferrari, which has been clocked at 176 mph, but it is the basic Holly equipment, including the carburetor and valve covers, that highlight the 350-horsepower engine.

"They make it (the engine) look pretty," adds Smith with a smile on his face.

More spectacular than the racing engine is the interior. The leather bucket seats are accented with a hardwood dashboard, imported from Europe, and the computer theft prevention mechanism was installed before completion.

After two theft attempts, one successful, when a thief kept the car for a few days, the owner took extra, almost paranoid, precautions.

Smith's "baby" is now monitored by a video camera in his Fort Lauderdale home, and if a would be thief is

park somewhere and watch the other cars go by," he confesses.

For those who saw the car when it first arrived and now see it, they might notice one small change. Smith registered his car with the Texas Department of Public Safety, on request, and now has Texas license plates for the duration of his annual visit.

"I get a lot of attention from the police, but as long as I'm within the law they don't say anything," the 1968 Spearman High School graduate admits.

Not only does his 4-wheel companion capture the eye of law enforcement officers it has become the talk of Florida car show fanatics and racing representatives.

During a Miami car show, Smith received every award possible and a Daytona spokesman presented him with an invitation to the 25th anniversary events.

"It was spooky at first especially driving the bank curves that you have to go at the very least 75 mph, but after you go around it a couple of times you calm down," Smith remembers of the unforgettable experience.

It was at the 1983 invitational show that Smith was clocked at 176 mph on the straight-aways. "The Daytona event was not an actual race, but a trial run to see what the car could do," adds Smith.

Since the car's completion Smith has been the envy of the car shows throughout Flor-

ida and has been very successful with his \$25,000 vehicle.

"I've never placed lower than second . . . usually I receive first in most of the competition divisions, including most unusual engine and first premium," Smith notes.

Smith hopes to sell his Ferrari model since he has already begun work on another car.

He has started a Lamborghini Cuntach back in Florida and hopes to have it finished soon, but with expense such as a \$1700 windshield, it may take some time.

"A person can only improve what he's doing with time and I hope that this one will be better than the other two I have built," says Smith.

Know THE Weather

What happens when a cold front and a warm front meet head-on? What are the characteristics of the stationary front produced?

A cold front, running into a warm front with about equal momentum, stagnates and marks time. The warm front also comes to a halt and the result, where the two air masses have met, is a stationary front.

Stationary fronts occur during the change of seasons. This spell of bad weather was called by old-timers the "turn of the seasons."

into the car he must punch in the correct code on the computer before it will start. A silent alarm notifies Smith on his portable pager when an attempt is being made to steal the vehicle.

Most car manufacturers prefer to place the ignition and console on the dashboard or steering column, but

when someone builds his own car, he can put it any where he wishes, as Smith did.

The flip-switch console, ignition and stereo are located overhead, between the driver and passenger seats, to leave leg room and decrease the possibility of both theft and electrical fire.

"I built it to my con-

venience and size . . . hardly anyone else can fit into it as comfortably as I can," the 34-year-old Smith says.

If theft isn't already enough to worry about, Smith is always in panic of physical damage to his car.

"I constantly worry about being hit or scratched by another car . . . usually I just go

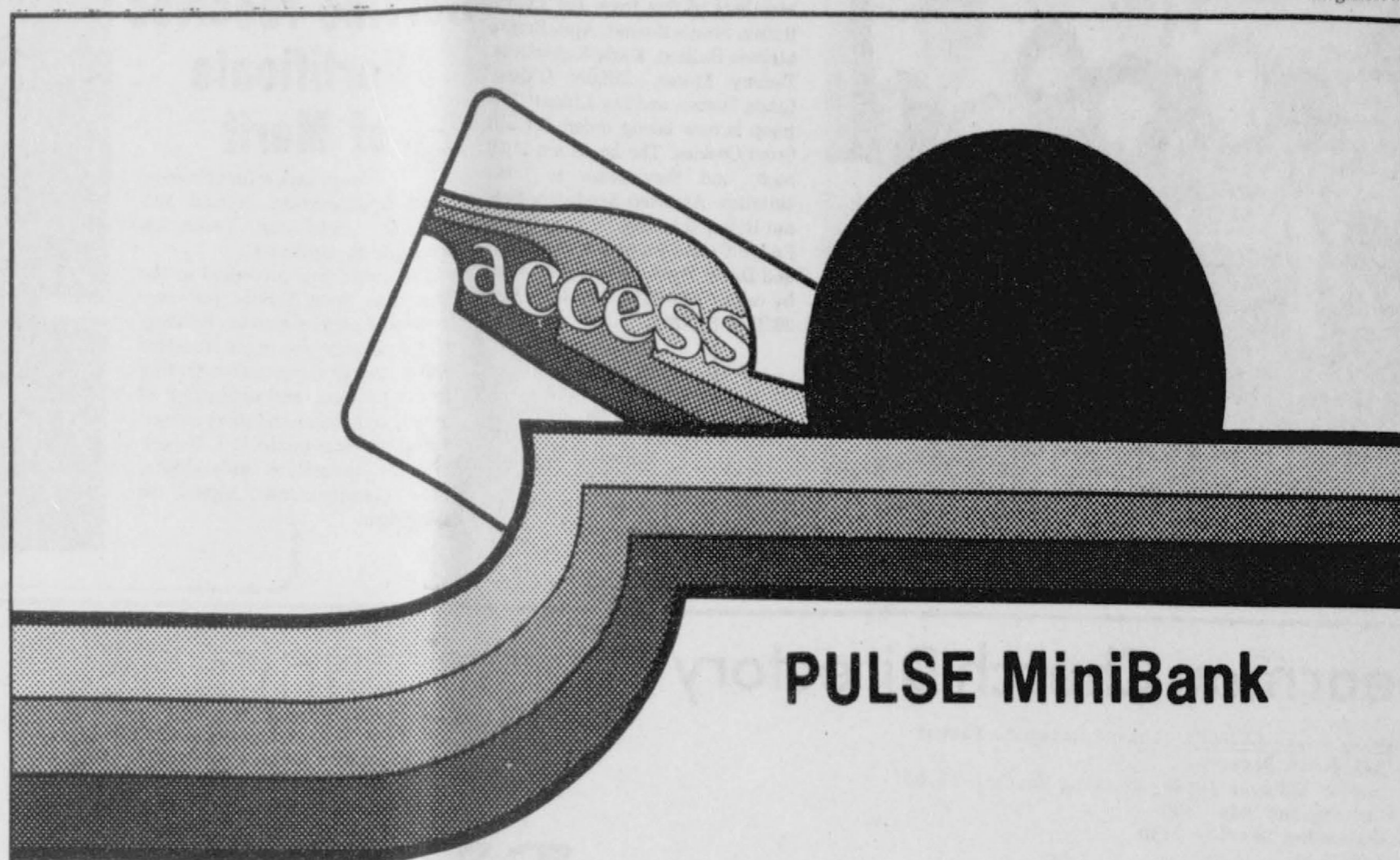

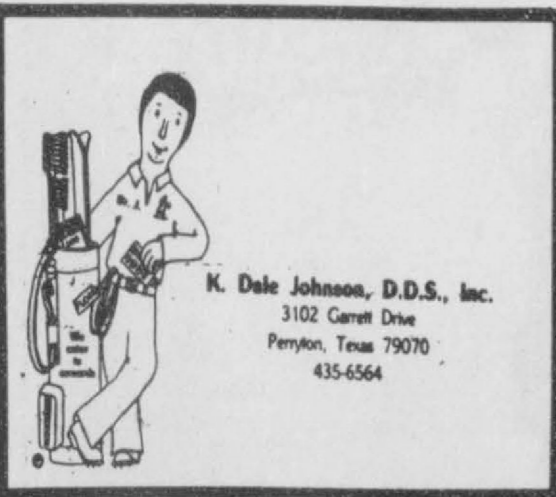
