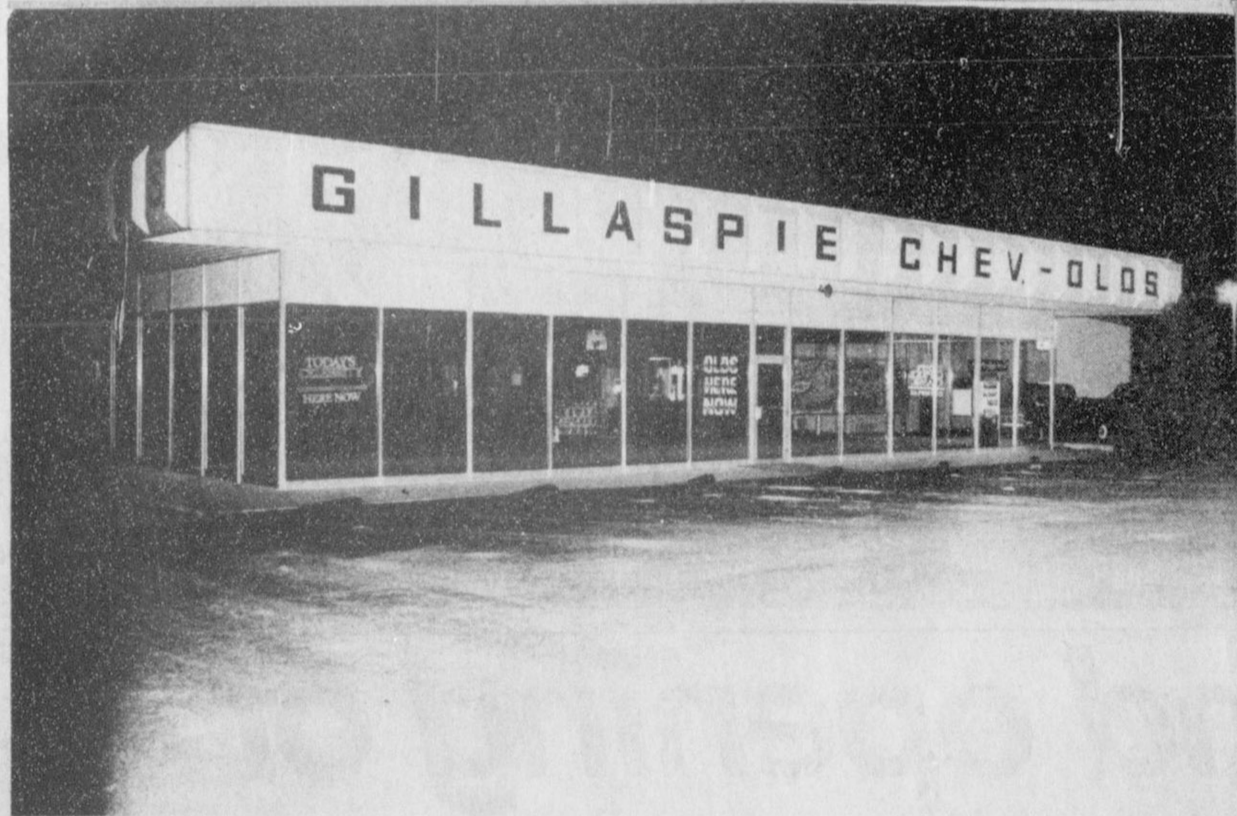

County is 2nd in wheat production

Last year's champion wheat producer, Hansford County, was ranked second this year with 6.15 million bushels of wheat harvested. The county was last year's champion, harvesting 7.3 million bushels.

Eight of 1984's top ten producing counties were in the Panhandle. Finishing first was Ochiltree county which led all Texas counties in 1984 with 7.03 million bushels of wheat, compared to 4.8 million bushels in 1983.

Other Panhandle counties finishing in fourth thru eighth places were Dallam County, with 4.8 million bushels; Deaf Smith County, 4.6 million; Castro County, 4.257 million; Swisher County, 4.25 million; and Moore County, 4.2 million. Parmer County finished tenth with 4.16 million bushels.

Last year's top ten, in order of finish, were Hansford, Dallam, Swisher, Moore, Ochiltree, Deaf Smith, Hill, Ellis, Willbarger and Castro.

Final Panhandle-area production statistics for 1984 are:

Armstrong County, 1,029,000 bushels; Briscoe, 685,000; Carson, 3,654,000; Castro, 4,257,000; Childress, 956,000; Collingsworth, 692,000; Dallam, 4,831,000; Deaf Smith, 4,591,000; Donley, 81,000; Floyd, 2,534,000; Gray, 2,054,000; Hale, 2,852,000; Hall, 173,000; Hansford, 6,148,000.

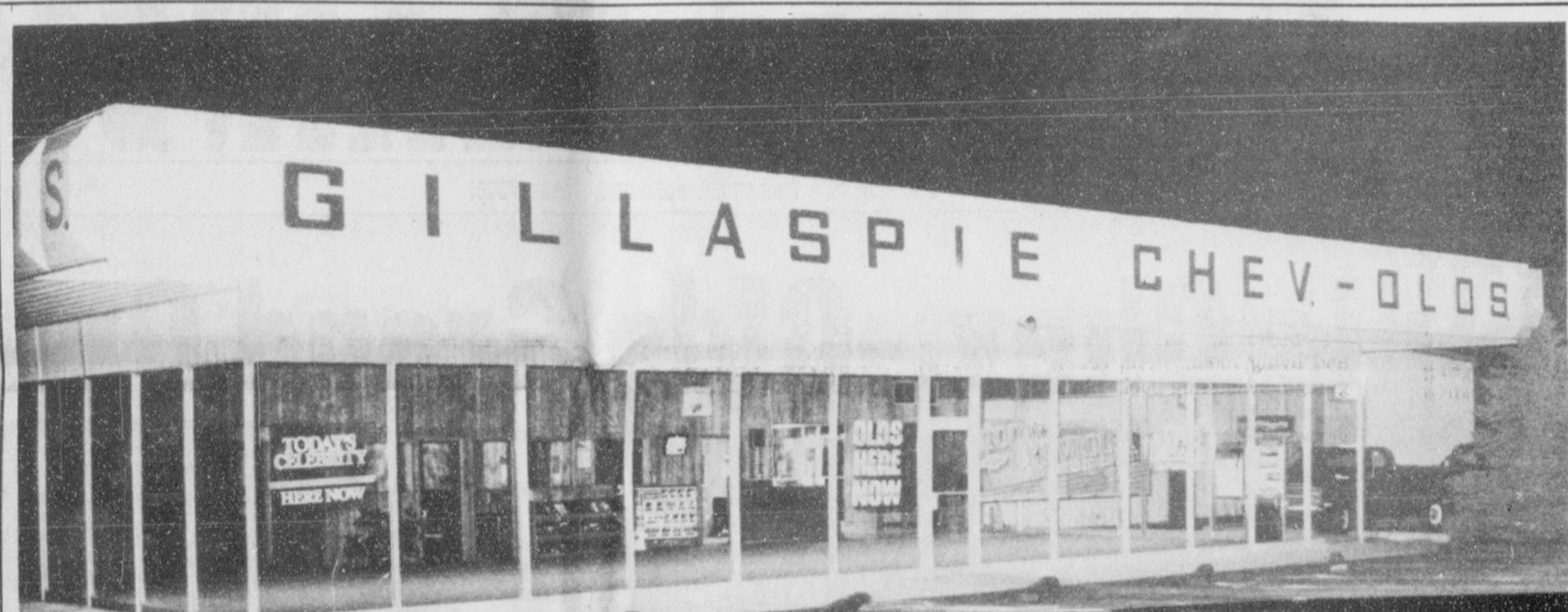

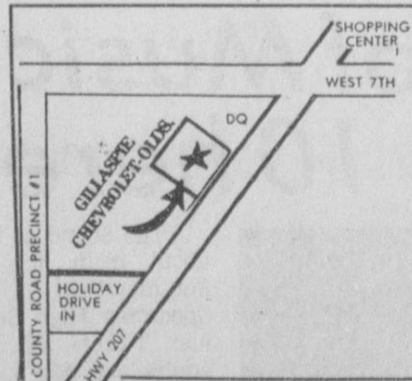

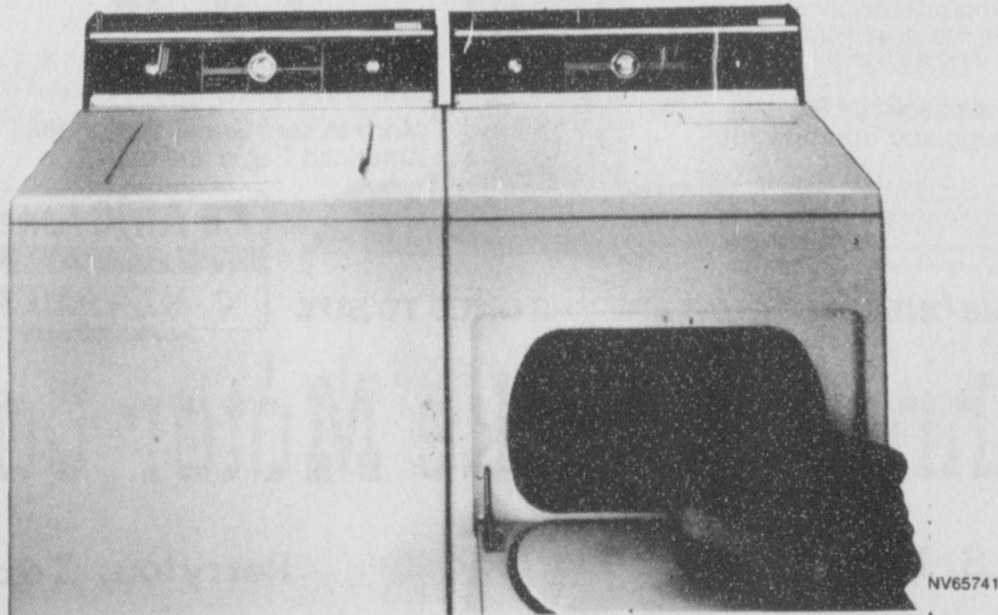

RULES FOR TEACHERS

1872

- Teachers each day will fill lamps, clean chimneys.
- Each teacher will bring a bucket of water and a scuttle of coal for the day's session.
- Make your pens carefully. You may whittle nibs to the individual taste of the pupils.
- Men teachers may take one evening each week for courting purposes, or two evenings a week if they go to church regularly.
- After ten hours in school, the teachers may spend the remaining time reading the Bible or other good books.
- Women teachers who marry or engage in unseemly conduct will be dismissed.
- Every teacher should lay aside from each pay a goodly sum of his earnings for his benefit during his declining years so that he will not become a burden on society.
- Any teacher who smokes, uses liquor in any form, frequents pool or public halls, or gets shaved in a barber shop will give good reason to suspect his worth, intepion, integrity and honesty.
- The teacher who performs his labor faithfully and without fault for

five years will be given an increase of twenty-five cents per week in his pay, providing the Board of Education approves.

RULES FOR TEACHERS

1915

- You will not marry during the term of your contract.
- You are not to keep company with men.
- You must be home between the hours of 8:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. unless attending a school function.
- You may not loiter downtown in ice cream stores.
- You may not travel beyond the city limits unless you have the permission of the chairman of the board.
- You may not ride in a carriage or automobile with any man unless he is your father or brother.
- You may not smoke cigarettes.
- You may not dress in bright colors.
- You may under no circumstances dye your hair.
- You must wear at least two petticoats.
- Your dresses must not be any shorter than two inches above the ankle.
- To keep the school room neat and clean, you must sweep the floor at least once daily, scrub the floor at least once a week with hot, soapy water, clean the blackboards at least once a day, and start the fire at 7:00 a.m. so the room will be warm by 8:00 a.m.

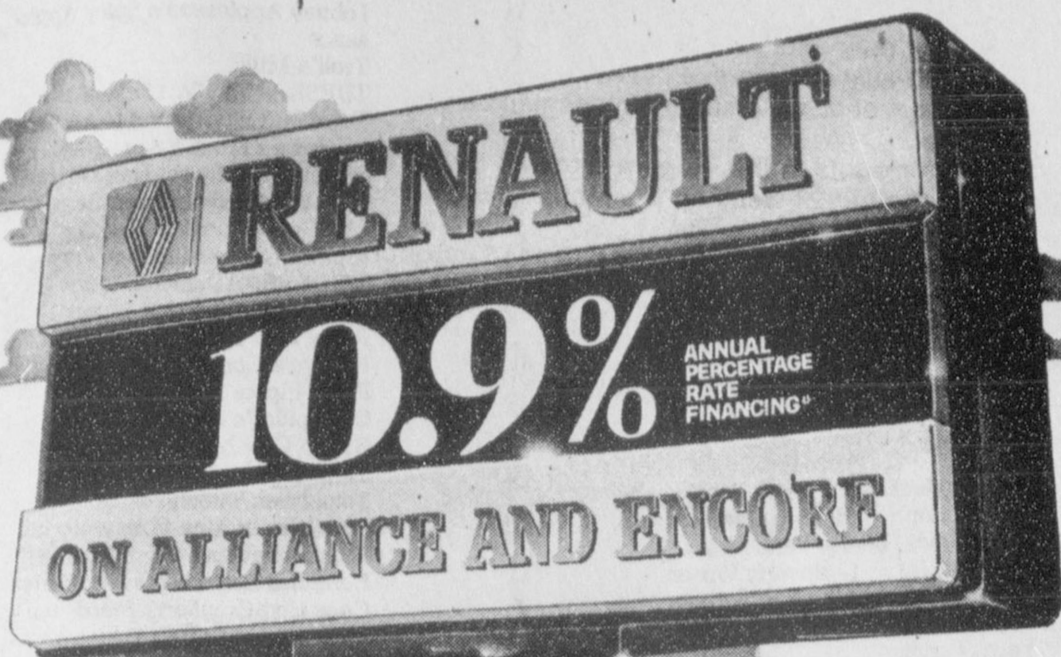

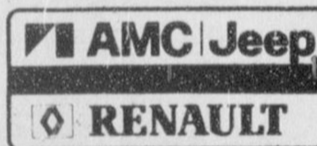

Missionary speaks to Rotarians



KEN CHAPMAN

Ken Chapman was the guest speaker at the Rotary meeting Monday. Mr. Chapman grew up in Borger and graduated from Borger High School. After graduation, he attended Frank Phillips College and then enrolled in dental school at the University of Texas in Houston. He graduated from dental school in 1979 and came to Spearman. He worked for Dr. Earl Novak, for the next 3 years.

Mr. Chapman then went to Liberia, West Africa for 7 months. He then joined Campus Crusade for Christ. He was then sent to Uganda where he has been for the last 4 1/2 years. Mr. Chapman is now home on furlough until January where he will return to Uganda. He works as a dentist at the Church of Uganda hospital.

Mr. Chapman gave the Rotary members some general information on Uganda. He told about his daily life at the hospital and the work he has done with Campus Crusade for Christ.

Mr. Chapman stated that Uganda is a country with many faces. It has mountains that rise to 16,000 feet with deep snows that are the beginning of the river The Nile. The land is very fertile just simply plant any type of seed and it will take root and grow.

The people of Uganda enjoy and like foreigners. There are not any racial problems (as there are in Southern Africa); however, there are tribal customs that cause terrorism. The citizens of towns and villages often get caught in a "cross-fire" between terrorists and government troops.

With more education, the families are smaller, many students now continue their graduate work in the United States.

I.C.E. planned

The Governor's Division of Emergency Management will hold I.C.E. 1 (Intense Cold Exercise) November 15 in Department of Public Safety Disaster Districts 5A, 5B and Sub 5B.

All city and county jurisdictions have been invited to participate in the four and one half hour exercise, and to date 38 are expected to be involved, Don Freeman, training officer for the Division, said.

The general scenario for the exercise is the effect of a severe cold weather system that passed through the region 17 days earlier, leaving ice and four inches of snow on the ground. Extremely cold temperatures have kept the snow and ice on the ground, and another storm system is expected to hit the area within hours. Cities who participate will be asked to determine the effects of food shortages and low natural gas supplies as well as other problems related to such severe weather, Free man said.

Our Heritage of Faith...

The Lutheran Church is a Creedal and Confessioning church. We confess three ancient creeds. These creeds have been accepted by almost all Christians. The Book of Concord contains the complete texts.

The Apostles' Creed was an updated version of the Old Roman Creed that was written around 200 A.D. The Apostles' Creed was written about 300 A.D. The Apostles' Creed had added the phrase, "He descended into hell." The only Biblical reference to this is found in 1 Peter 3:19, "in which he went and preached to the spirits in prison, who formerly did not obey, when God's patience waited in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight persons were saved through water."

The Nicene Creed dates back to the 4th-century Greek Church. It upholds the doctrine of one God in 3 persons, affirms the crucifixion and resurrection and states belief

in baptism for the forgiveness of sins and in the ultimate resurrection of the dead.

The Athanasian Creed, that is, the origin is unknown. Some studies trace it to the 5th or 6th century France, others to North Africa. This creed focuses on Christ as true God and true man in one person, by whose life and death the world is offered salvation. The creed was named after a clergyman by the name of Athanasius who had nothing to do with the creed.

Hansford County voters flocked to the polls Tuesday in record numbers, as did all area voters for the general election.

Out of 3387 registered voters, 2476 went to the polls, which is 73 percent. Reagan-Bush received 2213 votes, while Mondale-Ferraro received 259. Lyndon H. LaRouche and Bruce M. Davis received 4 votes.

Republican Phil Gramm, candidate for U.S. Senator received 2073 votes, and his opponent Lloyd Doggett, 365.

For U.S. Representative, District 13, in an upset, Beau Boulter received 1567 votes to incumbent Jack Hightower's 853.

John Thomas Henderson, Republican candidate for Railroad Commissioner received 1367 and opponent Mack Wallace 853.

Republican John L. Bates, running for Chief Justice, Supreme Court received 1346 votes and his opponent John L. Hill 931.

Virgil E. Mulanax, Republican candidate for Judge, court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1 received 1389 and his opponent Sam Houston Clinton received 724.

Other candidates were all Democrats with the exception of District Judge, 84th Judicial District, J.E. Blackburn, who received 2006 votes.

Franklin S. Spears, Justice, Supreme Court, Place 1 received 1111 votes.

C.L. Ray, Justice, Supreme Court, Place 2, 1105.

W.C. (Bill) Davis, judge, court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2, 1156.

Bill White, Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 3, 1167.

State Senator, District 31, Bill Sarpalius received 1345 votes.

State Representative, District 88, J.W. (Buck) Buchanan received 1158 votes.

District Attorney, 84th Judicial District Democrat Phil Black 921, and Republican Gene Compton received 1365.

County incumbents John L. Hutchison, county attorney, received 1556; Sheriff R.L. McFarlin, 1361, Helen Dry, County Tax Assessor-Collector, 1679; Garland Head, County Commissioner, Precinct 1, 395 votes and County Commissioner, Precinct No. 3, B.J. Renner, 423.

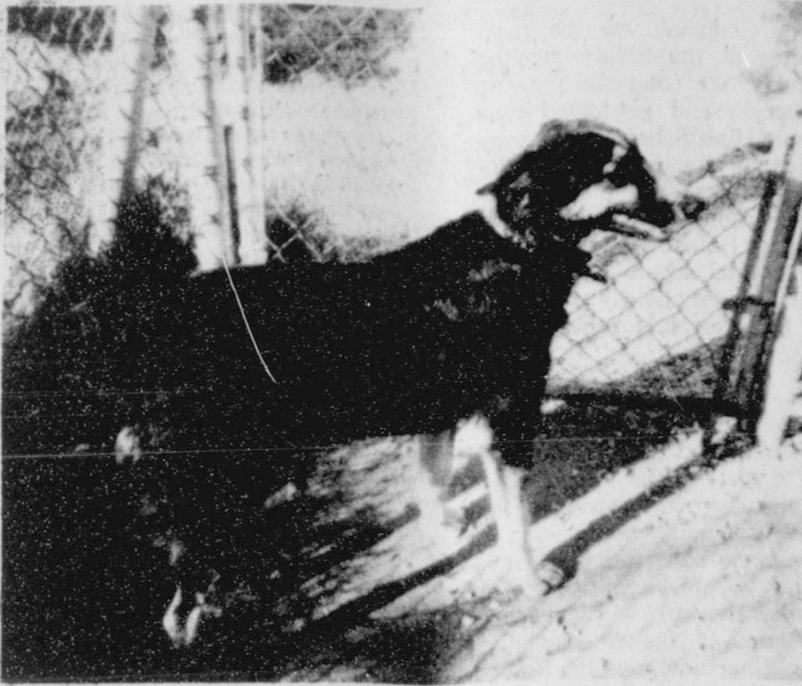
