Two Women Injured In Auto Accident

Two women were hospitalized with injuries received in a one-car accident two miles southwest of Spearman on Highway 15, at 8:30 p.m. Tuesday.

In Hansford Hospital is Mrs. Mary May Baker, 47, and Mrs. Maude Patton, 80.

The attending physician said Mrs. Patton received superficial lacerations and contusions. Mrs. Baker received severe lacerations of the legs and a broken left leg.

Bob Richardson of the Highway Patrol investigated the accident. He said the driver, Orvel Densel Baker, 40, apparently lost control of the car while driving south. It went out of control and turned over one time, the officer said.

Baker entered a plea of guilty to a charge of driving while intoxicated in County Court Wednesday morning and was fined \$50 and costs. The charge carries a mandatory six months suspension of drivers license.

Annual Bank Soil Banquet Set Tonight

An outstanding Conservation Farmer and an Outstanding Soil Conservation District Supervisor will be honored tonight at the annual Soil Conservation Bankers Award Banquet.

The banquet will be held in the Spearman Grade School Cafeteria at 7:30 p.m. It is sponsored each year by the Gruver State Bank of Gruver and the First State Bank of Spearman.

Principal speaker is Leon J. "T-Bone" McDonald, a retired SCS man, and seller of soil conservation. McDonald mixes humor in his serious sales work for conservation. He has told his story in 18 different states and before as many as 4,000 persons.

A committee from the local SCS district and the county banks have inspected several farms with good conservation practices. This committee has selected the outstanding conservation farmer for this year.

A similar selection committee has been working to select the outstanding supervisor of the Hansford Soil Conservation District.

Both of the men selected will be presented plaques for their work.

In a joint statement earlier, the presidents of the two banks, Ralph Bort of Gruver and Clay Gibner of Spearman, said: Because we realize the importance of soil conservation to the continued prosperity of the area, it gives us great pleasure to be a part of this program to honor those working for more conservation.

All cooperators in the district and friends of the conservation work have received invitations to the banquet.

Besides the presentation of the awards and the main speaker, reports on the work in the district during the past year will be given.

Bond Election Called Saturday, December 19

The election of the proposed \$250,000 school bond issue for improvements in the Spearman School facilities was officially called for Saturday, Dec. 19.

A petition signed by more than the required number of qualified voters was presented to the school board in a special meeting Monday night. The petition fulfilled the legal requirements for the bond issue which was decided upon last week.

The bond issue is for general improvements throughout the school and athletic plants.

Work to be done with the money includes repairs and improvements to the junior high school building, the parking areas at the school, and the bus loading area between the junior high and elementary school buildings.

At the high school the parking areas originally planned when the building was built, will be paved, the lawn in front of the building landscaped and a watering system installed and tennis courts erected on the parking area east of the school.

Athletic improvements include the moving and enlarging of the football stadium on the area back of the high school building, putting a concrete curb around a dirt track, building dressing room facilities combined with a concession stand and public restroom, and a practice field.

All qualified voters will cast their ballots at the Junior High School on West Fifth. Freeman Barkley has been appointed election judge.

Absentee voting will be done in the County Judge's office in the Courthouse with his secretary, Mrs. E. J. Copeland serving as absentee voting clerk.

A person is qualified to vote in this election if he has property rendered on the school tax rolls and has a poll tax or exemption which qualified him to vote in the elections of this year.

City police officers said a model 54 Winchester 30-30 caliber bolt action rifle was taken from the home of Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Owens at 1002 S. Haney.

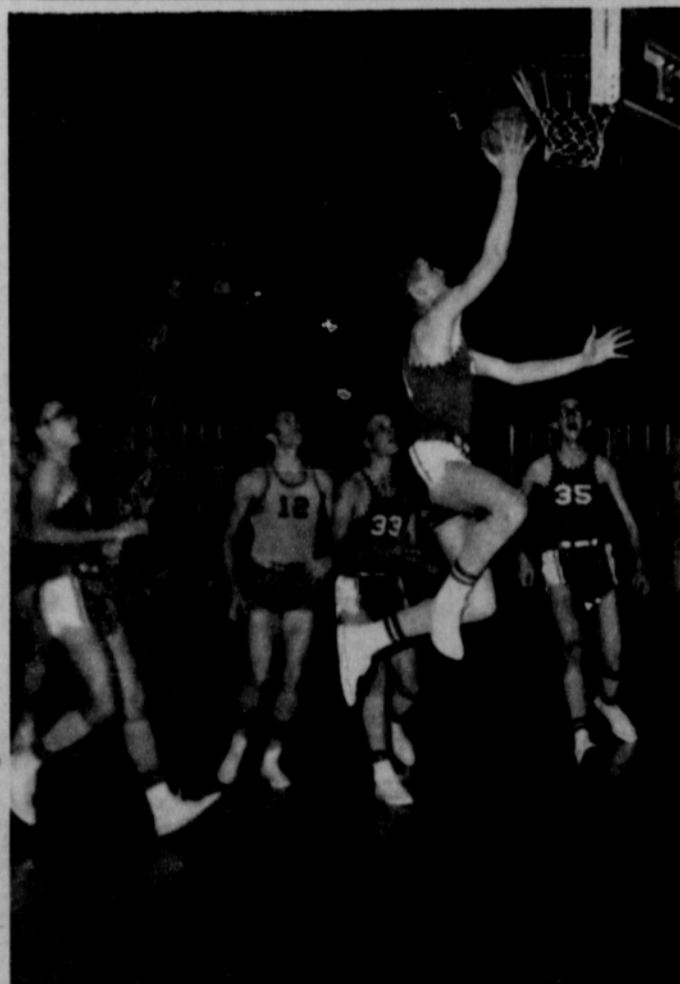
The Star Telegram picked only 11 boys to the first team and all others received honorable mention.

... Christmas is observed around the world in so many different ways. It seems the traditions you observed as a child always remain your best loved ones, so even the ones that seem the oddest to us, are someone's favorites.

For instance, in Armenia, boiled spinach is eaten because it is believed that Mary did so the night before her Son was born. In Holland, small gifts are hidden in puddings and sausages. In Scandinavian nations, a large rice pudding containing a single almond is prepared in the belief that the person receiving the portion with the almond will be married before the following Christmas. In Poland, wafers are exchanged between friends instead of gifts, and hay is spread under the Christmas dinner tablecloth. In Chile, Monkey's Tail, a cold beverage composed of alcohol, coffee, milk and egg, is served. In French Canada, the cat is always fed well at Christmastime because it is considered bad luck if there is a meow on Christmas Eve.

Countless other Christmas legends persist. In Switzerland, dumb animals are supposed to be able to speak at midnight on Christmas Eve. In Norway, spiders are thought to have crawled on the Christmas tree and their webs transformed by the Christ Child into shining silver—the origin of tinsel-decorating. In Ireland, it is believed that the gates of Heaven are flung open on Christmas Eve, admitting all deceased with no questions asked.

Though it has been celebrated around the world in many ways that astonish us, a similar thread of religious observances makes Christmas our most cherished holiday.

... Most everyone who likes to cook has some special recipes used only at Christmas. I know many of you are excellent cooks and I'd like to invite you to share a recipe with us, especially at this Christmas season, when good cooks really shine.

If you have an unusual recipe you'd share, I'd appreciate it if you'd call me or drop by the office.

... This recipe, called Delicious Pound Cake, comes from my husband's mother. She tells me that it's the buttermilk that makes it so moist and delicious and she substitutes vanilla for the lemon extract, a matter of personal preference.

DELICIOUS POUND CAKE

3 cups sugar	1/4 tsp. soda
3 cups flour	1/2 tsp. salt
1 cup butter	2 tsp. lemon extract
1 cup buttermilk	
6 eggs	
Cream sugar and shortening. Add egg yolks, one at a time,	

beating well after each. Add buttermilk alternately with dry ingredients. Beat egg whites until stiff; fold in. Bake in a greased and floured 10" tube pan at 325 degrees for 1 hour and 20 minutes or until done.

Lynx Slip By Sunray; Last Half Almost Deadly

The Spearman Lynx coasted on a big lead Tuesday night in Sunray until they almost lost the game to the Sunray Bobcats.

The Lynx played outstanding basketball the first half and were leading 33-17 when they broke for the mid-way rest.

Things went from bad to worse as the final 16 minutes of play dragged on. The score was 40-33 at the three quarters mark, then Spearman did not score again until the game was almost over.

Late in the fourth quarter Jim Kirkland hit a free shot to get the Lynx off the 40 peg.

Sunray tied the game with less than a minute to go. Spearman managed to get the ball down court. Reserve Bari Blevins almost waved his arms off before he finally attracted some attention and got the ball. He made his lone basket of the game and it won the game 43-41.

The full court press on which the Lynx has drilled since the Gruver game, still broke up the Lynx offense and set them to throwing the ball out of the gym.

The bright spot in the rather

poor game was the emerging of two new scoring threats. Sophomore Carl Close shook off his inexperience jitters and led the scoring with 12 points on some good work around the boards. The lefthander hit several from away from the basket. Joining him in the scoring was Ken Shufeldt who found his eye for 11 points.

Spearman had a good night at the foul line hitting nine of 13 shots.

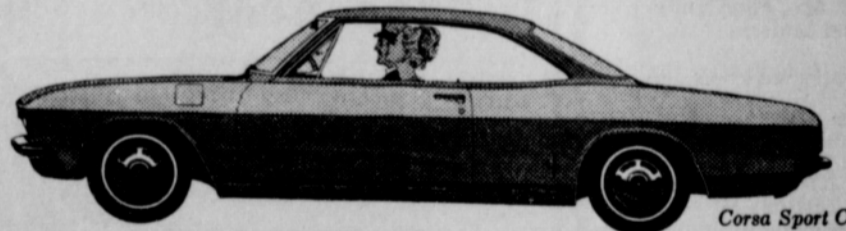

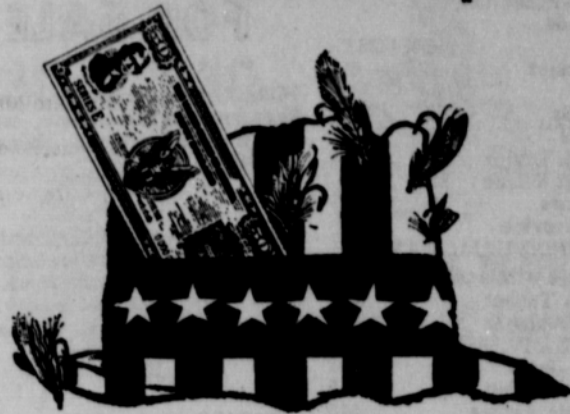

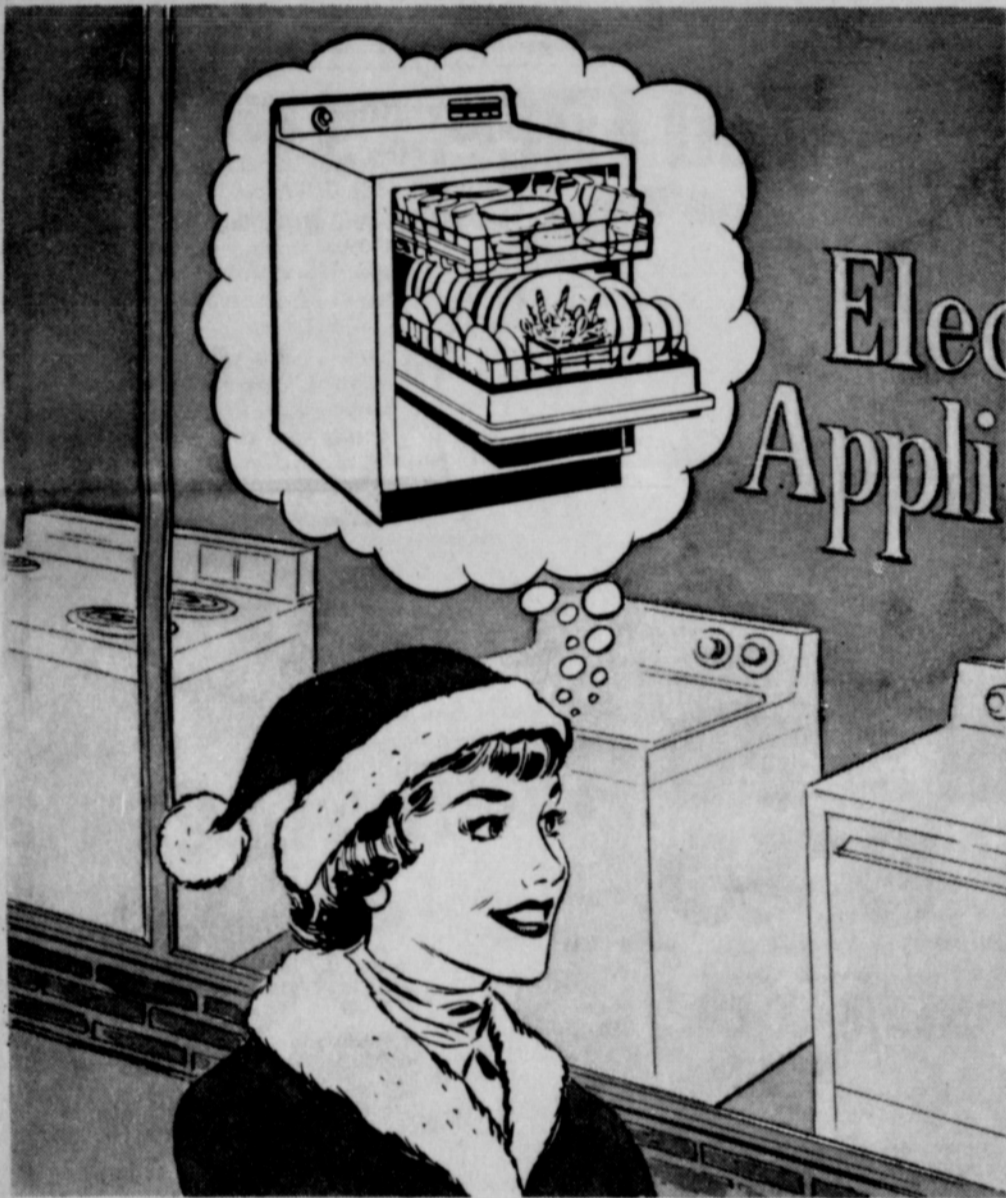

Old Farwell Landmark Announced

Old Farwell a historic landmark in Hansford County will now have an Official Texas Historical Marker relating its history. The marker has been approved by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, according to John Ben Sheppard of Odessa, president.

Scheduled for erection two miles southeast of Gruver, Texas on FM289, the marker is sponsored by Hansford County. It measures 18 by 28 inches and is made of cast aluminum with Swedish steel effect. The Official Medallion of Texas appears at the top with the inscription below.

The inscription recounts that Old Farwell was established in 1886 about 1/2 mile northeast of this site. It was intended to be the county seat of Hansford County, which was created in 1876 and organized in 1889, but lost the election to the town of Hansford which served until 1928 but is also now non-existent. It was named for an early surveyor, John V. Farwell, and members of his family, Chicago department store executives who operated the XIT Ranch in this and 9 other counties. The stones here are from the casing of a 200 foot well dug by hand to supply water to the town.

The erection of Official Texas Historical Markers is part of the five-year program of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee to record, appreciate, mark, preserve and survey history in Texas (RAMPS). These markers are designed to interpret the history of an area or site, and are sponsored by the state or through counties, cities, civic clubs, local groups or individuals.

Through the RAMPS program, 5000 of these markers are to be placed in the next five years in this joint state and local program. These markers will include archeological finds, old trails, Indian activities, Texas Ranger deeds, cattle baronies, river crossings, early railroads and industry, schools, businesses, birthplaces or homes of outstanding Texans, and the origin of the name and history of each town and stream in the state, with particular emphasis on oddly-named sites and ghost towns.

This Farwell marker is scheduled to appear with other Official Texas Historical Markers in tourist guides and maps to stimulate tourist interest in this area, to provide highpoints on historical tours, and to acquaint the citizens of the county with their unique historical past.

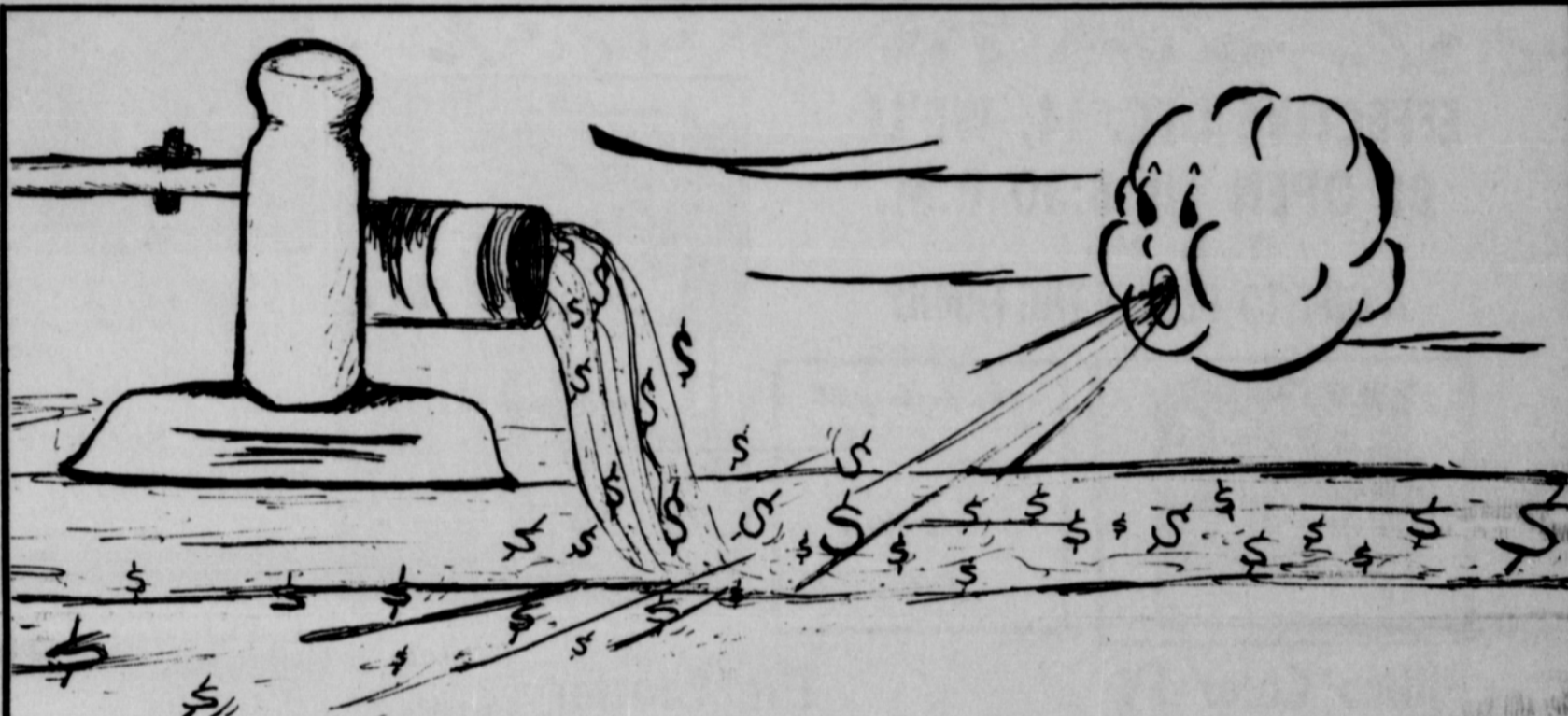

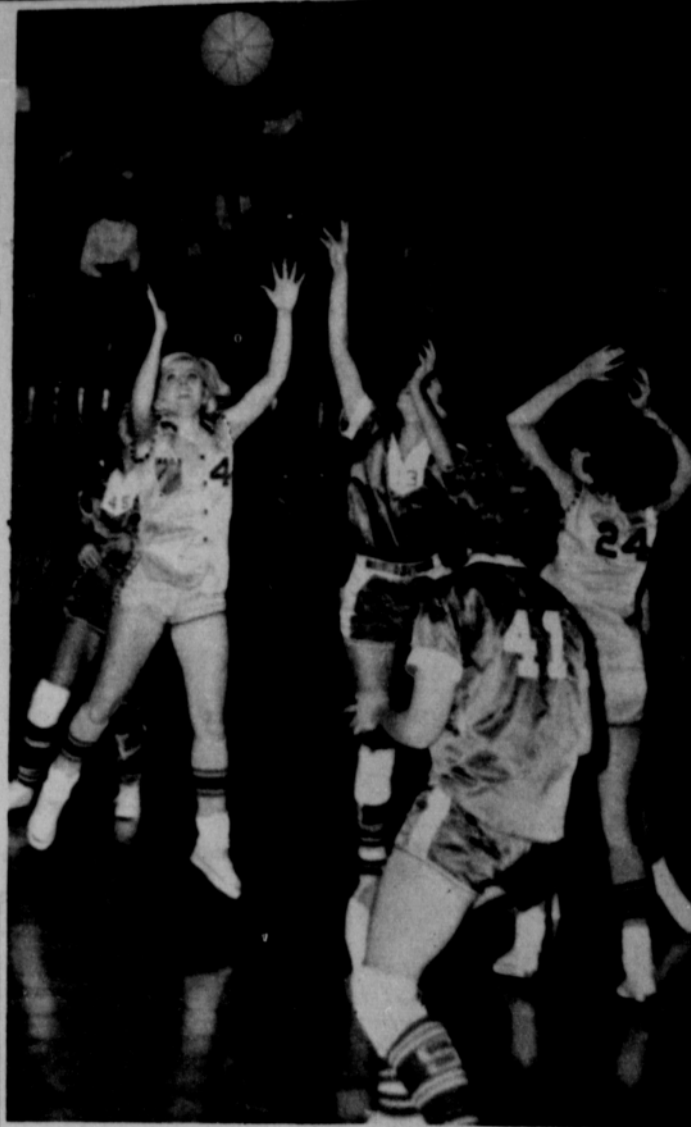
cues were costly as the Sunray six erased the Spearman lead and built up one of their own. Spearman got only seven points in the final period and Sunray rang up 19.
