City To Apply For Antiques On Display At Library CD Block Grant

A proclamation designating April as Emergency Services Month in Spearman, work on a Community Development Block grant was authorized, appointments to seven city boards were recommended and an ordinance updating the city's municipal defense and disaster relief committee were the agenda items acted on during the regular City Council meeting March 28.

Opening the 7:30 P.M. session was the Pledge of Allegiance led by City Manager Mark Neff followed by the Invocation by Mayor C. Ralph Blodgett.

City Council, at the conclusion of a public hearing concerning just vehicles owned by Perry Washington, granted a 30-day extension to allow Washington time to comply with the ordinance.

The proclamation designating April as Emergency Services Month in the city was signed by Mayor Blodgett.

The agenda item dealing with setting the cost of a copy of Spearman Code and updates was resolved with the cost of a copy of the code set at \$20 and updates at \$1 per page.

After recommendations for appointments to the seven city boards were completed, Neff

was in the process of contacting the individuals involved. There were to be three appointments to the charitable solicitation board, one to the Planning and Zoning Commission, two to the Park & Recreation Board, four to the electrical board, three to the board of equalization, one to the airport board and four to the housing board.

Names of the appointees will be reported after acceptance of the appointment. An ordinance was authorized and completed updating the municipal defense and disaster relief committee.

A public hearing was completed and authorization given to proceed with an application for a Community Development Block Grant to update substandard and delapidated housing in Spearman. A cost figure has not been set and city officials were at work last week preparing the application.

Excess city material and equipment, such as some trucks, pipe, water storage tanks on skids and miscellaneous items will be up for sale.

A complete list will be included in the forthcoming advertisement for bids by the city for board and equipment material. April 11 and 25 are the dates for City Council meetings in April.

Since ancient times the Chinese have fashioned figure carvings out of soapstone and a display of such artistic handicraft is the Collection of the Month for April at the Hansford County Library featuring the Chinese carved soapstone collection loaned by Mrs. Robert Novak of Spearman.

She has spent about 10 years collecting the different items in the collection, buying the antiques in Amarillo, Houston,

New Mexico and Oklahoma. She noted that she likes antiques and has been collecting them ever since she was married.

The items, including a large and intriguing incense burner, ashtrays, a figurine and a statuette, vases and what appear to be candleholders or toothpick holders, had monkeys and lions carved in them.

On a couple of the pieces there appears to be the carving of a

rat. There is one ashtray with the carving of a bird attached which looks like jade but is soapstone, Mrs. Novak pointed out. There is a statuette of an elderly Chinese and a tiny figurine of a horse.

When not on display, the valuable collection is kept at the Novak residence in an antique China cabinet. Not on display but in use at the residence is a set of bookends she acquired in New Mexico.

She noted that some of the pieces have China carved into the base denoting their authenticity.

The Hansford County Library and Mrs. Novak take this opportunity to invite everyone to stop by the library during regular hours to see the collection of antiques. They are in various shades of color.

American Ag News

WASHINGTON, D.C. 20313 February 27, 1976 Dear Colleagues:

Many of us in the House of Representatives are becoming increasingly concerned about the plight of the American Farmer in the face of spiraling production costs and an uncertain price outlook for 1975.

Cost of production statistics for 1974 released recently make it all too clear that farmers will be in trouble if they experience sagging market prices this year.

For example, compare the 1974 cost of production figures with the December 15, 1975 prices paid to farmer (in parentheses): Wheat-\$3.51 per bushel (\$3.41); Corn-\$2.67 (\$2.37); Grain Sorghum-\$4.37 per cwt. (\$4.00); and Soybeans-\$5.69 (\$4.28).

Unfortunately farmers have no realistic price protection available to them through the "TARGET" prices in the 1973 Farm Law, as the recently adjusted prices for the 1976 Crop Show: Wheat-Target price, \$2.29; Corn-\$1.57; Grain Sorghum-\$1.49.

As you know, the President at the urging of Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz has vetoed farm legislation that would have provided modest price assurance for farmers. However, the Secretary already has the authority to provide price protection administratively--without new legislation. The adjustments for the 1976 crop are a feeble effort and I believe he should do much better. The Law allows him to raise price support levels to 90 percent of

parity and I believe that is exactly what should be done as soon as possible to offer protection to farmers who already have their crops in the ground and for those who will be working in their fields soon.

This is why I am writing to seek your co-sponsorship of a concurrent resolution that I will be introducing in the House of Representatives in a few days.

The Resolution would express to the Secretary that it is the sense of the Congress that he should promptly raise price support levels to 90 percent of parity; Secretary Butz would be requested to use the Administrative Authority he now has to take this action.

North Plains International, Inc. of Spearman is one of the most modern, complete farm equipment dealers in the Texas Panhandle. The firm which is owned by J. L. "Dick" Ebert, recently received the International Harvester XL Award. According to a top IH executive only a select group of dealers qualify for the company's award.

Ebert assumed ownership in November of 1976 after the retirement of Douglas D. Connelly, due to health and personal reasons. Before acquiring

the dealership here Ebert worked with International Harvester in various capacities, including area sales manager, regional parts manager and marketing manager-agricultural tractors.

Voters Make Choices

Voters in Spearman and Gruber turned out April 1 to pick school board members and city officials. As of March 31, 1978 absentee ballots had been received by the Spearman Independent School District and seven at Spearman City Hall in the municipal election.

Spearman voters were to pick two school trustees each for three year terms. Incumbent Jim O. Davis is one of the five candidates on the ballot. Other incumbents in the ballot include Larry Porter, Tommie White, Dr. Bob Phillips and Linda Holt Jarvis.

In the city election, Spearman Mayor C. Ralph Blodgett is unopposed for that office. Incumbents Brad Beedy and Bill Pittman have joined Edwin (Eddie) Limbeck in the race for the two aldermanic slots to be filled through the election process.

In the Gruber voting, two positions are open on the Gruber School Board with five names on the ballot in the race. Incumbent Lynn Hart and Dayton Barkley have filed for reelection to their terms which are expiring. V. B. Morris II, Jamie B. McLain and Robert (Bob) Adams also filed. However, as of March 30, Adams announced his ineligibility in a statement to the Gruber Statesman in which it was brought out he had failed to satisfy the 12-month residency required by law.

In the Gruber city election, incumbent J. W. Doke filed for reelection and Jerry Hart filed to make a race for the one position to be filled by the voters.

As in all elections, space has been provided on the ballot for write-in candidates. Polls in Spearman and Gruber opened at 7 a.m. and closed at 7 p.m.



Schools Plan TAP Participation

The Spearman school will be participating in the upcoming Texas Assessment Project (TAP) according to School Superintendent James Cunningham. The project is a survey of the achievement of Texas students in selected subjects. The study is designed to obtain dependable information on the achievement of Texas students in selected subjects. The assessment is being conducted because more needs to be known about how well students in Texas public schools are mastering basic skills. Information will be gathered that will enable legislators, educators, and other policymakers to improve the effectiveness of the educational programs in these areas.

State-wide students will be tested in the areas of reading, mathematics, citizenship, and writing. Reading and mathematics tests will be administered to students in grades 6 and 11, and writing and citizenship tests will be administered to 9, 13 and 17 year olds. In Spearman on April 11, 50 students in grades 3 & 4 will be tested. One group will be at 1 p.m. and another group at 1:45 p.m. in citizenship and writing. Also a group of 46 fifth graders will be tested in reading. A group of field administrators will administer the tests. The tests will be given to a selected 113,307 pupils from April 3 to May 5 to determine which state educational planning should turn. The tested sample includes pupils

attending 2,234 elementary and secondary schools who have been picked to represent the total scholastic population of 854,020 in the age and grade brackets chosen for testing.

All test data will be compiled state-wide and regionally, said Charles Nix, TEA associate commissioner. There will be no comparisons among school districts, campuses, students or teachers.

"Our sampling pattern is designed to describe performance statewide and within the 20 regions served by the state's education service centers," he said. Any effect of pinpoint results by district or individual school would be grossly inaccurate. "We have made sure we would get the right balance of age, grade, and ethnic mix of students as well as an accurate cross-section of different types of school districts."

In addition to total statewide results information will be reported by the following categories: size of school district, ethnicity of students, gender of students, type of school district, expenditures per pupil, and regions of the state.






