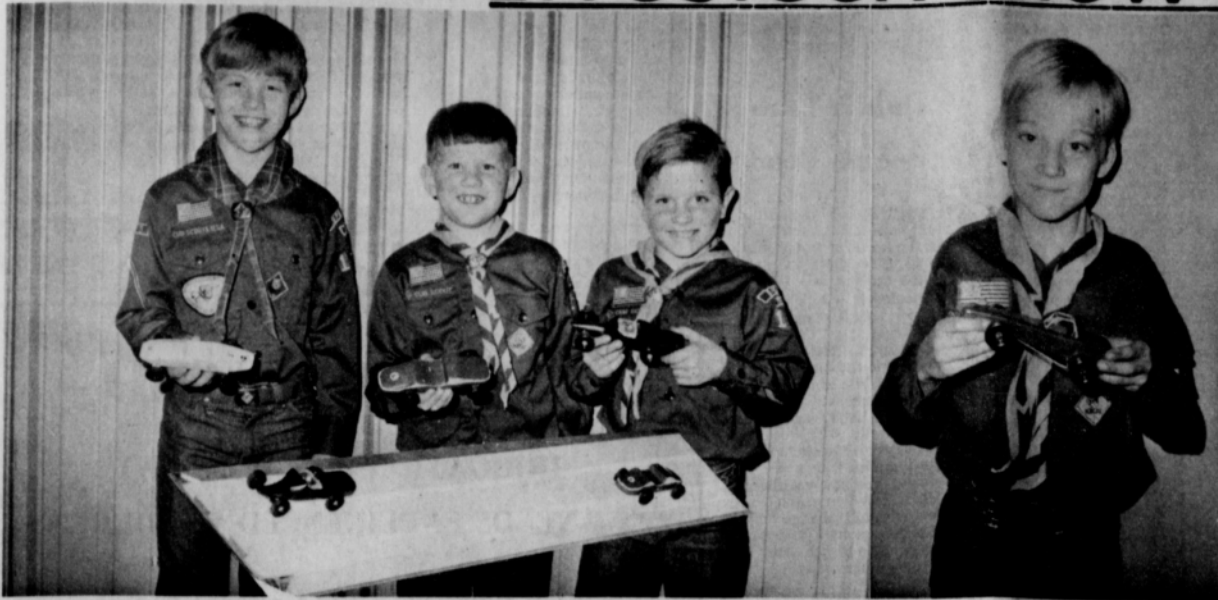


# Livestock Show Is March 19 & 20

### Bucy Infant Dies At Goodwell

Graveside services were held at 1 p.m. Friday in Linden, Texas for Dylan Stewart Bucy, the infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Greg Bucy. Mrs. Bucy is the former Pam Wylson of Spearman.

The infant was dead on arrival at Guyton Municipal Hospital shortly before 1 p.m. Wednesday. A Goodwell ambulance answered the call about 12:30 p.m. and a Goodwell fireman administered mouth-to-mouth resuscitation. The baby was rushed to the hospital where a further effort at reviving was made. The body was sent to Oklahoma City for an autopsy. The autopsy report stated it was a crib death.

Survivors include the parents, who are Panhandle State University students, one brother, grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Sam Wylson of Spearman, and great-grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Davis of Spearman.

they reviewed the history of manned flight from the beginnings and the study of the first rocket experiments undertaken in this country. The conclusion of the program was highlighted by a blast off from earth and voyage to the moon. Through visual and sound effects they experienced what a flight of this type might actually be like. As they were accelerated from the earth's surface, the sky grew darker and the planets clearer and brighter than they had ever seen them before. Upon reaching the moon they observed the first lunar explorers as they made their way over the rocky lunar terrain.

The ending of the program was a crash on the moon and it would take four days before another ship could be sent to take them from the moon.

The students were given a problem to figure out when they returned to their class room.

The cost was \$1.00 per student and it was certainly worth every penny for it was a fine educational program for the students and a rewarding experience.

## Woman, Girl Survive Collision with Trucks

A Canadian mother and her two-year-old daughter remained in good condition at Ochiltree General Hospital Tuesday following a Monday collision with two semi-trailer trucks two miles east of Sam's Corner.

Mrs. Sandra Burch and her daughter, Sonja Marie, were heading east on FM 281 at about 12:50 p.m. in their 1971 Volkswagen station wagon, following a 1971 GMC semi-truck owned by Clark Dirt Contractors.

When the semi-truck slowed down to pull to the side of the road, the Volkswagen slammed into its rear, investigating Highway Patrolman Kenneth Donahue said.

"She hit that truck in the rear and bounced in front of another semi-truck that belonged to Dale Davis of Spearman," Donahue said. The second truck "ran

over her" and popped the Volkswagen into the bar ditch, Donahue explained. The VW landed upright in the ditch and the mother and child remained in the automobile.

Both the child and mother were rushed to Ochiltree General Hospital by a Perryton ambulance.

The two-year-old sustained head injuries, while the mother had head injuries, an injury to her wrist and "banged up knees," the officer reported. "They were lucky," he added.

The driver of the Davis truck from Spearman, Willis Randall, mentioned that he hurt his shoulder in the accident, but that he would seek aid from a private physician, the officer said.

The Clark truck first struck by the Burch car was carrying a bulldozer.

### Sheriff's Report

Sheriff R. L. McFarlin reported that his office has recovered a stolen Chevrolet van truck on the 10 of March in Morse, Texas. The vehicle was occupied by a 14 year old juvenile. This made the fourth stolen vehicle that has been recovered by the Sheriff's Office since Jan. 1, 1976.

In other action by the Sheriff's Office, M. M. Jessie M. Taylor, white female 34 years old, was charged with DWI and released on \$500.00 bond. Mrs. Taylor's arrest followed information received on Channel 9 on the C. B. radio in the Sheriff's Office.

Since January 1 Sheriff McFarlin reported there has been 4 subjects arrested and charged with burglary, 6 drunk disturbances, 4 wanted fugitives, 4 for theft, 3 investigations, 7 for possession of marijuana, 1 criminal mischief, 1 contributing to minor, 4 run aways, 2 driving under the influence of drugs, 2 assaults, 4 auto theft, 1 probation violation, and 10 for swindle with worthless checks making a total of 54 arrests since Jan. 1.

On 10 arrests for swindle with worthless checks the total amount of fines was \$489.60 and checks that were collected and returned to merchants of Hansford County totaled \$1,145.14.

Also James Russell Johnson who was wanted for forgery by the Sheriff's Office has been returned to the Hansford County jail to await trial starting on March 15. Johnson has been in custody in Kansas City, Kansas for the past two weeks.

Lawrence Connelly, age 89, died March 5 at Mission Manor Rest Home in Mount Vernon where he had been a resident for the past three years.

Funeral services were held in Cypress Baptist Church on March 6 with burial in Cypress Cemetery with Masonic graveside services.

Mr. Connelly had been a resident of the Cypress area all of his life and had been a farmer and rancher. He was a Mason for 60 years and a member of the Cypress Baptist Church for 76 years.

Survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Bill Hightower of Mt. Vernon, three sons, Earl Connelly of Dalhart, Bert Connelly of Richardson and Doug Connelly of Spearman, fifteen grandchildren and 20 great-grandchildren.

## Bullock Says State Spending Up

Austin--Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that large increases in personnel, education and welfare costs are leading a 29 percent state spending surge this year over fiscal 1975 levels.

In his monthly financial statement, Bullock said salaries and wages have increased 26 percent, medical care for the needy 32 percent, foundation school program grants 43 percent and grants to higher education 33 percent.

But the Comptroller announced at the same time that tax revenues are 19 percent ahead of last year so far.

"The biggest jumps are in the natural gas tax, which is up 40 percent, the motor vehicle sales tax, up 27 percent, and insurance occupation taxes, up 33 percent," Bullock said.

Bullock added that state revenues during January totaled \$476 million, bringing revenues during the fiscal year, which began September 1, to \$2.4 billion so far.

Expenditures during January totaled \$528 million, he said, bringing expenditures this year to date to \$2.8 billion.

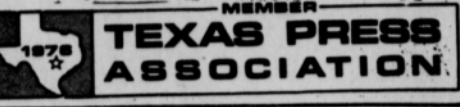

The British tried to break through the American lines but were forced back in the first battle of Freeman's Farm on September 19, 1777. Instead of retreating to Canada, Burgoyne tried a second time to break the American lines and on October 7 was once again driven back. ### Commemorative Coin Issued

The Hutchinson County Historical Commission has issued a commemorative coin in honor of county's 100th anniversary (1876-1976), and the 50th year of the city of Borger, Texas. Hutchinson County was the site of two historic battles at Adobe Walls. The first, in 1864, was between detachments of U. S. Cavalry led by Kit Carson and

Kiowa and Comanche Indians. The second battle in 1874 was between a handful of buffalo hunters and 700 Indians. The City of Borger, located on the southern edge of Hutchinson County, was born in oil and purged by being twice placed under martial law by 1930 during prohibition years. Borger celebrated its golden ann-

iversary March 8, 1976. The artwork is done by prominent artists, Lynn Morris, of Borger News-Herald, and Richard Hogue, a promising Borger artist. 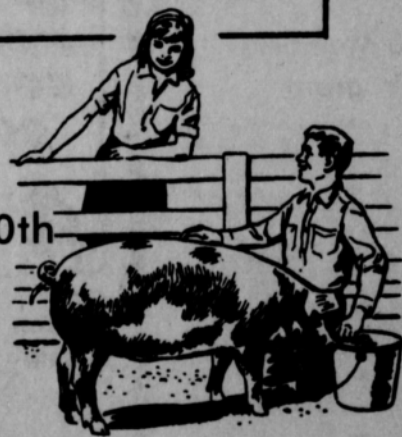
