## City appoints new Alderman and City Health Officer!

In a special 9 p.m. Thursday meeting, the Spearman City Council appointed Troy Sloan to serve the remaining 6 months of Roscoe Nelson's term as a City Alderman. Nelson recently moved from Spearman.

The city appointed Dr. R. L. Kleeberger, M. D., as the new city health officer. Dr. Kleeberger is a well known local physician.

The Council also voted to place the Police Department under the jurisdiction of the City Manager, Mr. Thompson. This means that the Police Department has been separated from being under jurisdiction of the City Council, and the Chief of Police and his Department will answer directly to Mr. Thompson, the City Manager.

The Council discussed the addition of a new

fire truck to the Fire Department. Spokesman for the Fire Department, Ronald Dunaway stated that the firemen are now looking for another truck, and implied that the Volunteer Fire Fighters would pay for the used truck!

The council authorized the Mayor to complete negotiations with Santa Fe for a new water well location.

Troy Sloan is a local tax man, and also has extensive farming and ranching interests. Troy is interested in Spearman, and has always been proud of "his town!" We join in welcoming him to the City Commission.

Spearman's Zane Newton scored the TD after Roger Jones had grabbed a 55 yard pass (30 in the air) and scampered down to the 35 yard line of the Eagles to set the TD up! Morris ran over the PAT for two points! The Eagles came back with a tidal wave of enthusiasm to almost catch the Lynx before half time, as they dashed around the end for a 37 yard touchdown. With the score 8-7, in favor of the Lynx, and time running out, Beedy intercepted an Eagle pass, and set the Lynx up on the 15 yard line, with 1:52 left. The Lynx drove to the 5 foot line, with seconds left, and Fox stuck the ball over the white stripe for the TD.

## Collier Boy To Burns Hospital

James R. Collier, 4 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Vance Collier, suffered first and second degree burns over most of his body Wednesday when a butane tank being filled on their ranch northwest of Spearman ignited, touching off a grass fire that stretched over the Oklahoma border. He was transferred Thursday to the Shrine Burns Hospital in Galveston from Northwest Texas Hospital.

The child was reported to be in critical condition at the Amarillo hospital before the transfer to Galveston.

Vance Collier was treated and released Wednesday at the Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center.

Leon Seay, 30, of Spearman, and employee of Colliers, suffered second-degree burns over portions of his body and was reported in serious condition at Hansford Hospital.

Fire units from Guymon, Oklahoma and Spearman extinguished the blaze.

# 1975 National 4-H Week ... Oct 5-11

CHICAGO—"4-H-'76... Spirit of Tomorrow" is the theme of this year's National 4-H Week, Oct. 5-11.

More than 7 million 4-H'ers, their leaders and parents will take part in the annual salute to the Head, Heart, Hands and Health program.

Observances are expected to center on the 1975 4-H bicentennial theme, commemorating the nation's 200th birthday and accenting the history, ideals and goals of the American youth movement now flourishing in over 80 countries.

As in past years, 4-H'ers are planning special recognition events, service projects and recruitment drives in their local communities, counties and states.

National 4-H Week is proclaimed annually by the Cooperative Extension Service, which conducts the 4-H program in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam and the Virgin Islands. Extension professionals recruit, train and assist the nearly 500,000 volunteers who provide local leadership in 4-H activities.

Of the 7.2 million boys and girls from 9 to 19 in-

involved in 4-H, more than 3.5 million belong to clubs and groups.

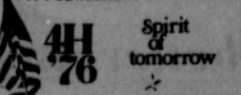
Nearly 900,000 take part in special 4-H nutrition programs geared to lower-income youth and their families. Another 2.5 million are reached by instructional television series like Mulligan Stew and Living in a Nuclear Age.

Although the majority of 4-H members still live on farms and in rural communities, 17 per cent now come from larger urban and suburban areas.

Since its beginnings around the turn of the century, 4-H has offered practical learning and citizenship experiences to millions of young people. Among the most popular projects today are those related to animals,

food, clothing, bicycle care and safety, and arts, crafts and music.

Private sector donors lend their endorsement and support to the Extension-supervised 4-H program through the National 4-H Service Committee and the National 4-H Foundation.



# Kid's Dog Show Planned

## Education Clinic Oct. 11

The first Kids Dog Show will be on November 1, 1975, at the County Barn on Ave. D in Spearman.

- RULES**
1. All youngsters from 4 through 14 may enter their dogs in the contest, regardless of breed, special training or whether the pet is pedigreed.
  2. All contestants must keep their dogs on a leash and under control at all times.
  3. Each contestant and dog must be present at least one-half hour before show time.
  4. Dogs entered in the smallest dog category must be over 6 months old.
- The show is being sponsored jointly as a public service by the

National Recreation and Parks Association, Kennel-Ration, Carmon's Canine Clip Joint and Happy Homes Home Demonstration Club.

Dogs will be judged in seven classes; plus a Best of Show winner.

Judging classifications are: Best Trick Dog, Smallest Dog, Largest Dog, Best Looking, Best Costumed, Funniest and Best Behaved. First, second and third prize ribbons will be awarded to winners in each category with a best of show trophy from one of the seven first place winners. Merit awards will be given to the rest plus each child will receive a Booklet entitled "How To Care For, Train

and Feed Your Dog."

In conjunction with the show, a Dog Education Clinic will be held on Saturday, October 11th at 2 p.m. in the Home Demonstration Building.

The clinic is open to all dog owners in the community. Local dog experts will discuss and illustrate such subjects as training and obedience, health grooming, responsibilities of pet ownership and other important topics designed to promote healthier, more responsive pet ownership.

Members of the Panhandle Kennel Club will give a demonstration and valuable information to the kids on how to prepare their dogs for the show on Nov. 1.

There will be refreshments following the talks and each child who comes to the clinic will receive

a certificate at the dog show.

Do not bring your dog to the clinic.

Entry form will be filled out at the County Barn from 12 - 1:30 (the day of the show) November 1. Contestants may enter more than one categories.

A concession stand will be available at the show and the proceeds from this will go to Happy Homes Home Demonstration Club.

The clinic and the show are free of charge and should not only be educational but a whole lot of fun.

held his first crusade in Houston. He counts this a real blessing in his life.

In 7 months cancer showed up in two more areas of his body, resulting in an operation and more cobalt treatments. On February 21, 1971 he was healed while attending a Kathryn Kuhlman meeting at the Shrine in Los Angeles. At that time he was very weak and had no color. Since that day he has not missed a day's work. He now leads a normal life and does not take medication.

As a result of this meeting he received his healing and received a filling of the Blessed Holy Spirit. He has spoken in more than 800 places giving his testimony.

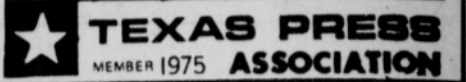

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### Local Income From Government High

NEW YORK--How large a part does government play in the financial affairs of Hansford County residents?

How much of their personal income comes from governmental agencies--Federal, state and local--via salaries and wages, social security, unemployment insurance, pensions, welfare payments and the like?

According to the latest statistics, a larger portion of personal income comes from such sources than ever before. Locally and elsewhere across the country, the role of government has grown by leaps and bounds in the last few years.

To a large extent it is attributed to the recession, which has led to a great outpouring of public funds in an effort to turn the economy around and assist those who are most seriously affected by it.

In Hansford County, it

is estimated, based upon an updating of the latest statewide figures, about 29 cents out of each dollar of personal income comes from government sources. In the past year it amounted to approximately \$8,932,000 after taxes.

Of the 29 cents, it is calculated, some 18 cents is from the Federal government and 11 cents from the state and local governments.

The range, in other parts of the country, is from a low of 22 cents, in Connecticut, to a high of 62 cents in the District of Columbia, where there is a high concentration of Federal employees. Nationally, the average is 29 cents.

The findings are based upon reports from the Department of Commerce, the Tax Foundation and others.

During the past year, the figures show, some \$345 billion was disbursed to individuals in the United

States by the various levels of government. Nearly half of it was for pensions, social security, food stamps, health insurance benefits and such, technically called "transfer payments," for which no services were being rendered.

In general, these transfer payments produced about \$1 out of every \$7 of personal income.

There is considerable concern among economists over the accelerating growth of such expenditures. They note that they are a major element in government budgets and are, according to the Tax Foundation, "relatively uncontrollable."

The Spearman Junior Varsity defeated the Sanford Fritch JV in a real thrilling football game at Lynx stadium 12-7. The Fritch Eagles kicked off to the Lynx JV, and Sam Boone returned the kick 15 yards. The Lynx ran a series of ground plays as Boone, Bodey, Sellers, and Reid crashed through the Eagles defense to put the ball at mid-field. However, the Eagles held and set up a "trend" for the night as both teams turned the game into a defensive battle.

The first quarter was scoreless, and Quarterback Reid started the 2nd quarter out with a bang! He passed to No. 82, Scott Martin who caught the ball on the 40, and dashed 30 yards to the 10 yard line. The Eagles held the Lynx on this series of downs.

The half ended with the Lynx team leading the statistics by a wide margin, but the score was still 0-0. However the Lynx put on a brilliant rally in the 2nd half; David Ortega covered a fumble for the Lynx on the Eagles 30 yard line. Bodey picked up 2 on an off tackle sweep. Sellers added runs of 9 yards and 3 yards, Randy Reid pulled "surprise" on the tough Eagles, as he ran the ball in for a TD from 16 yards out on a QB keeper! The try for the point after the touchdown failed, as Reid tried to pass to Martin.

In the 4th quarter, Reid had "some more surprises in store" for the high flying Eagles! Price had covered a fumble on the 38 yard line as the 4th quarter started to give the Lynx good field position, with 7:30 left in the game. Bodey dashed 11 yards for a first down, Bodey added 3, Price dashed 14 yards and Bodey 4. On a 4th down play, Quarterback Reid fumbled the ball, picked the ball up, raced around his right, and threw the ball as hard as he could throw to Boone, who caught the ball and was tackled on the 5 yard line, to give the Lynx a first down and goal to go! Powerful Bodey dashed 3 yards to the 3, and then ran roughshod behind tremendous

blocking to score the TD with 3:57 left in the game.

A Reid to Price point after try failed and the Lynx held a 12-0 lead. The Eagles who had not lost a game until their encounter with the Lynx, rallied and added a touchdown in the fading seconds of the game. Fritch had a really fantastic soccer style kicker who kicked the extra point against the wind perfectly to make the score 12-7 in favor of the Lynx.

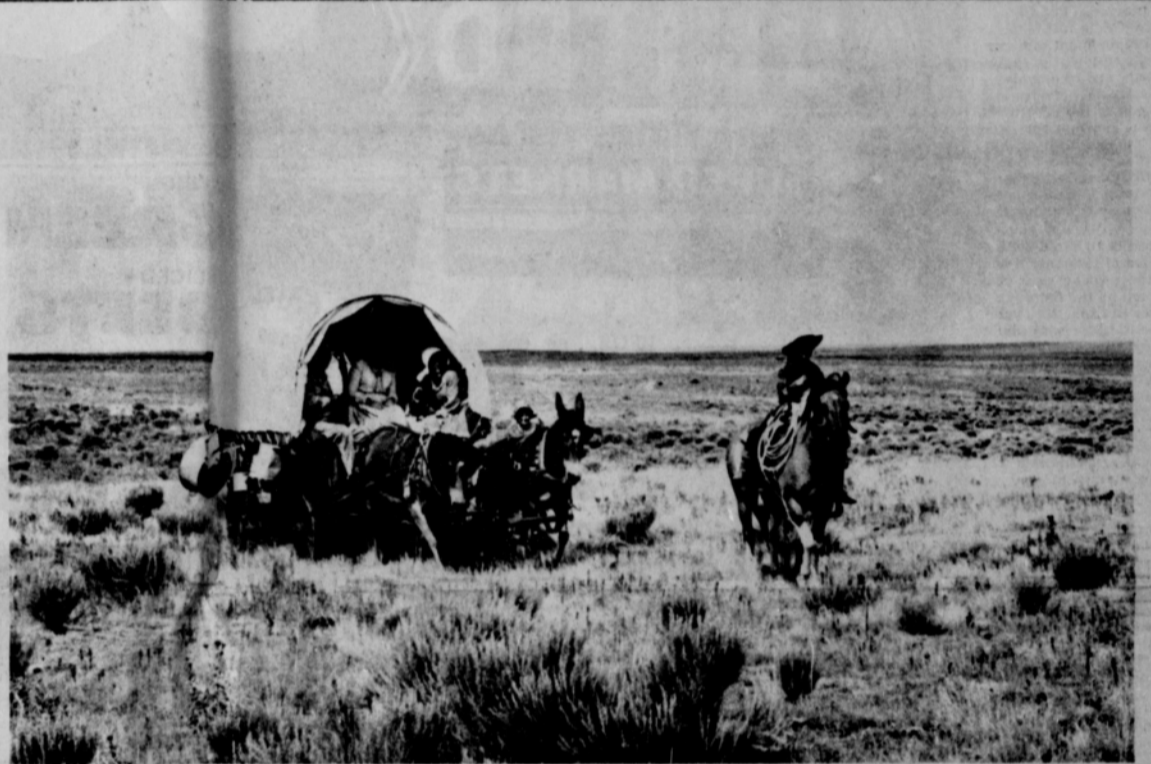

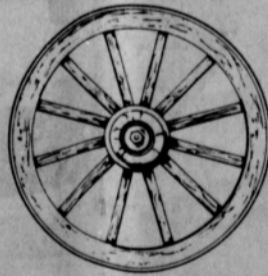

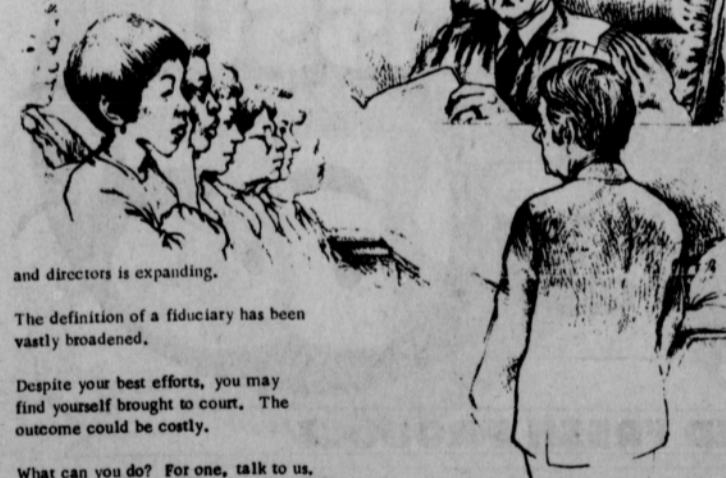

# County Wide Employment Service Opens

Residents of Hansford County have gained a new ally in their battle to seek and find suitable employment. The Hansford County Chamber of Commerce has established an Employment Division aimed at providing a clearing house for local employers and job-seekers.

The Hansford County Chamber of Commerce is a non-profit, voluntary organization of citizens who are investing their time and money in a community development program. This organization functions via working committees to provide a medium through which people can take effective action for the progress of the community.

Recent surveys in our area, conducted with the assistance of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, established the need and desire for a local employment service. Since the Chamber felt that such a service was consistent with its goals, an Employment Division has been established at its headquarters, 211 Main, Spearman.

The objectives of the Employment Division are to provide, FREE OF CHARGE, a full range of employment services to the residents of the county and to provide educational services in support of job development. Several activities are planned with the assistance of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Emphasis is placed upon coordination of activities with county agencies to avoid duplication of services.

Manpower services conducted by the Employment Division are available to all persons who are seeking suitable employment or who need training to develop skills that will enable them to become employed. A file of applications for those persons seeking employment or training is to be maintained and every effort is to be made to meet requests from employers for qualified workers.

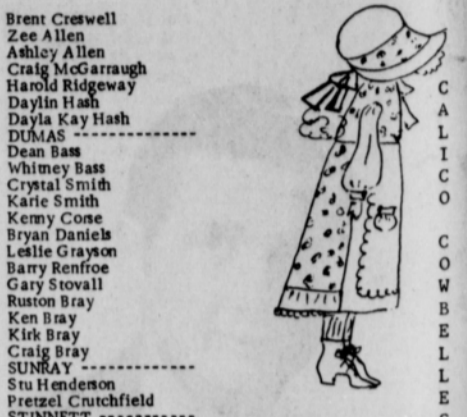

### U.S. Postal Service Plans Improvement Program

The U. S. Postal Service first-class mail service improvement program will go into effect at the Spearman Post Office on October 11, Postmaster Robertson said today.

Under the program, first-class mail will receive service that is equal to or better than airmail.

The major, new service step will extend to all first-class mail weighing 13 ounces or less. "In practical terms, what

this service improvement means is that domestic first-class postage now will purchase the level of service that previously only airmail could buy," said Postmaster Robertson.

"Under the new program, there no longer will be an advantage in purchasing airmail postage for domestic delivery," he said.

Priority mail (now starting at weight in excess of 13 ounces), which includes air parcel service, and

international airmail are unaffected by the improvement program and continue in their present form, the postmaster said.

"Airmail stamps will be sold for use on priority and international airmail. They can also be used in various combinations with other stamps for first-class mail," he said.

Customers can exchange airmail stamps, and stamped envelopes and cards at full postage value for ordinary stamps, stamped envelopes and cards. Stationery bearing airmail indicia will be allowed to be mailed at the first-class rate, the postmaster

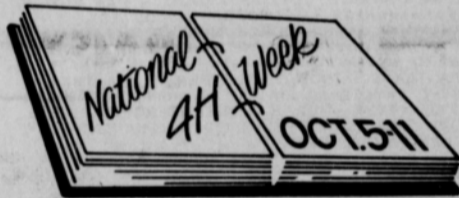

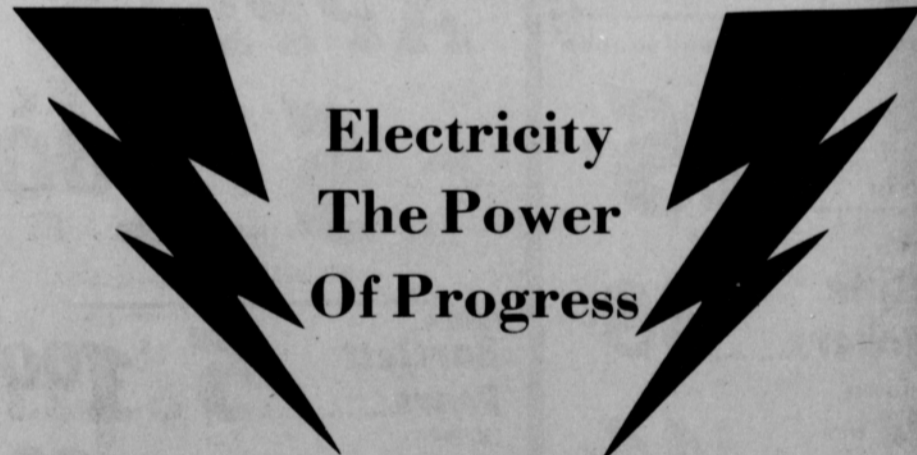

### Proposed Postal Increases Requested

The U. S. Postal Service today filed a request with the Postal Rate Commission for a recommended decision on increases in rates expected to take effect on a temporary basis shortly after Christmas.

Rates proposed include a 13-cent first class stamp for a letter weighing up to one ounce, and 11 cents for each additional ounce and 10 cents for a postal card. Other proposed increases for major rate categories are:  
Second class (regular) 22.1 per cent.  
Third class bulk rate (regular) 23.9 per cent.  
Parcel Post: 10.1 per cent.  
Special-rate parcels 21.1 per cent.

The proposed increases in rates average 26 per cent and would provide \$2.4 billion in additional revenues, postal officials said.

The Postal Service also announced that it will publish notice in the Federal Register of its intention to raise fees for special services and international mail rates. Proposals for special service fees, such as special delivery and registered mail, provide average increases ranging from 34 to 100 per cent. These fee increases would be implemented, add an additional \$188 million in new revenue.

Proposals for international mail rates, which would be increased an average of 22 per cent, would result in an expected \$96.7 million in additional revenue. Although the Service

requested increasing the current 13-cent airmail stamp to 17 cents, officials pointed out the Service is in the process of upgrading first-class mail to airmail status. This is expected to be completed by October 11, and it would be of little service advantage to customers to purchase an airmail stamp after that date for domestic letters.

In its request, the Service said it is currently losing money at the rate of \$2.6 billion a year, even with the new rates implemented on Sept. 14, which made permanent the 10-cent stamp.

The new increases would not prevent a deficit in fiscal year 1976, postal officials explained, because higher rates on a temporary basis cannot be implemented until the fiscal year is half completed.

This means that for a six-month period postal costs will continue to exceed income and result in a revenue shortfall measured in hundreds of millions of dollars, the Postal Service said.

For some classes of mail, the Congress has authorized appropriations for phased-in rate increases, over a period of years. For such classes, phased temporary rates (step 4) would be effective during late December.

This is the third rate increase proposed since passage of the Postal Reorganization

Act in 1970. The first rate case, filed February 1, 1971, took 17 months to complete, and the second, filed September 25, 1973, was completed on September 4, 1975.

The course will be conducted Tuesday, October 7, from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon, and on Wednesday and Thursday, October 8 and 9, from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m., at the Spearman City Hall and is under the auspices of the Hansford Co./Spearman civil preparedness organization and the Division of Disaster Emergency Services of the Texas Department of Public Safety. The instructor will be from the Austin Headquarters.

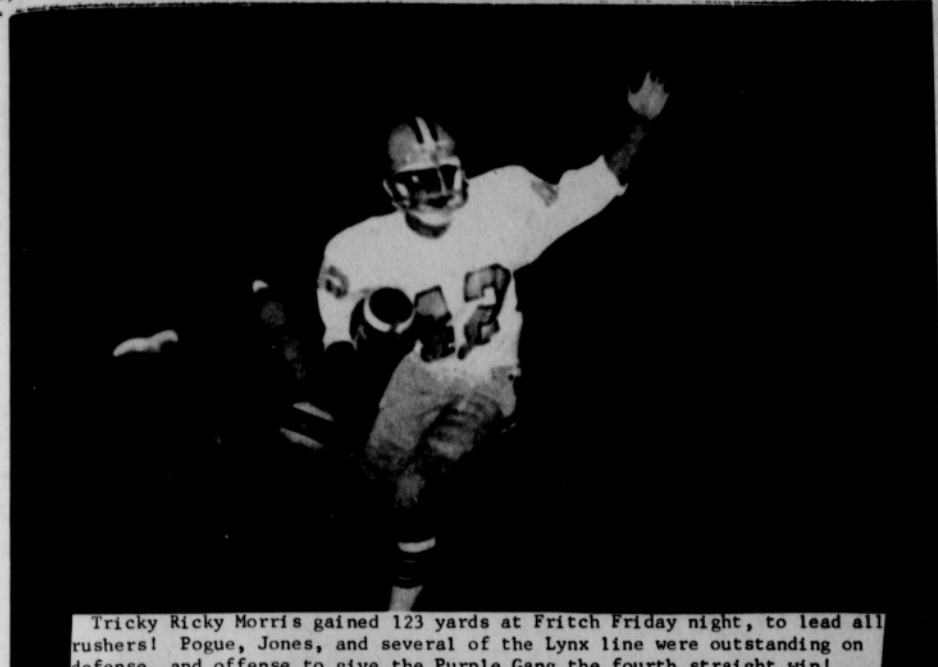
