March 2-8 National PTA Drug and Alcohol Awareness Week

From a survey conducted in conjunction with the Spearman Public School Discipline Management Program it was learned better than 50% of the parents that completed the survey perceived that Drug and Alcohol were major concerns. Mr. Friemel said, "Alcohol is a definite problem in Spearman. We do not see this at school but out in the community. We do not have as big of a problem with drugs as we do alcohol." Mr. Butler also commented, "Alcohol is a problem because of peer pressure. For a community this size ALCOHOL is more of a problem than drugs. We would like to lend our support to any anti-drug organization formed in this community."

Children and teens want to be able to talk to their parents or other adults about drugs and alcohol but don't know how or are afraid to do so. This week March 2-8 the Spearman PTA and thousands of others across the country are observing National PTA drug and Alcohol Awareness among parents, educators and others interested in the well being of children that

they can take positive steps toward preventing drug and alcohol use among the young.

The theme of our effort is PREVENTION: A POSITIVE APPROACH. We hope parents will take the time now to learn the facts about drugs and alcohol use and answer their children's questions, before problems start. Research shows that children as young as nine years old know about drugs and alcohol, so it's never too soon to address the subject.

There are several excellent brochures available from the National PTA-some of which will be sent home with our students and will also be available at Open House during Public School Week March 3-8.

In connection with Public School Week and Open House the Spearman PTA will be sponsoring a film fair to obtain some good information. There will not be a program or speaker-simply showing of a film. During Open House night the film that will be shown at High School in the Home-making Department is Sons and

Daughters/Drugs and Booze-the 28 minute film is for parents and adults-it takes a look at alcohol and drugs use among young people and offers suggestions on how parents can help them. It will also be shown at 7:15 and 7:45 at the Jr. High Cafeteria. During Public School Week Tamra Boyd will be showing, "How Do You Tell" to grades 2-6. This 13 min. film lets kids know that if they care about someone-it's OK to tell them what they think. Especially if they're involved with marijuana, alcohol or tobacco. This film, a combination of live interviews and animation, encourages kids to assert themselves and say "No."

Parents can help their children say "No" to drugs and alcohol. Let's make sure our children have a healthy tomorrow by taking a positive approach today.

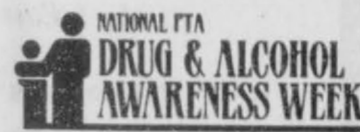

Spearman, Hansford County, Texas, March 12, 1920

County Court

Judge Townsend's court has been
going good at Hansford this week
and has been the cause of a number
of perfectly good farmers and other
workmen losing several days' work.
Numerous cases have been disposed
of, including one-third of a dozen
charges of gaming against Lawrence
Wilbanks. This batch of cases were
dismissed, as were also a similar
number against Henry Wilbanks.
The supposition was that the boys
had been spending their evenings,
mornings, and a part of the after-
noons in exhilarating sessions with
dominoes of the galloping vari-
ety, but the county attorney thought
the evidence insufficient for conviction
and had the cases dismissed.
For the elucidation of those of our
readers who do not keep posted and
up-to-the-minute on indoor sports
and pastimes, we wish to state that
in a game played with galloping
dominoes it is the numerals "7" and
"11" which bring home the bacon,
instead of "5" and multiples thereof,
as is the case in the old-style game.
The State of Texas vs. George
Washington Tally came to the atten-
tion of the court in regular order.
This case was supposed to have been
tried on the 22nd of February but
the attorneys could not get ready at
that time. George Washington was
accused of aggravated assault. It
was the plea of the state's attorney
that Mr. Tally had willfully and ma-
liciously, with premeditated design,
made an assault upon one Clarence
R. Kern with a deadly weapon, to wit:
One-half of a single-tree with a clip
on it. This was a jury trial and re-
sulted in the complete vindication of
George Washington, who was repre-

Next came a civil case entitled

was dismissed at cost of plaintiff.

A diet without exercise is like a car without an engine - it won't go anywhere.

Aerobic exercise drives up your metabolic rate. Have you ever been on a diet and found that your rate of weight loss slows down the longer you diet? That's because the metabolic rate decreases with a diet by 10-15%.

Combining exercise with diet counter-balances the problem by increasing your metabolic rate to burn more calories.

Many people believe that exercise increases the desire to eat, but the researchers don't agree. Studies show a decrease in appetite follows strenuous exercise in most people, especially those who are normally inactive.

reduces hunger pangs.

When you exercise, food passes through your intestinal tract much faster. This means a smaller percentage of the day's calories are absorbed.

Exercise also has psychological benefits. It can give you a sense of accomplishment, self-esteem, well-

being and self-control. With these positive feelings, the commitment necessary to stay on your diet will be easier to find.

So if you're on a diet or thinking of starting one, put on your walking shoes - you'll get to your weight loss goal a lot faster than you will in a car with no engine.

The Bible God's Gift To Us

David V. Fultz, Evangelist, Church of Christ

We noted previously that the Bible claims to be inspired of God, and that these claims are substantiated, that it was written by holy men of God as they were moved by the Holy Spirit. 2 Pet. 1:20-21, 2 Tim. 3:16-17; Matt. 24:35; 2 Pet. 1:3.

However, concerning the original manuscripts upon which the Bible was written we have none remaining today. Perhaps this is because God knew, like the Israelites of old, who worshipped the brazen serpent which Moses had made in the wilderness, Num. 21:8; 2 Kings 18:4, we would do the same with an original manuscript written by one of apostles or prophets, however we do have copies of these and carefulness was always manifested by the scribes to see that every copy was letter perfect. Moses wrote the first five books of the Old Testament, about 1400 B.C. and the last of the Old Testament was written about 400 B.C. by Malachi. There are 39 of these books and being for the Hebrews was originally written in that language. It was translated into the Greek in the year 277 B.C., by seventy scholars, which translation is known as the Septuagint version of the Old Testament. It was then in the complete form we have it today, and recent discoveries like those at Qumran bear this out.

There are three manuscripts which have had the most prominence as being authentic and from which our English versions have been translated. However there are many other discoveries, and pieces or fragments of manuscripts older than these that

have been compared for authenticity. One of these manuscripts is the Codex Sinaiticus, found at the foot of Mt. Sinai in 1844. This manuscript is complete except for some small portions of the Old Testament. It dates back to the 3rd century A.D. and is believed by some to be one of those fifty produced and copied by Constantine. It is in the British Museum in London today.

Another is the Codex Vaticanus which is in the Vatican at Rome where it has been since 1475. This manuscript is also fairly complete and is believed to be one of those produced and copied by Constantine.

The third is the Codex Alexandrinus which was written in Alexandria, Egypt in about the fifth century A.D., it is also in the British Museum. These along with many other discoveries, dating back to earlier years, are the ones from which we get our Bible in its present form of 39 books in the Old Testament and 27 in the New Testament. There were forty different writers of the Bible, who were inspired of God over a period of about 1500 years to give us His word for our guidance in matters pertaining to Life and Obedience. 2 Pet. 1:3; Jude 2:3. These were all in the original written in the Hebrew or Greek language. A version is a translation from the original language into another and next time we will note some of these versions.

The Alamo

On the sixth of March, 1836, Mexican General Santa Anna committed an error which made certain independence for Texas. Texans had proclaimed a revolution (with an eye on later admission to the United States) and Mexican soldiers were seeking to put down the insurrection. The Mexican Government had a good legal case.

General Santa Anna arrived before the Texas-manned mission, which had been converted into a fort, with several thousand troops. For ten days he bombarded the Texans but failed to breach the fort's walls. During this time, also, thirty-two volunteers arrived to bolster the defenses.

On the 6th, Mexicans attacked in overwhelming force. The Texans and other U.S. defenders turned them back. The Mexicans attacked again and were repulsed

a second time. But Santa Anna persisted. His third wave overran the fort. Only five defenders were taken alive, one of them being David Crockett. Santa Anna ordered them executed.

The cold-blooded order infuriated Texans, and U.S. citizens everywhere. Six weeks later a revenge-minded force of Texans and others met Santa Anna in the battle of San Jacinto, sweeping his forces from the field to the cry of, "Remember the Alamo," and winning independence for Texas.

Lee, Dear!
On Being Fired-
Iacocca's Politics-
Two Sides-

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- Democrats looking for a good political image, a la Ronald Reagan, got another lesson from Lee Iacocca recently.

Iacocca has a knack for being fired and then pleading his case as the underdog immigrant in the media to the people, who in turn rally against the establishment that fired him.

He did that at Ford. After Interior Secretary Donald Hodel fired him from one of two positions involving Ellis Island and the Statue of Liberty, he even charged his firing bordered on the "un-American."

But there were two sides to the recent firing. Iacocca wasn't willing to take orders. He obviously calculated (wrongly) that Hodel wouldn't fire him and he would get his way. He did that also at Ford but Ford fired him despite the uproar he created.

Hodel wanted a privately-built conference center on Ellis Island; Iacocca was adamantly opposed. Differences seemed irreconcilable and also there was a question whether the same individual raising funds should be spending them.

This didn't slow Iacocca, who went on live TV. It was good color and good politics--if that's what

Iacocca has in mind. And he might have just that in mind.

He already writes a column--which Ronald Reagan did. He has hired a former editorial writer to advise him on economic issues, who tells reporters Iacocca thinks the American people want to listen to him.

And he may be encouraged by boobos being made by Vice President George Bush's campaign managers. Several gaffes have come from the Bush entourage, now headed by Lee Atwater, who was vice-chairman of the Reagan-Bush campaign in 1984.

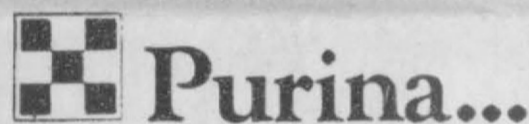
The 1984 campaign was a shoo-in and gaffes and poor coordination, and organization didn't matter. George Bush isn't likely to enjoy such

momentum. Iacocca may have the charisma in 1988. His TV commercials are on a par with Reagan's TV mastery.

In Washington, Iacocca detractors note that he led Chrysler back to profit only with a huge federal bailout, and note his several firings. But secretly Iacocca is admired for his PR ability. Whether he will devote a year or two to the job of winning delegates is the key question right now for Iacocca.

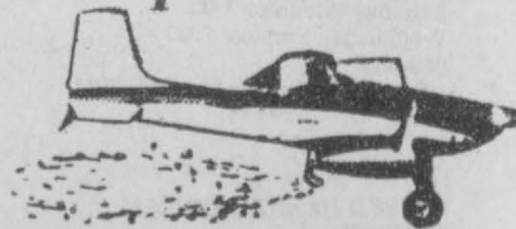

Spearman Equity Exchange

A number of Hansford county citizens met at the court house in Hansford last Monday in response to a call by W. N. Bohanan, an organizer of the National Equity Union, and the organization of the Spearman Co-Operative Equity Exchange was perfected. This movement had already been started by a number of the farmers and ranchmen of Hansford and Hutchinson counties and Mr. Bohanan complimented them on the progress they had made and gave them considerable information relative to the Equity Exchange they had not been able to procure elsewhere. The constitution and by-laws of the organization were adopted and officers and directors were elected. Geo. L. Roland, G. M. Whitson, W. C. Wemble, J. H. Cooper and R. L. McClellan were elected as directors. The directors then selected the officers from their own number, in accordance with the constitution and by-laws of the organization, as follows: Geo. L. Roland, president; G. M. Whitson, vice president and R. L. McClellan, secretary-treasurer. There is considerable work yet to be done. The organization will incorporate under the state laws.

The directors of the Exchange will meet next Saturday to take up the matter of procuring a charter, employing a manager and other necessary matters to rush the business of the concern in order that they may begin to buy wheat at Spearman at the earliest possible date.

The Equity Exchange will have a capital stock of \$40,000.00, a large part of which has already been subscribed. A campaign will be made the latter part of this month for the purpose of getting as many subscribers for stock as possible and following this will be a meeting at the court house at Hansford, to put the final touches to the organization. The president of the National Farmers' Equity Union will attend this meeting and will deliver an address on the Union program.

The object of this organization is to insure adequate marketing facilities and a fair price for the products of the farm and ranch.

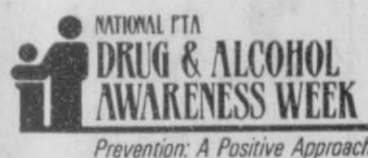
